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## Jaycee 'Open Letter' Drive Snowballs Throughout State

The "Open Letter to the President" campaign started by Horace Henley and the Dimmitt Jaycees is mushrooming throughout the state this week.

HUNDREDS OF Dimmitt and Castro County residents have already signed copies of the letter supporting President Johnson's Vietnam policy, and across the state the first-week signature list reached the thousands.

Now a statewide project of the Texas Jaycees, the letter campaign is being carried out by 298 Jaycee clubs in Texas.

HENLEY SAID the letter is intended to show Washington — and Hanoi — that President Johnson has solid grass-roots support for his determined policy in Vietnam.

The letter has been described as "a protest against the protesters" of American involvement in Vietnam.

Jaycees started circulating the letter here this week, as did other Jaycees throughout Texas.

FRIDAY, the Jaycees will have a "sign-up table" in the First State Bank community room in Dimmitt from 7 a. m. to 2:30 p. m., and in the Farmers State Bank community room in Hart from 9:30 to 3, for those who have not yet been contacted and wish to sign the letter to the President.

Those signing are asked to contribute \$1 toward having the letter printed as a multi-page display in the Austin American Statesman in three weeks.

The letter, with all signatures, will appear in the state capital newspaper the same day President Johnson is to address the national convention of the US Junior Chamber of Commerce. When he delivers his address, the Texas Jaycees will present the original signed letters to him in portfolio form.

Statesman page would hold a maximum of 650 signatures, properly spaced.

"WE'LL USE as many pages as we need," Henley said, "and will use any leftover funds to buy reprints and mail them to our soldiers in Vietnam and across the country."

The president of the El Paso Jaycees, Henley reported, is conducting a precinct to precinct campaign for signatures and expects to get as many as 10,000 in El Paso alone.

And the Berger Jaycees have

vowed that when they get all their signatures ready, they're going to stage a "relay to Austin" to run the letters to the state capital in Olympic fashion as an extra demonstration of support.

HERE'S THE text of the open letter:

"Mr. President:

"Those of us who have signed this letter have one thing in common that causes us to join together to support our country in this time of extreme danger.

"This common bond is that we are Americans. We come from

different political parties, economic, religious and social groups — but we are Americans and are united in this effort.

"AS AMERICANS, we wish to voice our support of our men in the Armed Forces who are fighting in Southeast Asia to protect us and our fellow man from the tyranny of Communist rule and aggression.

"We also extend this support to you, Mr. President, for your policy of waging war against an aggressor and at the same time seeking peace. We believe it is time for those of us who support our national policy to stand up and be counted so that those who oppose this policy will recognize the strength and solidarity behind that policy.

"We hope our fellow countrymen will join with us so that the present unpleasantness can soon be ended and our men brought home."

Water Group Starts Signing

"Our first big job is to sign up members and distribute information concerning the importation of water to the Tri-State area," John Kendrick of Brownfield, newly elected president of Water Inc., said.

SPEAKING at an after-dinner meeting of directors following formation of Water Inc., Kendrick said, "We must get about the organization's business promptly. We must make it understood that those who most need guaranteed irrigation water will have to depend upon themselves to get the job done."

Water Inc. is an association of West Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma agricultural and business leaders who have banded together to see that the Tri-State area is represented in state water importation plans. A large delegation of Castro County farmers and businessmen joined a thousand others at last week's organizational meeting in Lubbock's KoKo Palace.

Officers of the firm will be established in Lubbock shortly, and Kendrick said any person, business or group interested in joining the association may write to Water Inc., Box 271, Lubbock, 79403.

In addition to Kendrick, officers are K. B. "Tex" Watson of Amarillo, vice-president; Gaston Wells of Dumas, second vice-president; J. M. Collins of Plainview, secretary and Jim Ed Walker of Lubbock, treasurer.

Ray Joe Riley of Sunnyside was elected district director for Castro and Lamb Counties.

