Teacher Indicted For Shootings

Fort Worth Man Wounds 3 Boys Who Stoned Home

FORT WORTH—(AP)—Assault on murder charges were filed in Justice of the Peace Gus Brown's court Thursday against S. F. (Smitty) Watkins, 41, William James Junior High School coach, who fired two shotgun blasts Wednesday night that injured three youths who were throwing stones at his house.

Watkins posted \$1,000 bond on each of the three cases filed and asserted that he had no intention of hitting anyone when he fired the gun. He did not go to school to teach Thursday.

FORT WORTH—(AP)—One youth was in a serious condition Thursday and two others were suffering from minor gunshot wounds following, District Attorney Al Clyde said, a rock throwing incident at the home of their junior high school physical education teacher.

Clyde said the students were wounded by blasts from a shotgun after stones had been hurled at the residence of S. F. (Smitty) Watkins. "I fired at the ground and I should have aimed the gun in the air," Watkins told Clyde and City Detective A. C. Howerton. "If I had it to do over, I wouldn't shoot at all."

The district attorney said no charges had been filed against Watkins. Clyde quoted the teacher as saying he never realized that the figures he saw in the darkness were his pupils at the time he fired the shotgun.

The victims were C. A. Roberts, Jr., 14, Jerry Peden, 14, and Danny Bogguss, 15.

Roberts was taken to a hospital with a wound near his heart. His condition was described as serious. Peden was treated at the same hospital for wounds in his leg, hip and back. Bogguss suffered minor wounds in his foot.

Wednesday night, Watkins told Clyde, he was aroused to action after unknown persons had made a habit of throwing rocks at his home over a period of several days.

Ronald Thomason, 14, driver of the car in which the four youths were riding, told the officers that he and his companions were in the neighborhood when someone suggested, "Let's go by and tease the coach." He said rocks were hurled as they drove by the house and then they stopped the car nearby and got out.

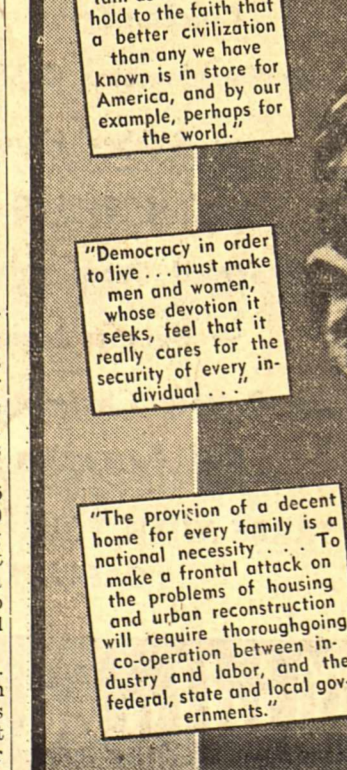

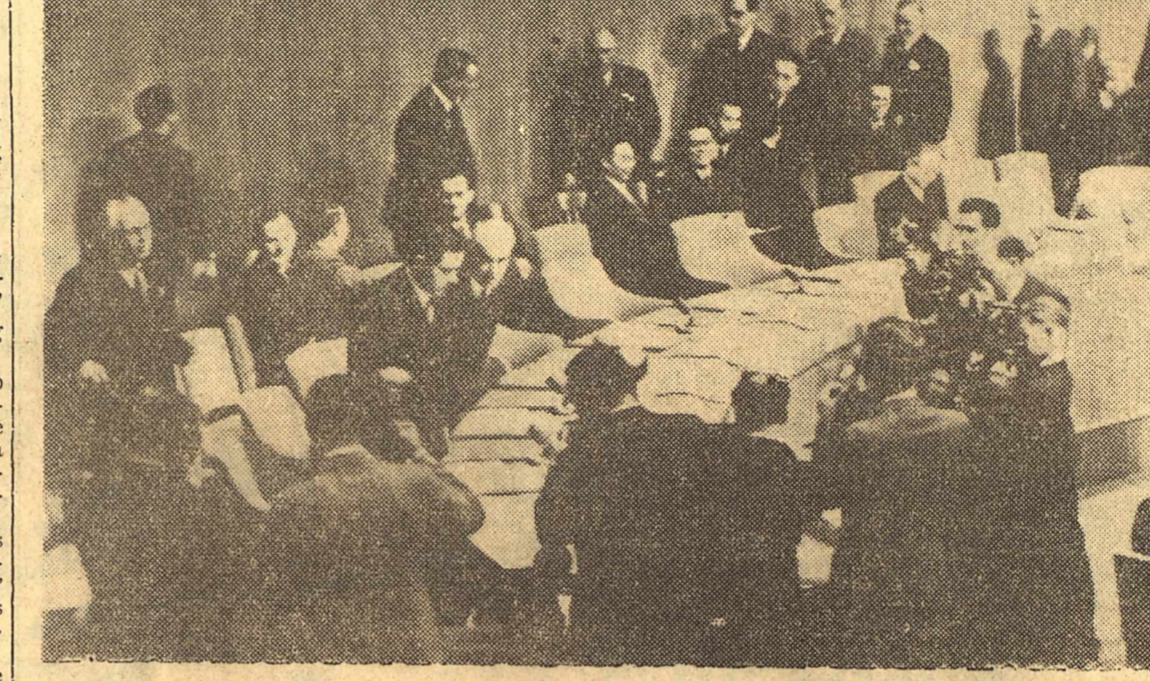

Language And Meaning

One of the fundamental difficulties in the troubled sphere of international relations is, of course, the lack of a common interpretation of the same words by different nations and governments. It is, perhaps, even more troublesome than is the lack of a common language.

The example of this difficulty that comes most readily to mind is the varying conceptions of the word "democracy." The American and British definition is best and most famously expressed in the last sentence of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. To the Russians, however, "democracy" is government of, by, and for the party—with secret police, controlled press, one-party elections, and so on.

But there are other differences. Take, for example, the matter of "equality among nations." From the evi-America and Britain, in particular, construe the phrase dence at hand, it would seem that among the great powers to mean that small nations have a right to be heard, to resent being pushed around, to choose their own form of government in free elections, and, having chosen that form of government, to be granted equality of sovereign standing among the United Nations.

