

# 1971 rain gauge overflows

During last Thursday's steady drizzle, the rainfall total in Dimmitt passed the "annual average" mark of 16.75 inches, with 99 days still remaining in 1971.

THEN THE rain continued to alternately drizzle and pour through midday Friday, until it had dropped 2.42 inches for the week, hiked September's rainfall to a near-record 5.34 inches and swelled the year's total so far to 18.88.

This has been the wettest September here since 1926, with more rain still possible before the month runs out at midnight tonight. The September rains came in the backwash of the second wettest August in the last half-century. Dimmitt received an even 6.00 inches last month.

The 11.34 inches of moisture in the last 60 days is the highest August-September total ever recorded in Castro County.

AVERAGE rainfall for the two months during the past 51 years has been 2.24 for August and 1.57 for September, according to the records of Edwin "Goose" Ramey and Howard Cook, US weather observers.

In the last half-century, only one August was wetter. That was just two years ago, when the month brought 6.38 inches. September has been the wettest (See RAIN GAUGE, Page 13)

## Sheriff's new teletype fingers crooks anywhere

Law enforcement communications have become so sophisticated that a good crook can't find a place to hide anymore.

CASE in point: the new computerized teletype machine installed recently in the Castro County Sheriff's Office.

It replaces the traditional teletype sender-receiver, with which messages were sent only as fast as the sender could type them.

On the new machine, you still type the message at your own speed, but the machine turns out a perforated paper tape as you do so. And to send the message, you feed the tape into the computer unit, and the machine does the rest. With a high-speed electronic brr-r-r, it will send even the longest message in a matter of seconds, routing it automatically to the specific places you want it to go.

THE MACHINE ties the sheriff's office here into the new Texas Law Enforcement Teletype Net, and all messages go through a giant computer at the Texas Dept. of Public Safety headquarters in Austin.

The DPS computer follows the sender's coded orders: if the message is to go, say, to Dallas and El Paso, the computer center routes it to those agencies and the message clacks off their high-speed receiving machines in seconds. If the message re-

quests information on an individual from the DPS's central files in Austin, the computer alerts operators there, and the answer soon will be on its way back to Dimmitt over the same high-speed network.

To the Austin computer, Dimmitt's code-name is WR.

WHEN IT'S completed, the Texas Law Enforcement Teletype Net will put the sheriff's office here into instant contact not only with every other sheriff's office and major law agency in Texas, but with those in all other states, and with FBI headquarters in Washington, D.C.

"We have two directories of code letters for routing," explained Mrs. Frankie Reed, radio-teletype operator for the sheriff's office. "One of the books includes all the Texas agencies and the other is the national directory. When we want to send a message to some town in another state, we code it for that state and town and the message goes from Austin to their state capital, then on to the specific agency we want to contact."

Sheriff Jack Cartwright added, "It won't be long until we have a direct link with the FBI in Washington."

THE advantages of such a widespread, rapid communications system are obvious. With

the instant tie-in to all the record centers at the local, state and federal levels, a law agency can find out whether a suspect once got a traffic ticket in Dubuque or whether he's wanted for murder in Miami Beach, in a fraction of the time it used to take.

The system will save the innocent man time, and will save the law enforcement agencies both time and money, with fewer overnight holds, bookings, lockups, meals, etc.

But for the man who is guilty and on the run, the computerized teletype machine in the sheriff's office is bad news.

## First bale is in

Castro County's first bale of 1971 cotton was ginned Wednesday morning—and it was a Sunnyside product from the seed to the bundling.

CARL BRADLEY produced the first bale on the Weldon Bradley farm, and Morrison Gin Co. ginned it. It was Ricot 90 variety, developed by Ray Joe Riley, Sunnyside cotton breeder and producer.

The first bale came from 1,960 pounds of "nice, wet seed cotton" which was hand-picked Tuesday afternoon from a three-

acre tract on the Bradley farm, Morrison reported.

The seed cotton produced a 450-lb. bale and 820 pounds of seed.

CASTRO County's first bale was ginned free by Gene Morrison, owner, and Gene Ross, manager of the gin. The bale was produced officially at 9:40 a.m. Wednesday.

Ross and Bradley delivered the bale to Dimmitt's traditional first-bale showplace—the corner of Broadway and Bedford, next to the ASCS Office—at 10 a.m. Wednesday.

