The Sun Oil Company filed application with the Railroad Commission to drill No. 1-A R. A. Wheeler, as a 10,600-foot exploration to side of the Wheeler field, in East

Dr. Inglis' Impractical Cure

It is debatable whether one should cheer or chide Dr David Inglis for his proposal that a typical American city be subjected to atomic bombing in order to snap the public out of its lethargic thinking.

The proposal, of course, is quite insane. Dr. Inglis' substitute suggestion of building a complete steel-andconcrete city in the desert for the experiment isn't much more sensible. Scientists should take pains these days to be practical. Their discoveries are hooking up increasingly with world government, and their help will be needed increasingly in running that government. They can't court the risk of being branded once more as visionaries, and exiled by popular demand to their cloistered

Yet it is not difficult to sympathize with Dr. Inglis thinking. He worked on the Manhattan Project for three years. Now, back at his old place on the physics faculty at Johns Hopkins, he sees people going about their business apparently unconcerned with the catastrophe miracle

which he helped to create. He sees some indulging in the childish practice of making believe that a thing doesn't exist by refusing to think about it.

He sees others recoiling from the horror of the bomb by telling themselves that it is so horrible no one will dare use it again. They assure themselves that something surely will be done to prevent it. Or at least they tell themselves that maybe it isn't really so horrible after all Possibly Dr. Inglis has been impressed most of all by

the boredom that the subject has induced. The repercussion of excitement, speculation and fear that the bomb produced died rather quickly. The murmur of comment that remained soon turned into a mass of platitudes.

People wrote and said the same things again and again. In their confusion and lack of knowledge, there was nothing else they could say. In time, they grev weary of thoughts that became cliches almost as soon as they were uttered. They became profoundly weary of reading pieces like this one.

The result was the lethargy of which Dr. Inglis complains, and which he would cure by violent, wholly impractical shock treatment.

There is no answer in sight at the moment. And so the world must sit uneasily, faced less by the threat of being blown to bits by the atomic bomb than by the subtle but even more deadly possibility of being bored to death

Return Of The Party Line

The party line may have encouraged all sorts of rep rehensible manners, stimulated gossip and invaded pri vacy. But the good people of Fayette, Wis., loved it. They not only loved it, but petitioned to have the fastdisappearing system restored to them. They got it, too, by order of the Wisconsin Public Service Commission.

A lot of unkind things have been said about the party line and its subscribers, sometimes in jest and again in hot-tempered earnest. But it seems to us that, in a rural community, its virtues may outweigh its evils.

It very often provides more "real life drama" than the morning radio operas ever dramead of. When there are no urgent calls to go through it is a comfortable small miracle of communication (long antedating the three-way radio conversation) whereby housewives can enjoy the local news and small talk of the sewing circle without the inconvenience of assembling at a central point.

And when there are emergencies the party line serves its purpose, too. There are no statictics on how many times a neighbor, listening in on a call for the doctor from down the road, was on hand to lend assistance and comfort long before the doctor had even left his office. But it has happened many times, and the party line has been rightfully blessed for it.

It isn't progress, in this day of moon-bouncing radar, to abandon the automatic telephone for the party line. Still, we're glad to know that Fayette subscribers have it back. We're sure they'll enjoy it even more after their unhappy bout with the cold efficiency of more modern communications.





Valentines Change From Frills To Big Business Industry

NEW YORK — Valentine-making is now a \$10 million a year industry in America-and old valentines, like etchings and stamps, are cherished

collectors' items. Recently the widow of a famous Cleveland collector, going blind, agreed to relinquish her husband's famous early valentines only because she could no longer see them.

This collection and that of Dr. Stanley Curtis of Youngstown, Ohio, were sold to Arthur D. Norcross, a shy, dignified man who has been as influential as any other person in making the practice of sending cards a year-round habit. Norcross now owns 3,700 valentines, the oldest, a fairly primitive one of hearts

and arrows, dating to 1740.

