Proposal Would Eliminate Youth Draft

450,000 Spanish Troops Reported On French Border

Exiled Leader Says Franco Plans War

NEW YORK (AP)—The mounting controversy over the Franco government in Spain, which is expected to reach the floor of the United Nations Security Council next week, was swelled Friday by an exiled Spanish Republican leader's assertion that Generalissimo Franco has 450,000 troops massed menacingly on the French frontier.

Dr. Fernando de Los Rios, former dean of the University of Madrid, one-time ambassador to Washington and pre-civil war cabinet member, told a press conference he had documentary proof of the existence in Spain of "an aggressive plan against France."

"Spain now has an army superior to that of France numerically, and perhaps in the quality of armament, too," said De Los Rios, who arrived here from Paris Wednesday as the exiled Republican regime's observer at the Security Council sessions.

He expressed hope the document to which he referred—supposedly found in Spain by Republican agents—would be presented to the council when it takes up Poland's charges that Spain is a threat to world peace and that Franco is harboring German scientists experimenting on new atomic weapons.

Truman Hits Poland Charge

De Los Rios made his accusations against the Franco regime only a few hours after President Truman had told a press conference in Washington that the Polish charges were political. The President did not elaborate.

The Polish indictment was placed on the council's provisional agenda Thursday night for consideration next week immediately after Russia's demand for dismissal of the Iranian case, is disposed.

A full hearing on the Spanish issue is assured and at least four members are expected to press for some means of cracking down on Franco. They are:

Mexico and Poland, the only council members recognizing the Spanish Republican exiles in Paris as a government; Russia, which never has recognized the Franco regime and France, which acts as host to the exiled Republicans and is a most concerned neighbor of Spain.

The United States and Britain, while willing to hear Poland's case, are represented as favoring individual decisions by each nation in respect to relations with Franco as opposed to any concerted action.

Canadian Suggests British West Indies As Loan Security

OTTAWA (AP)—A suggestion that the United Kingdom put up the British West Indies as security for a proposed \$1,250,000,000 loan from Canada was before the Dominion parliament Friday.

The loan agreement, signed recently, won the approval of spokesmen for all three opposition parties soon after Finance Minister J. L. Lasker laid it before parliament late Thursday, and passage was certain. However, three members from French-speaking Quebec, traditionally opposed to political and economic ties with the British Empire, criticized the loan as a "gift."

One of them, Jean Francois Poullet, outspoken member of the Liberal (government) Party, observed that Canada does not have a tropical climate and added:

"But Great Britain has possessions in the West Indies; it has Trinidad, Jamaica, the Bahama Islands. Why should we not put in our claim for that in return as a guarantee for what we have been doing financially for them?"

Each club president and two delegates from her club will attend the Home Demonstration Council meeting at which time plans will be made for observing National Home Demonstration Week May 6-12.

"Today's Home Builders Tomorrow's" is the theme to be followed in the observance and Midland County will plan to observe the week by serving others.

United Nations Leaders Join Truman In Dedicated FDR Shrine

HYDE PARK, N. Y. (AP)—United Nations leaders join President Truman Friday in dedicating as a national shrine the green acres and the old Hudson River mansion of Franklin D. Roosevelt, who died one year ago Friday.

The ceremonies, from 1:30 to 2:00 p. m. (CST), included:

An eight-minute dedicatory address by Truman from the front porch where the late President customarily greeted his neighbors on victorious election nights.

Formal presentation by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt to Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug of the house, the century-old rose garden in which her husband is buried, and the surrounding 33-acres of land, comprising an estate which has been in the Roosevelt family since 1867.

Truman vowed to carry on Franklin D. Roosevelt's fight against "tyranny" abroad and for the "progressive and humane principles of the new deal."

Standing "in reverence" at ceremonies dedicating "this hallowed spot"—the Roosevelt estate—Truman said:

"May Almighty God, who has watched over this republic as it grew from weakness to strength, give us the wisdom to carry on in the way of Franklin D. Roosevelt."

It was Truman's first trip to Hyde Park since he journeyed here a year ago for the burial of his predecessor.

Roosevelt's foreign policy, he said, "recognized the solemn duty of this country toward nations which have been weakened in the death struggle against tyranny."

"For these principles of international cooperation, Truman declared, 'we are determined to fight with all our strength.'"

Roosevelt's domestic policy, he continued, was "a recognition of the basic truth that this government exists not for the benefit of a privileged few but for the welfare of all the people."

