**U.S. Speculates Reds** Plan To Set Off **Province** Uprising

TEHRAN-(AP)-A column of Russian troops which left Tabriz in Azerbaijan was reported Thursday to have swung westward in the direction of the Turkish border. Marshal Ivan Bagramian, Russian expert on tank

warfare and campaigning in difficult terrain, has been in Tabriz two or three weeks, sources disclosed here. Bag-ramian made his reputation as commander on the Baltic front in the war with Germany.

The Russian column which left Tabriz at first was reported moving northward toward the Soviet Border. \*At Marand, however, it

iturned westward toward Khoi, north of Lake Urmia and near the Turkish Border.

Tabriz is about 40 miles directly east of the lake.

Other Soviet forces were report-ed to have moved south of the lake at Miyanduab, near the Iraq border.

Khoi is 80 miles south and slightly east of Mt. Ararat. This Turkish landmark stands just below the areas of Kars and Arda-han, which Russia has said should be ceded back to her.

Moving mostly at night, another column was reported at Mianeh, southeast of Lake Urmia and the northern terminus of the railroad leading to Tehran. A hard-surfac-ed road also connects Mianeh with

# A Course Is Charted

At long last the thing for which all of us would-be consumers have been wishing and waiting has happened. Common sense and the American spirit of understanding compromise have entered the blood-spattered arena of current economic controversy.


The auspicious debut was made in Detroit, where officials of the Ford Motor Company and of the CIO's United Automobile Workers got together, calmly talked over their differences in an atmosphere of co-operative honesty rather than in that of the recriminating supersensitivity which has marked so many labor-management conferences, and made the astonishing discovery that continued production was to their mutual interest. Both "sides" were, in fact, so thoroughly convinced that an operating plant was preferable to a closed one that each found itself willing to sacrifice inane class "face" and announce a series of genuine concessions.

The company agreed to an 18-cent per hour wage in-crease retroactive to January 5, and to a full-time grievance-investigating status for factory union representatives. The union agreed to prevent illegal work-stoppages and to sanction discharge of trouble-making or inefficient workers. So saying, the two parties shook hands and parted friends, to meet again the next morning at their common place of business not as enemies under painful truce, but as industrial partners pointing the way to a new era of economic peace. It was as simple as that.

Elsewhere the picture remains diametrically different. Just how sadly different was revealed with the release, at almost the same time, of preliminary estimates of the Bureau of Labor Statistics covering the month of January.

The record shows that during that one month there were approximately 500 strikes, involving a "grand" total of 1,750,000 employes and producing an all-time high (or, more appropriately, low) of 19,200,000 man-days lost. It does not show the infinite human suffering inevitably involved.

That is the inescapable story of American industrial civilization in this year of 1946. That is the record compiled by human irascibility, by human recalcitrance, by human folly.

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

#### Veterans Get A Break

Those veterans who have been thinking, and even saying, that the United States declared an indefinite moratorium on its GI obligations when Japan surrendered, received a partial answer March 1 with the institution of liberalized regulations governing loans to ex-service men.

The government's home-loan guarantee has been increased to \$4000 from the previous \$2000, and such loans may now be contracted as late as 10 years after discharge. The time limit for repayment has been extended, too-to 25 years on real estate and to 40 years on farm property. And only one single-sheet application need be signed.



In 20 junior high schools with enrollment of 9,000, it was found that 95.5 per cent of the students were automobile drivers, and 4.4 per cent held drivers licenses. Yards, for it was his first trip to Chicago. Soon he was back, all excited—"Sell those steers right away for whatever you can get. There's not enough peo-ple in the world to eat all the cattle I've seen here!" The salesman managed to calm him down and

sent him downtown to see the city. He landed in the heart of Chicago, took one look at the crowd of people, and dashed into a drugstore to 'phone his salesman. "Hold those steers of mine for the highest price. There's not enough meat in the world to feed all these people!" This old story makes a good point. All of you

know the price we can pay for your livestock is governed by what we can get for the meat and by-products. Also you know that what we can get for the meat and the by-products is greatly affected by the supply of livestock and the demand for meats. The ever-present problem among producers and meat packers is the matching of the supply with the demand, wherever the supply and demand may be. The job of nation-wide meat packers is to balance the supply of meat with the demand by efficient distribution of the meat to the places where people want to buy it.

Native Range Grasses may be supplemented by seeding abandoned land to adapted range grasses. Intermediate wheatgrass, crested wheatgrass, Russian wild rye, smooth brome grass, and western wheatgrass have done well in Colorado dry-land pastures. They may be seeded in early spring or late fall.

#### **KEEP EWES** WITH GOOD FLEECES by Dean J. A. Hill, University of Wyoming

Before shearing time, range flock ewes should be carefully examined and the ones with poor fleeces marked for culling later. Experience in west-

Dean J. A. Hill ern states during 25 years has shown that 20 to 30% more wool per sheep can be obtained by the systematic selection of range ewes.

One livestock man reported that the average weight of fleeces from his flocks, of about 40,000 head, had increased nearly 3 pounds during a period of ten years of systematic culling in cooperation with the University of Wyoming. He got better lambs, too. Others report similar results obtained by searching out and discarding the ewes which are below standard in wool production.

With today's high costs, any range ewe which does not shear a big fleece of first-class wool is a money-loser. By a systematic examination, any flock master can find the ewes with fleeces which are one or more pounds less than the average of his flock. The agricultural colleges of practically all the western states are glad to help flock masters get started in a program of wool improvement.