It would also seem from recent evidence that Russia considers "equality among nations" to mean an equally free hand among the powerful nations to do about as they please.

At least, "equality among nations" has been invoked in unofficial complaints from Moscow in protest against the fact that, in effect, Britain maintains armed forces in the Near, Middle, and Far East, and the United States keeps troops in China, Iceland, and elsewhere, yet Russia is not considered justified in doing the same thing in Iran.

Perhaps the western democracies have not lived up to the letter or spirit of their ideal of equality among nations. Surely, the world will be a happier and more peaceful place when all foreign troops are withdrawn from every country.

Meanwhile, it can be pointed out that, in some instances, American and British forces are present on foreign soil at the request of that foreign nation's duly constituted and recognized government. In no case are they present in violation of a treaty agreement to withdraw, and despite a recognized government's protest of their presence to the United Nations.

But protests and excuses can lead to no solution in an international organization without real legal power, and, thanks to weakening compromises, without any real strength to act against the Big Five.

Lacking legal teeth, the United Nations can depend only on good will for its good work. And good will seems to be an unhappily scarce commodity in the international market these days.

New Date For Coal Strikes

If the coal strike is to become an annual event, we should like to suggest to John L. Lewis and the bituminous mine operators that they change the expiration date of their contracts from March 31 to, say, May 31.

It's still chilly throughout most of the country in April, and, in a lot of places, snow in May is not uncommon. A fire feels mighty good on frosty evenings. This is a poor season for folks to have to cut down on coal.

So the strike ought to be scheduled to start at a time more convenient for the public. If baseball officials scheduled the World Series to take place at Lake Placid in January, people would kick, and with good reason.

The same goes for the coal strike. The public is going to start complaining after a while—blaming either Lewis or the operators for needless inconvenience.

John L. should insist on starting the new contract and the new strike on June 1. That way it would be possible to tie up the mines and a good deal of industry, to slow down national production, and to have a good long strike before the first snow.

The public wouldn't shiver. And the striking miners could get in a lot of fishing.

Unsuitable For The Government

This isn't Halloween by several months, though all the witch-hunts now going on in Washington might make you think so. The town is spy crazy.

The latest coal oil to be poured on the flesh and soul-searing flames of this inquisition is bound to come from a footnote on page 498 of the hearings on the Second Defense Appropriation Bill, just made public in the House.

At the request of Republican Congressman Richard B. Wigglesworth of Milton, Mass., State Department Budget Officer Harry M. Kuth has here inserted a statement showing that, as of mid-March, a recheck on the personnel records of 3000 employees recently transferred to the State Department from war agencies demonstrated 243 "unsuitable for continued employment in the State Department."

This statement probably needs a little amplifying if it is not to cause a lot of hysteria.

At the end of the war, what was left of several war agencies was dumped in the State Department lap for absorption or liquidation. From the Office of War Information, the Office of Inter-American Affairs, the Foreign Economic Administration, the Army and Navy Intelligence services, and the Office of Liquidation for surplus property came 11,000 wartime employees. About half were overseas and half in the United States. This number has already been cut to about 4400, and it will be further reduced, so that the entire State Department payroll next year will number around 3800 employees.

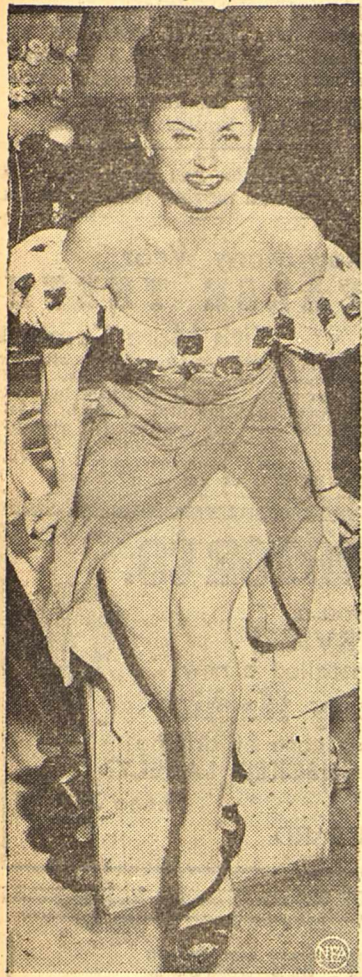

Russia Shows Faith In UN By Naming Ambassador; Gives Gromyko Full Job

WASHINGTON—(P)—Diplomatic officials hailed Russia's appointment of a new ambassador to the United States as a fresh sign Thursday of Soviet faith in the United Nations.

Moscow Wednesday night announced appointment of Nikolai V. Novikov as ambassador in Washington, succeeding Andrei A. Gromyko, Russia's permanent representative on the UN Security Council.

State Department officials later confirmed that Russia recently had made the usual inquiries about the acceptability of Novikov—present charge d'affaires—and had been told the United States would welcome his appointment.

Diplomatic officials who related Novikov's appointment to Russia's regard for the UN reasoned this way:

If the Soviet Union took UN lightly it would not have assigned an official of Gromyko's stature and experience to devote full time to the council job.

Gromyko's appointment was announced March 24, the day before the UN Council met for the first time in New York. It was not until Novikov's appointment was announced, however, that the world knew for certain that Gromyko would be a full-time Security Council member with no ambassadorial chores to perform.

