



## Lewis Returns Mine Workers To AFL

### CIO Proposes Confab As US Seizure Nears

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman Friday checked to Secretary of Agriculture Anderson the proposal of CIO Packinghouse Workers for a conference on wage issues in the strike-beset meat industry.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross disclosed Truman's action. Anderson, who was directed by the President to seize and operate the industry beginning Saturday, told reporters he had no comment.

The 193,000 CIO workers thus have not indicated whether they will return to work under government supervision. The 55,000 AFL workers have pledged cooperation.

Meanwhile, a source in a position to know said that government fact finders would make wage recommendations quickly in the meat controversy.

A high government official who would not be named disclosed the fact-finding board's schedule calls for announcement of findings "within a week"—paving the way for possible federally-sponsored pay raises.

President Truman Thursday ordered the Department of Agriculture to take over 124 strike-bound plants of 19 companies at 12:01 a. m. (CST) Saturday.

**Wage Stabilization Board**  
Under the Smith-Connally Act, either the government or a majority of the employees in seized plants may ask the Wage Stabilization Board to adjust wages. If the board approves, the adjustment becomes effective regardless of management's views.

Whether this procedure would be followed in the meat industry remains open.

Public hearings before the panel began last Tuesday in Chicago.

Under terms of the meat seizure order, Secretary of Agriculture Anderson has broad powers to determine the extent to which companies "will" continue their managerial functions.

The order also specifies that present terms and conditions of employment will hold "until and unless the duly authorized federal agencies shall, with the approval of the President, otherwise direct."

### Skelly Has Good Permian Oil Show In Andrews Test

A new source of possible oil production from a comparatively shallow depth, in the San Andres-Permian, in Southwest Andrews County has been indicated by Skelly Oil Company No. 1-Z University.

That exploration, located 677 feet from north and 2,833 feet from east lines of section 10, block 11, one and one-half miles west of nearest San Andres production in the West Andrews field, and about two miles south of the Martin field, where production from the lower Permian and the middle Ordovician has been developed in the last year, had a recovery of 90 feet of heavy oil and gas cut drilling mud, in a one-hour drillstem test at 4,376-4,430 feet. That test was taken Thursday night.

May Test Further

The prospector was shut down for orders Friday morning. It was originally started to drill to around 10,000 feet to explore the Ellenburger—and it will ultimately drill to that horizon.

Operator is now considering making a through test of the San Andres shows before making more hole. It is indicated, that should such a test develop commercial production, other explorations likely would be drilled shortly to the shallow horizon in that region.

In earlier test, Skelly's No. 1-Z University, had recovery of 120 feet of gas cut drilling mud, with a slight trace of oil, during a two-hour investigation at 4,209-4,400 feet.

**Eldson Gets Some Oil**  
Phillips Petroleum Company et al. No. 1 Eldson, Southwest Ector County prospector, 1,997 feet from north and 1,827 feet from east lines of section 25, block B-15, psi survey, one mile east of Judkins, was to drill ahead from 4,948 feet, in lower Permian lime, after a drillstem test at 4,342-4,648 feet.

The tool was open 65 minutes. There was a show of gas at surface in 45 minutes. The packer started leaking at end of 60 minutes. Recovery was 85 feet of clean oil and 135 feet of drilling water. The test is contracted to 10,000 feet to examine the Ordovician.

**Vereeto Cores Ahead**  
Stamford Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Vereeto, Central Hockley County exploration, two miles west of Levelland, and about four miles east of closest production in the Levelland field, was coring below 4,780 feet, in San Andres lime. Cores had been taken at 4,754-64 (Continued on Page 4)

### US To Seize Three Texas Meat Plants Not Strike Bound

The government, in its seizure of the meat packing industry, has announced intentions of taking over three Texas plants which are not strikebound.

President Truman said 134 meat plants will be taken over at 12:01 a. m. Saturday. In the list were Swift plants at Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio so far untroubled by strikes. Not on the list was a Swift plant at Houston where a strike of AFL workers has been in progress since Monday. Irvin Horton, business agent of Local 103 of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen Union (AFL), said about 50 employees were still off the job at the Houston plant Thursday night.

