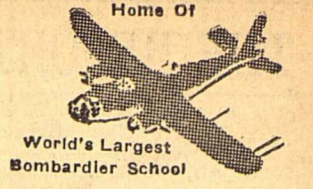

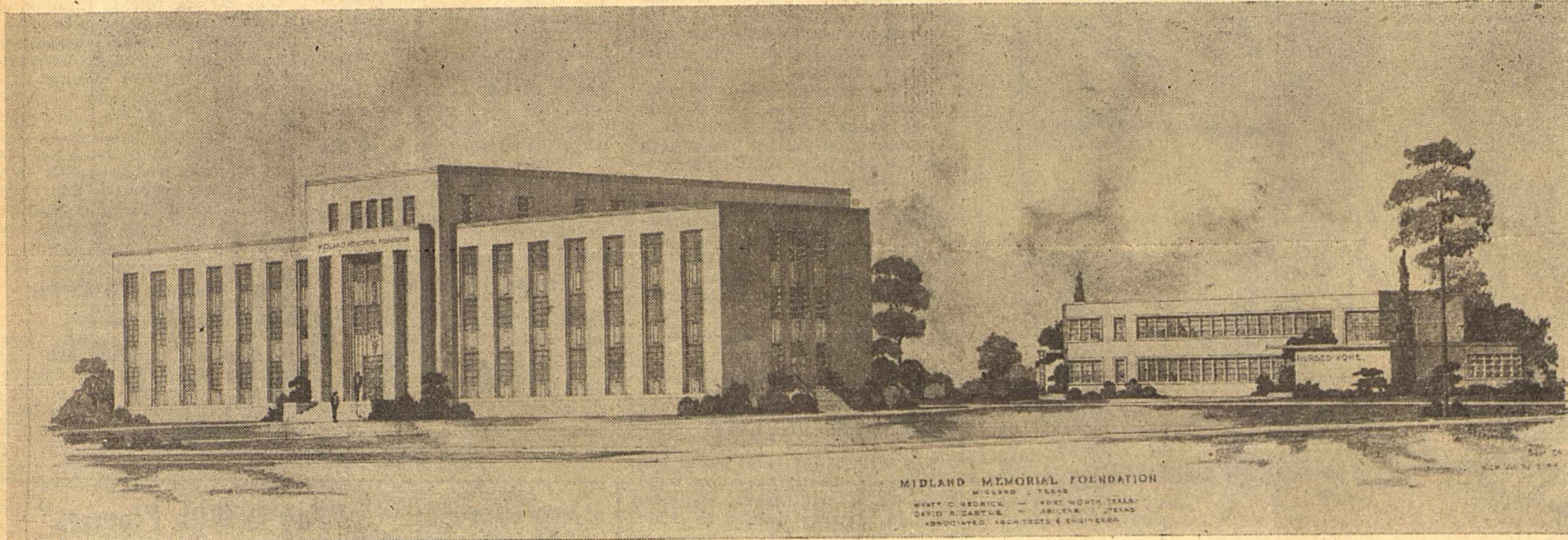

GM Electric Walkout Ends; Employees OK Western Union Terms

Another major break in the log-jam of strikes tying up reconversion came Saturday when the General Motors Corporation announced a strike of 25,000 CIO Electrical Workers in its five electrical division plants had been settled on the basis of an 18 1-2 cents an hour wage increase. A few hours earlier, some 7,000 CIO members voted to end their strike against Western Union in New York City, and a White House spokesman reported good progress in attempts to end the steel strike.

House, a past-president of the Chamber of Commerce, will be toastmaster. Directors and officers of the organization for 1946 will be elected at the session.

Steel Strike "Near End"

With striking CIO Steelworkers and the U. S. Steel Corporation reported "not very far apart," government officials renewed efforts Saturday to bring quick settlement of the biggest barrier blocking reconversion. A White House official said President Truman was "quite hopeful" that the strike would end soon and White House Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told his news conference Saturday good progress was being made.