## Cats to hit road to Green Land to test defending 3-AA champs

Dimmitt's Bobcats will launch the District 3-AA race Friday night when they travel to Floydada to take on the mean green Whirlwinds.

THOSE Whirlwinds have beaten Dimmitt for the past two years—as they have done every other district opponent in their successful quest for back-to-back championships. The Bobcats hope they can put a jolting halt to Floydada's 3-AA win streak in the 3-AA lid-lifter Friday night.

After three weeks of 8 o'clock kickoffs, Friday night's battle will begin at 7:30 as will all the rest of the Bobcats' games this year.

The Whirlwinds, under the direction of L. G. Wilson, are fairly inexperienced. But in the Floydada tradition, they will be very competitive.

KIM ROSE is the Mean Green's most experienced man, having lettered at center for two years. Rose has been moved to a guard slot this year, and also will hold down a line-backer spot.

Also dream-team material are backfield returnees Walter Harris and Van Mitchell, a pair of halfbacks who scored 154 points between them last year.

Rick Watts quarterback the Whirlwinds, while fullback Jim Kunkel rounds out the backfield. DIRK CAMPBELL and Charles Jackson are Watts' prime receivers, and both will be playing from split positions.

Teaming with Rose in the middle of the offensive line are center Mike Vinson, guard Mike Grigg, and tackles Steve Hale and Macyl Roberts.

You can probably look for a

low-scoring defensive contest Friday night. Floydada's defense has given up only one touchdown, and Dimmitt's only four in their first three games.

BOTH TEAMS enter the district race with 2-1 records. Dimmitt's only loss has been at the hands of Muleshoe, 18-16, while Floydada's lone setback was an 8-0 loss to Tulia—the Mean Green's first regular season loss in more than two years.

In a pre-season coaches' poll, Floydada was favored to repeat as the 3-AA titlist this year. But now, three weeks into the season, prognosticators are beginning to lean toward the powerful Lockney Longhorns and the unbeaten Abernathy Antelopes. However, Floydada is still Floydada—still dangerous, and the best until somebody else can prove otherwise.

Playing on their home field, the Whirlwinds will be favored over the Bobcats Friday night. But if moral support will help, the Bobcats will have plenty of that—every other team in the district would like to see Coach Brown L Smith and his crew topple Floydada.

## You're invited to a pep rally

Something magical happened at Friday afternoon's pep rally at Dimmitt High School. The students put it all together, Coach Brown L Smith called it "the best pep rally we've had since I've been here," and it helped the Bobcats knock Springlake-Earth from the unbeaten ranks, 8-7, that night.

NOW THE students, coaches and players want to do it again—except bigger and better this time, if possible—as the Bobcats face the powerful Floydada Whirlwinds in the District 3-AA opener.

"We're inviting all the townspeople to our pep rally Friday afternoon in preparation for the Floydada game," said DHS Principal Robert Ryan. "We need to win this game Friday night in a big way."

The 15-minute rally will begin at 3:30 in the DHS gym. The east doors of the gymnasium will be open for anyone who would like to attend—and who knows?—maybe be a part of another magical happening.

Woodworking students from other high schools in the area are operating the assembly line at night this week. Their goal in the joint project is 3,000 game boards.

Accompanying the students will be Denton Lingle, industrial arts teacher, and Robert Ryan, DHS principal.

## Riley is new PCG president

Ray Joe Riley of Sunnyside was elected president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Tuesday, climaxing the PCG's 15th annual convention in Lubbock.

RILEY, 36-year-old cotton breeder and producer, is the first Castro County man ever elected president of the 25,000-member regional growers' organization. A graduate of Hart High School and Texas Tech, he operates 4,000 acres of farm and ranch land.

He succeeds Donnell Echols of Lamesa, who becomes chairman of the board after serving two terms as president. Other PCG officers elected Tuesday were Paul Bennett of Amherst, vice-president, and Don Marble of South Plains (Floyd County), secretary-treasurer. Don Anderson of Crosbyton is the retiring board chairman.

IN ADDITION to his vanguard work in the cotton industry and its organizations, Riley is a director of Water, Inc., president of the Castro County Water Committee, water resources chairman of the Chamber of Commerce, and a former official of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. He also is a former winner of the Jaycees' "Outstanding Young Farmer" award.

