

LONDON — (AP) — Generalissimo Stalin, declaring the last two wars resulted from the development of Capitalistic world economy, Saturday night announced a new five-year plan for Soviet Russia and stupendous production goals "to guarantee our country against any even-

He predicted, too, that Soviet scientists could "not only catch up with but surpass those abroad." He did not mention atomic research specifically.

80 Persons Are Injured In Cairo Anti-British Riot

CAIRO-(A)-More than 80 persons were injured Saturday in battle between police and Egyptian students who shouted for revolt and 'down with Britain" in a demonstration protesting Britain's attitude toward revision of the British-Egyptian treaty.

At least 50 students and 30 policemen were hurt, and 150 students were arrested before order was re-

The demonstrators surged through Cairo streets after a mass meeting at Faud University. One bus was

A drawbridge across the Nile was raised to prevent the crowd from pushing to the heart of Cairo, and fighting broke out at the bridge with sticks and stones as weapons.

The 1936 British-Egyptian treaty provided for establishment of a miltary alliance between the two countries, and for maintenance of Brit-ish troops in Egypt for 20 years. Egypt had asked for evacuation of all foreign troops and a revision of the status of the Sudan, now under joint British-Egyptian control. Replying, Britain agreed to un-

dertake revision of the treaty. Speakers at the mass meeting, however, asserted it was impossible to negotiate with British Ambassador Lord Killearn, who was accused of being "imperialistic."

LONDON-(P)-Great Britain and the Netherlands topped a full day demand Saturday night that the Security Council reject a Soviet four story building, attractive and Ukraine request for a commission strife-torn Netherlands East Indies.

> The council adjourned until 11 a. m. Sunday without reaching any decision. As the first United Nations meeting sped toward early adjournament, possibly on Tuesday these were the other main highlights of Saturday's decisions:

1. The General Assembly, in a move sparked by the United States to carry out the United Nation's charter provisions in developing selfgovernment and free political institutions in their dependencies.

GM Electric Walkout Ends; Employes OK Western Union Terms

Another major break in the log-jam of strikes tying up reconversion came Saturday when the General Motors Corporation announced a strike of 25,000 CIO Electrical Workers in its five electrical division plants had been settled on the basis of an 18 1-2 cents an hour wage increase.

A few hours earlier, some 7,000 CIO members voted end their strike against Western Union in New York City, and a White House spokesman reported good progress in attempts to end the steel strike.

Surplus Headache

Lt. Gen. Edmund Bristol Gregory, who as quartermaster general bought several billion dollars worth of food, clothing and equipment for the Army, now finds himself installed as chairman of the board of War Assets SECOND GRADE CLASS Corporation. His new job is to sell from \$10,000,000,000 to \$15,000,000,000 worth of surpluses which Army, Navy and the war agencies now wish they hadn't bought. General Gregory's plight is perhaps the crowning irony of the whole war. The general, however, is cheerful. "I didn't buy it all," he says, in self-defense.

The surplus property job is an unwelcome brat that has been shifted around from government door to door like a poor relation. Temporarily, General Gregory and his WAC-War Assets Corporation-headquarters are installed in the Federal Loan Building.

Surplus Property Administration is being liquidated after two reorganizations and three bosses. The whole job has now been given to RFC, which has organized War Assets as a subsidiary to do the work and take the losses. But now the plan is to divorce WAC from RFC Midkiff, Leroy Reeves, Coy Hudson, and run it independently.

Will Shift Civil Service System

John W. Barnett, secretary of the U. S. Civil Service Board of Examiners in Midland, announces the president has signed an executive order outlining the program to be followed by the federal government in shifting the Civil Service system from a wartime to a peacetime basis.

Some of the principal decisions

contained in this order affect Midlanders and civil service employes of this sector, they are: The Civil Service Commission

will immediately begin the use of all its resources for holding examinations leading to regular appointments. Appointments made pending the completion of these examinations will be temporary. 2. War service appointments,

which, generally speaking, have been the only type of appointment made in the federal service since March 16, 1942, will be discontinued

3. Persons working for the federal government under war service appointments, who fail to pass the regular examination will be replaced promptly by persons from the top of the regular civil service lists. 4. The Civil Service Commission will establish civil service commit-

te of expert examiners.

Persons holding war service appointments will have the opportunity of competing in regular civil service examinations. If they do not pass they will be replaced.

Contour Cultivation Continues In County

Lines for contour cultivation were run last week by the Soil Conservation Service on the farms of E. G. Locklar, W. B. Franklin, and Kelly Lewellen. These farmers are applying contour cultivation on their land as a part of their cooperative agreement and complete soil and water conservation plan with the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District. A. L. Ware, who contoured his

land last year, reports that the con-tour rows stopped washing on his field. Ware is a district coop in the Prairie Lee Soil Conservation Group J. C. Perryman, also in the Prairie Lee Conservation Group, has farmed his land on the contour for the past two years and states that the rows held water that ran off on to the county road before contouring. By holding water on the land contour cultivation will not only stop washing but increases yields Jim Stump, who is farming the B. R. Greathouse place in the Pleasant Valley Soil Conservation Group, found contour cultivation also bene-ficial in controlling blowing.

"Before contour rows were put in, sand blown off the field covered up my pasture so no grass could grow," Stump said, "but after contouring there has been little blowing and the pasture is improving." Herd Midkiff is leveling fence row drifts on his farm in the Valley View Soil Conservation Group.



Bible Classes Ruled Out Of State Colleges

AUSTIN-(A)-A quick about-face was taken Saturday by regents of the seven state teachers' colleges with regard to the permitting of Bible chairs on college property.