I should have, but I didn't, attend the water meeting at Lubbock last week. I am sure that all of the possibilities for the transportation of water to the Texas Panhandle-Plains area were discussed. It is high time that whatever steps necessary be taken to develop the type of water project best suited to our area. The planning stage should be thorough, but as brief as possible. Regardless of the plan that is decided upon, it will be years and years before the water will flow into this great agricultural area, in the meantime the huge underground supply of water is being depleted slowly but surely.

Some ten or fifteen years ago this newspaper received a copy of the Washington Post, with an accompanying letter, describing an engineer's idea, illustrated by maps, as to how water could be brought down from the Missouri River. We gave the idea some publicity at that time, but irrigation was just reaching its peak in this area and the general opinion seemed to be that the underground water supply was all but inexhaustible. Regardless of the cost of a project, that would bring sufficient water to irrigate the Panhandle-Plains area, it would be far exceeded by the wealth it would create.

Ray Joe Riley is Castro County's member on the water board appointed at Lubbock last week. If the other board members are as competent as the one we have supplied this project will be in fruition at the earliest possible date.

THE loan amount okayed by the Farmers Home Administration is \$267,220, with \$167,220 for construction and \$100,000 for land purchase. THE CENTER is to have a complete, built-in sprinkling system.

In addition to these facilities, two junior ball parks are to be constructed at the center by local civic clubs.

The golf course will have unique "doub'tee boxes" on many fairways to provide different approaches and angles on the "back nine." With this design, a golfer will tee off from one side of a double-tee fairway on the way out and from the other side coming back, if he decides to play the conventional 18 holes.

BIGGS & MATHEWS of Wichita Falls, engineers for the Castro County Recreation Association, Inc., will provide bidders with contract documents, plans, specifications and information sheets.

Bids are scheduled to be opened and read aloud at 2 p. m. June 19 in the community room of First State Bank, with the association reserving the right to reject any or all bids.

## Iowa State's 'Travel Course' To Tour Farms Here Saturday

Thirty College upper-class men, all members of Iowa State University's Unique "Ag travel course," will arrive in Dimmitt Saturday morning for all-day tour of Castro County.

THEIR SCHEDULE IN the nation's grain sorghum capital includes tours of a small irrigated farm and the Western Ammonia plant Saturday morning, and a tour of the Truman Touchstone farm northwest of Dimmitt Saturday afternoon.

The ag students started their travel course in Iowa and will see farming operations in Nebraska, Colorado, Texas, the southeastern states, the Atlantic seaboard and Canada before returning to the ISU campus. Tour directors are Dr. John Sims and Dr. Joe Stritzel, ISU agriculture professors.

LOCAL HOSTS for the students will be Edd McLeroy, vice-president and agricultural represent-

ative of the First State Bank, and Dr. Bill Bennett, chief agronomist for Western Ammonia Corp. The two firms will treat the group to lunch at noon Saturday in the Colonial Inn Restaurant.

The ISU ag travel course previously toured Castro County farms in the summer of 1965.

Funeral services were conducted Friday morning in Dimmitt's First Baptist Church for Elmer C. Caudle, 82, long-time Dimmitt resident and prominent church worker, who died last Thursday in Plains Memorial Hospital.

Rev. Frank Pollard, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Floydada Cemetery under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

MR. CAUDLE, a retired bookkeeper, was born Oct. 24, 1884 in Miller Grove (Hopkins County). He had been a Dimmitt resident 37 years.

Baptized 67 years ago, he compiled a lifetime of service to the Baptist Church. He was a deacon of the church for 40 years and served First Baptist here as general secretary of Sunday school, department secretary for Sunday school and Baptist Training Union, and voluntary worker with the Joe Bailes Mission in East Dimmitt for 10 years.

He was also a contributor and frequent visitor to Boys Ranch. HE IS survived by his wife, Theresa Hamilton Caudle; a brother, B. B., of Amarillo; and three sisters, Mrs. Lillie Sowell of Dallas, Mrs. Mary Flinn of Colorado Springs, Colo., and Mrs. Noa Bishop of Floydada.

His nephews served as pallbearers. They were Lynde' Roberts of Muleshoe, Freddie Hamilton and Wade Maynard of Dimmitt, Preston Elmer Maynard of Abilene, Wayne Hamilton of Silverton, Phil Young and James Maynard of Midland, and Melvin Hamilton of Farwell.