## Burglars strike again at Hart

Burglars struck again at Hart Saturday, taking some \$300 worth of cigarettes, gum, candy and coins from Gonzales Shamrock Station and the Green Frog Cafe on State 194.

IT WAS the third time burglars had broken into Hart businesses in recent months. Three Lubbock men were sent to prison recently after burglarizing Bob's Farm Supply, and another man was charged last week with breaking into another Hart store.

Sheriff's officers said three persons were involved in Saturday's burglaries, which are believed to have occurred between midnight and 6 a.m. Muddy footprints indicated the three had walked around the Green Frog Cafe several times before breaking a plate-glass window in the front of the building.

The burglars jimmied the locks on several coin-operated machines in the cafe and made away with 157 packages of cigarettes, \$52 from the juke box and five boxes of candy. The cigarettes were valued at \$86.35 and the candy at \$12, bringing the total loss to \$150.35.

AT GONZALES Shamrock Station, half a block west of the cafe, the burglars broke the handle and lock assembly from the steel front door, then forced three coin-operated machines open. Robert Gonzales, station operator, said they made off with 22 cartons of cigarettes, three cartons of gum and \$20 to \$30 in coins. The station's total loss in merchandise and money was estimated at \$140 to \$150.



### Clayton delegate to disposal meet

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake was one of three Texas legislators named as delegates to a national symposium on animal waste management this week in Warrenton, Va.

THE three-day symposium which ends today (Thursday), is co-sponsored by the council of State Governments, US Dept. of Agriculture, the Environmental Protection Agency and the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges.

"The symposium," said House Speaker Gus Mutscher, "will concern itself with the problems livestock and poultry producers are facing with the advent of new laws and regulations relating to animal waste abatement."

In addition to Clayton, Mutscher also named Rep. Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches and Rep. George Baker of Fort Stockton as conference delegates.

During the 61st legislative session (1969), Clayton served as chairman of the House Committee on Livestock. In 1971, he chaired the 62nd session's House Committee on Counties.

### Hightower named for youth study

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes announced Friday in Austin the appointment of five members of the Texas Senate to the Senate Interim Committee on Texas Youth.

THOSE appointed were Senators Ronald Bridges of Corpus Christi who will serve as chairman, J. P. Word of Meridian, Jack Hightower of Vernon, Don Kennard of Fort Worth and Ralph Hall of Rockwall.

The Interim Committee on Texas Youth was created by SR 1412. It will study problems pertaining to Texas youth, including drug abuse, juvenile delinquency, lack of communication, and breakdowns in the present judicial disposal of young offenders. The committee will report to the 63rd Legislature.

COL. WILSON E. Speir, Texas Department of Public Safety director, has been named lawman of the year by Veterans of Foreign Wars.

NATIONAL 4-H Club Week will be October 3-9. This year's theme is "4-H Bridges the Gap."

## 'Schools much discussed but misunderstood'--Ryan

"Schools are the topic of more uninformed discussions than any other institution," Dimmitt High School Principal Robert Ryan told the Lions Club last week.

"OUR SCHOOL system is one of the biggest businesses in Castro County, and probably one of the most misunderstood businesses we have," Ryan said.

He cited three reasons for the public being uninformed about what's going on in the schools:

1. "Many parents get their information from their children, and sometimes the children may be giving their own version of the story."
2. "MANY people don't want to go to school to find out the truth about a situation, because they're afraid of being a bother. You shouldn't hesitate to come and talk—we'll welcome the chance to talk to you."
3. "Teachers too often don't get out into the community like they should."

This lack of communication, coupled with the public's interest in the schools, results in "everybody talking about the schools but very few knowing anything about them," Ryan commented.

THE NEW principal painted this statistical picture of Dimmitt High School:

"The average experience of our faculty is 9.4 years in teaching, and 4.3 years in the local district, so we have a seasoned faculty. Our faculty ranges in experience from two beginning teachers to one with 25 years in the profession.

"Our faculty includes 24 with bachelor's degrees, nine with master's degrees and two non-degree people.

"WE TEACH 58 courses in Dimmitt High School. Our newest one is a woodworking course for girls, with 13 enrolled in it.

"Dimmitt High School has 22 active clubs and organizations, and student participation is widespread. For example, at Friday night's ball game we had 182 students representing Dimmitt High School through the football team, band, Pep Club, and so forth."