Government seizure of two packinghouses at Fort Worth, Armour and Company and its subsidiary, Ratliff Pure Foods Products Company, were ordered. Both have been strikebound.

Truman's seizure order made no mention of the Livestock Handlers strike at Fort Worth but an aide of Secretary of Agriculture Anderson commented that he expected the CIO handlers both at Fort Worth and St. Louis, Mo., to return to work after the government takes over meat plants in those cities.

**Navy Returns Shell Refinery**  
Meanwhile, the Navy announced intended return of the Shell Oil Refinery to operation following settlement of a wage dispute between CIO Oil Workers and the management. The refinery was seized last October and will be turned back Saturday. Basis of the settlement, said the Navy, was an 18 per cent wage increase upon return to a 40-hour week.

Nine steel plants at Houston remained closed by the strike of 15,000 Steelworkers at Houston, and strikers at the Alamo Iron Works, San Antonio, remained away from their jobs, accusing the company of non-compliance of a War Labor Board ruling.

**Russia And France To Help In Jap Trials**

TOKYO—(AP)—Russia, France and the Netherlands Friday joined the international tribunal that will try Japan's top war crimes suspects, including Hideki Tojo, Japanese premier at the war's beginning.

Announcement of their participation ended weeks of uncertainty during which only the United States, China and four members of the British empire had participated in preparations for the trials, which may start in March.

**O'Daniel Introduces Rapido Resolution**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A resolution calling for an investigation of the handling of the 36th Division in its ill-fated crossing of the Rapido River in Italy has been introduced in the Senate by Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel of Texas.

The investigation would be conducted by the Senate Military Affairs Committee.

### LATE NEWS FLASHES

**NEW YORK**—(AP)—The CIO United Electrical Workers Union, representing 200,000 workers on strike against three major producers of electrical appliances, Friday asked the government to suspend its business with two of the firms until they complied with a War Labor Board ruling concerning women employees.

**KYOTO, JAPAN**—(AP)—The U. S. Sixth Army, the most seagoing in American history, ends its colorful career Saturday upon inactivation after three years and 21 major engagements. It is commanded by Gen. Walter Krueger, German-born veteran of the Spanish-American War, Philippine Insurrection, and World War I.

**VERNON**—(AP)—Three members of the Vernon draft board were notified by letter Friday they had been removed from office and a Selective Service official in Austin said the board members had not been following instructions and refused to draft students or farm workers after the end of the war.

**WASHINGTON**—(AP)—President Truman Friday ordered a temporary postponement in the return of Germany of "contract" prisoners of war, in view of a U. S. agricultural labor shortage.

### Security Council Orders UNO Armed Might Formed

LONDON—(AP)—The United Nations Security Council Friday ordered into operation its machinery for organizing armed forces to back the council's orders with military power when necessary.

The council commanded military representatives of the principal powers to hold their first meeting here by February 1 when work will be started on the special agreements by which nations are to pledge land, sea and air forces to enforce Security Council orders when necessary.

The Security Council also formally agreed Friday to discuss the tense military-political situations in Iran, Greece and Indonesia at its next meeting.

The council thus disregarded a request from Soviet Russia that it decline to take up the dispute over Iran.

The next meeting will be held Monday.

**Russia Sent Opposition**  
Russia in a letter to the Security Council earlier Friday said she was "categorically opposed" to the international peace body's taking up Iran's case.

Disclosing Soviet strategy in dealing with Iran's appeal for council action to halt the alleged intervention of the Red Army in Iran's internal affairs, the Soviet answer declared the Iranian charges groundless and incorrect.

Instead of united nations intervention in the affair, Russia proposed that the differences between Tehran and Moscow be worked out in direct negotiations between the two countries.

The Russian position was set forth in a letter from Russia's chief delegate, Vice-Foreign Commissar Andrei Vishinsky, to Norman J. O. Makin of Australia, president of the Security Council.

**Witness Says Bomb Shock Deranged Hitler**

HERFORD, GERMANY—(AP)—Bomb shock suffered in an attempt on his life July 20, 1944, started Adolf Hitler on the road to mental deterioration, Luftwaffe Gen. Nikolaus von Below disclosed Friday.