Deacons of First Baptist Church served as honorary pallbearers.

## Rites Held for 'Mother' Bell, Hotel Hostess Here 38 Years

Mrs. Nancy E. "Mother" Bell, pioneer hotel woman who provided rooms and meals for many of Dimmitt's early-day residents, died last Thursday morning at her home at 407 SW Sixth St. She was 91.

FUNERAL services were conducted Saturday afternoon in the First Baptist Church with Rev. Frank Pollard, pastor, officiating. Mrs. Bell was buried in Castro Memorial Gardens beside her husband, John, who died in 1955. Dennis Funeral Home directed.

Mrs. Bell had been a Dimmitt resident 48 years, and for 38 of those years she and her husband had operated the Bell Hotel, Dimmitt's main early-day landmark.

Born Sept. 5, 1875, in Macon, Mo., she moved with her family to Montague County, Texas, when she was 16 years old.

SHE AND Mr. Bell were married on Christmas day, 1894, and they moved to Dimmitt by covered wagon in 1918 to buy the hotel from "Uncle Buck" Tate. Dimmitt was a small town of 200 people at that time, with a grocery store, hardware store, tiny bank, courthouse and a few other buildings.

With its extra conveniences of a wagon yard and dining room, the hotel was a gathering place for cowboys on weekends and a home for persons employed in local stores. The hotel usually was full when court convened here. Room rates included meals, and Mrs. Bell either performed or supervised the domestic work and cooking.

IN THE 1940s, the Bells moved

the original hotel and built a new one on the same site, where the West Texas Telephone Co. office now stands.

In 1956, after her husband's death, Mrs. Bell retired and sold the hotel building to Willson Nichols Lumber Co. The familiar building was moved to East Dimmitt, where it stands today.

Mrs. Bell is survived by a son, Roy W. Bell of Plainview; a daughter, Mrs. Ruby Webb of Dimmitt; a sister, Mrs. Tennie Patrick of Dallas; two grandchildren, Cavin Lee Webb of Amarillo and Mrs. Pauline Dea of Lubbock; and six great-grandchildren.

He announced a public contest to rename the new memorial park now under construction on the Clovis highway, with a \$50 cash prize for the person submitting the winning name.

ENTRIES are to be mailed to "Cemetery, P. O. Box 67, Dimmitt, Texas."

The present Castro Memorial Gardens — formerly the Dimmitt Cemetery — was renamed the same way in 1955, when Mrs. R. C. "Chook" Lay submitted the winning name.

## Quarter Horses To Parade Sunday

Dimmitt Rodeo Association will stage its annual quarter horse show Sunday at the Dimmitt Rodeo Grounds.

MORE THAN 125 top quarter horses from as many as five states are expected to compete in the show, according to Maurice Campbell, show manager.

Horses will compete in both halter and performance classes, starting at 10 a. m. Judge will be John Stotts of Matador, old-time horseman and former Motley County sheriff.

Admission to the show is free, and Dimmitt's Jaycee-Eltes will serve sandwiches, coffee and soft drinks throughout the show.

Dimmitt's Quarter Horse show started about 10 years ago as a local affair, and for years was held in conjunction with the annual Dimmitt Junior Rodeo. But the show has become so popular, attracting horse entries from surrounding states, that it was established as a separate all-day show this year.

## Library Announces New Hours; Starts Reading Club for Kids

Boys and girls, you're encouraged to join the Texas Reading Club this summer — and the Castro County Library will open its doors an extra two hours a week to help you keep and open book and achieve your reading goals.

HAZEL MERRITT, chairman of the Castro County Library Board, announced that the commissioners court has authorized the library to open an additional two hours each week, from 10 a. m. to noon each Wednesday, during the next four months.

The extra hours are being established on a trial basis, Miss Merritt said, and the policy will be continued throughout the year if enough persons use the library during this "bonus period" this summer.