Gromyko Well Prepared

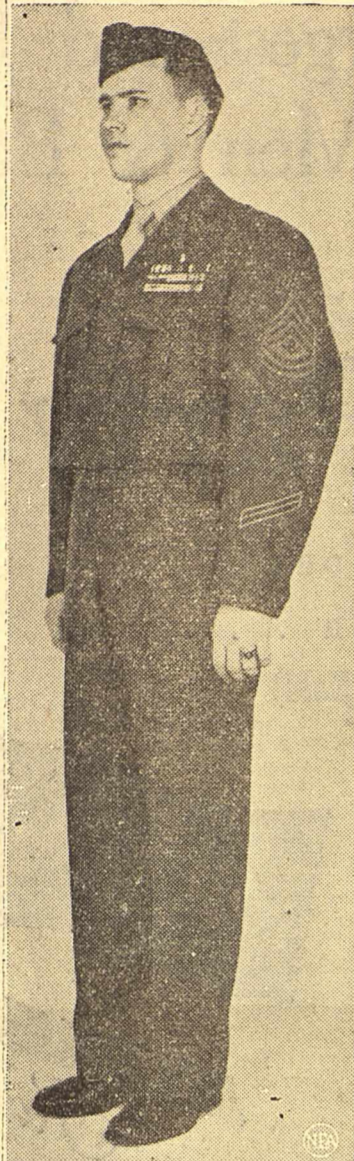
The UN job is one for which the special assignments of the black-haired, 38-year-old Soviet diplomat during the last three years have prepared him. Gromyko has sat in on virtually every international conference having to do with the establishment of UN.

It signified how far he had come in the diplomatic world since Oct. 4, 1943, when, as a little-known embassy minister-counselor, he was named ambassador to succeed the famous Maxim Litvinov.

Stocky and bespectacled, Novikov enjoys cordial relations with State Department officials and Washington diplomats. Reserved, soft-spoken, and reticent in his dealings with the press, he nevertheless is regarded in the words of one veteran diplomat, as "a good guy—intelligent, pleasant, and easy to get along with."

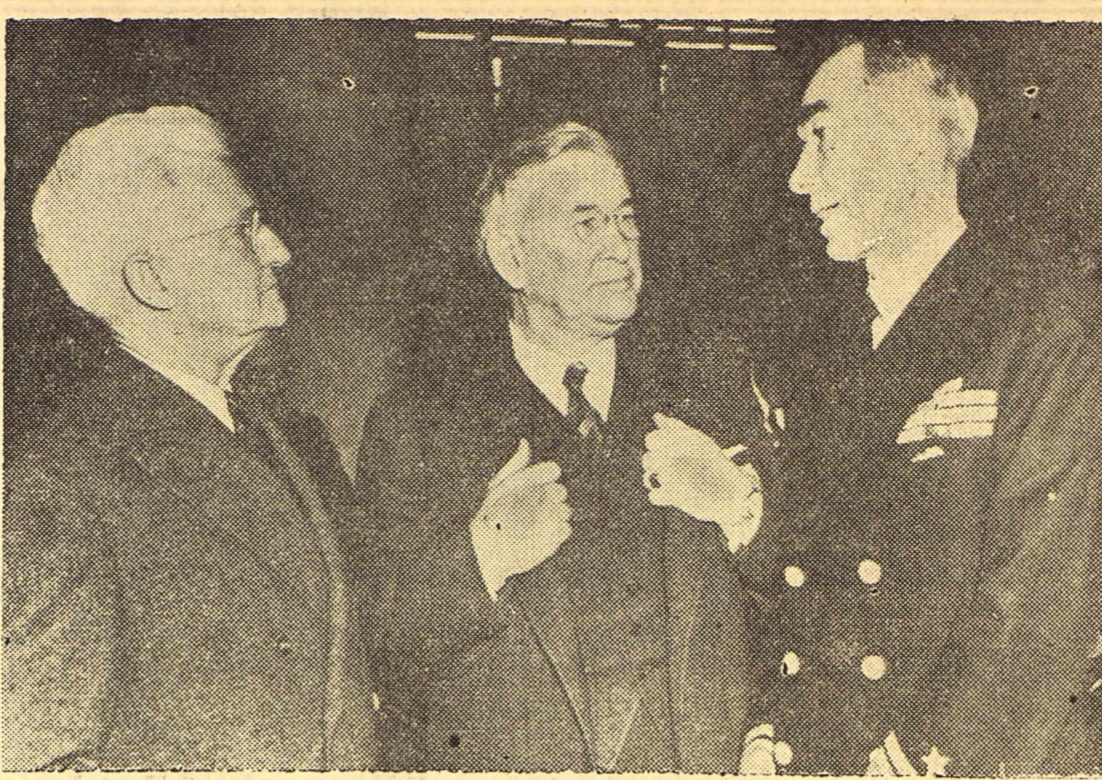

WORTH THINKING ABOUT

In view of the recent talk about the business, profits, etc., of the meat packers, it's worth remembering the basic economics of all businesses in this country.

To be successful, any business must do four things — 1) it must purchase its raw materials at prices comparable to the prices paid by its competitors; 2) through know-how, efficiency, good operating, it must manufacture products of comparable quality at a manufacturing cost no higher than that of its competitors; 3) in doing this, it must pay its workers wages rates comparable to the going wage-scale paid by others; and 4) it must sell its product at prices that a large part of the public is willing and able to pay.

In the livestock-and-meat industry, this simply means that prices must be high enough to earn both cost and a decent profit for the livestock producer, the meat packer and the retail merchant—and low enough to keep the great masses of people eating meat.

... that the dairy business is mighty colorful—red cows eat green grass and brown hay to give white milk and yellow butter. . . that the more a feller works, the more work he finds to do.

WOOL BLINDNESS is a definite handicap. Open-faced sheep, during a test in New Mexico, produced an average of 12% more pounds of lamb per ewe. Wool on the face hindered sheep in finding feed and resulted in some becoming separated from the flock. However, the flock in the test excelled by 25% the wool production of commercial flocks.

BRED TO MEET PRODUCER NEEDS

By E. J. WARWICK, The State College of Washington

A successful example of sound breeding methods in improving farm animals is the development of the Columbia breed of sheep for the Northern and Northwestern states.

When the Western sheep industry began shifting from a "one-crop" industry—wool—to production of both lambs and wool, the need for a true breeding type of sheep, combining the vigor, hardiness and flocking instinct of the fine wool types, with the size, prolificacy, and desirable carcass characteristics of the mutton types, was clearly indicated. Recognizing this need, U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists began developing such a breed from crosses between Rambouillet ewes (a fine wool type), and Lincoln rams (a mutton type).

Today, after more than 30 years of intense selection for desirable characteristics, the Columbia is widely used on better ranges of the West. Animals of this breed are large, rugged, vigorous, prolific and productive.