Von Below, a witness to the explosion as well as Hitler's will, was arrested by British security police several days ago at Bad Godesber.

**Workers Probe For Mexico Fire Victims**

TUXPAN, MEXICO—(AP)—Workers probed ruins in this fire ravaged city Friday in search of victims of a \$300,000 blaze which swept through the market place Thursday, reached the municipal palace and city jail and then burned the wharves.

### Army Makes Contact With Moon With Radar Waves

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Army Friday claimed the world's first scientific contact with the moon in a Jules Verne feat which spanned 238,000 miles of outer space by radar.

Government astronomers said the achievement might lead to the answer of the age-old question whether any form of life exists on the moon.

Another possibility was that it might usher in radio control for super-range jet or rocket projectiles which could be kept hovering ominously above the earth in the stratosphere.

The War Department reported that the results of the experiment promise "valuable peacetime as well as wartime applications." Far-ranging space ships were listed as one of the "less likely" applications.

The first radar contact with the moon was made January 10, it was disclosed, and the feat has been successfully repeated several times since.

The experiment has been carried out by Signal Corps scientists, working from Belmar on the New Jersey coastline.

It took only two and a half seconds, the report revealed, for a radar echo to bounce back from the moon, normally about 238,857 miles distant from the earth.

The War Department frankly acknowledged that it was impossible at this stage to forecast what the success of the experiment would make possible.

Major Gen. Harry C. Ingles, Signal Corps chief, said the immediate significance was that scientists know for the first time with certainty that a very high frequency radio wave from the earth can penetrate the electrically charged ionosphere which envelops both earth and stratosphere. The multi-layered ionosphere starts about 39 miles above the earth's surface and extends to an altitude of approximately 250 miles higher.

### ATC Base Unit Is Moving To New Home At MAAF

Motor trucks were rolling from Midland's Municipal Airport Friday, moving the Army Air Force's Air Transport Command ferrying service unit and the Navy detachment to the Midland Army Air Field. Several days will be required to complete the transfer of personnel and equipment to MAAF, as announced Thursday.

Meanwhile, reports at MAAF said a number of officers of the bombardier school are clearing the field for posts in California, but no announcement was made by the AAF Training Command concerning the plans.

Major W. L. Burall, commanding officer of the 577th AAF Base Unit which has been stationed at the municipal airport, was in charge of the move and will remain in command of the unit at its new home at MAAF.

As far as the Army is concerned the municipal airport will be placed on "inactive" status Monday, but private and commercial planes may continue to use the field.

### House Votes Down Funds For White House Wing

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman found himself minus exactly \$1,650,000 Friday.

That was the money he had for the much-discussed addition to the White House, which would be complete with the theater boasting a disappearing stage, a cafeteria, more office space, plus a lot of other improvements.

Excavations already have started for the addition, which has kicked up a local fuss among architecturally-minded groups who contend it will mar the classic appearance of the executive mansion.

Truman's predicament is that the \$1,650,000 voted by Congress a year ago for the work was ordered turned back to the Treasury Thursday by the House.

It is reported that the Senate would attempt to restore the White House funds and ask the House later to relent or at least compromise on a smaller cut.

### Body Tentatively Identified As That Of Capt. Colin Kelly

MANILA—(AP)—A body re-buried recently in a Manila cemetery was tentatively identified by Western Pacific Army Headquarters Friday as that of Capt. Colin Kelly, American hero of World War II.

Headquarters said positive identification hinges on a check of dental work and a comparison of data, including a crudely-drawn map marking the spot of first interment at Fort Stotenberg, long since leveled by Japanese bombs.

Officers said a Filipino told them that in December, 1941, he saw the sergeant of a field crash truck point to one of two bodies recovered in the crash of a bomber and say: "Why that's Captain Kelly."

Kelly first was reported to have died Dec. 10, 1941 in diving on the Japanese battleship, Haruna, in Lingayen Gulf—for which he posthumously was awarded the Congressional Medal.