OPERATION of the schools is a joint venture of the school district, state and federal governments, Ryan explained, and such a large, diverse business requires a system of rules and regulations to operate successfully.

These rules and regulations come in the form of school board policy, state requirements and federal guidelines, Ryan said.

He showed the Lions a 140-page notebook containing the school board's stated policies, which he said will be printed soon for public use.

"ALSO, we issue the students a nine-page handbook, which is made up of excerpts from the school board policy book," he said.

While the state dictates the regulations regarding curriculum and required courses, Ryan said, the University Interscholastic League regulations govern such matters as athletic eligibility, band program and literary events in the schools.

"It's very important that we follow these League rules and regulations," he added. "A school cannot survive if it does

## Canyon JV deals first Swift loss

The Nazareth Swifts suffered their first defeat of the season 9-2, at the hands of the Canyon JV Eagles at Swift Field Friday night.

THE RAIN stopped just before the game got underway, as though it wanted to watch. And the game was well worth watching as it turned out to be a fast-moving, hard-fought bout of real football.

Due to injuries and other factors, a new player was added to the Nazareth backfield—Russel Schacher, No. 44 Schacher surprised everyone by running for a total of 113 yards in 20 carries, exceeding all other gains by any player on either team. But even his outstanding performance was not enough to give Nazareth the edge in this game.

The scoring was unusual. Early in the first quarter, the Eagles blocked a punt and recovered the ball in the end zone for a two-point safety.

LATER IN the second quarter, after a booming, 65-yard punt off of the foot of Nazareth's Neil Dobmeier, the Eagles had possession of the football on their own 5-yard line, giving the Swifts a golden opportunity. The Swift defense rose to the challenge by dropping Ken Barton of Canyon in the end zone. The tackle was credited to Randal Schilling of Nazareth. This tied the game at 2-2 at half-time.

After the half, the Eagles tried a different strategy, using Barton as their key man in a new attack. Slowly but surely, the Eagles worked their way to a touchdown late in the third quarter. The point-after kick brought the score to 9-2, and their it stayed for the rest of the game as the teams deadlocked in a scoreless duel through the fourth quarter.

## Antelopes win with drafted QB as 3-AA teams go 6-2 for week

For anyone who has been in military service, there's something familiar about the sentence "I need three volunteers, you and you and you."

ABERNATHY'S Luke Nickerson almost had to call for volunteers to play quarterback, but the one he pointed to, Kent Snodgrass, stepped forth and led the Antelopes to victory Friday night.

Illnesses hit the Abernathy squad, with four players sidelined—including the top two quarterbacks. So, from the ranks of the receivers, split end Snodgrass was picked and it proved a key point in the 20-0 win over Hale Center.

That Abernathy victory was one of six posted last week by District 3-AA teams. The final—and muddy—weekend of Sep-1971 football season, and this non-conference portion of the 1971 football season, and this Friday night, the district's eight teams start what could be the most cut-throat struggle in history.

GOING INTO this opening round, the district boasts two undefeated, untied elevens and another with an unbeaten-but-tied tag. And just as was predicted in the pre-season coaches poll, the struggle should stretch from leader to last place.

The first-round games will send Morton to Abernathy, Dimmitt to Floydada, Olton to Friona and Lockney to Littlefield. Floydada is the defending champion and pre-season pick, and Littlefield was voted the No. 1 challenger. But, after three weeks of play, challengers and champion appear too close to differentiate. Abernathy and Lockney wound

up as unbeaten teams, with Friona having only a tie on its record. Dimmitt, Floydada and Littlefield have been beaten only once each, all by Class AAA teams.

FRIONA held on for a 13-6 win over previously unbeaten Muleshoe, and the defense made the difference. "Not so much one individual," said Coach Bob Owen, "But defense, period. We held them on a two-point extra point try after they scored to pull within one (7-6). Then, we held them four downs inside the five in the last two minutes. Also, we stopped them in the fourth quarter after we had fumbled about our 30."

"I definitely think it will help us as a football team," added Owen. "We know we can hold people—now, if we can just do it again, in this tough district. Boy, it's rugged."

ABERNATHY Coach Nickerson echoed that. "The way the district looks now, a guy could look up and see four or five teams ahead of him and still have a good football team." Nickerson had to go with Snodgrass, a starting split end, after the top two quarterbacks, Dave Davenport and Steve Riley, were sidelined with fever and headaches last Wednesday.

