

The French Chamber of De puties is considering a bill to enforce compulsory physical training for all boys and girls over six years old, as a beginning to prepare them for army service in elementary schools. This is only following the trend of most) European countries. Austria has lately put all boys between 11 and 18 into uniform for purposes of sport, military training and political education.

In Italy every boy of 12 has to join the "balilla," wear a uniform and be subjected to military discipline, and lately Mussolini has promulgated an order that boys of six shall be put into training and uniform against the time when they are old enought to undergo the more rigorous discipline of the balilla

In Germany the "Youth Movement" has become almost a brownshirted militia. In Russia the age of military conscription has become lowered to 16 years. Every boy from 18 years onward must do compulsory military service in France and Germany.