Subsequently, however, it was determined that he flew his flak-riddled plane back to within four miles of Clark Field after ordering the crew to bail out. One crew member parachuted, but another chose to remain with Kelly and died when the plane crashed.

The two bodies mentioned by the Filipino were buried at the post cemetery in Fort Stotenberg Dec. 11, 1941. A map was made of the burial location, but dog tags were removed from both bodies by Filipinos at the crash scene, headquarters said.

### Federation President Green Announces UMW Affiliation

MIAMI, FLA.—(AP)—AFL President William Green Friday announced the reaffiliation of John L. Lewis and his 500,000 United Mine Workers with the American Federation of Labor.

Lewis immediately was elected to the vacancy on the executive council created by the withdrawal of Harvey W. Brown, president of the Machinists, whose 700,000 dropped out of the Federation in October, 1943.

Green said Lewis would attend next week's sessions of the council, expected to be merely routine.

Green said the return of the miners was "significant" because of the emphasis "upon the need for unity and solidarity."

"I interpret this step taken by the mine workers as evidence of their determination to wipe out the division of labor and to establish unity," Green told a news conference.

**Move to Stabilize Labor**  
"It might be interpreted as a move designed to place the house of labor in order. It will have a profound effect upon the expansion and development of a united labor movement."

Lewis left the American Federation of Labor in 1936 to form the CIO, and later left that organization for his United Mine Workers. Lewis had been flirting with the AFL since he left the CIO in 1942. Once he paid his per capita tax for return to the AFL, but he did not like the terms the executive council imposed on him and asked for return of the check for approximately \$48,000.

### House Assails Low Prices Paid For Texas Crude Oil

Boycot House, Texas auditor, addressing a Lions Club dinner in the Scharbauer Hotel Thursday night, assailed the "discrepancy" or "unfair prices" paid for Texas oil during the war and said the state's schools and teachers were deprived of \$58,000,000.

The speaker praised the work of women in the war and advocated appointment of a woman to the board of regents of the University of Texas.

The Lions Club Philharmonic Hillbilly Orchestra played a number of selections. The invocation was given by the Rev. Hubert Hopper, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church. Sheriff Ed Darnell won a prize in a contest conducted by Bill Collyns, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

### 19 Per Cent Of Yanks Believe Germans Had Some War Justification

WIENBADEN, GERMANY—(AP)—Nineteen per cent of 1,700 men questioned last fall in a U. S. Army poll of American troops stationed in Germany believe the Germans had some justification for starting the war.

The poll, said to represent a cross-section of the U. S. troops in Germany, was not officially released for publication, but was made available by a thoroughly authoritative source.

(In Washington a War Department spokesman said that polls had been taken to ascertain the degree to which enemy propaganda had been absorbed, so that counter measures could be effected.)

The poll also showed:

Fifty-one per cent said they believed Hitler did the Reich a lot of good before 1939.

Eighty per cent favored occupation of Germany for 10 years.

Seventy-one per cent said the U. S. military government was not tough enough with Nazis; 62 per cent said it was not tough enough with ordinary Germans.

Twenty-two per cent said they believed the Germans had "good reasons" for the persecution of Jews.

## Orthographic Bomshel

This country and, presumably, the world are thickly peppered with little groups of people in a perpetual state of excitement over things that leave many of us cold. For instance, there are the group that favors counting by twelves instead of tens, the perpetual calendar enthusiasts, the basic English addicts, Esperanto fans, societies for the preservation of barber shop singing, and so on.

Out of a reluctant concession to sterner problems, most such organizations coasted during the war. But now the shooting has stopped they are at it again at top speed. And the current leader on the hit parade of scholarly fads is certainly the movement for simplified English spelling.

Bernard Shaw revived the movement a short time ago, and the chain reaction which followed was practically atomic. The motion has been seconded almost daily by some learned doctor. It is noteworthy that it's the natives who are doing the kicking, not those who learned English late in life. Newspapers are printing more and more stories studded with what looks like an 8-year-old's spelling.

The simplified spelling movement is not only old but is, in a limited way, already a part of our life. There are such obvious things, of course, as catalog for catalogue, program for programme, and so on. But that isn't all. Several newspapers have adopted thru, tho, etc., as space-savers. Logically they might consider another, very ancient one—the Old English single symbol for th, which looked something like a lower-case p.

