### ALL-STARS WIN 7-0 MUD GAME

### WILSON STARS AS EXES SLIP TO 7-VICTORY OVER BOB- CATS TUESDAY IN MUD

On a field of mud that throttled the sweeping runs around the wings the Dimmitt High School Bobcats learned a bit about grid- iron navigation Tuesday afternoon when the brilliant Raymond Wil- son displaying flashes of his hol- lege form led the ex-stars to a smashing 7 to 0 victory over the school lads.

The exes received the opening kick and felt out the Bobcats for- ward wall with line plays and then kicked into the opponent's territory. An exchange of for- ward passes found the Stars forging to the youngster's goal, but the condition of the slippery field kept each team at bay through the first period. In the second quarter the exes used passes and powerful tackle smashes carried the ball to the Cats' 10 yard line as the half ended in a scoreless draw.

Recovering the ball midfield the stars loosed a withering line at- tack which swept the scholastics deep into their own territory. A cleverly executed basket pass from Wilson to Cowsett coupled with fine blocking by "Tater" Webb carried the ball to the 12 yard line from where Wilson plunged over left tackle for the six points. An aerial from Wilson to Braswell in the end zone added the extra point.

This set-back apparently irked the Purple and White gridsters and a pass to Johnson and some neat gains by Lile penetrated the exes' thirty yard marker, but there the attack bogged down and again the ghost stars took control of the situation.

Adding variety to the program and a few laughs Mrs. Noel Golle- hon entertained with a reading, "So did I".

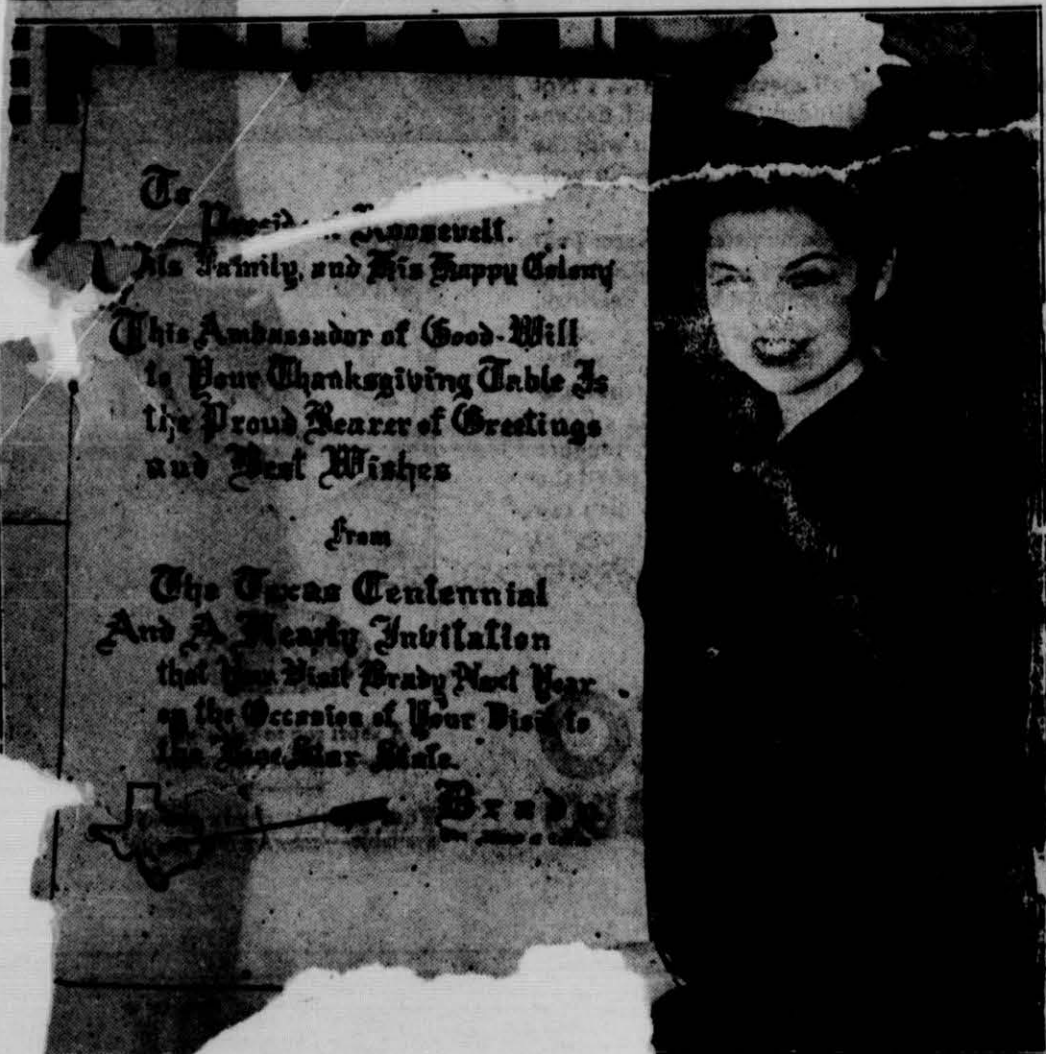