THE LIBRARY this summer will again sponsor the Texas Reading Club in conjunction with the Texas State Library, Miss Merritt said. Last year, more than 48,000 Texas boys and girls joined this vacation reading program, and 27 in Castro County earned certificates for reading 12 or more books during the summer.

## Schools Need 11 Teachers

Although Dimmitt's school board has already received applications for several of the 14 vacant posts in the school system, Supt. Paul Hilburn said this week that 11 teaching and administrative positions are now "open" and will need to be filled this summer.

The vacant teaching posts show up in the new proposed salary budget, which shows Dimmitt teachers next year will earn an average of approximately \$300 above the new state salary schedule. (Continued on Page 6)

The consequences which Mr. Ott could feel as a result of such expression could be far reaching. It is entirely possible that because of such statements of opinion that Mr. Ott could be "blackballed" by school administrators throughout the State of Texas, and perhaps over the entire United States. **WHETHER or not you agree** with the opinions and views of Mr. Ott, one must admit that he does

have courage of his convictions to risk his reputation as a teacher, to say nothing of the chance of losing his retirement benefits which he would be entitled to receive in a few years. This extraordinary exhibition of courage is the type of courage which built this country into a great nation. Without such courage our city, state, and country can easily become only mediocre, and second-rate. **MR. OTTE** has often said that if he could teach his students to think for themselves, that he has done them a service. I will agree with Mr. Ott to a point. A person should indeed be able to think clearly for himself, but if

he takes no action on his thoughts, his time has been wasted in thinking. Little courage is required to think about a thing, but to express an opinion or take an action requires courage. This is especially true if those opinions expressed might place your chosen life work in jeopardy. A fine example of true courage has been set before you in the person of Mr. Ott. If you have learned to think well and to take action on seemingly sound conclusions, then you are far better educated than the masses and will