In the world of trade other simplifications have caught on. Most of us have seen shops that sell Klasyy Kredit Klothes, theater marquees that used to advertise Bank Nite, and even Bar-B-Q stands.

Yet in spite of these incursions, the English-speaking world generally seems to be receiving the suggestions of reform in a mood ranging from indifference to belligerence. Part of it may just be stubbornness and conventionality. But there is also a practical factor.

Bernard Shaw says simplified spelling would save time. He finds that, in the course of a minute, he can write bom a third again as often as he can write bomb. But what about the time wasted in changing our spelling habits?

Users of English, with the exception of illiterates and graduates of progressive schools, seem to manage pretty well with the old, inefficient, illogical, confusing spelling. The conversion problem in breaking hundreds of instinctive spelling habits would be terrific.

We could better devote our energies to creating a world in which the temptation to use the atomic bomb would no longer exist. Only when we can refer to it without fear can we honestly say that we have time to revamp our habits and orthography to a point where we can also refer to this awesome weapon, and properly, as the atomik bom.

### Book Review Featured On Program Heard At Fine Arts Club Meet

In continuing the speaker said, "As Viceroy Wavell puts it, 'This 77-year-old bone and skin, brain and will, that man Gahandi, is still the biggest thing in India.'"

As her closing remarks, the speaker quoted Gahandi. "When that fineness and rarity of spirit which I long for have become perfectly natural to me; when I have become incapable of any evil; when nothing harsh or haughty occupies my thought world, then and not until then will my non-violence move all the hearts of all the world."

### Nimitz Says Texas Was No. 1 State In Furnishing Fighters

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, a Texan, says relatively more Texas men and women entered the armed services than those of any other state.

Addressing the Texas State Society here Thursday night, Nimitz said about 500,000 Texans entered the Army, 175,000 went into the Navy, 28,000 into the Marine Corps and 8,000 into the Coast Guard.

"Twenty-eight medals of honor were won by the sons of Texas," Nimitz added. "Many of those brave men will never return to us, and our nation, vast as it is, can ill afford their loss. We must keep ourselves so strong and alert that no enemy will ever again dare attack us."

Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, a Texan, was a guest at the gathering. Nimitz commended Texans who "served at home" in factories and shipyards and on farms. The speaker, who holds the title of admiral of the non-existent Texas Navy, said Texas once demonstrated the importance of seapower with a Navy of its own that, although small, "made a valuable contribution to the winning of Texas' independence" from Mexico.

Gossett and Lyle, Texas Democrats, and Mrs. Tom Clark, wife of the attorney general of Dallas, vice-president; Mrs. Luther Johnson, wife of Rep. Johnson (D-Texas), official hostess, and Miss Helen Snelling, Abilene, secretary-treasurer.

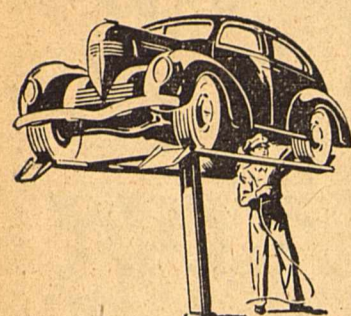

**Yankee Pitcher Will Manage Beaumont Club**

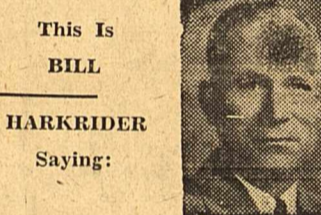

President Larry MacPhail announced Friday that the 41-year-old righthander was given his release to sign with the Texas club.

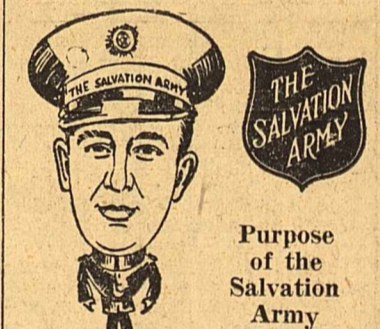
