THE SUBCOMMITTEE is considering the Air Quality Act of 1967 - with a number of amendments to existing laws to make certain that the pollution already damaging this Nation's big cities will not be allowed to worsen or to spread into less industrial areas. This act would give the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, Mr. Gardner, new powers to control pollution and to try to eradicate this danger where it presently poses a problem to the health and safety of

Dr. William H. Stewart, Surgeon General of the United States, told the Senate subcommittee that air pollution is one of the major health challenges confronting the American peop'e today. He also said there is an abundance of evidence which demonstrates beyond any doubt that air pollution - if unchecked can be deadly to large numbers

In the big cities of the world air pollution is an old problem. The Surgeon General recalled the extraordinarily heavy fog in Lonton during 1952 that mingled with poisonous fumes and gasses of Nellie Stephens






