Houston Employes Strike Ends

Guaranteed Adjustments

Houston city employes was ended at 11 a. m. Tuesday.

Mayor Massey called a meeting of City Council for 1:30 p. m. Tuesday to approve his agreement with organized labor

Under the agreement the city employes will return to their jobs Wednesday morning with full seniority rights and civil service rights unimpaired.

After the agreement was reached, City Attorney Lewis Cutrer said he would ask for a postponement of Tuesday's scheduled injunction hearing to restrain workers from

striking or picketing. Cutrer said if the city workers are back on the jobs Wednesday as contemplated, then "of course" he would ask that the city's petition for the injunction be dismissed.

The Civil Service Commission will begin an immediate study of city wage scales, comparing them with pay for comparable work in private industry in the Houston area, rather than matching them against the pay scales of other cities.

To Correct Inequities 'I'll promise you," the mayor told D. W. Maxwell, secretary of the Houston Building Trades Council, 'that if this analysis (of pay scales) shows any deficiencies or inequities in our city employes pay, I, for one will set about some way to correct

Maxwell announced the outcome of the conference in City Hall to an estimated 5,000 persons assembled outside. He asked them to disband quietly.

Within a few minutes, most of the demonstrators had left the place. Maxwell asked the business representatives of the unions which had participated in the demonstration to attend a meeting in the Labor

COLUMBIA, TENN .- (AP) -- One hundred state highway patrolmen, backed up by 400 State Guardsmen, moved swiftly into the negro populated district of Columbia at dawn Tuesday after a night of riotous disorders and by midmorning more than three score arrests

At least 10 persons were wounded in the disturbances which developed from the shooting of four Columbia policemen fired upon early Monday night in the section known as "Mink Slide" where the disorders centered.

Bad Judgment In Europe

It is embarrassing to Americans to learn that our occupation forces in Germany have armed and put American uniforms onto some 10,000 men who openly describe themselves as a "Royal Yugoslav Army" and whose undisguised goal is to unseat Tito's government by force.

We are embarrassed also to learn that 34,000 Poles, hostile to the Warsaw regime, are wearing American uniforms, carrying American guns, eating American Army rations and drilling as soldiers. The United States has recognized the Belgrade and

Warsaw administrations as de facto and de jure governments of Yugoslavia and of Poland respectively. We gave such recognition to these new governments of friendly nations, victims of Nazi aggression, against the better judgment of a probable majority of Americans,

who felt that young King Peter of Yugoslavia and the Polish government-in-exile deserved better than they got. We accepted the Moscow-sponsored regimes, frankly, because Stalin had planted them in office and then said

to us and to the British, in effect: "There they are. What are you going to do about it? Fight?" We didn't want to fight, so we took Tito and the Warsaw cabinet. Having recognized them we are committed. They have done nothing since recognition that they were not doing, to our knowledge, before and at the time of recognition. We have no possible grounds, now, for repudiating them.

We do have a moral duty not to repatriate refugees from Yugoslavia and Poland whose only offense is that they object to seeing Russia dominate their countries. To Brady, judge advocate. force them to go "home" might well be to send them to a horrible death.

They are entitled to sanctuary with us and to the food and clothing and shelter that we try to provide for all refugees from oppression. But we cannot, in good faith, assist them to prepare to overturn governments that we recognize as legal.

Whatever the reasons given by the military authorities who are responsible, they cannot be acceptable. The existence of such a situation indicates that the Americans responsible do not possess the good judgment required to make our occupation administration in Europe a success.

Without reflection upon their military achievements, or necessarily upon their good faith, they soluld be replaced by men who are more alert to the diplomatic dangers with which they are surrounded.

Locking The Barn

When a special committee of three railroad rate experts was assigned by the Budget Bureau to investigate the War Department's freight bill, only a few people had any idea what a 10-months' headache it was going to be. From Jan. 1, 1943, to V-J Day—two years and eight

months-245,000,000 tons of war materials were moved. Ninety per cent was moved by rail and 75 per cent was freight. The government's transportation bill was over four and a half billion dollars. Even a 1 per cent over-charge would be \$45,000,000, but no one can make any accurate estimate of how much excess freight Uncle Sam may have paid. The investigators say there are no adequate statistical records. Correspondence files are incomplete and scattered in hundreds of desks. The personnel supposed to check freight bills was never adequate for the job and is now scattered.

Okayed freight bills were paid by the War Department Finance Office, subject only to adjustment by the General Accounting office. GAO is now running from two to three years behind in its audits. According to the Budget Bureau's investigators—W. B. Hammer of the Interstate Commerce Commission, Charles B. Bell and Emory B. Ussery of Washington-bills of lading were okayed without pre-audit, so there is no real check on the reasonableness of many of the rates charged the government for hauling war supplies.

Before the reorganization of the War Department in March, 1942, every branch handled its own freight shipments. Then the Transportation Corps came into being and a Traffice Control Division was set up. But it was not until June, 1944, that a systematic approach was made on freight rate problems, the Budget Bureau probers


Organized labor consistently opposes proposals to provide by law for compulsory arbitration in labor disputes, no matter how vital may be the public interest in keeping an industry at work.

The theory is that compulsory arbitration would be unfair to 3400 tugboat workers in New York, to 9900 transit workers in Philadelphia, to 3400 power plant workers in Pittsburgh.

New London' School Law Unconstitutional

AUSTIN - (AP) - A law whose bassage echoed the New London School disaster which took the lives of many school children, was declared unconstitutional and void Tuesday because of an amendment which exempted Houston schools from its principal provisions.

"An act designed to give adequate protection to the lives of school children should apply to all," said the opinion by Assistant Attorney General E. M. DeGeurin, approved by Carlos Ashley, first assistant to Attorney General Grover Sellers. The opinion held the law-passed

by the 49th Legislature—unconstitutional because the section exemp Houston from its "provisions with teeth" makes it a local or special law in the class prohibited by the Constitution, he said. Senate records show the section objected to was written in by an amendment by Senator Weaver Moore of Hous-

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


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