Chairs were placed on the wide expanse of lawn before the house for 700 special guests, including members of the United Nations Security Council. Krug issued formal invitations also to the chiefs of all foreign missions in Washington.

In accepting custody of the Roosevelt Estate as a national historical site, Krug stressed that it will be shared by people of all nations.

"The people he loved will come here," he said, "young people, poor people, aliens, and neighbors, men who are freer men because he lived, Statesmen from many lands will come to Xmas. May his memory deliver all of them from selfishness and from greed. May he forever share with all who come something of his timeless qualities—his contagious vitality, his gallant courage, and his infinite compassion."

Members of the cabinet, the Supreme Court and Congress represented official Washington.

The scene of the ceremonies gave the impression of an open air theater. Standing space was provided for the public behind the seating section and among the trees of the park which extends for some distance before the house.

The Department of Interior said the radio hookup for broadcasting the ceremonies was the greatest since V-J Day.

Five months of work by Department of the Interior specialists have restored the interior of the house in accordance with photographs taken in 1940.

Mr. Roosevelt deeded the house and 33 acres to the government and Congress accepted it as an historic site by an act passed July 18, 1939. Last November Mrs. Roosevelt, her four sons and one daughter, waived their lifetime claims to the estate.

"We have tried to make the house look as if President Roosevelt might be coming back for a weekend," George A. Palmer, superintendent of the estate for the Department of the Interior, said.

May Says Boys Under 20 Not Suitable For Occupation Duty

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the House Military Committee touched off a fight in the chamber Friday over continuing inductions of 18 and 19-year-old youths by asserting he would offer an amendment to prohibit the induction of anyone under 20.

He said he would submit later Army figures indicating that there is no need to keep on drafting teen-agers and would cite testimony by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower that youths under 20 are "not suitable" as occupation forces.

The Kentuckian argued that the Army's manpower requirements could be met without drafting teen-agers, asserting that during March there were 73,000 voluntary enlistments and as many more are expected in April.

Committee opponents of May's amendment have contended that since teen-agers were drafted for war service, they should continue to be inducted under an extension of the draft. Otherwise, they have argued, they may not be adequate replacements for men of long service.

Some members, notably Rep. Hoffman (R-Mich) questioned the propriety of bringing up the draft legislation at all before the Easter recess starting late next week. House members, Hoffman claimed, should be given an opportunity to discuss the subject with their constituents during the recess.

Rep. Barden (D-NC) attacked the committee's inclusion of 18-year-olds in the draft-extension measure, and likewise challenged General Eisenhower's statement that the Army is replacing them with older volunteers for occupation duty.

Senate Group OKs Extension

A one-year extension of the draft was approved by the Senate Military Committee Thursday.

The Senate committee, in an action which Chairman Thomas (D-Utah) conceded was highly unusual, reported to the floor measures which would provide:

1. Pay increases for enlisted men only, ranging from \$15 a month for privates down to \$2 for top sergeants.
2. Similar increases, but as a measure separate from the draft extension.
3. An extra \$50 a month for all officers and men serving at sea or outside the United States.
4. A 20 per cent increase for all officers and men.

Thomas sponsored the 20 per cent increase, which is what the services themselves have recommended.

Along with the one-year draft extension, the Senate committee specified that by July 1, 1947, the services shall limit their enrollments to 1,070,000 in the Army, 558,000 in the Navy and 108,000 in the Marines.

Truman Hits Navy For Opposing Merger

WASHINGTON (AP)—In shocked and angry silence the Navy Department held aloof Friday from wide speculation that top-berth resignations might follow President Truman's biting blast at admirals and others opposing his armed forces merger program.

Immediate conjecture centered on whether Secretary of the Navy Forrestal might decide to quit, now instead of waiting until summer, and whether Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, chief of Naval operations, would request retirement. Both have vigorously fought the merger.

There was no question that Truman had the gloves off when he pointedly notified the Navy where he stood. He used the words propaganda and lobbying in speaking of continued opposition, and said the public was interested in facts instead.

The President told his news conference Thursday that, while individual Naval officers are entitled to voice their honest opinions, he expected both Navy and War Departments to support the unification policy when he, as commander-in-chief, once established it.

Takes Navy by Surprise

Truman's sharp words took the Navy Department completely by surprise.

