Little folks bake cookies for fun and happy hours

Youngsters can spend many creative hours in the kitch-en, baking and putting together their very own cookies and Christmas treats.

The recipes below are easy for little folk and will pro-vide some toothsome goodies to add excitement to your table, hang on your tree or wrap as gifts.

Basic Cookies (from a mix). Decide which cookie to make and make up basic dough from package directions. Use ginger-cookie mix if preferred. Roll dough out about 1/6" thick. Cut in desired shapes. Bake as package directs, then decorate with prepared frosting.

Santa Cookie: From cookle dough mix, cut out tear drop shape about 3" tall. Sprinkle with red sugar. Bake, cool, then decorate. Pointed top of tear drop is Santa's peaked hat. The wide bottom, his body.

Gumdrop Christmas Tree: Cut out triangle for tree, and small rectangle for tree base, from basic cookie dough. Press parts into place on cookie sheet and bake. When cool, add gum drops for ornaments.

Singing Angel: From cookie dough mix, cut out circle for head and larger triangle for body. From contrasting dough cut wings in tear-drop shape. On cookie sheet, press all parts into place and bake. Cool and decorate with frosting or egg paint (recipe below).

Egg Paint: It is easier for young people to decorate baked cookles, but egg paint can be applied before baking too. To make this medium, mix an egg yoke with a few drops of water. Put small amounts in tiny dishes and add vege-table coloring as desired. Use a soft brush for each color, and let your imagination go! If you are using the cookles for Christmas tree trimming, remember to leave a small hole about 1/2 inch from top of the cookle, for a bit of colored yarn or ribbon as the hanger.

The City of Dimmitt and Goodpasture, Inc., agreed Monday night on terms of a contract authorizing the fertilizer plant to discharge its waste water into the city sewage system.

40 Pages.

THE CITY set 19.26 cents per 1,000 gallons as the handling fee for processing the waste water through its sewage plant. Goodpasture Plant Manager Pete Stewart said the fertilizer plant discharges a maximum uniform flow of 4,500 gallons per hour. At this rate, Goodpasture would pay the city \$20.9088 per 24-hour period, or more than \$7,000 per year.

Under terms of the contract. the Goodpasture plant is to 'emit only waste water and waste products which, after treatment by the Dimmitt sewer plant, shall be suitable for irrigation purposes on agricultural land . . . and shall comply with the Texas State Department of Health and Texas Water Quality Control Board rules and regulations .

After being processed by the city sewer system, the Goodpasture waste water will go into the city's playa lake north of the sewage plant, and will be used by neighboring landowners to irrigate crops. The neighboring farmers, along with city and Soil Conservation Service officials, agreed that the Goodpasture water would not harm agricultural land, and in fact would probably be beneficial because of its nutritive trace elements.

HOWEVER, the contract specifies that if any future waste water from the plant is not compatible and treatable, have the right, at its option, to by Goodpasture, Inc."

Carl L. King of Dimmitt has eported a high yield among ocal entrants in a nationwide sorghum growing program with a yield of 8289.1 pounds per acre. The program is sponsored by the producers of Funk's G-Hybrid seeds.

King planted 3 acres of Funk's G-701 sorghum on May 10 and harvested on Nov. 3 at 15.2 percent moisture. His official yield was adjusted to 14 percent moisture.

To achieve his high yield, King planted 84,000 seeds per acre in 30-inch rows. He fertilized with 200 pounds nitrogen and 92 pounds phosphorous. His crop was irrigated 3 tion, welcomes members of the times.
