

As harvest draws to close


Wheat yields prove low **By JIM STEIERT**

Wheat yields are running far below last year and most local farmers are barely breaking even or are losing money on their crops as the county's 1974 wheat harvest draws to a close this week.

GREENBUGS, drought, mosaic virus and hot dry winds this spring all teamed up to make 1974 a disastrous year for the wheat farmer.

According to local elevator operators, this year's average irrigated wheat yields are run-

Wheat was quoted by a local elevator at \$3.57 Tuesday afternoon compared with \$2.42 on June 19 of 1973, but the slightly higher price being paid for the commodity is of little consolation to the farmer whose crop raising and harvesting expenses have risen drastically since last year.

Ed Woodard of Bruegel & Sons Elevators reported that yields have ranged anywhere from 10 to 20 bushels on dryland wheat received at his facility and yields on some of the irrigated wheat have ranged as high as 40-50 bushels.

Crop insurance is becoming necessity

Although crop insurance has been a ''yes or no'' decision for most Texas farmers in the past,


it may soon be a necessity, believes an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"ONE MAJOR insurance company is expecting to write two to three times more coverage for crops this year than in 1973 because of the higher

cost of getting a crop in the ground," says Dr. Wayne Hayenga. "Also, farmers are expecting higher prices for their crops, and many of them remember the extensive damage done by hail last year."

Rates for hail insurance vary by crop, area of the state and company, explains the economist. Grain sorghum rates go from about 1.5 to 8 percent of the coverage while cotton rates usually start at 3 or 4 percent. In some hail prone areas, some companies quote prices as high as 18 percent.

"AT PRESENT, no commercial insurance companies write 'all risk' crop insurance in Texas," notes Hayenga. "This type of insurance is available in 84 counties from the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, with coverage limited to cotton,
