





Bible Thoughts "NO PLACE FOR THE WORD"

In John 8:37 Jesus made the statement, "My word hath no place in you." Often times it proved true in the earthly ministry of Christ, that the very ones who would have been the first to receive him were, in effect, the first to reject him. Jesus at this time was speaking to God's chosen race, the Jews. Even though they were the favored race, they found no place for the word of God. They were so rooted and grounded in traditions, their hearts were so filled with pride and

prejudice, they would not receive his word. Is that not about the picture as one sees it now? Because of neglect we will not let the Word have free course in our lives. Like some in Athens, "we will hear thee again concerning this matter. (Acts 17:32). Therein lies the root of great trouble in the world of today. Men are waiting to hear the story of Christ again and again rather than obey the truth when convinced. We sometimes know that something is wrong in our lives, but had rather not think about it. It is more comforting to put it off for awhile. There is a lack of love for the truth on the part of many. From Jesus' teachings in Luke 8 of the parable of the sower, we learn that the Word falling into good and honest hearts will bring forth fruit. Has it in your case? If not, what is the only conclusion that you can come to? Often our hearts are so full of other things — worldly pleasure, desire for gain, and sin in all its forms, that we do not have room left for the Word of God. Let God's Word have a place of authority, reverence, love and devotion in your heart. "If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will and it shall be done unto you" (John 15:7).