However, the capital was likening the apparent tension between White House and Navy high command to the strained relations which existed between the President and Harold L. Ickes before the latter stepped out as secretary of interior.

Up until Thursday all recent reports represented Forrestal as intending to remain in office until about July, the beginning of the new governmental fiscal year.

When reporters inquired whether the Navy would be allowed to continue to fight unification, Truman replied it was not justified in making a fight after he announced his decision in favor of unification. Then he lit into admirals and others who still oppose the plan.

Escaped Marine Killer Captured

KNOXVILLE, TENN. (AP)—The nation's most hunted criminal—Rape-Killer Earl McFarland—was back behind bars Friday, awaiting removal to Washington and eventual death in the electric chair.

The 24-year-old ex-Marine, who was captured here Thursday on a street corner a block from city jail by two FBI agents, said "my goose is cooked and I'm ready to go," and added that he would not fight extradition to Washington.

FBI Agent Norman H. McCabe said McFarland, who escaped from the District of Columbia jail April 3 in company with another convicted killer, Joseph D. Medley, was being held in Knox County jail under \$100,000 bond pending a removal hearing Saturday at 10 a. m. (CST).

McFarland was awaiting execution for the rape-slaying of an 18-year-old government girl in Washington in 1944 when he and Medley made their daring break from the jail. Medley was captured inside the district the same day.

McCabe said two agents in an automobile saw McFarland standing on a street corner "like he was waiting for a car," and added that "they stopped immediately and took him into custody."

R. L. Wood Heads Office Building; Architect Named

R. L. Wood Thursday night was elected president of the Midland Office Building Company, which soon will erect a \$750,000 office building here, and Wyatt C. Hedrick of Fort Worth was named architect for the structure.

Stockholders of the building company, formed to build the large new structure to provide more office space in Midland, met in the directors room of the First National Bank. The new building will have approximately 50,000 square feet of space above the ground floor.

John W. House was elected vice president of the company and M. C. Ulmer was named secretary-treasurer.

Directors are Wood, House, Ulmer, Ralph Lowe, Harry Adams, O. C. Harper, R. B. Cowden, G. E. Hall, and Fred Wemple.

Ulmer heads the finance committee, Wood the steering committee and House the building committee.

Hedrick, one of the leading architects of the Southwest and the nation, has erected a number of Midland's finer buildings.

Lake Success Chosen Temporary UN Site

NEW YORK (AP)—The United Nations decided Thursday to move its interim headquarters to the \$17,783,000 Sperry gyroscope plant at Lake Success—22 miles from New York City—and accepted an offer of Mayor William O'Dwyer to see the old World's Fair site at Flushing Meadows in order for next September's meeting of the general assembly.

The Security Council will transfer its activities from Hunter College to the Lake Success site as soon as arrangements can be made.

New York City's offer—described by Secretary General Trygve Lie as "a very great contribution to the success of the United Nations"—was to spend \$1,250,000 improving the municipal building at the fair site and to erect housing units to accommodate 4,000 persons on the UN payroll by Jan. 1, 1947.

Although present contract requires the UN to evacuate the remodeled gymnasium at Hunter College May 15, Lie requested an extension to August 15, in a letter to the mayor.

He said the premises would be vacated before that date if the new quarters were completed ahead of schedule.

Oil Ceilings Removed For Federal Purchases

WASHINGTON (AP)—When a federal department or agency is involved, above-ceiling prices can be paid for petroleum products, the Office of Price Administration has ruled.

The OPA handed down this decision Thursday in connection with the Navy's contemplated purchase of 200,000 additional barrels of fuel.

Fred Barber Dies Friday In Dallas

Fred Barber, 60, a Midland County resident for 39 years, died at 9 a. m. Friday in St. Paul's Hospital at Dallas, following a long illness. He was a farmer.

Barber lived one mile north of the city.

Funeral services have not been set pending arrival of the body here from Dallas.

Survivors include: his widow, Mrs. Stella Barber of Midland; four daughters, Miss Frances Barber of Midland, Mrs. Clyde Pate of Schertz, Texas, Mrs. James E. Webb of Midland, and Mrs. Earl Pace of Odessa; a son, Charles, of Midland; and two grandchildren, Joan and Walter Fred Pate of Schertz.

Midland Woman Makes First Aerial Flight On Her 76th Birthday

Mrs. Clara E. Goss made her first airplane flight Thursday—on her 76th birthday.