Friday, approval was accorded Dr. R. M. Hawkins of Sul Ross at Alpine, to establish a Bible chair on his campus.

Regent Walter Woodul (former lieutenant governor of Texas) who had not been present at Friday's meeting, told members Saturday that scuhh a coalition of church and state was inadvisable as well as unconstitutional.

On his advisement a resolution was adopted which "prohibits the use of state college property by any religious denomination for the purpose of conducting Bible chairs." Consideration will continue to be given, however, to Bible chairs off the campus, such as at the University of Texas, and credit given for

the courses. The resolution provided further that where chairs are now being operated on campuses, the administration must proced to remove them in conformity with the new ruling

Lt. Col. Frank Hobbs, formerly of Midland and an officer in the 36th Division during the Salerno invasion and the Rapido River crossing, has received his discharge and resumed his position as assistant district manager of the West Texas Utilities Company in Abilene,

it was learned here. Names, now famous in World War II history, such as Casablanca, Salerno, Pompeii, Naples, San Pietro, Rapido River, Casino and Rome, are familiar to him. He was an artillery officer with Texas' 36th Division.

In 1941 when the 1st Battalion, 131st Field Artillery, Texas National Guard, was activated, Hobbs was a captain. He was in command of a battery, and has been an officer of this unit since its organization The unit was sent to in 1929. Camp Bowie in January, 1941, and the following month the Abilene officer was promoted to the rank of

The 131st trained at Camp Bowie until January, 1942, when the 36th Division was sent to Camp Blanding, Florida. During the summer of 1942 they were on maneuvers in the Carolinas; and received amphibious training at Camp Edwards, Massachusetts, in the Fall of that

Colonel Hobbs sailed from New York on March 21, 1943, with an advance detachment for Africa and landed at Casablanca on March 29. The division arrived two weeks later at Oran and was stationed near Sidi-bel-Abbes on the edge of the desert.

He was transferred to the 155th

Field Artillery as executive officer and was stationed on the border of Spanish Morocco. On Sept. 5, 1943, the division sailed from Oran and spearheaded the invasion of Italy at Salerno. They moved in, taking Salerno, Pompeii and Naples. Following the fall of Naples, the division was sent back for rest and replacements, returning to the front line on November 17 to re-

lieve the 3rd Division.



Doug Munro, A Sergeant York Of War Bread-For-Europe Plan Was Hero Volunteer Of Guadalcanal

NEA Staff Correspondent

WASHINGTON -(NEA)- In a tiny church in South Cle Elum Wash., there is an altar to the memory of Douglas Albert Munro, signalman first class, United States Coast Guard.

It was erected by the citizens of that tiny community in honor of heir outstanding war hero. Munro was killed at Guadalcanal and is the only Coast Guardsman to re ceive the Congressional Medal of Honor in World War II.

There was a terrible urgency in our invasion of Guadalcanal in It was our first offensive strike in the Pacific and represented a transition from the inglorious defensive position in which Pearl Harbor had placed us. The flow of men and materiel could not be interrupted. It was the job of the men in the Navy and Coast Guard landing craft to see that every

Marine and every gun got ashore. The story of Douglas Munro can best be told by Comdr. D. H. Dexter, his commanding officer. He wrote it in a letter to Munro's parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Munro, when it became his duty to advise hem of their son's death.

Volunteered "On Sunday, the 27th of September," wrote the commander, "an expedition was sent into an area where trouble was to be expected Douglas was in charge of the 10 boats which took the men ashore.

"In the latter part of the afternoon, the situation had not deve-loped as had been anticipated and in order to save the expedition it became necessary to send the boats back to evacuate the men. Volun teers were called for and true to the highest traditions of the Coast Guard and also to traditions with which you had imbued your son, he was among the first to volunteen and was put in charge of the de-

"The evacuation was as success ful as could be hoped for under fire. But as always happens, the last men to leave the beach are the hardest pressed because they have been acting as the covering agents for the withdrawal of the men. Your son, knowing this, so placed himself and his boats that he could act as the covering agent for the last men. By his action and successful maneuvers, he brought back a far greater number of men than had been hoped for.

"He received his wound just as the last men were getting in the boats and clearing the beach. Upon regaining consciousness his

question was:
"'Did they get off?" Heroism Shown

"He died with a smile in the full knowledge that he had successfully accomplished a dangerous mission.
"I am sending this to you directly, for I feel you should have the privilege of knowing the facts, but request that you keep it confidential until such time as the of-

ficial notification is received:
"In the year and a half that have known Douglas, I have grown be better this year because passes to admire him, and through him, opened by last August's hurricane you. He is the true type of American manheed that is going to win this war

Douglas' heroism had been demonstrated before that fateful day on the beach at Guadal'. He was in an open landing boat with several officers and men looking for the two-man crew of a Navy dive bombwhich had been forced down sea off Savo Island. They ran into Jap landing party and found themselves under heavy enemy fire. Munro returned the fire with a rifle and cooly maneuvered the boat out of range.

When news of her son's death

arrived, Mrs. Munro said: "We are a Coast Guard family through Doug. He loved his service. I am happy to be eligible to serve in it She promptly joined the SPARS, Coast Guard Women's Reserve, and served as a lieutenant until she resigned, Nov. 1, 1945.

Douglas Munro was born Oct. 11 1919, in Vancouver, B. C. He attended Cle Eleum High School, later studied for a year at Central Washington College of Education. He enlisted in the Coast Guard, Sept.



Contending this country had followed the Morgenthau plan, Landon told a news conference Thursday in Topeka, the United States must decide whether to "continue to feed Germany, reverse our policy, or be a modern-day Genghis

Look at me, it seemed to say. I'm modern, wealthy, progressive, growing. A good place to work




