

### Subsidies May Be Made For Scarce Housing Materials approval. The site inspection committee,

WASHINGTON-(AP)- Despite the pleas of Housing Boss Wilson W. Wyatt, the homes-for-veterans bill will go to the House floor next week minus the price ceilings President Truman wants on old houses .

A fight on party lines is probable on that issue, but Wyatt last night got Republican and Democratic leaders to agree to another key portion of Truman's two-year program for 2,700,000 new homes. This calls for \$600,000,000 worth of federal subsidies-Wyatt calls

them "premium payments"— to stimulate the output of scarce building materials.

Wyatt contends the premium payments have two advantages over higher prices as a production spur: They do not bring about higher prices for finished houses, and they can be reduced or eliminated more easily when no longer needed. Leaders of the House Banking

Street railway service was nalted shortly before the strike began, but a spokesman for the struck Duquesne Light Company said it was still supplying current on an emergency basis.

He expressed belief that, despite the strike, the comcany could continue to provide service to institutions and nomes—but only if householders imited their consumption to vital

### U.S. And Britain Make Commercial Airport Pact

HAMILTON, BERMUDA - (A) ommercial aviation in the United States and Great Britain was linked Tuesday by an agreement authorizing an unlimited number of flights between the two countries at "economis rates" to be fixed by intergovernmental action.

The agreement, signed here Monday night, allows the commercial planes of each country to use the stones on global flights.

Each country is given a free hand in determining the number of such So-called "fifth freedom" traffic is authorized. ### Lincoln And 'Reconstruction'

During the war years it was natural that on Lincoln's Birthday we should look back through time and history to a war of 80 years before, and to the words and example of a man of acknowledged greatness who led an embattled nation to victory.

This year the analogy no longer holds good. We are in the midst of what, 80 years ago, was called reconstruction. Had Lincoln lived through that period of reconstruction, this nation's history would be a different and undoubtedly a happier one. But the task of returning the country to the ways and practices of peace was entrusted to the war president's successor, as it is today. Lincoln died at the dawn of peace; Roosevelt, almost or the eve of victory.

It would be comforting and instructing to know how Abraham Lincoln would have met problems similar to those which the United States faces now.

How would he have helped to answer the question of whether "We shall nobly save or meanly lose the last best hope of earth" through a closer organization of the world's nations? How might he have aided in solving our industrial disputes quickly and fairly?

It is idle to speculate. But it is also excusable to turn to some of Lincoln's thoughts on labor and read them with present circumstances in mind. The particular thoughts quoted here were contained in some informal remarks which he made to a delegation of New York workingmen

They are not a formal economic and social philosophy. They may not be geared to today's thinking but they make interesting reading, nevertheless.

The strongest bond of human sympathy, outside of the family relations," Lincoln said, "should be one uniting all working people, of all nations, and tongues, and kindreds." (That would get him called a Communist today.)

"Nor should this lead to a war upon property or the owners of property. Property is the fruit of labor; property is desirable; is a positive good in the world. That some should be rich shows that others may become rich, and hence is just encouragement to industry and enterprise." (That would get him called a conservative, or

"Let not him who is houseless pull down the house of another, but let him work diligently and build one for himself, thus by example assuring that his own should be safe from violence when built." (That might be called good sense and sound advice which is probably more apt today than it was in 1864.)

### Let Them All See

The British government has asked to have official military observers present at the American atomic bombing of naval vessels next Spring and Summer. Prime Minister Attlee has specified that he means military representatives, not newspapermen.

Well, we hope his generals and admirals get to go. We hope the newspapermen will be present, too—not just American and English and Canadian reporters, but newspapermen from all over the world. Furthermore, if it is physically possible, we hope that the entire UNO delegation now meeting in London can be invited, and will ac-

Let them see the effects of the predicted hundred-million-degree heat, the 1000-mile-an-hour wind, the 100foot waves. Let them all see it, and let them see all that

The whole world has read of the atomic bomb. It also read of D-Day, but few of the world's people stormed the beaches. It read of Dachau, but few knew its sights and stenches at first hand.

So let as many as possible of the architects of lasting peace see what the next war could do. They would certainly return with an even more serious and diligent approach to their complicated tasks.
