MAAF To End Training Program

Many Gls Will Leave Immediately

Midland Army Air Field, which trained thousands of bombardiers under the World War II Flying Training Command program, will revert immediately to a re-duced activity status, it was announced Thursday.

The Midland base is one of 12 Army Air Force stations going to the reduced status.

Flying Training Command will operate seven bases on active training schedules. They include: Randolph Field, San Antonio; Good-fellow Field, San Angelo; Enid, Okla., Field; Luke and Williams fields, Arizona; Barksdale, La., Field and Smyra, Tenn., Field. Training Ends February 22

There will be no flying training program at Midland after the graduation of a class of Chinese cadets February 22.

The strength of the base here will be approximately 350 officers, 500 civilians, and a few enlisted men. Emphasis at the Midland base will be the housing, clothing and feeding of Air Force personnel until such time as a post-war program is completely set up. Surplus personnel from Midland

and the other 11 air bases will be diverted to the seven active stations. The ATC will continue to operate at Midland Army Air Field as a separate base function.

Midlanders may expect to see fewer airplanes under the revised set-up. Thousands of training planes will be sent to bases remaining ac-



Case Plan Would Allow

WASHINGTON -(AP)-The House Thursday passed 257 to 155 the hotly-disputed Case Bill to curb and seek settlements of labor strife.

Final action came on a roll call vote, sending the far-reaching strike control legislation to the Senate. There. its foes predict it will meet tough sledding.

Just before the conclusive ballot, members shouted down a motion by Rep. Baldwin (R-NY) to send the bill back to the Labor Committee for further study.

The measure, by Rep. Case (R-SD), won tentative approval late Wednesday, 197-115.

But the clinching vote was delayed until Thursday when Rep. Hoffman (R-Mich) insisted that the lengthy, much-amended bill be read to the House in its entirety.

The Case proposal, as it now stands, would:

1. Create a federal mediation board with authority to step into major labor disputes and forbid strikes or lockouts for 30 days. 2. Permit wide use of court in-

junctions in enforcing the cooling off period, preventing violence or nsuring movement of perishable goods. 3. Provide for civil suits against





of habeas corpus. The general petitions were placed in the mail in Manila late in January, while the Supreme Court was considering similar petitions filed by Japanese General Tomoyuki Yamashita, who is under death sentence as a war criminal.

The high tribunal last Monday rejected all of Yamashita's conentions.

Homma's petitions were placed before the justices immediately after their arrival Thursday, but the court is expected to announce later whether it will hear argument or reject them.

If the petitions are rejected, the court may base its action on the decision reached in Yamashita's case.

Meat Rationing To Be Returned If Necessary

WASHINGTON -(AP)- President Fruman said Thursday he would call for a return to meat rationing if it becomes necessary to prevent 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 people from

starving to death. The President told his news conference that he thought it would not be necessary to ration meat, that he hoped not.

If, however, it becomes necessary to keep from 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 people abroad from starving, he continued, he thought the country ought to do it.

He explained that he was vitally concerned with the prospect of videspread starvation in wartorn countries, accentuated by losses of vheat crops in some countries and other grains elsewhere.

More Confusion In Argentina

A new complication was added to the confused political picture in Argentina by the national lockout of industry and business in protest against the policies of the present government in Buenos Aires.

The lockout is traditionally a "reactionary" measure. But in this case the paralysis of commerce seems to be a liberal maneuver directed not against labor, but against the military dictatorship which, elaborating on the ward politician's old practice of giving away cigars to voters, has decreed wage increases and bonuses in a bald attempt to get the labor vote.

Apparently Argentina's Labor Party has swallowed the bait. At least it has unanimously selected Colonel Peron as its candidate for president in next month's elections

How the Argentine workers, with the example of Italian and German labor's fate before them, can choose to string along with a totalitarian boss is hard to understand. It may be hoped that business, for once deployed to the left of them, may bring them to their senses, and that the hardships attendant upon the business lockout will not be so severe as to alienate supporters of Argentine democracy as their difficult and unequal struggle approaches a climax.

New Deal For Japan

Almost 40 directives have been sent from Washington to Gen. Douglas MacArthur in Japan since V-J Day. The general in turn has issued orders to the Japanese government to put all save two or three of these directives into effect. What these directives and orders are intended to do is to force a complete revolution in the Japanese way of life.

The job of the new Far Eastern Commission set up under the Moscow communique issued by Secretaries Byrnes, Bevin and Molotov is to review all these directives and see whether they approve of what has been done so far. The critics and the experts and the prophets are about evenly divided as to whether this new arrangement, plus a Big Four Allied Council in Tokyo, will stop Mac-Arthur's progress or whether it won't. The Coast Guard report from Seward said it was not known as yet whether all the crewmen and pas-sengers listed actually had been aboard when the Yukon sailed Sunday night from Seward, seven hours before she ran aground on the storm-beaten rocks in Johnstone Bay.

The cutter Onondaga messaged late Wednesday that all survivors had been rescued and the Yukon abandoned. There had been reports from rescued passengers and crewnen that casualties had been seen,

but none of these could be verified. Three crewmen pulled from the water by a tug after the Yukon broke in two Monday night said they thought several were lost, one man estimating the number at 20 or more. One passenger said he had been told three bodies were recovered.





Navy Plans Postwar Fleet Of 319 Ships

WASHINGTON -(AP)- The Navy revealed Thursday its postwar blueprint for the nation's first line of defense—a fleet of 319 fighting ships "for instant action" and ready to aunch a sky armada of 3,627 planes. The biggest force would be alocated to the Pacific where a combat force of 176 warships is planned. The Atlantic detachment would muster 143 men-of-war.

Rocket Snakes Cleared Fath For Anzio **Beachhead**

By FRANK CAREY Associated Press Science Writer

PLUTO, W. VA. - Exploding "snakes," propelled along the ground by rockets, ran interference for American invaders in the assault on German positions at Anzio.

This was disclosed with the un-veiling of details of an ingenious device developed by military and civilian scientists during the war for clearing wide paths through territory heavily infested with antipersonnel mines.

The device is known as the "antipersonnel mine clearing snake." It was developed by the Army Engi-neer Corps and by scientists of the National Defense Research Committee. The NDRC group did its share of the work at its ballistics laboratory here at Pinto in the Allegany Mountains.

'The "snake" consists of a series of magnesium strips approximately five inches wide bolted end-to-end for a length of 100 feet. Between these strips are clamped two 100foot strings of explosive cartridges a total of 60 pounds of explosive. At the front, the strips of magnesium are bolted to a steel skidshaped like the front of a ski-



Germans Deliberately Destroyed Library U. S. Helped Build

NUERNBERG - (AP) - Professor Van Der Essen told the internation-al military tribunal that German invasion forces "deliberately and systematically" destroyed world-renowned Louvain University library in Belgium in 1940. Appearing as a prosecution wit-

ness, the history professor who also is the university's general-secretary, said two German artillery batteries were trained on the library, destroyed by the Germans once before in 1914 and rebuilt with the aid of American funds, while 42 planes bombed it on the morning of May 19.

Before the first World War the library was one of the best in Europe, housing priceless manuscripts and a large collection of books of the 16th and 17 centuries.