Mrs. Goss, mother of Mrs. Don Thompson and Mrs. W. A. Yeager of Midland, flew to Tulsa on a Continental Airlines plane to visit another daughter, Mrs. E. B. Smith, at Sapulpa, Okla.

The daughters here had received no word from the mother Friday on how she enjoyed her trip, but Mrs. Goss had looked forward to the flight. She has been a resident of Midland about 10 years.

District One-Act Plays Scheduled At Midland High Friday Night

The district scholastic contests will come to a close Friday night when Odessa, Big Spring, and Midland High School students present three one-act plays at the Midland High School auditorium, beginning at 7:15 p. m.

Midland will present "Overtures" and Big Spring will stage "Trifles." The Odessa contest play has not been announced. The casts will meet at 7 o'clock and draw for the order in which the plays will be presented.

The public is invited to the plays but, in accordance with interscholastic rules, will not be permitted to enter the auditorium while a play is in progress nor will any one be permitted to leave during a play. Persons arriving late will be ushered to seats between plays. A small charge is made.

The outcome of the plays will have no bearing on the final outcome of the all-event district contests as Midland High already has enough points to be assured of the championship. The winning cast, however, will enter the regional contests at Abilene April 20.

GI Testifies Sergeant Beat Him With Club While In Detention

LONDON (AP)—Pfc. Claris B. Smith, Big Rapids, Mich., testified at a United States Army court martial Friday that S/Sgt. James M. Jones of Muskogee, Okla., struck him with a wooden club at the Lichfield Detention Camp in January, 1945.

Testifying at Jones' trial on charges of mistreating GI prisoners in the Lichfield stockade, Smith also said he and other prisoners were ordered to march around the courtyard.

Col. Buhl Moore, president, abruptly closed the court, interrupting cross examination of Smith. Moore's action was protested by Lt. Morris C. McGee, defense counsel, who accused the colonel of exhibiting bias by interrupting at a "crucial moment in the defense cross examination."

McGee objected to Moore's continuing as head of the court, but his challenge was not sustained.

The colonel explained he had interrupted the proceeding to discuss with his colleagues the actions of an unnamed spectator, which he said, bordered on contempt. He did not amplify his assertion.

LATE NEWS FLASHES

KAIYUAN, MANCHURIA (AP)— Chinese Communists are bitterly defending the rail junction city of Szepingkai in a battle that has been in progress for six days, Lt. Gen. Liang Hwa-Sheng, Chinese government deputy commander, informed correspondents Friday.

NUERNBERG (AP)— Ernst Kaltenbrunner complained, flushed and shaking, on the witness stand Friday against "constant insults" after a U. S. prosecutor had accused him of lying.

SHANGHAI (AP)— The prosecution Friday demanded the death penalty for four Japanese officers charged with the execution of three Doolittle fliers and expressed regret that more of the Japanese involved could not be brought to justice.

Truman Signs Temporary Veteran Housing Law

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman signed into law Friday a bill providing \$253,727,000 for veterans' housing.

The funds will be used to provide approximately 100,000 temporary dwellings for war veterans. Most of the homes will be converted service barracks.

A similar number of temporary homes was authorized by previous legislation.

Kent Ellenburger Discovery Makes Production Test

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Vick, Southwest Kent County Ellenburger discovery, was preparing to swab to test in the top zone of the formation which had shown for around 20 barrels of oil per hour, natural, in drillstem tests.

The 5 1/2-inch casing, which had been cemented near bottom at 7,938 feet, had been perforated at 7,775-85 feet with three shots to the foot; at 7,785-7,800 feet with four shots to the foot and at 7,800-10 feet, with three shots to the foot.

Those perforations cover most of the zone which showed oil on investigations conducted while drilling was in progress. The project is 660 feet from north and 1,960 feet from east lines of section 45, block 5, H&G survey.

Humble No. 1 Crespi, East Midland County exploration, in northwest quarter of section 19, block 38, TP survey, T-2-S, nine miles south of Midland, was making hole below 10,482 feet in lime. No indications of possible production have been reported.

House Committee Asks Increase In Price Of Meats

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress, told by OPA that Americans face a \$2,000,000,000 cost of living jump, heard a demand from one of its own committees Friday that meat prices be boosted \$750,000,000 a year.

Price Administrator Paul Porter voiced the living cost prediction in protesting amendments tacked on to the pending bill to grant OPA another year of life beyond June 30.

