Strongest Opposition From Hico and Northern Part Of Hamilton County

Voters last Saturday turned thumbs down on a proposal to is-sue \$680,000.00 worth of road bonds, contingent upon their assumption by the state through some future act of the State Legislature. Out of a total of 1284 votes cast, 519 favored the issuance of the bonds and 765 voted against issuing them. To carry, the bonds would have had to re-

ceive a two-thirds majority. Opposition to the issuance of the bonds was strongest in the Hico box, where only 6 voted for same, with 249 against. Property owners in this end of the county apparently believed that the bonds would be a burden to them, since they would not be affected by the benefits and stood to lose that part of the money from the State fund which had been returned to them in the past. Many other smaller boxes in a similar position also gave the proposition a black eye. Quite a lot of work had been done through advertising in attempting to get the people out to vote on the issue, and the local vote was surprising.



Vitamins Are In Vogue; Let's

Get the Facts

In recent years, the term "vita-min" has become a household word To nearly everyone it means vim, vigor, vitality, and all that goes with good health. What are these vitamins anyhow? What is the story back of them?

he existence of certain unidentified substances having superior nutritive properties was suspected long, long ago. As early as 1500 B.C., Egyptians and Chinese hit on the discovery that eating livers would improve one's vision in dim light. Today we know that the liver supplied vitamin A, recognized as a protective food factor for night vision. About 1720, Kramer, an Aus-trian physician, found that when certain fresh foods, such as vege-tables and fruits, were added to the diet of persons suffering from scurvy, this disease was cured. To-day we know that these foods supplied vitamin C. These and other nstances of earlier times afford an interesting background to our present knowledge of vitamins.

Word Coined 28 Years Ago

It was only 28 years ago that the word "vitamin" was coined. And since that time, the nation has be-come "vitamin-conscious." Scores of scientists are engaged in vitamin research. New discoveries are being made, and the subject has aroused such interest, that the public last year spent about \$75,000,000 for vitamin products in drug stores.

For a long while, vitamins were looked upon as something quite mysterious. Today, although there is still considerable mystery, a great deal is known about them.

We know there are several kinds of vitamins, and that each has its own specific function in the body. They help children to grow, give endurance and stamina, stimulate appetite, build body resistance, and have other values. Taken into the human body, they act somewhat like the ignition spark in an automobile. Outstanding among recent discoveries are those of Dr. C. A. Elvehjem of the University of Wisconsin. He found, in studying the B vitamins, that meat is the richest source of these important factors. The vitamins featured in this chart are all necessary for growth and health. In addition, vitamin A
