Folks this means we are getting a 15 percent deduction on the fire portion of the insurance policies that are renewed between April 1, 1965 and April 1, 1966. Last year we had a 10 percent credit but due to the low loss by fire during 1964 we have earned another 5 percent credit. We can continue to get these credits until we reach 25 percent credit, but only if our losses continue to remain low. So folks let's all think of our pocket books and practice fire prevention all the time. Of course a few large losses could start us in the other direction for penalties. The net fire loss for the city of Dimmitt, that is a very low loss ratio. We wish to thank all of you for the co-operation and safe thinking of the past year. Let's all keep up the good work in the future. At this time we would like to mention some of er figures we have that might be of interest to you. The key rate for Dimmitt is now at 24 cents. Our five year (60-64) net loss was \$70,818.00, for a yearly average loss of \$14,163.60. The net fire premiums paid during the same period (60-64) were \$192,214.00, for an average of \$38,442.80 per year. 
FERTILIZING LAWNS

Lawn fertilization time is here a Lawn fertilization time is here a-gain so a few comments this week on this subject shuld be appropriate. Keep in mind that you are growing a plant which is primarily vegetative in nature, hence, nitrogen is the key to good lawn grass growth. You should start, however, with a hasic application of high phosphate fertili-zer such as 11-48-0, 13-39-0, 18-46-0 or 16-20-0. If grades with porassium and sulphur are available, include these in your early spring fertilization proin your early spring fertilization program. For the grades listed above, apply about 5 to 8 lbs. per 1000 square feet of lawn space. Then comes the plan to water and mow. A good rule plan to water and mow. A good rule of thumb would be to apply 2 lbs. actual nitrogen per 1 square feet every 4 to 6 weeks. This can be applied by using about 10 lbs. ammonium sulphate, 6 lbs. ammonium nitrate or 4 lbs. urea per 1 square feet. Water in the nitrogen fertilizer

Proper watering is one of the important phases of good lawn care. When watering a lawn, apply a sufficient amount to wet the soil to a depth of at least one foot. Deep watering encourages deeper root growth which will cive you a much better which will give you a much better lawn throughout the season and help the grass through the winter. With the grass through the winter. With proper watering and good root penetration, it will be necessary to water most lawn grasses only once every 7 to 1 days. The exception would be drouthy or very sandy soils. Some of the grasses which require more care may need watering more often. Liquid fertilizers are being developed which will be ideally suited for

Liquid ferfilizers are being develop-ed which will be ideally suited for lawns and which can be applied in a sprinkler system. They will be easy to apply and will do a good job. The equipment, however, to properly ap-ply liquids in a sprinkler system has not yet been fully developed.

GSPA Approves **Current Seed** Grain Law

Farmer-directors of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association at a meeting in Amarillo, Texas, on Tues-day, April 20, unanimously approved the continuation and extension of the current feed grain law.

The law provides for a program of diversion payments, price suppor loans and certificate payments for farmers who divert parts of their crop land from farm production. The action is in effect an endorsement of the program requested by President Johnson and outlined by Secretary Freeman before Congress several days ago and it is now known as the Agricultural Act of 1965.

The directors also endorsed several changes asked by Freeman from the Brown-Burt Plan current operation of the law includ-


(8) A continuation of the current provision for permitting substitution of wheat and feed grains.

The grain sorghum growers took exception to the Secretary's request hat soybeans be allowed to be planted on "diverted acres" from fd grains in that it was felt that he had adequate opportunity for expanding soybean production from the provi sion allowing soybeans to be planted on feed grain acres.