For some of them the Massachusetts man has paid more than \$100. Fanciest Bro 13ht \$50

The finest and laciest hand-made valentines, which often sold originally for as much as \$50, were made before 1860. Then the art hit a slump, as the designs became merely ornate and pretentious.

About 1880, professional artists were called in to design them, and their standard generally improved. Manufacturers now classify their

cards in revealing groups: The "honey" cards, slangy and impudent, sold to bobby soxers; the "pretties" or whimsies of cunning kittens and other cute subjects; the sweetheart cards which are the most sentimental and are sold to all ages. Despite variations in sentiment

and taste, valentines have changed little in a hundred years. Early 18th century makers used satin panels, handpainted ruffles, round nosesilk fringes, small mirrors, painted and enameled miniatures. Struck Solemn Notes

In these, the messages were laboriously penned in, handwriting being a polite accomplishment and apt to give the donor an edge in his or her suit. Few had separate envelopes. They were folded and sealed

Though the messages were often dolorous ("So may my love smile till life is closed and angel hands have crowned her!") they never were intended to be funny. Comic valentines did not appear before the end of the 19th century.

very cheap in appearance and printing. Cartoons, they bore sarcastic verses which were a deliberate slam at the recipient—school teacher, policeman, or "stuck-up." The 1946 comic verse is kinder, pokes fun at the sender rather than the recipient.

The origin of St. Valentine's Day, a combination of ornithology and paganism, is undocumented. State Rates Midland Fire Credit Rating Among Texas' Best

AUSTIN —(P)— Fire insurance penalty and credit ratings of Texas cities and towns to become effective March 1 have been released by State Fire Insurance Commissioner Marvin Hall.

The key rating of zero is determined by the State Board and community ratings range from 25 per cent above to 15 per cent below the key rating, said. Hall, depending upon the ratio of fire losses to fire insurance premiums in the individual communities.

In a town with a 25 per cent credit rating fire insurance premiums are 25 per cent cheaper than in a town with a zero rating, explained Hall. In a town with a 10 per cent penalty, insurance premiums would be 10 per cent higher than a zero-rated

sibilities for the party. He said he hoped for a Republican gain in the Senate, but said it would be very difficult to win a majority.

Taft's train stopped here briefly en route to Dallas, where he will speak at a state Lincoln Day banquet Thursday night. The rally was postponed two days in order to have him as a speaker.





Throughout the war, the Belgian Refinery in Ontario Congo furnished the United States with considerable amounts of uranium ore-basic raw material of atomic bombs. This ore made posshima and Nagasaki to force im- west Territory.

mediate Japanese surrender. Furthermore, unless new reserves of ore should be discovered and exploited elsewhere, the United States, Canada and Great Britain will retain the lead, for some time to come, of atomic fission for either military or industrial purposes. This would be true even though all the ndustrial know-how secrets now under discussion were to be given

freely to the world. Some of the Congo uranium ore went to Canada for processing. There it was mingled with a lesser quantity of uranium ore from the Dominion's own mines in the Northwest Territories. Under the veil of military secrecy, the American public has assumed that all ore used in the bombs origi-

nated in Canada.

Gov. Gen. Pierre Ryckmans, without disclosing the terms or the length of time the U.S. contracts with the Belgian Congo ore producers have to run, summarizes his satisfaction with the simple expres-

"The uranium is perfectly safe." So far as I can ascertain, neither Great Britain nor Canada is formally a party to the contract, but the Belgians think of the United States as representative of the Anglo-American alliance in the deal. Produced Largest Share

"We had very pleasant relations with the United States and Great Britain during the war," Ryckmans said, in oblique reference to this unity of interest.

'We wanted to free Belgium from the Germans. Obviously we could not do that ourselves. So we did everything in our power to help the British and Americans, who were doing the fighting. The uranium supplies were part of that cooperation. That is all there was to it. We were very happy to have been able to do what we did."

Ryckmans felt that it is up to American authorities to disclose whatever they think best about the volume of ore received from the Congo and its relationship to the

total supply. Other apparently informed sources told me that the Congo produced by far the largest share of the uranium used, though they had no figures.

Examination of lend-lease figures throw no light upon the volume or monetary value of the Congo's ore. Up to July 1, 1945, Belgium is credited with \$55,647,000 of reverse lend-lease, and the Congo with only \$182,000. What Belgium supplied to that amount is not clear. It is possible, of course, that-since the Congo is a colony with no individual financial entity-the ura-

nium was credited to the mother

Stelle Blast Aids

tack by John Stelle, national commander of the American Legion, on Gen. Omar N. Bradley and his Veterans Administration has set off bomb within the Legion and has given World War II veterans' oranizations a new lease on life. Led by Amvets and the American Veterans Committee, World

War II veterans' organizations are capitalizing on the bad publicity attracted by Stelle and the Legion and are reporting increased membership.

Meanwhile the Legion is seething with internal strife over the ruckus. There is a movement on foot to oust Stelle as national commander. And Legion heads are groping for something to restore their damaged prestige at this crucial time when millions of veterans are makng up their minds about which veterans' organization to join. Committee to Meet

The Legion's executive committee neets February 17. Several members of the committee plan to put Stelle on the carpet and make him account for his antics. No Legion commander has ever been kicked out before. But the Legion has never faced such an important

In all the noise and confusion which has been raised by Stelle's request that Congress investigate VA and give Bradley's job to a business man these facts stand:

1. There has been no denial, by Bradley or any of the men or organizations which came to his defense, that the figures the Legion gave, on how far VA was in arrears in its work, were true. It must be assumed the Veterans Administration, then, is just as bogged down as Stelle claims. And Stelle's charges about the slowness of the VA hospital plan haven't yet been answered.

2. Stelle did have the mandate of the Legion to ask Congress to investigate VA. It was based on a study of VA facilities by the Legion's legislative committee. 3. Stelle did not have the man-

date of the Legion to ask for Bradey's ouster. 4. Stelle has not successfully denied that he had a telephone argu-

ment with Bradley over Bardley's refusal to put a hospital in Stelle's home town, McLeansboro, Ill. shortly before his attack. It is this latter fact which has Legion big-wigs worried. They

stood ready to back up every charge made against the Veterans Adminstration. But they now feel their whole cause was discredited when personalities were brought in. What goes on in Veterans Ad-

ministration has always been considered a sort of family affair by Legion heads. Frequently they have criticized it sharply but have managed to leave the administrator's name out of it, even though he utimately was the responsible man. They used this publicity as a sort of persuader. Shocked Legion

Months before former VA head, Gen. Frank T. Hines, was eased out, the Legion knew what sad shape affairs of VA were in. But they got Hines out smoothly. There is no indication that the legisla tive committee of the Legion had the least idea of getting Bradley out when they made their report to Stelle. Stelle's direct attack on Bradley was his own idea, and he shocked members of the Legion by is method of making it.





anything, especially greasy broiler pans, frying pans and baking dishes. You pour three or more tablespoons of the de-greaser, depending on the size of the pan, in the vessel to be cleaned, fill it up with hot water, and wash off with a cloth or dish

To get grease out of the oven, pour some of this stuff on a cloth, spread it in the greasy oven and let it stand for 5 minutes. Then rub off with a clean dry cloth, rinse, and the grease is gone. It does not contain any abrasive or scratchy substance, so is good for glass and enamel utensils. One thing amazing—the degreaser does a fine job of removing milk from dishes, bottles, pots and pans. A few drops in just enough water to cover the milk line dissolves this film. Then it can be wiped away lightly with a dish mop or cloth without rubbing or

Baby Sets The Pace According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the average annual consumption of milk and cream in the United States during the decade from 1930 to 1939 was less than 325 pints per person, or less than .89 of a pint daily. By 1943, milk and cream consumption reached 374 pints, the first time Americans had ever consumed more than a pint a day. In 1944, this consumption climbed to 392 pints, or 1.07 pints daily. Latest Department of Agriculture estimates are that milk and cream consumption reached another high in 1945 with 411 pints for the year per person, or 1.10 pints daily.