"We had to go back to basic plays, straight handoffs," said Nickerson. "But Kent is a good athlete, and the change didn't bother him. We didn't have time to work on passing, but his ball-handling was flawless."

Snodgrass scored the first touchdown for the Antelopes and finished with 28 yards rushing. He completed one pass for 26 yards, too.

FLOYDADA warmed up for its title defense with a 24-0 thumping of Post. Fullback Jim Kunkel scored the first three Whirlwind TDs on runs of 3, 35 and 85 yards to pace the triumph.

Littlefield started with Ralph Funk's 51-yard touchdown scamper, Funk followed with two more touchdowns, and the Wildcats sauntered on to a 34-0 win over Slaton. Littlefield gained over 300 yards on the ground and allowed Slaton only 76.

The bullish rushes of fullback Pat Bennett led Lockney to a comeback 19-6 win over Idalou. Bill Hill returned a kickoff 96 yards, and Bennett picked up one TD and 116 yards rushing for the unbeaten Longhorns.

DIMMITT bounced back from a 7-0 halftime deficit to score in the final quarter, then went for two points—successfully. Tailback Daniel Frierson got the touchdown from 11 yards out, then skirted right end for the two winning points, and the Bobcats will enter district play with a 2-1 record. The Bobcats' TD was the first against the previously unbeaten Springlake-Earth Wolverines, who had outscored their foes 131-0 coming into the game.

Morton jumped to a 6-0 half-time lead against Farwell Friday, but the hosts came back with three TDs to overtake Morton 20-12. Jimmy Harvey and Alan Joyce scored for Morton on runs measuring 45 and 50 yards.

Olton, the district's only team without a victory, fell to undefeated Tahoka, 14-12. Marlos May put the Mustangs in front in the first period on a 48-yard sprint up the middle, and tailback Keith Workman scored from the 3 in the fourth. A run for the extra points failed after Workman's score, however.