Development of the Columbia breed has been successful because: (1) it was created to fill a real need; (2) the breeding program was carefully planned to preserve and concentrate the germ plasm of superior individuals; (3) rigid culling was practiced; and (4) practical production factors have been emphasized in the selection program.

Adherence to these simple principles will result in further improvements of other farm animals.

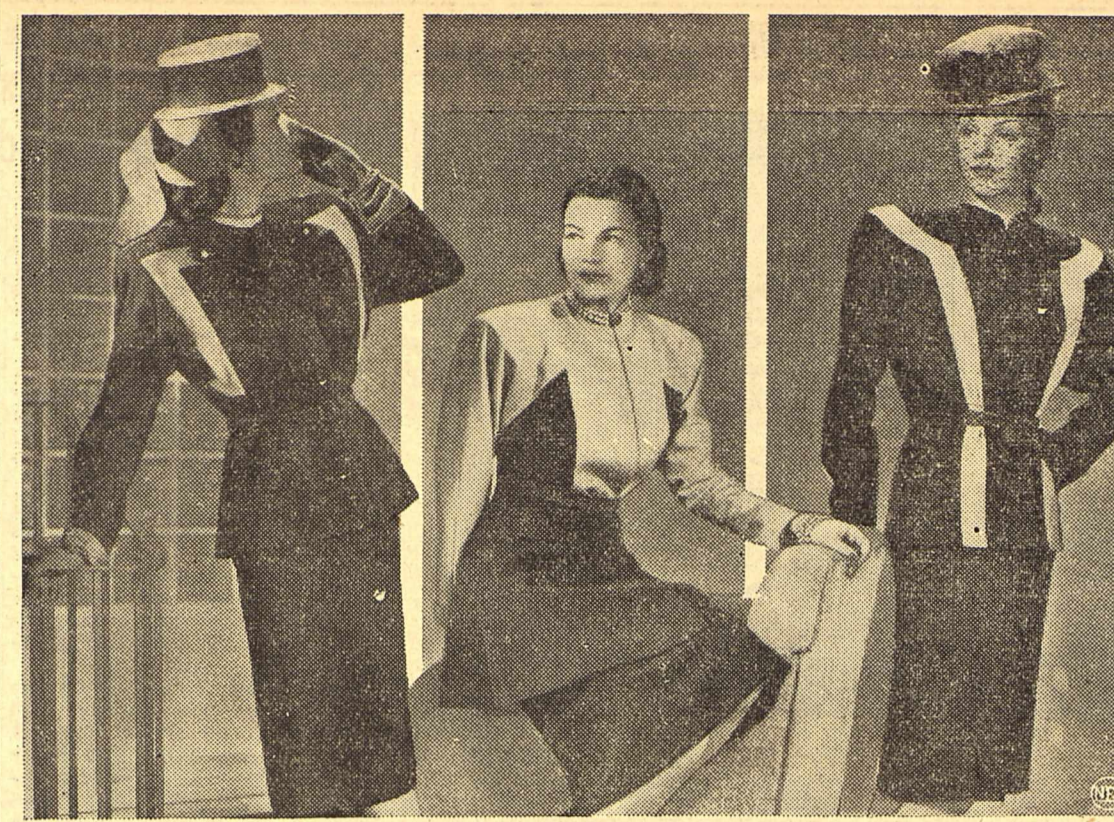

As good a trick as this, and less obvious, is a dark suit with a bright yoke or V-inserts of color. Placed this high on the suit, as a point of focus, color has the effect of lengthening the distance for the traveling eye.

Lawyer For Texas Cattlemen Punches OPA Economist In Jaw After Hearing

WASHINGTON—(AP)—An OPA economist nursed a sore jaw Thursday after a brush with a lawyer for Texas cattlemen over ceiling prices on livestock.

Leonard Rhodes, OPA meat branch economist, took a left jab to the jaw. It was thrown by Joe Montague of Fort Worth, attorney for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

It all happened Wednesday as the two started to step into an elevator in the House office building after a ceiling price hearing.

Montague told newsmen Rhodes accused him of having delivered "below the belt" blows at OPA at the hearing and—

"He almost punched a finger in my eye as he pointed his accusations at me."

"I have never hit anyone below the belt in any sense of the word so I simply gave him one to the jaw. I helped him straighten up and that's all there was to it."

Rhodes' side:

"Some of his (Montague's) statements before the committee were false and I did not get a chance before the committee to disprove him. I suppose he struck me because of what I said about his testimony as we entered the elevator."

Rhodes contended that Montague had testified OPA, in fixing slaughter quotas in 1945 had used 1940 figures for a basis. In reality, he said, OPA used 1944 figures.

After the altercation Rhodes descended in the elevator and Montague remained behind with associates who had accompanied him to the hearing.

CHINESE CHANGES NAME TO COMPLY WITH ERROR

SAN DIEGO—(AP)—Ten Fat Tom, 35-year-old native of China, became a citizen of the United States in 1943, but his naturalization certificate inadvertently gave his name as Tim Fred Tom.

Now he has petitioned court to sanction the new name, because—sighs Tom—the Army also listed him as Tim Fred Tom, and he might as well make it legal.

Reece Says Demo Administration Is Not Telling Truth

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Republican Chairman Carroll Reece enumerated his party's stand on major issues Thursday in an open letter to Democratic Chairman Robert E. Hannegan, then threw this question at his political counterpart:

"When will the Administration begin telling the truth to the American people about how their government is being operated?"

Shortly after his election as head of the GOP National Committee April 1, Reece was challenged by Hannegan in an open letter to give a "long overdue clarification of your party's policies on vital questions."

Reece said after the Potsdam conference last summer, President Truman "following the practice of his predecessor, assured the nation no secret agreements of any kind had been made during that conference." Then the GOP chief quoted from the New York Herald Tribune of Oct. 11, 1945, that Secretary of State Byrnes had "acknowledged" that Truman "entered into a secret agreement at Potsdam on revision of the Montreux Convention and said the United States fully intends to keep his pledge to confer with Turkey on the future status of the Dardanelles."