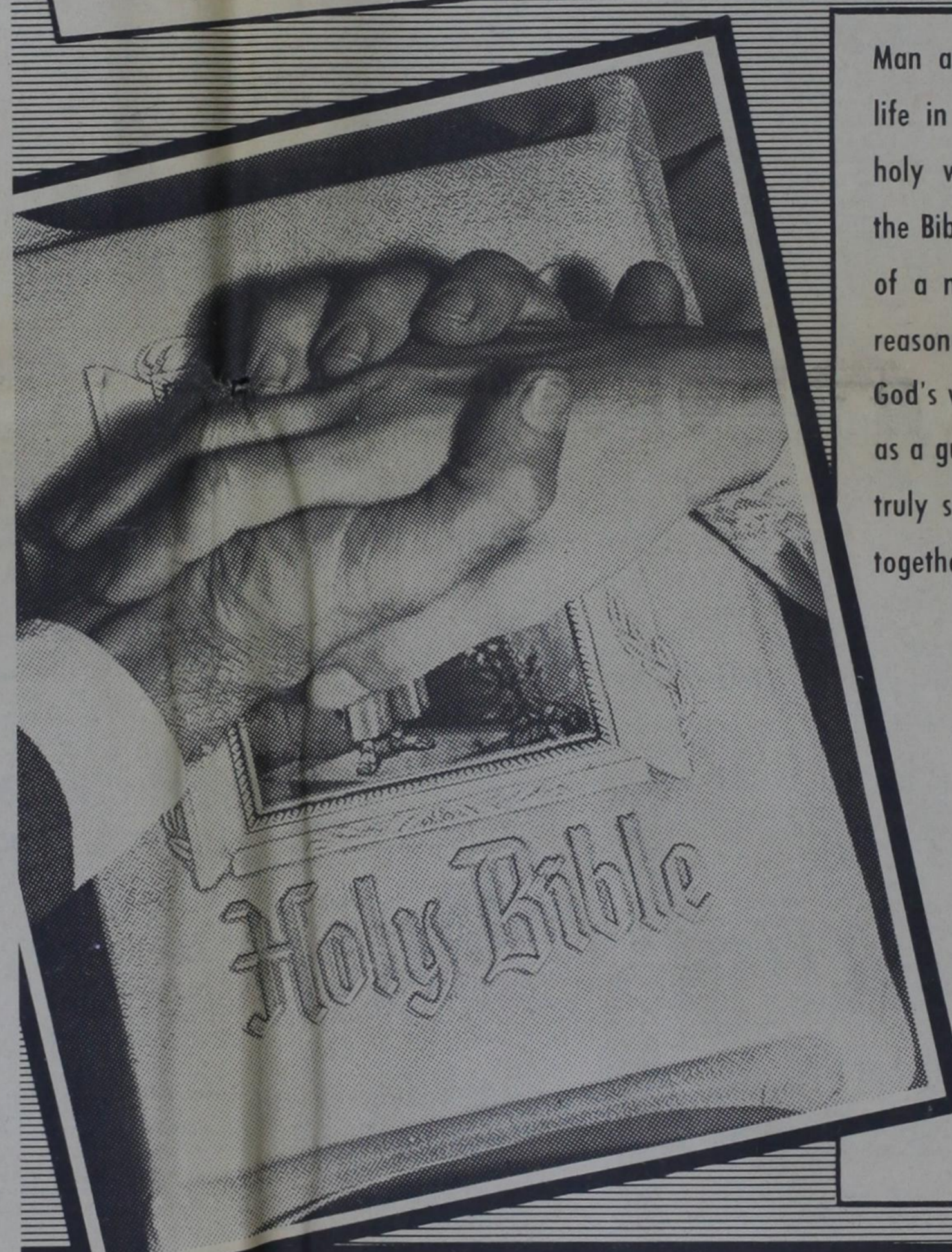

## Hale Residents Okay Membership In Water District

Voters in Hale County's Precinct 2 chose last week to become a part of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

VOTERS within the district also chose to accept the precinct. Unofficial returns showed that 283 voters cast ballots, with 233 favoring annexation and 50 voting against.

Precinct 2 of Hale County includes the southeastern part of the county and the city of Petersburg.

WASPS, as a rule, are beneficial insects, but they can become "tough customers" when disturbed. This often happens, says Phil Hamman, extension entomologist at Texas A&M University, when they build their nests too close to traffic lanes and around the home or in trees and shrubbery which may be near a door or driveway. 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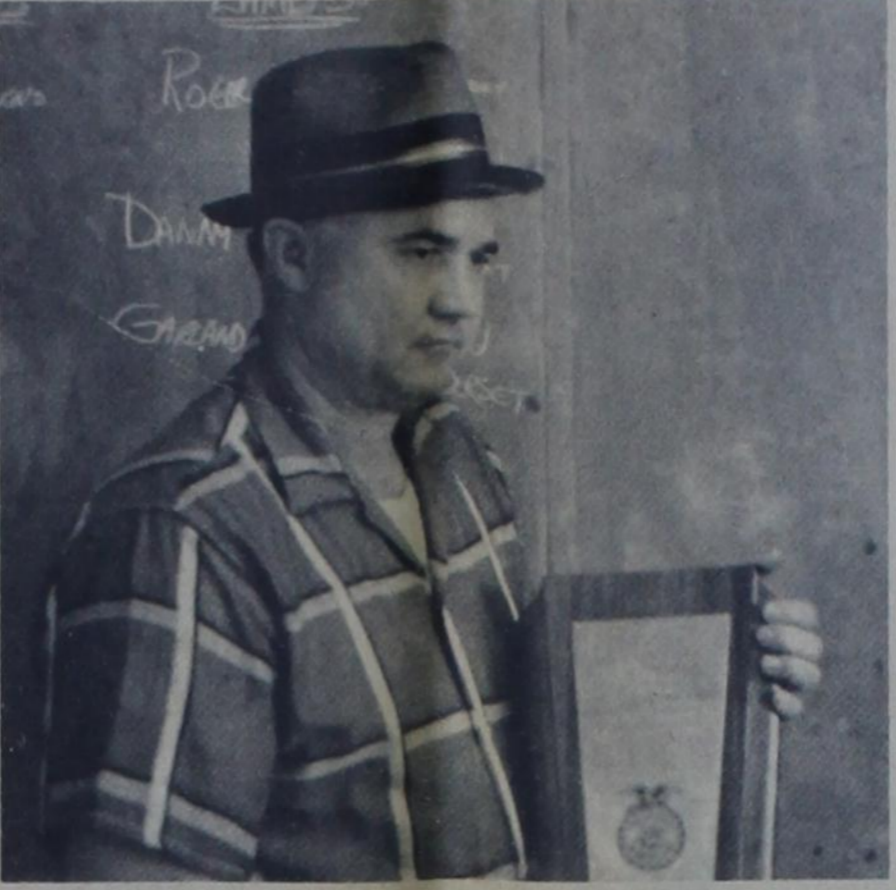