Britain Objects To UNO Inquiry Into Dutch East Indies

LONDON—(P)—Great Britain and the Netherlands topped a full day of United Nations activity with a demand Saturday night that the Security Council reject a Soviet Ukraine request for a commission to investigate conditions in the strife-torn Netherlands East Indies. The council adjourned until 11 a. m. Sunday without reaching any decision. As the first United Nations meeting sped toward early adjournment, possibly on Tuesday, these were the other main highlights of Saturday's decisions: 1. The General Assembly, in a move sparked by the United States delegation, called on colonial powers to carry out the United Nations' charter provisions in developing self-government and free political institutions in their dependencies. 2. Assembly delegates adopted a resolution, proposed by Panama, to keep Franco's Spain out of the United Nations and to treat his government as a virtual outlaw. The proposal won 45 votes, with El Salvador and Nicaragua abstaining and four nations not present.

Extended service on the north bus run of the Midland City Lines began Sunday morning. The north route was extended from Avenue C to Louisiana Street. The present route is as follows: bus leaves postoffice at 15 and 45 minutes after the hour, goes west on Avenue C to Louisiana Street, then east to Avenue A, and continues on the present route along A Street to Storey and North Big Spring streets back to the post-office.

80 Persons Are Injured In Cairo Anti-British Riot

CAIRO—(P)—More than 80 persons were injured Saturday in a battle between police and Egyptian students who shouted for revolt and "down with Britain" in a demonstration protesting Britain's attitude toward revision of the British-Egyptian treaty. At least 50 students and 30 policemen were hurt, and 150 students were arrested before order was restored.

"Each day, a painter will extend the red line, indicating the total of contributions. In drafting plans for the hospital, thorough study was given to modern equipment which has the endorsement of the American Hospital Association and the U. S. Public Health Service. Midland now lacks adequate hospital facilities and through the Midland Memorial Foundation citizens can provide the means to benefit humanity, eliminate suffering and spread the blessings of health to all citizens. The Midland Memorial Foundation provides an unusual opportunity to provide a living and useful memorial to loved ones. It can perpetuate and add glory to their names. Appropriate recognition will be given all contributors. Contributions may be deducted in figuring income taxes. The hospital, being a non-profit institution, is exempt from income taxes. Midland's population is increasing. It must provide hospital facilities not only for its present citizens but for those who are moving here to make their homes.

White House Denies Snyder Will Go Out

WASHINGTON—(P)—OPA Administrator Chester Bowles appeared Saturday night to be on top, at least for the moment, in his fight for firm holding of a price line even though it be a line bent upwards to make room for wage increases. This report on the internal wage-price controversy came from a responsible but unquoted official, as the White House gave out a denial that Reconversion Director John W. Snyder is to be replaced in his high post. The statement on Snyder was in answer to published reports that the wage-price policy tangle would result in Bowles taking Snyder's job, with Federal Communications Commissioner Paul A. Porter replacing Bowles at OPA. But a new report came quickly into circulation in the economic agencies: That Bowles might replace not Snyder but John C. Collet, stabilization administrator. The White House declined comment.

Wanted--\$500,000 Immediately For Midland Hospital

Determined to obtain \$500,000 for constructing and equipping a modern 75-bed hospital here to serve the Permian Basin area, Midland citizens banded together for one of the major financial campaigns in the city's history. From all sides and from all walks of life came pledges of support as campaign workers arranged to visit every citizen during the drive which opens Monday. More interest was displayed in the campaign than in others in recent years. Physicians and dentists at a recent meeting heartily endorsed plans for the hospital and one dentist made a sizeable contribution.

Heading the campaign is George Abell and his first assistant is James S. Noland. Scores of workers have been enlisted. Clint Dunagan is in charge of the campaign in the business district and John W. House is in charge of solicitations from oil companies and associated industries operating in Midland and this area. Many have expressed a sincere interest in the hospital campaign, but first want to see if citizens of Midland will back the hospital campaign with their money. "Must for 1946," and "An Investment Which Pays Dividends Forever," are among the popular campaign slogans.