Scores Secret Agreements

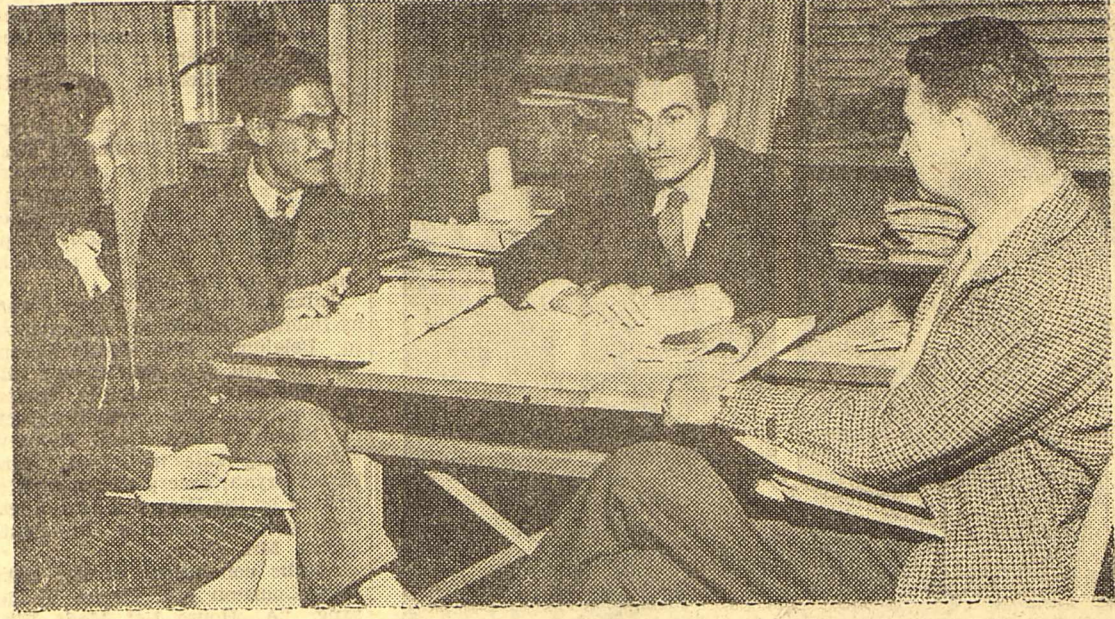
"Thus, in this matter of making secret agreements and then denying their existence until the march of events forced disclosure of the truth," Reece said, "Mr. Truman was apparently following the established practice of the Administration."

Listing several "secret agreements" which he said the late President Roosevelt entered into at Big Three conferences, the Tennesseean asked: "What other secret agreements have been made and remain for the future to disclose?"

In the domestic field, Reece quoted from a Cleveland Plain Dealer editorial saying the Administration "spread false predictions about the level of unemployment this year; it disseminated false propaganda to the effect that wages could be raised 24 per cent without increasing prices."

"The reference to 'false propaganda' with respect to the effects of wage increases relates, of course," Reece continued, "to the performance given by Henry A. Wallace, your collaborator in the current attempt to purge your party of 'dissenting Democrats'."

at 7,425 feet, on an elevation of 3,426 feet. That put it 240 feet high to same company's No. 9 Brunson-Argo, nearest producer. The 7,425-foot point makes No. 11 Brunson-Argo highest well on the top of the Ellenburger to penetrate that formation in the Brunson area.

It ran a 30-minute drillstem test at 7,421-72 feet. A 1,000-foot water cushion was used. Recovery was 120 feet of muddy water cushion and 800 feet of fresh water, from the blanket. There was a slight show of gas.

No Shows in Crespi
Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Crespi, East Midland County wildcat, in northwest quarter of section 19, block 38, TP survey, T-2-S, was making hole below 10,451 feet in lime.

A drillstem test was taken at 10,347-441 feet. The well was open 19 minutes. There was a blow of air for a part of the period. Recovery was the 2,500-foot water blanket, with no shows of oil or gas.

Oil Corporation No. 1 Roberts, Southeast Reeves County exploration, was coring below 10,231.5 feet in lime with streaks of shale. A core at 10,220-231.5 feet recovered two feet of lime and shale, with scattered slight bubbles of gas, and some slight oil stains. No signs of water have been reported.

Ledge Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Bruscaren, West Crockett County wildcat, in northeast quarter of section 29, block GG, HE&QT survey, in the Noelke shallow field, has been plugged and abandoned.

This project had some shows of oil in the Clear Fork-Permian, about a year ago, in the section at 3,950-4,052 feet. The zone was shot and acidized—but it failed to develop commercial production.

Will Make Water Well
B. A. Duffy No. 1 Stephens, East-Central Concho County wildcat, in section 78, block 71, H&GN survey, nine miles northeast of Eden, is to be completed as a fresh water well from total depth of 3,503 feet in the Cambrian.

The water developed at 3,491 feet and rose to within 80 feet of the top. Shows of oil, gas and water in the Ellenburger between 3,314-430 feet, have been squeezed off with cement.

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 Taylor, in section 43, Harrison and Brown survey, in Southwest Cochran County, about one and one-quarter miles northwest of the Landon field, has been plugged and abandoned on total depth of 5,153 feet in lime.

It tested for small quantities of oil, with considerable water, in the San Andres-Permian, pay section in the two wells so far completed in the Landon area.

2,604 PAPER AND RADIO MEMBERS — Kent Cooper, AP Executive, Says Wire Service Contributed To Freedom Ideal

NEW YORK—(AP)—Kent Cooper, executive director of The Associated Press, said that the expansion of AP service on a global scale in 1945 "contributed in spreading the doctrine of a free press to all peoples hungry for unbiased information."

"The year 1945 for The Associated Press was a 12-month of extraordinary news and picture coverage, of widespread extension of the AP service to almost every quarter of the globe, of impressive advances in wirephoto, features and other special services, and of outstanding recognition for performance," Cooper said in his annual report, distributed to members in advance of the annual AP meeting April 22, in New York.