## Foundation Lists Consequences Of '66 Freeze on Castor Beans

An early freeze in 1966 caused a decrease in yield of castors compared with the high yields of the 1965 season. At the High Plains Research Foundation, the average yield of all varieties and experimental strains in 1965 was 2,918 pounds, which dropped to 2,291 pounds in 1966.

A comparison of the yields of seven varieties shows the adverse effect of bad weather conditions in 1966. These seven were in both the 1965 and 1966 tests, with an average drop of approximately 600 pounds per acre. The records

Fertilizer in the form of 100 followed by a sidedress application of 50 pounds more on June 10th was used in the strain and variety testing program in 1966. This application has proven effective and profitable in past years of testing at the Research farm.

The irrigation system used in 1966 included a preplant application, a second watering on June 29 followed by irrigations on July 14, July 23, and August 10. A total of 20.81 inches of rainfall fell between May 1 and October 1. All varieties were planted May 5 with a seeding rate of 15 to 18 pounds per acre spaced every six inches in the soil. All plots were cultivated twice. Plots were weeded once, and hand hoed twice.

BOTH the 1965 and 1966 tests were under the supervision of Loyd Langford, associate agronomist, and Howard Malstrom, associate soil scientist, of the Foundation scientific staff.

# Center Reports Recharge Success

Fifty-three feet of valuable water — approximately 18 million gallons — was recharged through two multi-purpose (artificial recharge) wells at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1966, according to Jim Valliant, soil chemist at the research farm.

A TOTAL of 636 acre-feet of run-off water which includes both rainfall and surface runoff, has been recharged into the Ogallala formation through the two multi-purpose wells since 1959. The water recharged in the experimental research well recorded during this eight-year period was 352 acre-feet. A second well, which is the type that would normally be used by a farmer, with no experimental equipment, was installed in 1961. From 1961 through 1966, a total of 285 acre-feet of water have been recharged through this well.

This savings of 636 acre-feet (a little more than 207 million gallons) is enough water to completely irrigate the half-section farm at Halfway for about two years. Approximately 90 percent of the same water could have been lost to evaporation if it had not been stored underground.

Valliant said 2,405 acre-feet of underground water has been pumped for irrigation at the Research Foundation since 1959, and that 26.4 percent of this amount came from the water which was recovered by recharge.

SEVERAL grasses, hybrid sorghum grazers, and rye were planted in the playa lake at the experimental recharge well site in 1966. Some of the advantages of these crops are: (1) cover for the lake bed, (2) partial filtering of run-off water, (3) tolerance to flooding and, (4) a source of income from grazing the lake bed.

# Sen. Ralph Yarborough How Can We Halt Pollution of Air?

Dear Fellow Texan:  
A farmer plowing his fields in the green hill country of central Texas or the family that lives amid the clean-smelling pines around Nacogdoches or Jasper could easily be unaware of a danger to our lives that is as subtle as it is deadly.

**BUT RESIDENTS** of Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, and perhaps a few other Texas cities are learning what a nuisance and a health hazard polluted or dirty air can be. Polluted air can be perfectly clear, yet have deadly chemicals in it.

In the past it was thought that air pollution was a problem for big cities elsewhere, but in Texas today we have three of the 13 largest cities in the United States. Texas is rapidly becoming urbanized. Seven Texas cities each have a population of one-quarter million.

