# Railroad Strike Is Postponed

By The Associated Press Threat of a nationwide railroad strike was postponed Friday for at least from 30 to 60 days when President Truman appointed a three - man fact - finding board to investigate the dispute. Appointment of the board auto-

matically delays a scheduled strike under the Railway Labor Act, and heads of the two brotherhoods-the Trainmen and Engineers-who had directed their 300,000 members to quit work Monday had promised in advance to abide by the law.

Named to the emergency panel were former Associate Justice Lief Erickson of the Montana Supreme Court; Frank M. Swacker, New York lawyer, and Gordon S. Watkins of the economics department of the University of California. Rank And File Movement

Meanwhile, announcement was made in Cleveland of a "rank and file" movement within the railroad brotherhoods.

Wellington Roe, a writer who last week was dismissed by the BRT president for what he termed disloyalty and insubordination, announced formation of the National Rank and File Association for 'democratic and intelligent representation" of the workers. He said 34 delegates at a meeting Thursday represented approximately 75,-000 railroad workers, mostly from the BRT and BLE.

Note Also Sent To Moscow On Manchuria

WASHINGTON -(AP)-Official Washington Friday anxiously awaited Russia's reply to this country's demand that Soviet troops leave Iran immediately. Some officials believe that reply

may go far toward determining whether American-Russian relations improve or continue to deteriorate. There was no indication when it would arrive from Moscow.

Nikolai V. Novikov, charge d'af-faires of the Russian embassy, made his first diplomatic call in months on Secretary of State Byrnes Thursday. Officials said ater, however, that he did not discuss either of the two United States notes sent to Moscow Tuesday.

It was believed likely that the State Department would make public the second of those notes sometime Friday. 

PARIS -(P) The foreign office id F iday Russia has replied fav-ably to a French proposal to take e Spanish question before the Inited Nations Security Council. Diplomatic officials in Washington said it was virtually certain the Jnited States would oppose the rench plan, contending that the Franco regime, whatever else it might be, is not a threat to international peace and security and hence not a proper subject for the Security Council.

The British have replied to France, but the answer has not been published. Statements by For-cign Secretary Ernest Bevin and ther British officials indicated Great Britain would decline to join France in the undertaking for substantially the same reasons advanced in Washington.

The well was swabbed four times after the pipe was perforated, and it kicked off to flow. It flowed to oits for one hour and 35 minutes, cleanout, and then flowed 346 barrels of fluid to tanks in four hours. 

## Housing Bill May Fare Better In Senate Voting

WASHINGTON - (P) - Senate Democrats Friday gave President Truman's bob-tailed housing bill a fighting chance to regain some of the important ground it lost in the House.

Majority Leader Barkley (Ky) hinted Administration strategy might be a move to incorporate the legislation into a projected long-range housing program which already has bi-partisan backing in the Senate.

The new homes issue shifted over to the Senate when the House passed a much-modified version of the Administration bill Thursday by a vote of 357 to 24. The final draft was minus two major provisions urged by Truman-price ceilings for existing homes and a \$600,000,000 subsidy fund to boost production of

building materials. The fate of the ceilings proposal in the Senate was uncertain, but there was mild encouragement for subsidies.

The Senate bill is sponsored by Senators Wagner (D-NY), Ellender (D-La) and Taft (R-Ohio).

Its major provisions include a plan for FHA insurance up to 95 per cent on construction costs of low-priced homes; continued fed-eral aid for low-rent public housing; aid to communities rebuilding "blighted" areas, and loans for