Cooper reported that AP services were received last year by 2,604 newspapers and radio stations, more than double the 1920 figure of 1,263. The 1945 domestic membership of 1,271 newspapers represented a net increase during the year of 33.

AP's international services were received in 1945 by more than 500 daily newspapers and radio stations in 20 countries of the Eastern Hemisphere. From the close of 1944, through 1945, services were established in Sweden, Italy, France, India, Switzerland, Denmark, Finland, Belgium, Holland, Norway, the Philippines, China, Japan, the Malay States, Korea, Turkey, Egypt, Greece, Germany and Czechoslovakia. The news report to foreign countries averaged from 5,000 to 8,000 words daily.

Hundreds of other subscribers were served in Latin America, Great Britain, Canada and elsewhere.

"The exchange of news thus afforded greatly expanded coverage in many countries, and local staff resources were immeasurably strengthened," Cooper said, "with the result there was an unprecedented flow of news between all countries and the United States."

London to New York wordage over leased facilities totaled more than 7,000,000 words, and the east-bound volume exceeded 2,500,000 words.

Cooper said that although war-ravaged communication lines in Europe and Asia were being rebuilt slowly, "there is no reassuring evidence that the governments of the world are yet willing to recognize that communications should and must be an instrument for enlightenment and information of their peoples."

"Quite to the contrary," he said, "it appears that the various countries' telegraph administrations, the government monopolies, are not disposed to surrender any of what they regard as their sovereign prerogatives but which actually are used to restrict the flow of intelligence."

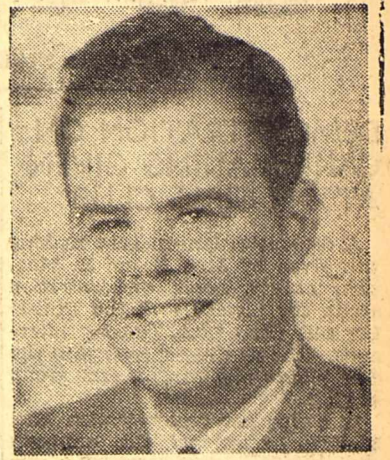

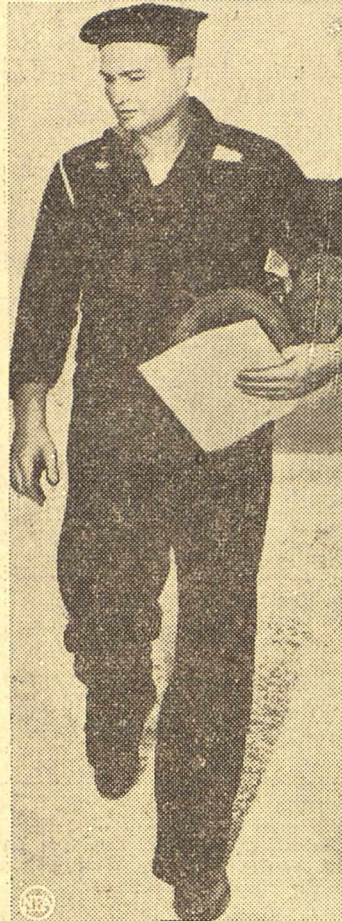

Truman Cancels White House Easter Egg Roll

WASHINGTON —(AP)— President Truman has vetoed the idea of an Easter egg rolling on the White House grounds this year in view of the world food crisis.

The Easter Monday egg rolling was a familiar part of White House routine in the years prior to the war.

U.S. Develops War Gas As Destructive As Atoms For Use In Any Future War

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—(AP)—Secretary of War Patterson has disclosed that the United States had developed a war gas that "would have made the Japanese military mask useless."

Patterson made only that brief reference to the gas in an address at the opening of the 109th meeting of the American Chemical Society. He did not elaborate.

Maj. Gen. Alden H. Waitt of the chemical warfare service declared in another prepared address to the society that chemical warfare probably would be "as decisive a weapon in any future war as the atomic bomb."

"I say this advisedly for already

we know of agents thousands of times more toxic than mustard gas, phosgene, the cyanides and the arsenicals that we have worked with in the past," Waitt said. "Our discoveries in recent years give me more confidence than ever in the power of the chemical weapons."

Patterson also declared that at the end of the war America was just getting into stride with "improved" fire bombs which "would have levelled everything (the enemy) had and rendered their cities uninhabitable."

"Fire Storms"

He declared that beyond the terror of fire, the release of incendiaries caused a new phenomenon called "fire storms" which, he said "caused columns of heated air to rise two and one-half miles high, and increased wind velocities to such an extent that at the edge of the vortex, trees three feet in diameter were uprooted."

Asserting that the wartime developments in chemical warfare also offered promise of peacetime humanitarian uses, Patterson said a group of war gases known as "nitrogen mustards" have shown "such positive effects (experimentally) on certain forms of cancer that vigorous study will be pushed."

The secretary declared the Army was committed to a policy "that future planning must involve the concept of a steady partnership of the military, science and industry." He said the Army was setting up a long-range program designed to augment the number of Army personnel educated along scientific lines.

The Army also plans "to offer better inducements to civilian scientists to take employment with the War Department and to remain in this activity," he added.

Farmers Urged To Plant More Corn, Sorghums


COLLEGE STATION — Texas farmers are being urged to increase their planting of grains, especially corn and sorghums, in order to help alleviate the critical feed shortage. Prospective acreage reports, based on intentions to plant as of March 1, indicate that Texas farmers are falling far short of reaching the acreage goals set for corn and grain sorghums, according to B. F. Vance, State PMA director.

The corn planting goal for 1946 is 4,950,000 acres, while prospective acreage is only 3,921,000 acres, 79 per cent of the goal. For sorghums the goal is 7,800,000 and indicated acreage is 7,045,000 acres, 90 per cent of the goal.

The Texas record for wheat and oats planting is much better, Vance declared, with 5,994,000 acres of wheat planted, 115 per cent of the 5,200,000 acre goal. The oats acreage is 1,349,000, slightly more than the 1,330,000 acre goal.

With feed supplies short and with great amounts of wheat being exported to starvation areas, the demand for all grains will continue, Vance said. He called upon Texas farmers to go over their plans and to increase production of grain this year if at all possible.