The air around us is changing, and changing for the worse. For several weeks now the Senate Subcommittee on Air and Water Pollution has been holding public hearings in which experts have told shocking stories of danger lurking in the air we breathe.

**THE SUBCOMMITTEE** is considering the Air Quality Act of 1967 — with a number of amendments to existing laws to make certain that the pollution already damaging this Nation's big cities will not be allowed to worsen or to spread into less industrial areas. This act would give the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, Mr. Gardner, new powers to control pollution and to try to eradicate this danger where it presently poses a problem to the health and safety of the people.

Dr. William H. Stewart, Surgeon General of the United States, told the Senate subcommittee that air pollution is one of the major health challenges confronting the American people today. He also said there is an abundance of evidence which demonstrates beyond any doubt that air pollution — if unchecked — can be deadly to large numbers of Americans.

In the big cities of the world air pollution is an old problem. The Surgeon General recalled the extraordinarily heavy fog in London during 1952 that mingled with poisonous fumes and gasses of

that big city, with the resulting four thousand deaths blamed on this combination.

**AIR POLLUTION** has been linked to many diseases and respiratory ailments as well. Medical evidence shows that, with all of the usual factors and unknowns accounted for, lung cancer occurs with thirty-three percent more frequently in the larger, smokier cities than in the rural areas.

I am worried about the dangers of pollution. Unless more is done, conditions in our Texas cities will not only worsen, but the air that now causes discomfort and illnesses in the metropolitan areas could spread to our State's countryside.

That is why I am co-sponsoring the Air Quality Act of 1967. It will tighten controls and help prevent air pollution.

ule adopted by the legislature last week.

All but two salaries are at least \$233 above the new, higher state scale. One salary is \$30 above the state schedule and another is \$140 above. Many teachers here will earn from \$300 to \$2,004 above the state scale next year.

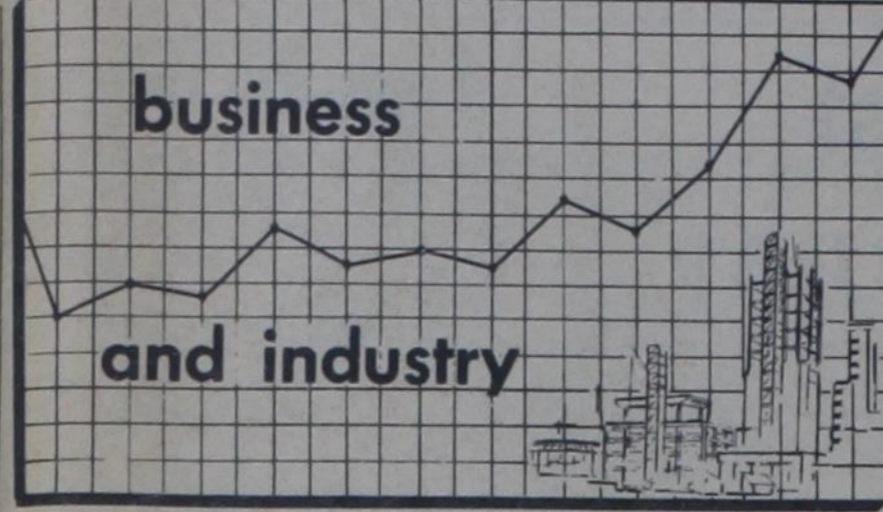

Remove Fire Hazards, Using This Checklist

Monday I was in Pampa for a Professional Improvement meeting. Dr. Bateman from Texas speaker.

**THIS WEEK** I'd like to share some safety ideas and preventive measures to take against fire. Please check your home and/or farm to remove any possible fire hazards.

Here are 10 questions that you should ask yourself. I hope you can honestly answer yes to all of them:

1. Do you dispose of ordinary trash and rubbish weekly?
2. Do you dispose of accumulations of old clothing, mattresses,

curtains, drapes, lampshades, magazines, paper and rags at least 4 times yearly?

3. **DO YOU** thoroughly clean cut attic, basements and closets at frequent intervals?

4. Are ash trays cleaned only into closed metal containers?

5. Do you store paints and solvents only in capped metal containers, well away from heat, and dispose of leftovers regularly?

