Soviets Assert Churchill Endangers UNO

Armies Race To Mukden Fight Government To Slash Industrial Construction

Reds Battle Nationals In **City Streets**

CHUNGKING ---(AP)-Chinese press reports Monday said that elements of four Nationalist armies are marching to Mukden, where government troops were reported engaged in "serious" street fighting with Communist forces trying to seize the city-largest in Manchuria.

At the same time Communist reinforcements were reported moving toward Mukden from the north The Nationalist troops on the march were identified as elements of the 13th, 52nd, and new 1st and 6th Armies.

Another report from Changchun capital of Manchuria to which Soviet forces in Mukden were moving, was full of unconfirmed rumors that Soviet forces intended to quit that city

The China Central Daily News' reported that the Nationalist 14th Division entered Mukden Saturday night to bolster the meager Nationalist force there. **Reds Outnumber Nationals**

Chinese press dispatches said that the Communists, heavily outnumbering Nationalist troops in the city of 2,000,000—Manchuria's largest — had occupied the power plant and northern district. Other reports said the Central Government had proclaimed martial law in the skeleton city, whose once-great industrial plants had een picked clean by the Russians The suddenness of the Soviet withdrawal was blamed for the

"serious" street-fighting in Muk-den. Dispatches said the National-ists did not have sufficient troops to cope with the situation.

Russian Withdrawal Sets Off Street Fighting

Most Materials Into Homes

The new order is being drawn up by the Civilian Production Administration and the National Housing Agency. They figure it will chan-nel well over two-thirds of all building materials to residential construction. There has been no decision yet

whether to halt work on some commetcial and industrial projects already underway. OPA reportedly is opposing such

step because of the difficulty of where to draw the line.

Housing officials estimated that upwards of \$50,000,000 a week in labor and materials is being expended on non-residential building. The new order, it was understood, also will have the effect of whittling down the number of homes which can be built to sell for more than \$10,000.

WASHINGTON - (P) - Senator Barkley (D-Ky) said Monday the administration will fight to restore \$600,000,000 in subsidies when housing legislation is considered by the senate.