Meanwhile, the House Agriculture Committee by unanimous vote instructed its chairman, Rep. Flanagan (D-Va.), to offer an amendment to the OPA bill eliminating all meat subsidies and requiring an equivalent increase in price ceilings.

Meat subsidies now amount to about \$750,000,000 a year.

Thus the legislation to continue OPA another year will come before the House for debate Monday, exploding with issues on meat and many other foods, fibers and industrial products.

OPA's Porter, in a letter to Chairman Spence (D-Ky.) of the House Banking Committee, said amendments put into the bill by the committee, would cost consumers \$2,000,000,000 more in one year and deliver a "body blow" to efforts to hold down inflation.

If approved by House and Senate, Porter said, the amendments would boost the nation's annual clothing bill by 10 per cent.

He estimated they would "transfer at least \$425,000,000 from the pockets of American car buyers to the pockets of American car dealers," and increase prices of many other items.

Will Re-Acitize

Sun Oil Company No. 2 Martin, on northwest side of the Martin field, in Central-Southwest Andrews County, and 1,980 feet from east and 660 feet from south lines of section 17, block A-41, psl survey, was preparing to re-treat with 5,000 gallons of regular acid, in the Sulphur field, in 24 hours, cut six per cent acid residue, after injection of 2,500 gallons of mud acid. At the end of the 24 hours the fluid was standing 7,000 feet from surface.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1-E-A TXL, West Ector County exploration, in northwest quarter of section 39, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, and southeast of the TXL field, was bottomed at 11,344 feet, in lime, and was taking a gamma ray survey.

Fred W. Shield No. 1 Covert, East Terry County wildcat, in section 29, block O, H&OB survey, was making hole below 4,993 feet in lime.

Trace Of Oil Stain

There was a trace of very slight oil stain at 4,940-60 feet. The zone had no porosity.

Humble No. 1 Campbell, Northeast Hockley County prospector, in section 116, block A, R. M. Thompson survey, was drilling past 9,610 feet, in an unidentified dolomite.

Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Roberts, Southeast Reeves County lower Permian development, in section 294, block 13, University survey, was coring below 10,237 feet in lime and shale.

J. W. Murchison No. 1 Fraser, Southwest Ector County wildcat, four miles southeast of the TXL field, and in section 7, block 45, TP survey, T-2-S, was making hole below 6,306 feet in lime. It was due to be in the Gloretha section of the middle Permian soon—if not already. The project is contracted to 8,500 feet.

One Year After Roosevelt

One year after his death, Franklin D. Roosevelt remains one of the most commanding and controversial figures of the twentieth century. The immediate impact of his personality and ideas is gone, and with it much of the bitter partisan animosity it engendered. Already his goals and accomplishments are beginning to be seen in a saner perspective. But that does not mean that temperate appraisal has replaced adulation and abuse.

Franklin D. Roosevelt still dominates and divides the Democratic Party, and probably will as long as the party remains in power. His aims are officially the aims of his successor, and it seems safe to say that Truman has found this commitment a source both of strength and of embarrassment.

The minds and temperaments of Roosevelt and Truman are vastly different. Thus the President, while subscribing to the Roosevelt philosophy, cannot put it into action with the Roosevelt technique. Truman, in his way, is as strongly individualistic as his predecessor was. Because of this, he finds himself accused of leftism by some of his conservative fellow Democrats, and accused by one outspoken labor leader of being "weak and spineless."

How different this last eventful year's history might have been with Roosevelt in the White House cannot be calculated. Some domestic crises were inevitable, others might have been avoided, and still others might have been created by popular feeling for or against the President.

Roosevelt, who was capable of quickly changing tactics as well as long-range planning, certainly would have shown an outward reaction to these crises quite different from Truman's handling of the same situations. But whether the final story would have been greatly altered is not so certain.

A more insistent source of speculation is Roosevelt's possible influence on international affairs and the beginnings of the United Nations. It is clear today that his international prestige is undiminished. His leading part in the conception and foundation of the world organization is everywhere recognized. But whether his hand would have been strong enough to steer the UN away from perils set up in part by compromises which he himself was party to is something, of course, which we never can know.

Time and distance alone can give us the true picture of Franklin D. Roosevelt against the background of the world in which he lived. But two things seem capable of safe prediction: He will be remembered best as a war President, astute diplomat and world leader, rather than as the author of domestic reforms on which he set so high a store; and he will be remembered long.