6. Are your oily mops hung up to air and oily rags kept in closed metal containers?

7. **DO YOU** have your heating system cleaned and checked annually, and your chimney cleaned regularly?

8. Do you periodically clean under and the back of the refrigerator to keep motor and coils free of lint, dust and grease?

9. Do you keep the grounds around your house free of dead grass, weeds, trash and dried brush?

10. Do you invite your fire department to inspect your home periodically to help you clean up fire hazards?

**THIS IS THE** time of year for cleaning up our residences. Remember, if we put it off, it may be too late. Did you know that in every 12 minutes a home in this

nation is damaged or destroyed by fire? Our county is no exception — we're not exempt from such emergencies.

The three storage areas of the home — attic, basement, closets — are the spots where 16.4 percent of all dwelling fires originate. My information comes from the National Fire Protection Association.

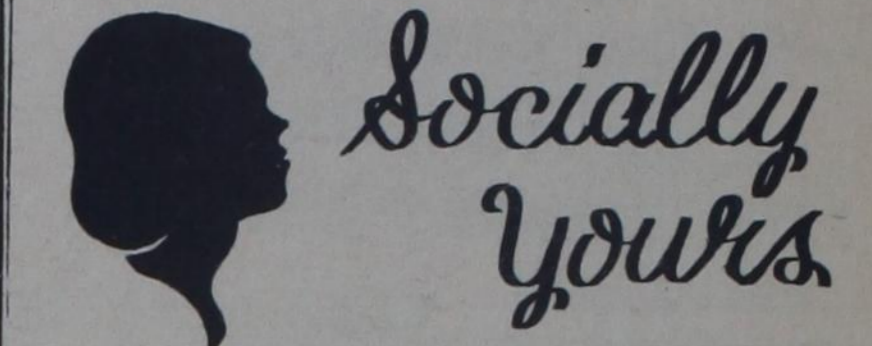

Bond Sales Total \$2,099 in April

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$2,099 in Castro County were reported today by Judge R. E. Wilson, chairman of the county Savings Bonds committee.

**TOTAL** purchases of E and H Savings Bonds in Texas during April amounted to \$13,817,202. The January-April sales for the state totaled \$56,389,486 which is an increase of 8 percent over the same period of 1966.

Nationally, cash sales of E and H Bonds for the first four months of 1967 amounted to \$1,770 million, 4 percent above sales during 1966. Sales of E Bonds alone for the first four months were \$1,640 million, an increase of 6.3 percent over 1966's \$1,543 million.

**BOTH** FORAGE and grain sorghum crops in widespread areas of the Texas Coastal Plains are under attack from downy mildew. Dr. Richard A. Frederiksen in Texas A&M University's Department of Plant Sciences says the spore-borne disease was first noted in this country in 1961. It directly affects the seed-producing capability of grain sorghum. Frederiksen advises growers not to plant sorghum for at least two years in a field with a history of the disease and not to plant gain sorghum after sudan-sorghum hybrids or sudangrass.

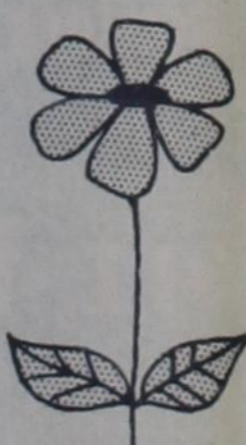

**Former Dimmitt Teacher Is Dead**

Last rites were held recently in Sooner High School auditorium at Bartlesville, Okla., for George Milton Roberts, long-time superintendent of the Bartlesville school district and former Dimmitt teacher.

**MR. ROBERTS**, 63, died in Bartlesville's Memorial Hospital May 24. He had been superintendent of schools in Bartlesville 17 years, until 1964, and at the time of his death was serving in semi-retirement as associate superintendent.

**SURVIVING** are his wife; two sons, Bryan of Bartlesville and Richard of Greeley, Colo.; a sister, Mrs. Charles Doss of Crosbyton, and four grandchildren.