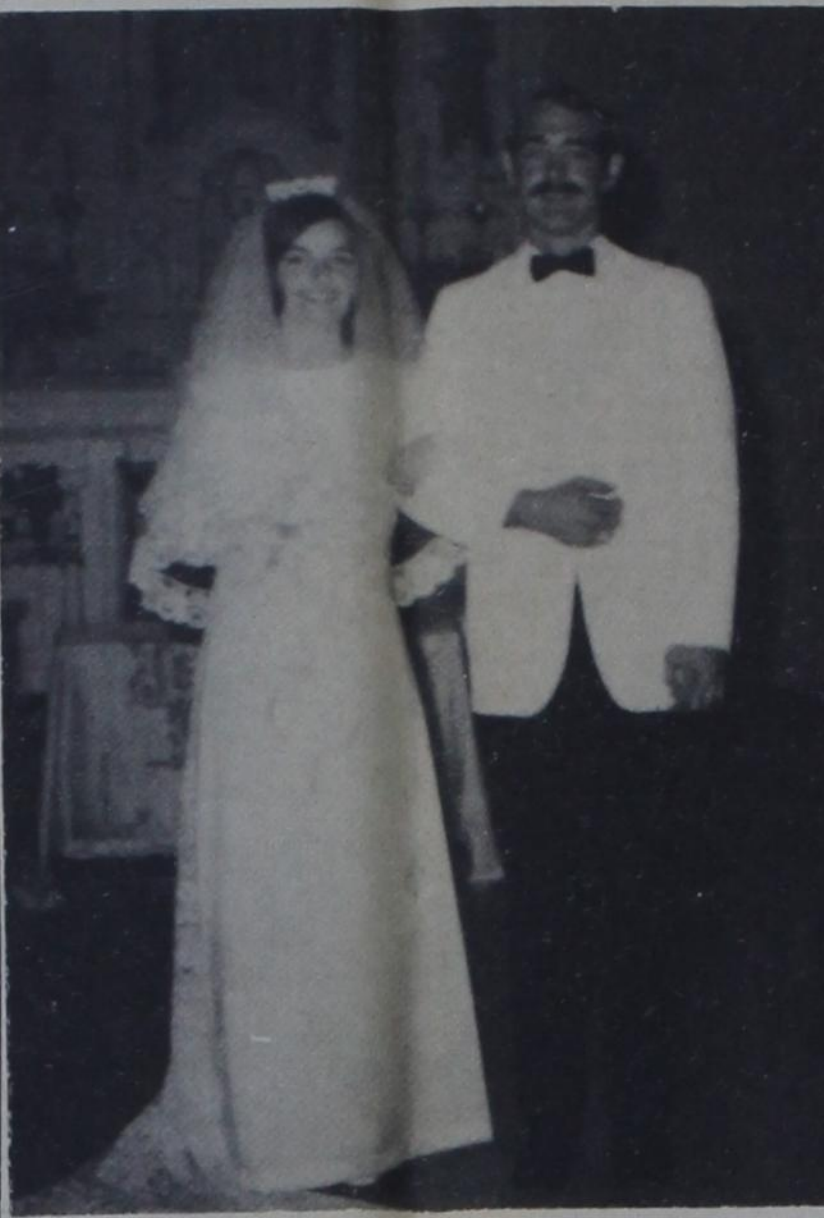

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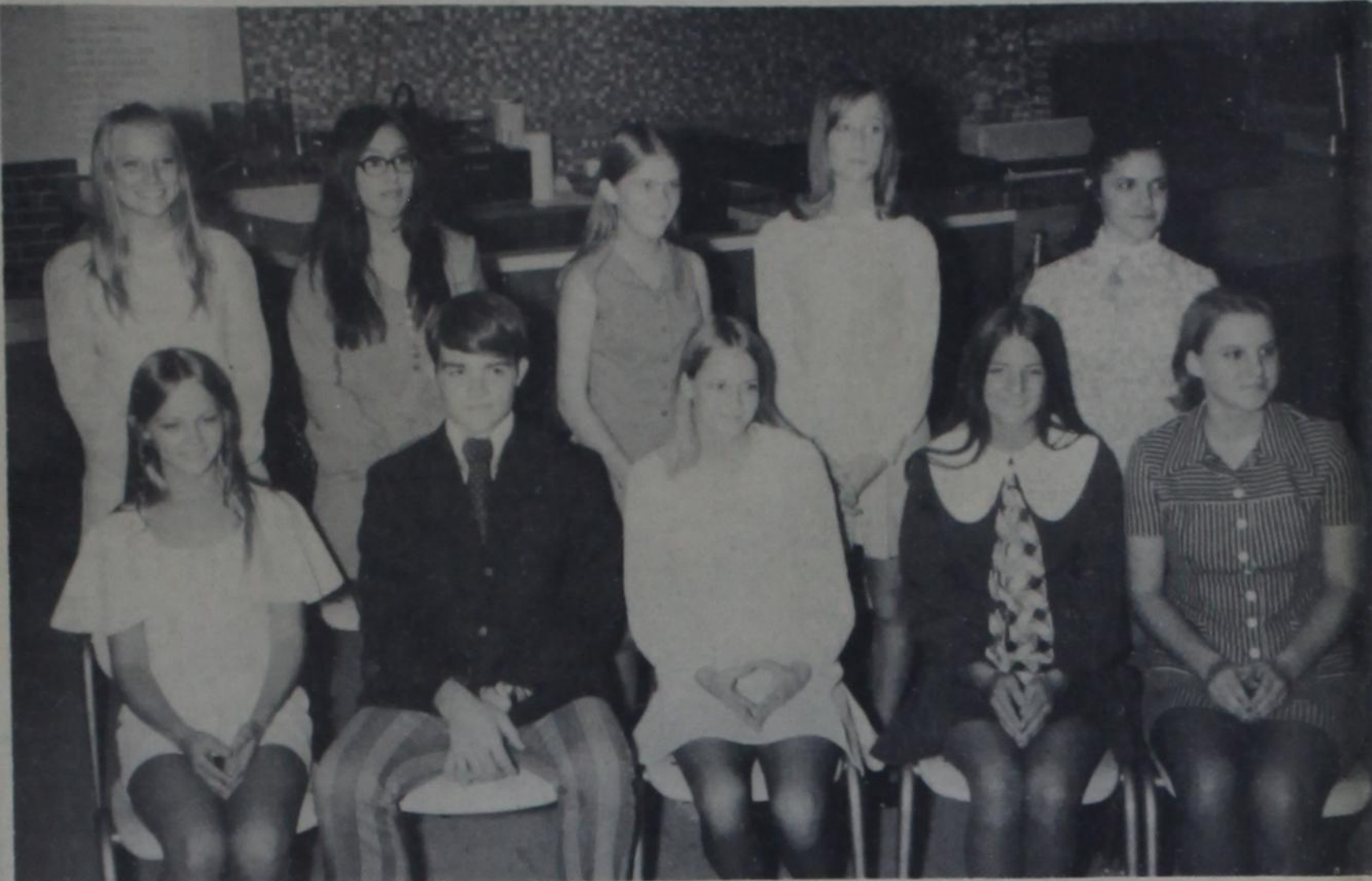