Truman Finds Tough Sledding In First Year As President

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Harry S. Truman became President one year ago this Friday. It's been a tough year for him.

When he went into the White House April 12, 1945, we were at war with Germany and Japan. By mid-August both wars were over.

Then this smiling man, zippy, fast-talking, full of confidence that everything would be all right, faced peace. He had a lot to learn.

He talked too fast and sometimes too casually on the gravest questions. He had to learn to slow up and be more cautious.

When peace came, he started throwing off wartime controls, depending on advisors to say which should go.

His advisors made some mistakes, bad ones.

Being a friendly man, Truman tried to use kid gloves with his old friends in Congress. They're defied him, thwarted him, bottlenecked him.

Members of his own Democratic Party in Congress, particularly Southern Democrats, have harpooned some of his best intentions. He has made more than 25 major proposals to Congress. Congress still is sitting on the majority of them.

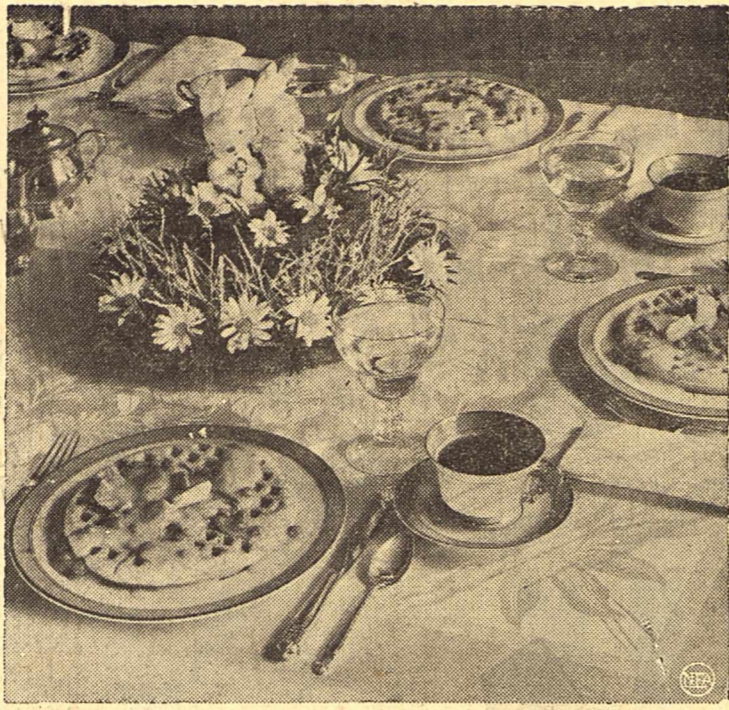
In desperation, around Christmas time, Truman appealed to the public to jog up Congress. Congress refused to be jogged.

Any hope he might have had for quiet reconversion was ripped wide open on the labor-business front. Sets Up Fact Boards

Finally fed up, Truman asked Congress for a law to delay strikes and set-up government fact-finding boards to learn the truth.

Labor and business ganged up on this notion and throttled it in Con-

Mexico City Publisher Visits Texas As He Studies US Papers

Lanz Duret, publisher of Mexico City's El Universal and Augustin ("if-you-can't-pronounce-my-name-just-call-me-Tex") Tejada, mechanical superintendent of the same paper, are in the United States trying to buy equipment and studying American methods.

While in Texas they told amusing tales of problems south of the Rio Grande.

For example, they scoff at U. S. labor troubles. Tejada said they had as many as 27 labor disputes going on at one time at their paper.

"They seek to make their paper 'The New York Times of Mexico' and print no comics, few pictures. They run from 30 pages daily up. Their daily press run is 110,000.

They decided to eliminate advertising from page one of their second section, and doubled the rates to discourage advertisers. The lineage dropped for a few weeks, then came up higher than before. They promptly doubled the rate again. The April 4 issue had less than 12 inches of news matter—all the rest was advertising.

"People got the idea it was a valuable page, and look at it now

—solid advertising," said Tejada, dejectedly. They may double the rates a third time.

Yanks Knock Home Runs

As a promotion stunt, the paper used to offer one hundred pesos to any baseball player who knocked a ball over the Mexico City ball park fence for a home run. The paper carried a challenging sign on the fence, making this offer.

But since American players have hit Mexico in force, the paper had to gracefully withdraw its offer. It began costing thousands of pesos a week. They went to city officials, "investigated" the city ordinance,

found such a prize offer was "illegal."

Distribution problems plague Tejada. He said he had a hunch all circulation was not being collected for, so he cancelled his subscription.

"That was six months ago," he said. "I still get my paper every day, and haven't paid a cent. What can I do?"

Lanz Duret said cost of living has gone up 400 per cent in Mexico. He said publications have been hit hard by the newsprint shortage, but pool their paper and then ration it among themselves.

This was a demand for a continuation and generally signifies the ability to ruff the next lead of the suit.

Therefore, when West played the five of spades, declarer thought that Casner was now void of spades, and put on dummy's ten-spot. Casner's jack won the trick, and as West still had to get a heart trick, the contract was defeated.

