Socialized Individuals

If Herbert Morrison can be credited with speaking for the British Labor Party, of which he is a leader, then it may be said that the present government in London is alert to the dangers inherent in its program of socializa-

Morrison recently outlined to Parliament a general scheme of educational reform in primary and secondary schools which would put more emphasis on individuality and lessen implicit belief in what the teacher tells the

"The more we socialize industry-and we are going to socialize a lot—the more determined we must be toproduce individuals," he said. "We'll need individuality more than ever. . . . Britain, however far her industry may go on a collective basis . . . shall nevertheless be a nation of individuals, of pioneers who are showing that British character is as strong, powerful and individual as ever it was in the past.'

That, of course, is a frank admission of the evident fact that collectivism is and has been the foe of individualism elsewhere. In Italy and Germany and Russia, government control of industry has been accompanied by government control of thought and speech and action.

The latter may not be inherent in the former. But it has happened to work out that after the leaders of collectivist governments in those countries had sold their program as the ideal and most beneficial way of life, they used the most violent means to squelch any suggestion by their citizens that things were not precisely as advertised.

Morrison's party knows, of course, that such methods would not work in England. And so, while Morrison may sound as if he were about to create or recreate individual freedom, he is only going on record as guaranteeing its

It cannot be said that the British people are sheep. The exaggerated social and economic division between upper and lower classes has not stopped the voice or quelled hte spirit of Britons within their particular sphere. It was a free, independent, thinking majority that voted last summer for a government which it hoped would narrow that class division

Morrison told Parliament, "I have notices put up in every classroom saying, 'The teacher may be wrong. Think for yourself.'" That freedom applies to the children of anti-Labor families. And it gives implied assurance that their parents may also think for themselves and say, "The government may be wrong.'

So it appears that socialized government and individual liberty may work as well together as domestic socialism and a conservative foreign policy seem to have worked in Britain to date.

Simple Solution

The Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation and the United Steel Workers have signed a legal agreement. The company will not attempt to resume production or admit any production workers during the present strike. The union will not attempt to hinder non-union employes of the company from entering or leaving company plants.

Simple, isn't it? Yet how many pickets have been beaten by goon squads, how many eyes have been blacked by pickets, how many hot words have passed and how much bad feeling has been aroused before such a logical solution could be reached?

We don't know. But we do know that the only important answer is too many. We hope that the Jones hogs slaughtered weekly. 

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Republicans Launch Drive To End OPA

WASHINGTON -(AP)- The 1d ministration's drive to give OPA an unchallenged lease on life bumped into potential trouble Tuesday—a Republican plan to write a definite formula for junking ceilings.

As a spokesman for the agency told the House Banking Committee that all controls except rents probably can be eliminated next year, Rep. Wolcott (Mich), ranking committee Republican, said he favors a system that would provide for gradual but forced OPA liquidation.

This could be accomplished, Wolcott told reporters, by an amend-ment requiring removal of price ceilings in each industry when it is found that production has reached 75 per cent of normal output.

He would base the industry-by-industry decontrol on findings by OPA's own advisory committees with any disputes to be settled by the emergency court of appeals. Two Other Amendments Wolcott said he might offer this

bill before the committee to extend the price control law one year be yond its June 30 expiration date The others, he said, would: Redefine OPA's scope of powers "to confine controls to prices and rents and prevent use of the