Dunagan will launch his campaign in the business district with a breakfast for his workers Monday morning. Plans Are Completed Plans for the Midland Memorial Hospital have been completed. The site at West Illinois Street and the Andrews Highway has been donated and includes more than seven acres of land. The Midland Memorial Foundation has been chartered by the State of Texas to construct and erect the hospital. It is a non-profit, charitable and benevolent organization. Dr. John E. Thomas is president. Abell is vice president, and Mrs. J. Howard Hodge is secretary. John P. Butler is treasurer. Contributions may be sent direct to Butler at the First National Bank.

Trustees of the foundation include Abell, James N. Allison, Ralph M. Barron, Butler, Mrs. Hodge, Lester Grant, O. C. Harper, Mayor A. N. Hendrickson, Mrs. Hodge, House, Ralph Lowe, John Mabey, R. L. Miller, Noland, Foy Proctor, Mrs. Scharbauer, Stubbeman, Dr. Thomas, Fred Turner, Fred Wemple and Wright. No officer or trustee shall receive any financial benefit from the hospital or the foundation which will operate it. Plan To Construct 2,700,000 Houses Meets Big Accord

WASHINGTON—(P)—Blueprints for America's biggest home-building job—2,700,000 in two years—met wide acclaim Saturday and a let's-get-going attitude in Congress and the construction industry. With the program less than a day old, both Republicans and Democrats in Congress appeared solidly behind most of the plan. Some of them already were pitching into the legislative end, but the proposal for price ceilings on old homes and building lots was far from having universal support.

Messages offering warm praise and offers of cooperation poured in on Housing Administrator Wilson S. Wyatt, who drew up the plan, and on President Truman, who endorsed it. They came from housing, labor and farm organizations, from mayors, veterans, and individuals. The program calls for building some \$16,000,000,000 worth of new homes in the next two years, mostly by private firms. Most of the houses would sell for no more than \$6,000 or rent for no more than \$50 a month. To accomplish it, Wyatt said there would be needed a tremendous expansion in the output of building materials, three times labor force now working on home construction, and, in some cases, government subsidies for wages and prices.

LONDON—(AP)—Generalissimo Stalin, declaring the last two wars resulted from the development of Capitalistic world economy, Saturday night announced a new five-year plan for Soviet Russia and stupendous production goals "to guarantee our country against any eventuality." He predicted, too, that Soviet scientists could "not only catch up with but surpass those abroad." He did not mention atomic research specifically.

Snow And Sleet Sweep Midland

A blower sleet and snow storm surprised Midland early Saturday but cleared by Sunday. Moisture amounted to .07 of an inch. Snow and sleet as far east as Abilene and as far west as Eagle Pass were reported Saturday. Meteorists said a heavy snow fell at Big Spring. The temperature dipped sharply from midnight on Friday and was 27 degrees Saturday morning. Howling winds whipped rain, then snow and sleet. The mixed fall beat against the faces of citizens going to work Saturday morning. Paving was coated and slippery early Saturday. It melted under a sun in the afternoon. Traffic slowed under assaults of biting wind, mixed with snow and sleet in Midland Saturday morning. Early Saturday the highway was covered between Stanton and Midland. Minimum temperature expected Sunday was 25 degrees with the weather clearing and warming.

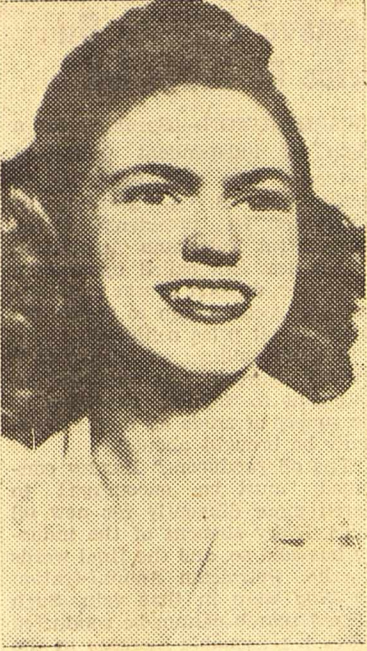

Bible Classes Ruled Out Of State Colleges

AUSTIN—(P)—A quick about-face was taken Saturday by regents of the seven state teachers' colleges with regard to the permitting of Bible chairs on college property. Friday, approval was accorded Dr. R. M. Hawkins of Sul Ross at Alpine, to establish a Bible chair on his campus. Regent Walter Woodul (former lieutenant governor of Texas) who had not been present at Friday's meeting, told members Saturday that such a coalition of church and state was inadvisable as well as unconstitutional. On his advisement a resolution was adopted which "prohibits the use of state college property by any religious denomination for the purpose of conducting Bible chairs." Consideration will continue to be given, however, to Bible chairs off the campus, such as at the University of Texas, and credit given for the courses. The resolution provided further that where chairs are now being operated on campuses, the administration must proceed to remove them in conformity with the new ruling. This affects North Texas State Teachers College at Denton, Sam Houston State Teachers College and East Texas State Teachers College, all of which now have Bible chairs on their campuses.

Victim Of Strangling



Clad only in robe and pajama tops, pretty Mary Lou Jenkins was found strangled to death in her home at Columbia, Mo. The body was found by her mother on the floor of the living room, a piece of electric light cord twisted cruelly around her neck. Sgt. Glen Murray of the Columbia police said the 20-year-old girl had been criminally assaulted.

Appropriations Group To Guard Finances Of Governmental Agencies

WASHINGTON—(P)—The House Appropriations Committee reached out Saturday for a tighter hold on the purse strings of 41 government corporations, including some of the biggest financial operators in the federal family. It designated five of its members—Reps. Mahon (D-Texas); Whitten (D-Miss); Gore (D-Tenn); Ploeser (R-Mo) and Jensen (R-Iowa)—as a subcommittee to review annually all transactions and operations of the agencies. Mahon is chairman of the group. Mahon told reporters the new subcommittee will "keep under close and constant Congressional scrutiny the activities of government corporations." Heretofore the corporations involved have obtained approval of Congress for administrative expenses, generally appropriated out of their capital. Their justifications of these expenses have been made to scattered appropriations subcommittees, none of which had jurisdiction over all 41.

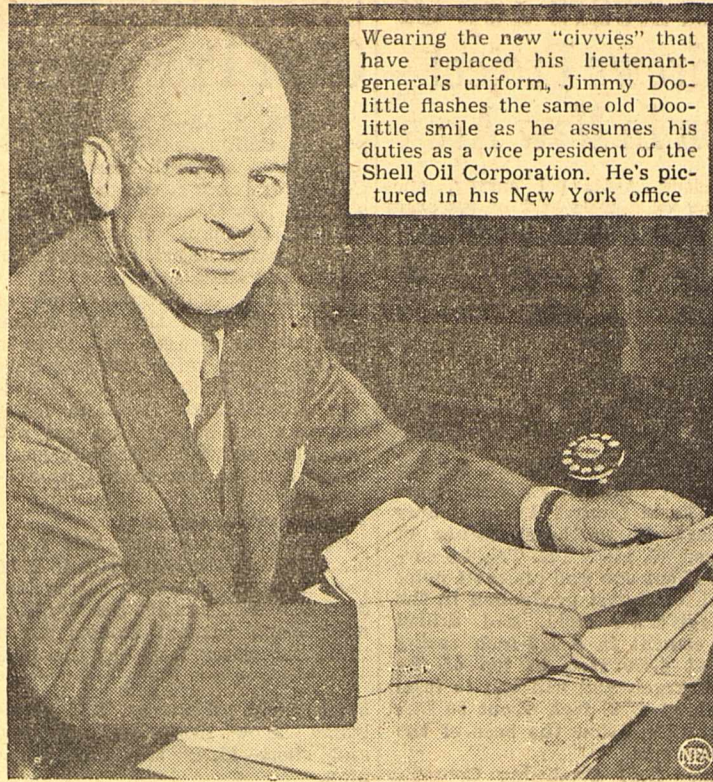
Nine-House Project Accelerates Building

They will be located at 1001-1011 West Pennsylvania and 1006-1010 West California Streets in Midland Heights Addition. Each will be 24 by 24 feet and cost \$1,200. Building permits total \$17,100 for February. Other permits for the month included: P. A. Nelson, to move to 707 N. Colorado Street, 40 by 30 feet dwelling, cost \$3,000; Allen Edwards, to construct 14 by 30 feet lumber and frame structure at 1007 S. Wear Street, cost \$2,000; Pool Miller, to build a 12 by 20 feet lumber dwelling at 1500 S. Colorado Street, cost \$1,000; \$300 permit to move a house to the Moody Addition from out of town, P. A. Smith.

Bradshaw Jury Is Discharged By Judge

FORT WORTH — (P) — A criminal district court jury deliberating the fate of Mrs. Doris Bradshaw, comely 27-year-old blonde charged with murder in the slaying of her husband, was discharged at 6:35 p. m. Saturday after jurors reported to Judge Willis McGregor they were hopelessly deadlocked. Foreman J. J. O'Brien reported the 12 men were divided six and six but did not disclose which alternative they were discussing. The hung jury will call for a new trial of Mrs. Bradshaw who was charged in the slaying of her husband, Lt. George B. Bradshaw Jr., November 11 at their home here. District Attorney Al Clyde said he will seek a new trial at the earliest possible time. That will be at least April, he said, since other murder cases are pending on the docket.

Kaiser To Build 10,000 New Homes

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Henry J. Kaiser, announcing he would construct 10,000 homes in the East and Midwest this year, Saturday called the Truman-Wyatt program for building 2,700,000 homes in 1946 and '47 "a bold and daring plan to come to grips immediately with the emergency."

The industrialist told reporters his Community Homes organization could build double the proposed 10,000 homes if materials were available. He would not reveal the specific localities of the proposed construction, he declared, until land purchases for the site were made.

Navy Releases Texas' Port Arthur Refinery

PORT ARTHUR—(AP)—The Navy was scheduled to officially release the Texas Company refinery here at midnight Saturday, according to Lt. L. E. Cole, representative of Admiral Ben Moreel, in charge of seized refineries.

Restoration of the plant to the company followed an agreement with the oil workers union calling for an 18 per cent wage increase, effective with resumption of a 40-hour week possibly within two weeks, Cole said.

UNO May Vote Sunday On Proposed Site

LONDON—(AP)—A French parliamentary maneuver Saturday delayed a vote by the United Nations Permanent Site Committee on locating the permanent United Nations headquarters in the Stamford-Greenwich area on the Connecticut-New York border and the temporary headquarters in New York City.

The French proposed that the vote on selection of a permanent site be delayed until next September. The vote on this proposal was tied at 19-19 and the committee chairman, Dr. Auleta Angel of Colombia, declared it was defeated. The French contended, however, that under United Nations rules a tie vote on any subject except an election called for new balloting within 48 hours.

Dr. Angel granted an adjournment to study the French contention. It was announced later that the committee would meet again at 3 p. m. Sunday.

Swedish Prince to Wed Commoner



Soon to be wed in America are Prince Carl Johan of Sweden, son of Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf and favorite grandson of King Gustaf, who renounced his royal birthright for love of Mrs. Kerstin Wijkmark, seven years his senior. The 35-year-old divorcee is a newspaperwoman and editor. The marriage will climax a five-year romance carried on over strongest opposition from the prince's family. The couple plan to live in the U. S., as plain Mr. and Mrs. Bernadotte, the Swedish royal family's name.

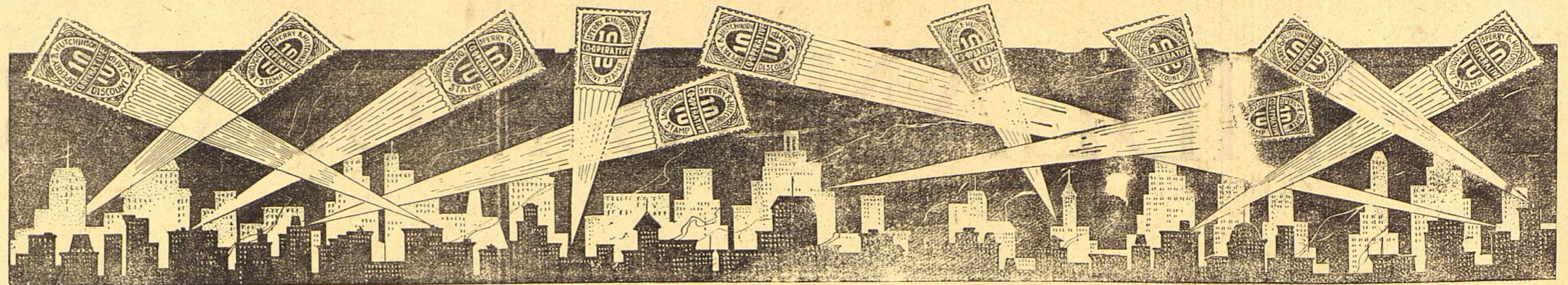
New Rules Eliminate 10th Man in Softball

Housewife Voices Plea For Modern Midland Hospital

TO MIDLAND CITIZENS:

I'll never forget the first time I saw Midland. The name was on our road map, but long before we expected to see it, the tall, modern skyline thrust itself challengingly into the sun, in startling contrast to the flatness of the land around it.

Look at me, it seemed to say. I'm modern, wealthy, progressive, growing. A good place to work and live.

Later, when Midland really became our home, I found it all it had promised to be. I liked the climate, the people, the lovely homes, Midland's air of a town swiftly becoming a city. I liked it all, until our baby grew suddenly dangerously ill.

Or you could walk the floor with him in your arms until office hours were over and the overworked doctor could drop by—and hope he wouldn't be too late.

I hear that some people oppose the new hospital. Who are they, I wonder. People who are immune to sudden illness? Who have no children? Or those with the means to fly to Dallas when sickness strikes. Even so, can they do without the rest of us who do, occasionally, become emergency cases.

There are more and more children here. Midland has outgrown its hospital. It needs more doctors and nurses. But what incentive do good doctors have for coming to Midland? A few have come already, only to be so overwhelmed with patients that they haven't time for house calls and have to see some serious, contagious cases in their offices.

Some doctors who have moved here are now practicing in other towns where there are hospital facilities and enough operating rooms to go around.

Does that make Midland look like a desirable place to live?

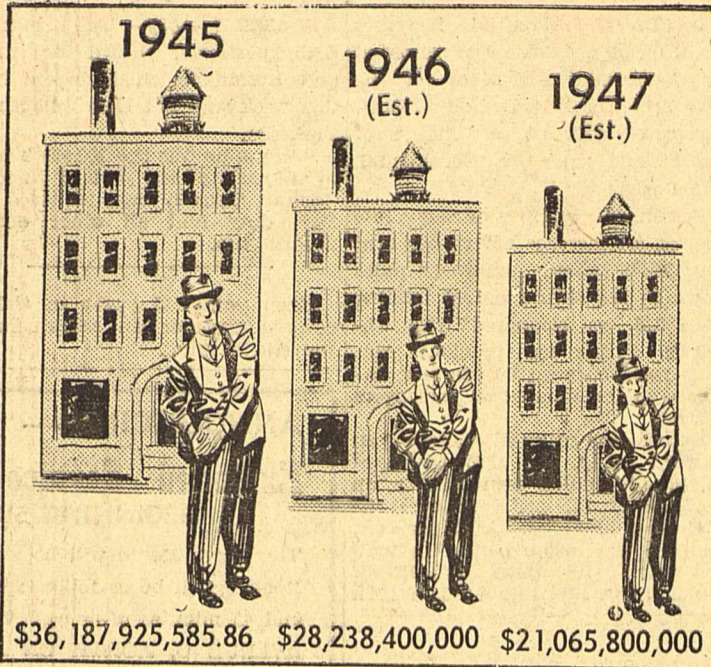
To deny the need of a new hospital here is to admit that Midland is through growing. That it's going to back up. I find that hard to believe with all the new houses being built in town.

I think it is up to all of us, business men and parents alike, to see that the building of this new hospital goes forward. Uncle Sam's Income to Drop



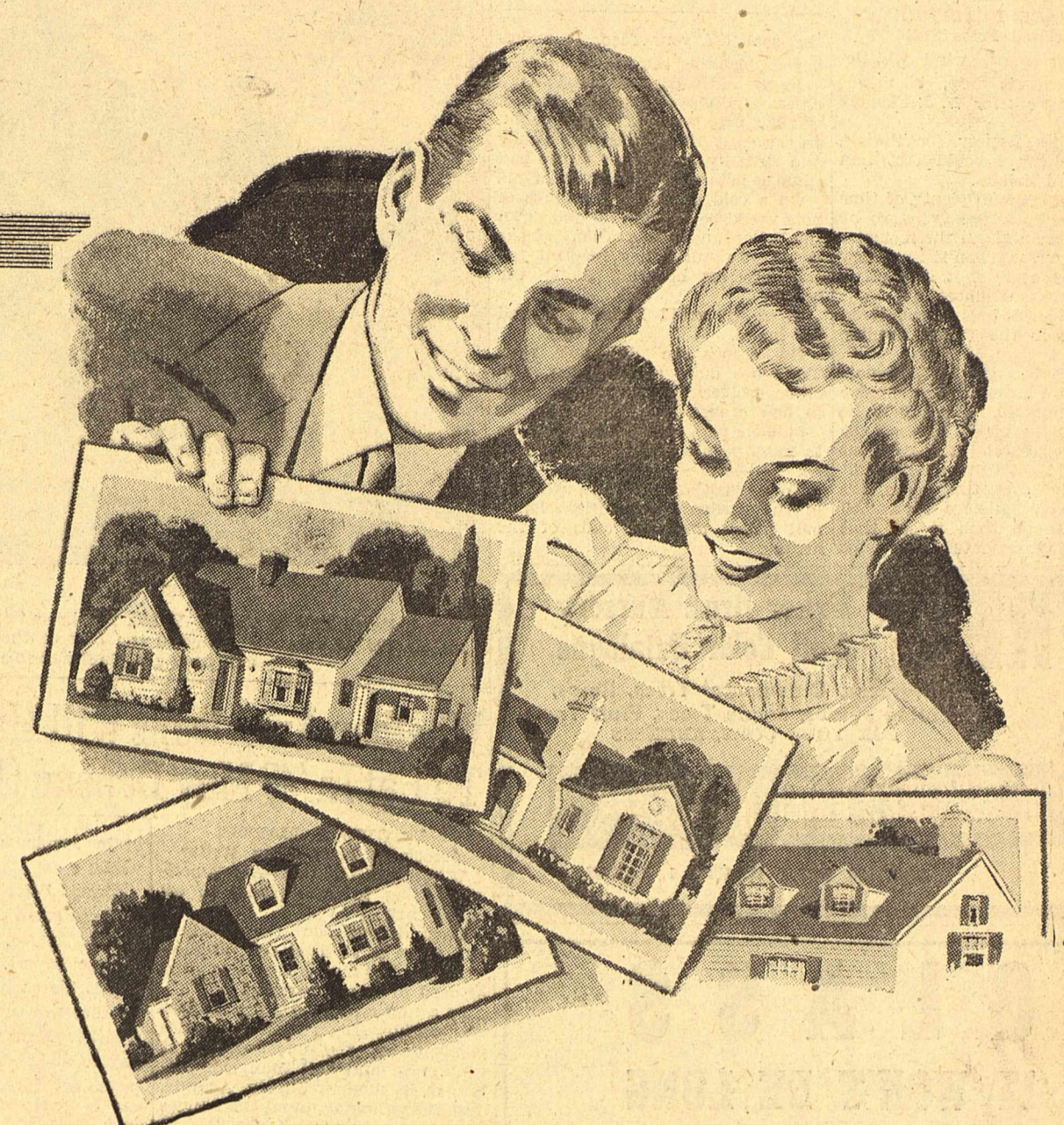