# Cats pop Wolverine bubble, 8-7

Through the mud (and probably some blood), Dimmitt's Bobcats turned their home field into Ulcerville Friday night, squeaking out an 8-7 win over the previously unbeaten, state-ranked Springlake-Earth Wolverines.

**THE GAME** was that close all the way, as the Bobcats finished the night with 215 total yards to the Wolverines' 214. The Wolves' vaunted running machine gained only 126 yards against a hard-nosed Dimmitt defense, but the visitors added 93 yards through the airways. Dimmitt rushed for 174 yards and passed for 40 on the rain-soaked field.

The Wolverines dominated the first half, scoring in the second quarter to take a 7-0 lead to the dressing room. But the second half belonged to the Bobcats, who steadily regained the initiative and drove home the winning points in the fourth quarter.

Played in dry but threatening weather, the exciting game was filled with drives that fizzled out because of fumbles or interceptions, field-goal tries that either missed or were blocked, and leather-popping defense by both crews.

**DIMMITT'S** defense was the prime factor in the victory, holding the dangerous Wolverines at bay time and again as the visitors pushed goalward, until the Bobcats finally turned the tide in the second half and scored the winning points in the final frame.

On offense, the Bobcats chalked up 12 first downs to Springlake-Earth's 11. Most of the visitors' first downs came on long passes from Quarterback Mike Cleavinger to his fine receiver, Carl Sulser. Hoyt Glasscock, the Wolverines' dangerous, 190-lb. running back, also broke loose for some good chunks of yardage, including a 16-yard scoring sprint. But the Bobcat defense was able to contain Glasscock's hit-and-run tactics most of the time.

The Springlake touchdown came when Glasscock broke through for 16 yards to paydirt in the second. Glasscock also kicked the conversion point to give the Wolverines a 7-0 advantage.

**AS IT** turned out, the high-scoring visitors had to settle for that lone touchdown. But it didn't look that way at the start of the second half as the Wolverines received the kickoff and drove to Dimmitt's 10-yard line. However, Dimmitt's defense choked off the threat and blocked a Glasscock field-goal try.

The ball continued to change hands in the third until, with five minutes remaining in the quarter, Nati Anes started playing bulldozer to spark a Dimmitt drive. Then Felton Isaacs joined the Jerry Corps when he hauled in a Jerry Matthews pass on S-E's 10-yard line with 14 seconds remaining in the third.

With the fourth quarter just nine seconds old, Daniel Frierson sped around left end with a host of blockers ahead of him, and swept into the corner of the end zone for Dimmitt's TD. Going for broke on the conversion, the Bobcats chose the two-point running route. Frierson ran the power sweep in the opposite direction and went over standing up for the all-important two points to give Dimmitt its 8-7 victory margin.

**THEN IT** was the Bobcat defense's turn again, and the purple marauders kept the victory secure by turning back the desperate Wolverines through the rest of the quarter.

With the punting of Lynn Buchanan and a timely fumble recovery by Felton Isaacs on the Wolverine 19, the Bobcats kept their visitors off balance through the crucial final minutes.

After Isaacs' fumble recovery, the Wolverines stopped Dimmitt at their own 10, then mounted their final drive in search of a TD or field goal. Needing lots of yardage fast, Cleavinger heaved a pass Sulserward. But Dimmitt's Charlie McLean was there to make his second interception of the

runner for the Bobcats, gaining 87 yards. Nati Anes returned to his old form during the second half and was instrumental in Dimmitt's scoring drive. Dimmitt absorbed a rash of penalties, stepping backwards seven times for 85 yards. The Wolverines were penalized three times for 38.

Despite the wet field, Matthews had a good night passing as he clicked with his receivers four times in eight tries for 40 yards.
