Commission hears of rate hike

City commissioners heard report from representatives of Dimmitt TV Cable Co. and looked into the possibility of purchasing a new garbage truck for the city during a light session Monday night.

RONNIE HOWARD, president of Dimmitt TV Cable Co. appeared before the commission along with Stanley Schaeffer, secretary, Paul Coker, chief technician and Jack Mill-

er, vice president. Howard announced that Dimmitt TV Cable Co. will be upping its local rates from \$6 per month to \$7 per month effective Dec. 1.

He explained that TV Cable Co. has had the same rate in effect since 1962

"Most companies have gone up in their rates in the last two years. We have been holding back on going up for about nine months, but it has become necessary to go up," said

According to Howard, the rate hike will not change the

charge for additional outlets. THE NEW \$7 per month charge is comparable to rates already charged in Bovina and Friona. Plainview residents pay a charge of \$6.50 monthly and Muleshoe residents are currently paying a rate of \$7.50.





But the thing that makes Robert stand out is that he can do so many things-he's a runner, a receiver, a kickoff-return and punt-return man, an excellent blocker and a good defensive back. When you consider his speed and size, he's the best I've ever coached.'
