British Cabinet Rejects Compromise

Government Seizes NY Tugboats Homma Admits Ordering Balaan Death March English Reportedly

Union Tells Workers To Await Orders

NEW YORK —(A)— The strike-bound tugboat industry in New York harbor was seized by the federal gov-ernment at 12:01 a. m. Wednesday to prevent interference "with the movement of necessary fuel and food supplies for the City of New York.'

3,500 striking members of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association's United Marine Division, however, were under orders of union leaders/not to return to work before the outcome of an emergency meeting called to consider the seizure and an appeal by Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach that they go back to their jobs.

President Truman ordered the Office of Defense Transportation to take control of the 91 towboat companies operating in New York and contiguous waters. Lawrence C. Turner, director of the ODT Waterways Transport Department, named federal manager of seized properties.

Record Waterfront Tie-Up The tugmen struck Monday morning in a wage-hour dispute with the New York Tugboat Exchange, halting commercial shipping in the world's busiest port and producing the worst waterfront tie-up since 1919.

Capt. William Bradley, president of the ILA's United Marine Diquestioned regarding the union's reaction ta the seizure order-which was announced early Tuesday evening-declared:

'We don't like it, but we will leave it up to the membership at their meeting.

The strikers want a 40-hour week in place of the present 48-hour week; hourly wage increases from 1.10 to \$1.57 and from \$1.42 to \$1.85 for licensed personnel.

Conoco Wildcat In S-E Reeves Finds Delaware Lime

Continental Oil Company No. 1 H. T. Collier, Southeast Reeves County wildcat is in the Delaware black lime, on a total depth of 5,259 feet, and is to run 7-inch casing before drilling ahead to explore for possible petroleum production in that formation.