Nibi returned to the United States last December after living in

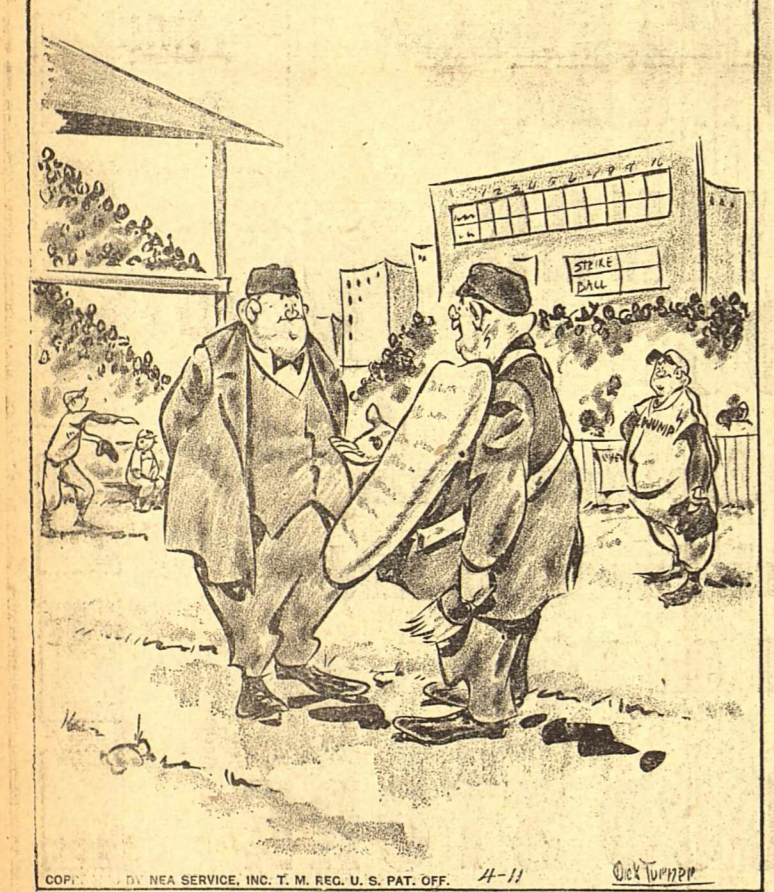

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Lubbock Wins Honor For Traffic Safety

AUSTIN—(AP)—Houston, Galveston and Lubbock have been announced as winners in the 1945 traffic safety contest sponsored annually by the Texas Safety Association.

Houston, in the 100,000 and up population bracket, had a fatality rate of 13.52 per 100,000. Dallas was second with 14.25. San Antonio was third with 16.93, and Fort Worth was fourth with 21.34.

In the 50,000 to 100,000 class, Galveston had 3.28 traffic deaths per 100,000 population; others in order were Beaumont, Waco, Amarillo, Austin, El Paso and Corpus Christi.

In the 25,000 to 50,000 class cities, Lubbock had a fatality rate of 6.28. Port Arthur was close behind with 6.50. Other cities in order were Tyler, Wichita Falls and Laredo.

Seven cities in the 10,000 to 25,000 class had perfect records—no fatalities. They were Brownsville, Denison, Highland Park, Marshall, Paris, Sweetwater and Terrell.

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Eisenhower Urges Extension Of Draft

The House Military Committee has decided in favor of a nine-month draft extension and the bill goes to the House for approval.

Californian Says Texas Gas Pipeline Needed

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—Harold W. Wright, general manager of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, says the lack of natural gas here within a few years will make a pipeline from the Texas oil fields indispensable.

Appearing before the Federal Power Commission, Wright said construction of a proposed 1,200-mile pipeline from Texas to California is essential to the growth of industry here. He estimated that industrial users might be 250,000,000 cubic feet short of their daily needs within a few years.

The \$65,000,000 pipeline project has been approved by the California Railroad Commission. The hearing will continue the rest of the week.

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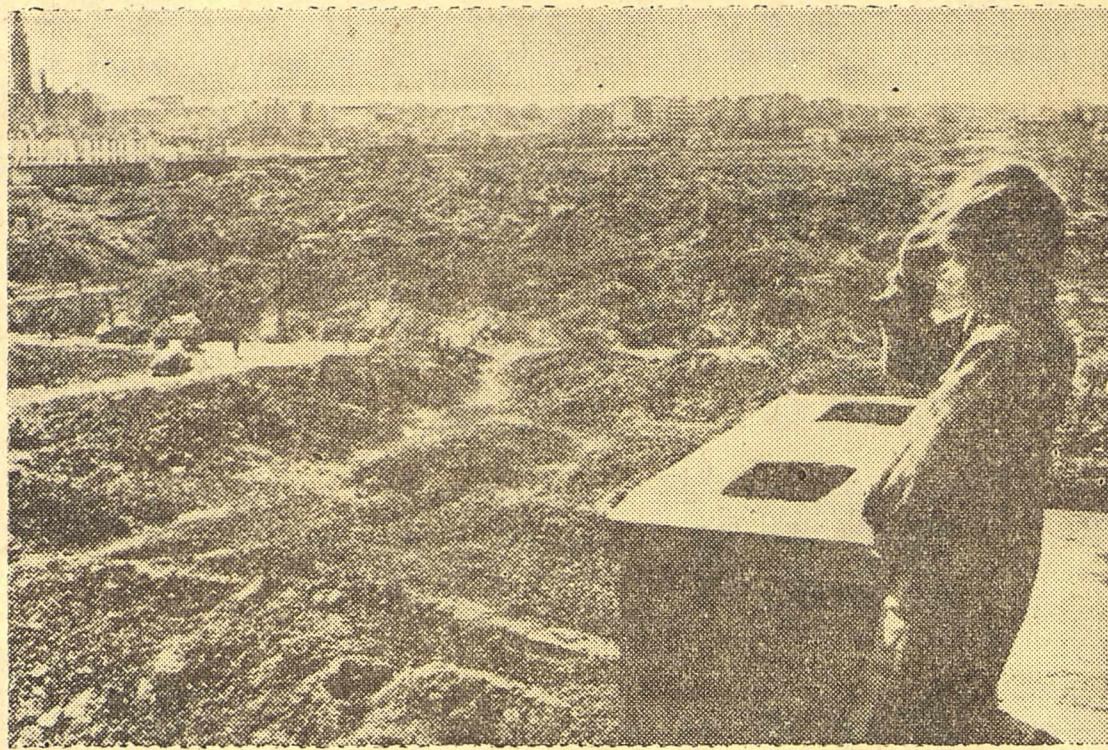
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Polish Refugee Gazes At Wrecked Warsaw

“I’m a little worried about the tree, though,” she confided. “It’s bearing only nine oranges this year, and one time it had 60.”

Campus Cleanup Plan Rubbish To Veterans

PITTSBURG, KAN.—(AP)—A veterans' block at Pittsburg State Teachers College protested vigorously against a “campus cleanup campaign.”
Ex-GIs some 600 strong, and numbering many a yardbird in their midst, said in a petition against forming a line to police up the rubbish:
