Final Statement Withheld

Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma, the "Beast of Bataan," kept his date with a U. S. Army firing squad the other day, just six weeks after his uniformed comrade-in-crime, Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, "Tiger of Luzon," stretched a hangman's noose. Thus died, in the Philippine capital they did so much to desecrate, the two principal war criminals among Japanese field commanders. A most fitting end. Or is it an end?

Yamashita, who went to his revered ancestors in the "disgrace" of an undecorated fatigue uniform with only a rope for a necktie, favored his executioners with a gracious pardon for their injustice to him. But Homma, permitted an "honorable" death in full military regalia, refused to make a final statement.

This is not necessarily to say that the "Beast" has been eternally denied voice. His "final statement," it seems to us, has merely been withheld for the time being. It is now being prepared, in Washington and in Tokyo, in London and in Nagoya, at Hunter College and at Tokei Institute. When at last it is released, it will determine which ideology truly won World War II, and whether the savage philosophy of Yamashita and Homma really died with them.

The American courts-martial which passed judgment on the "Tiger" and on the "Beast" viewed the trials as an opportunity further to impress the Japanese people with the fairness and the impartiality of democratic processes. These men, obviously guilty of the most heinous crimes against humanity, were accorded super-scrupulous legal consideration, though they long since had been condemned by outraged international public opinion.

And were the Nipponese convinced of the desirability of democracy? We rather think not. It is more probable that they regarded the courts' deliberations as mildly interesting preliminaries to an inevitable end—the pronouncement of death sentences.

The evidence is present in abundance, it seems to us. Yamashita's conviction was followed by mass demonstrations of protest in Tokyo; Homma's by public exhibitions of grief for this man who "but did his duty to the emperor." The democratic general elections of April 10 aroused little interest in Japan. Public criticism of Hirohito is still socially intolerable. And the "magnificent" new constitution remains but an historic piece of paper.

Stuck Either Way

The American Car and Foundry Company of St. Louis found itself with a strike on its hands when an employe refused to join the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen (AFL), which represents the workers in this open shop. The company, in an effort to end the strike, asked the man to join, and fired him when he wouldn't. Then the National Labor Relations Board took over.

The board ordered the company to cease encouraging its men to join the BRC or any other union. It ordered the company to reinstate this employe with full seniority and to reimburse him for any financial loss incurred.

Technically, the NLRB seems to have been right. It is probably as much a case of interference for a company to urge a man to join a union, even one not company-dominated, as it is to threaten him with discharge unless he stays out. But what was the NLRB's motive—to protect the individual's choice of action, to protect the union from "domination," or to penalize the company for strike-settling tactics which must have been agreeable to both management and union?

Obviously the individual's right to choose wasn't the prime consideration, since that choice is denied in the NLRB-sanctioned closed shop. And as for domination, it would rather seem to an outsider that the NLRB might itself be trying to coerce the company and interfere in labor-management relations by its action. For, if the company is to avoid similar and further penalties, the only solution is a closed shop in which the worker has no choice but to join the union.

In other words, it is all right for the union to force union membership on a man under threat of company dismissal. But the company can't do the same thing. And the American Car and Foundry Company meanwhile is in the unenviable position of being damned by the government if it does, and damed if it doesn't.

Further Proof

The roundup in Germany of the sizable cell of a new Nazi movement re-emphasizes the need for a strong American force in our occupation zone.

The more we weaken our force in Germany, the bolder the defeated die-hards will become, and the more gravely world peace will be threatened. The Nazi spirit isn't dead. We must not let our vigilance and strength expire.

Going His Way

Douglas Corrigan, the famous wrong-way flier of 1938, is going to run for the U. S. Senate in California on the Prohibition ticket. Perhaps Corrigan has been watching the postwar drift of international relations and has decided that the world at last is going in his direction.

JayCee Carried America, Texas, And Midland To Panama City Convention

Big and West Texas-looking Taylor Cole, all dressed up in western clothes, boots, et al, took Midland and Texas and America to Panama.

Cole, a Midland JayCee, recently returned from an International Junior Chamber of Commerce meeting in Panama City. He was asked to attend in the clothes of his state, and the suit he wore was a credit to Roy Rogers and then some. It had a horned head emblem on it and was "some buckaroo."

Taylor was outfitted in Dallas. They fixed him up because he was to campaign to bring the convention for next year back to Big D and Texas. He succeeded in doing just that.

Cole flew to Panama City, and he and four other American JayCees carried the goodwill of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce to the first international gathering of the organization.

What he tells about the convention is interesting. Fifty-seven representatives from 17 countries, ranging from Canada to New Zealand, were present.

Cole was elected a vice president of the International Junior Chamber of Commerce. He already is a vice president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Only English Speaker
On one radio program at Panama City, Cole was the only English-speaking person on it.

Cole says the convention delegates were feted by many people from the president of Panama on down. They were royally received and had diplomatic entrance privileges.

"Language is always a barrier when nations get together," Cole says. "I served on the constitutional committee of the international convention. It took us six days to get together. We all meant the same thing, but saying it was another thing. Interpreters worked the sessions but there still were breaches of expression. When we did understand what each other meant, we agreed."

"I think this is something of the problem our nations have at peace conferences and the such."

Had To Dance "Texas"
Cole tells of the many carnivals held in Panama City, which are outgrowths of religious expression and very spirited, he explains. The people dance and parade for days and nights.

Cole says he was asked to dance "Texas" at the balls. He was asked to do "Little Foot" and "schottische," all to the tune of "Deep in the Heart of Texas."

Cole said Texas and Hawaiian dancing got the writeups in the papers there.

He flew over the Panama Canal and also visited it.

"The Panama zone bristles with guns and fortifications. It is the hotspot of the world. The people down there are scared, even now. They know full well what an atomic bomb could do. Even regular bombs would rain at them in the case of another war. Radar is on every island and installation. It picks up planes 500 miles away and is a necessary defense. Fortifications cost as much as \$50,000 a block in Panama zone."

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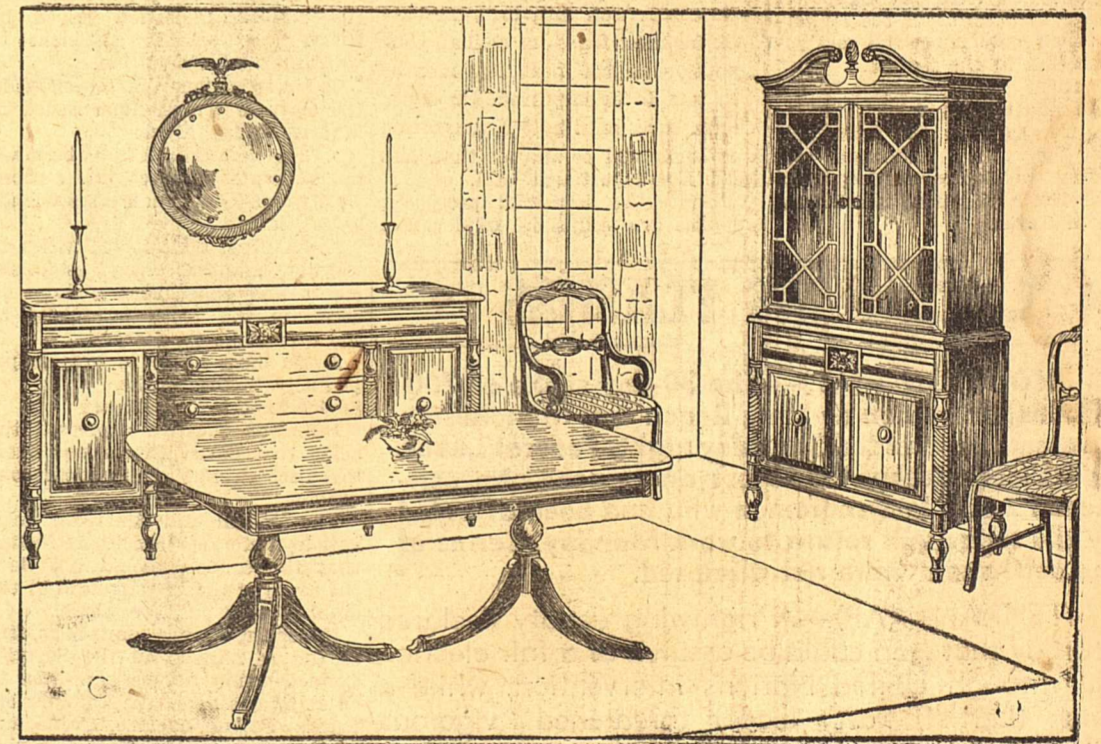

Coach Quits After Urging Students To Call Off Strike

The students were still on strike Friday when Sachse appeared and talked to about 250 in Simpson Park. Sachse urged them to return to their classes immediately. The majority of them did.

Sachse made no comment on his future plans. He came here from Electra.

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Midland Operators Will Drill Wildcat To 3,500 Feet In Northeast Garza; Acid Shot Slated For Shell 1 Nelson

Location for a 3,500-foot wildcat in Northeast Garza County was reported Saturday. The project will be Paul G. Shaefer, of Midland No. 1 S. F. Everett.

It will be 330 feet from south and west lines of southeast quarter of section 14, block 2, H&GN survey.

The 3,500-foot objective is calculated to take the project into the Clear Fork-Permian. The drill-site is about 17 miles northeast of Post.

Has a Solid Block

Shaefer has a solid block of 4,560 acres in that area. The test is near center of the spread. Several major companies are supporting the exploration.

Joe Cannon, of Post, has the drilling contract. Rotary will be used and material is being moved in. Digging will start as soon as the equipment can be rigged up.

Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 Nelson, West Andrews wildcat, which has been holding the center of interest for the oil fraternity in the Permian Basin for several weeks, as it drilled and tested in the Ellenburger lower Ordovician, to a current bottom of 10,453 feet—and on which definite and official information has been withheld—is reported to be preparing to treat the pay section acid.

Located in the southeast corner of section 8, block A-40, psi survey, this project is supposed to have entered the Ellenburger at 10,370 feet, on an elevation of 3,335 feet.

Some oil and gas cut drilling mud, is reported, by unofficial sources, to have been recovered by some of the drillstem test which have been taken below the 10,370-foot mark.

It is expected that some definite information on producing ability of the wildcat will be available soon.

Failed to Flow

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Vick, Ellenburger discovery in Southwest Kent County, swabbed for 24-hours and failed to kick off to flow, on perforations between 7,785-7,810 feet. It was reported, but not verified, that the well swabbed at the rate of about five barrels per hour natural, during a part of the testing.

That figure could not be considered a fair report on the possible production of the well, however, as it is understood that the swab was not pulled regularly or consistently.

Oil is said to have risen to about 1,900 feet of the surface. No report has been released on total amount of fluid swabbed out. Operator reported the well was shutin Saturday to pressure up.

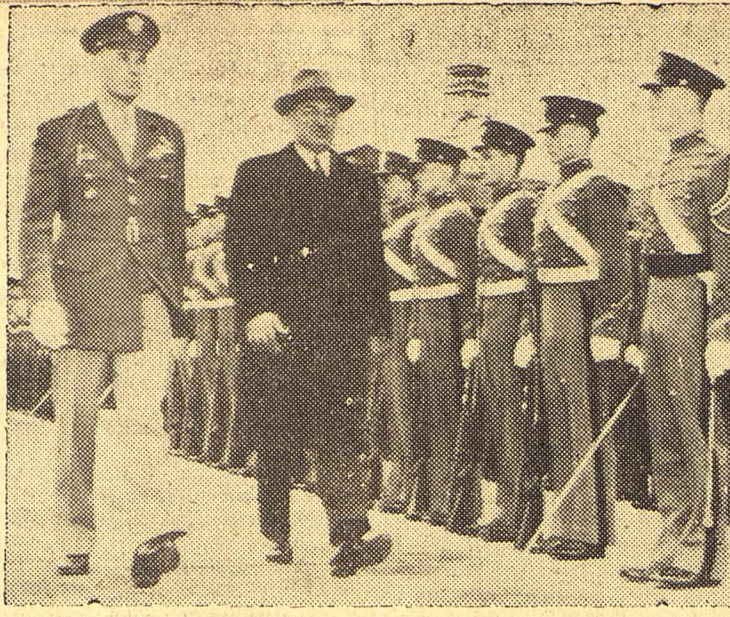
It is located in northeast quarter of section 45, block 5, H&GN survey, and had indicated a possible natural production of about 20 barrels per hour on drillstem tests.

Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Roberts, Southeast Reeves County prospector in southeast quarter of section 294, block 13, H&GN survey, and about 13 miles northeast of Balmorhea, cored at 10,237-253 feet, and recovered six feet of lime and shale, with some slight signs of oil and gas.

April 15 Is Tenth Anniversary Of Discovery Of Wasson Field, One Of Largest Oil Areas In United States

Monday is an important and significant date in the history of the oil development of the South Plains sector of the Permian Basin.

April 15, 1936, was the date of the official completion of the discovery oil well in the Wasson field, in Southeast Yoakum County, and April 15, 1946, is the tenth anniversary of that event which started a major change in the economic program of the area.

At the time of the completion of Honoluhū Oil Corporation and Cascade Petroleum Corporation (C. J. Davidson) No. 1 L. P. Bennett, for an initial daily flowing production of 234 barrels of oil, there was only one other oil producing area listed on the South Plains.

Wasson Classified High

That was in the Garza field in Central Garza County, where a small amount of production had been developed in 1935. It was not of any great importance and had not been shown for the production that was indicated by the Honoluhū-Cascade discovery.

Since that discovery all the other important oil fields now active on the South Plains—the area extending to the south lines of Gaines, Dawson and Borden counties, have been found and developed.

The Wasson field alone is now classed as one of the largest oil fields in the United States—from the standpoint of proven acreage—having more than 57,000 acres inside its proven productive limits.

At last report the field had 1,532 producing oil wells—located in Yoakum and Gaines counties, and less than 200 of them are pumps—the others, more than 1,300 wells, were flowing.

Combined daily potential of all the wells in the Wasson field is 1,164,149 barrels. Total daily allowable is in excess of 42,000 barrels per day and at the end of 1945 the field had produced 101,362,157 barrels of oil. Of that oil, the pool produced 22,625,154 barrels during the 12 months of 1945.

There are a number of interesting features connected with the drilling and completion of the Honoluhū-Cascade No. 1 Bennett.

The wildcat was spudded April 19, 1935. It was a partnership venture of Honoluhū Oil Corporation and C. J. (Red) Davidson, head of Cascade Petroleum Company. He did the drilling.

The project drilled during most of 1935. Early in October it encountered a slight show of oil at 5,085 feet, in lime. By the time it had drilled to 5,090 feet, there was about 700 feet of oil in the hole. A string of 7-inch casing was run, and shortly afterwards operations were shutdown on account of litigation.

Drilling Resumed

Drilling was resumed later in February, 1936, and as more hole was made more oil developed. Operators tested for about 17 barrels of oil per day natural when total depth was at 5,215 feet.

The well was drilled on to 5,282 feet, and then plugged back to 5,264 feet for completion. At that depth it tested for 72 barrels per day natural. It was shot with 340 quarts of nitro-glycerin at 5,080-5,257 feet and the production increased, and when the official completion test was taken on April 15, 1936, the well flowed 234 barrels of pipe line oil.

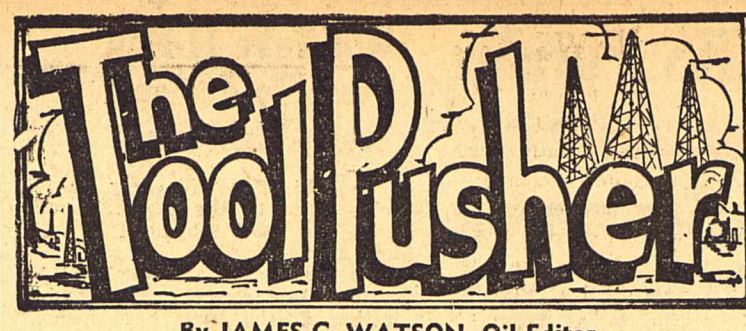
It was put on production then, but later in the year it was treated with acid, and that also increased the production. It tested for a potential of 427 barrels of oil per day after the acid. It still is flowing its allowable.

One of the most interesting angles of the story of the discovery is that connected with the L. P. Bennett ranch, on which it is located.

The property had been attached for a lien and a foreclosure sale by the sheriff had been ordered. The well developed its first indications of commercial production on Saturday, immediately prior to a Monday on which the sheriff's sale had been set.

Advance Payments Made

After it became apparent that the well would be some sort of a producer, Davidson and officials of Honoluhū arranged for advance payments on royalty purchases to be provided so Bennett was able to

—Several proposals will be submitted. Among them will be one calling for an expenditure of approximately \$20,000,000 to build a large natural gasoline plant and gathering lines, in the area to take the gas from all wells to the plant, and then carry the residue gas back for re-pressuring.

—It is understood that plans for the \$20,000,000 project include an expenditure for about \$5,000,000 for gas lines alone.

CROCKETT OIL FIELDS TO GET PIPE LINE

Seven oil fields in Crockett County soon will be connected with the Texas-New Mexico Pipe Line Company's West Texas-Houston 12-inch trunk line.

—Producing areas to be tied to the line include the Olson, Clara Couch, Simpson, Shannon, Noelke, Hoover, and Live Oak fields. They have a combined daily allowable of about 1,800 barrels. Wells in some of the fields are said to be shut on account of lack of a market.

—It is understood that T-N-MPC will move the oil for the amount of the Texas Company.

CONTRACT LET FOR NEW STANOLIND PIPE LINE

Fulton Construction Company of Lubbock has been given the contract to build a new 35-mile, 16-inch pipe line, from Sundown, in the Slaughter field, to the Wasson field, in Yoakum County, for Stanolind Pipe Line Company.

—The new line will feed Wasson field oil into Stanolind's West Texas-Oklahoma line, which now is handling around 44,500 barrels per day. Capacity of the line is 66,000 barrels daily. Runs from Wasson will increase the Stanolind movement of West Texas oil to

Amerada Is To Drill To 5,500 Feet In Oil Prospector In S-C Lea Area

HOBBBS, N. M.—Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 H. S. Record is to be a 5,500-foot wildcat in South-Central Lea County, about six miles west of the closest production in the Eunice-Monument field.

It will be 1,890 feet from south and east lines of section 26-19c-35e. Rowan Drilling Company has the contract, and is moving in material. The 5,500-foot destination should take the project into the middle Permian.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 11 Brunson-Argo, 731 feet from north and 589 feet from east lines of section 9-22s-37e, one location diagonally northeast of closest producer from the Ellenburger on the northeast side of the Brunson field, in East Central Lea County, has shown for good flowing production from the Ellenburger, and is drilling below 7,637 feet in granite wash, and will continue until solid granite is encountered.

Good Natural Flow

A one and one-half hour drillstem test was taken at 7,470-7,550 feet. Gas showed at the surface in 24 minutes. Oil flowed in 42 minutes and in a 40-minute period of about the current capacity of the line.

—It has been revealed on good authority, that the line likely will be extended from the Wasson field into Ector County, in order to move some of Stanolind's production in Andrews and Ector County to the north and east.

GLOBE WILL USE WEST TEXAS OIL IN ILLINOIS

Globe Oil & Refining Company has contracted to purchase 5,000 barrels of oil per day from the Texas Company from leases of that concern in the Slaughter field.

—The oil will be moved from the field by Stanolind Pipe Line Company to Drumright, Okla., and from there it will go to Globe's large refinery at Lemont, Ill., by Texas Empire Pipe Line Company.

CAMPBELL NEW SECRETARY NEW MEXICO ASSOCIATION

Jack M. Campbell, Albuquerque attorney, has been named executive secretary of the New Mexico Oil & Gas Association.

Blazing Kermit Gasser Put Out By Famous Team

KERMIT—Two world-famous professional oil well fire fighters Friday afternoon succeeded in extinguishing a gas fire which had raged for five days in The Pure Oil Company's No. 1 E. W. Cowden oil test about six miles south of Kermit. The fire started about 3 a. m. Monday when gas at about 2,440 feet blew out. No one was injured.

H. L. Patten and his son, O. L. Patten, of Houston, worked for two days on preparations for combating the fire, then quelled the blaze with a reported 1,000-pound charge of explosive. Attempts to run drilling mud into the hole were unsuccessful because drill pipe was bent and broken by the blast and flames. The Pattens recently returned from Borneo and Java where they had worked six months in extinguishing 37 oil wells set ablaze by the Japanese prior to their withdrawal or surrender of those points. The elder Patten lost an arm in fighting an oil well fire some years ago. Both are recognized as top professional oil well fire fighters in the world. They flew here from New York.

It is reported that 100 pounds of explosive were used Wednesday night in blowing out the kelly on the test, after remains of the derrick and drilling equipment had been cleared away. The well was making an estimated 18 million cubic feet of gas daily. George P. Livermore, Inc., was the drilling contractor.

The No. 1 Cowden is one quarter mile west of a new oil discovery made recently by the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company on the Brown and Altman land.

Rubber industry supplied 10,000,000 hard rubber battery cases to power the U. S. mechanized attack during the war.

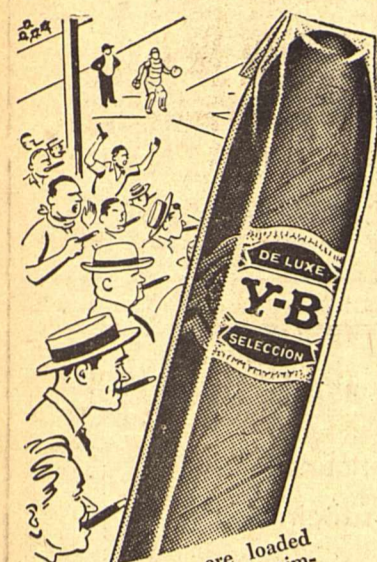

Baruch Is Generous And Outspoken Man With 'Park Office'

By NATHAN OATIS AP Newsfeatures Writer Bernard M. Baruch, 75, United States representative on the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission, is known as the man whose office is a park bench.

In the days when he was head of President Roosevelt's World War II rubber committee, starting in 1942, he used to hold conferences and frame policies on a bench in Lafayette Square, across the street from the White House.

Such openness was characteristic. Baruch has shown a park sitters' temperament. He has been generous with many people and direct with some of them.

He has given away speculation—earned millions in philanthropies—for hospitals, refugee relief, war work and economic studies, among other things.

And he admits that once, acting on a real man-to-man basis, he struck a man he'd seen abusing a cab driver on Fifth Avenue, New York. He hurt his right hand.

"I was damn fool enough to do it," he explains, "when I was 68 years old."

Graduated from City College in New York, he started on Wall Street as a brokerage clerk at \$3 a week, studied statistics, began buying and selling stocks and at 25 was made a partner in the brokerage firm he worked for.

He turned speculator, won the respect of John W. (Bet-a-Million) Gates and others and by the time he was 30 had gained and lost his first million.

Going into government work in the first World War, he sold his seat on the New York Stock Exchange and put most of his money into government bonds.

"There are two kinds of money," he said once. "The first is money that possesses a man. The second is possessed by a man. If money had possessed me, it would have been my master instead of my slave."

In World War I, as chairman of the War Industries Board, he himself paid for a mission to Europe to study distribution of materials shipped there. In World War II, heading the rubber committee, he paid his staff out of his own pocket.

He gave away a million dollars at Christmas '42, in Army and Navy and refugee relief and other causes and less than a year and a half afterward he gave \$1,100,000 to promote "physical medicine."

"It has always been easy for me to make money," he says. "Why shouldn't I give it away?"

Sally Hall Is Queen At Texas Tech Event

Tech held its biggest party since the war, combining the Old West angle to the machine age. A campus rodeo was held.

Young Veteran Killed In Plunge Into Canyon

WHITEFISH, MONT. — (AP) — A young war veteran died and two companions survived a 600-foot plunge to the bottom of a canyon near here Saturday when their car left the road at a hairpin curve and landed in a deep snowbank. James Johnson of Browning, Mont., was found dead by a rescue party summoned by Quentin Gilham and William White, also of Browning, who climbed the precipitous canyon wall in a tortuous three-hour struggle, and caught a ride to summon aid.

American Legion Chief Says Dealers, Not Vets, Get Surplus Property

AUSTIN—(AP)—Herman G. Nami, Texas department commander of the American Legion, Saturday described as "deplorable" the surplus property situation at the Fort Worth Regional Office of the War Assets Administration.

He suggested replacing all the top officials at the office with "veteran-minded" Texans. As far as veterans are concerned who have tried to get property the situation gets consistently worse instead of better, Nami said.

He charged that in the latter part of 1945 less than 25 per cent of surplus motor vehicles went to veterans while dealers got 75 per cent or more.

"My investigation shows that even a smaller percentage of furniture, hardware and textiles went to veterans during that period," Nami declared.

He called for an investigation to determine if the officials are "dealer-minded" as charged.

"If that is the case, they should be removed and replaced with personnel, preferably Texans, who are veteran-minded," Nami said.

Academy Professor Tosses Atomic Issue Into Texas Politics

By MAC ROY RASOR AUSTIN—(AP)—To the galaxy of candidates who for years have injected elements of the unusual into Texas politics comes now Drew C. Nichols, war veteran candidate for lieutenant governor.

A mild-mannered but enthusiastic man of science, Nichols believes it is time for lagging politics to catch up with scientific knowledge. He is tossing Texas voters a provocative issue—the crisis of the atomic age.

"In this age of the atom, the last best hope of earth may well lie in the election of a new type of man to public office—a man who has kept in step with the march of science," Nichols contends.

Both Nichols and his idea are newcomers to Texas politics.

"Science Changing World" The University of Texas social science graduate compares science to Aesop's tortoise which is plodding ahead while the political rabbit has stopped to shake hands with voters.

"It isn't politics that's changing the world today—it's science," says Nichols. "We must adopt the scientific approach to our problems if we have any hope of solving our economic, physical, educational and political ills."

Nichols in about three weeks will open his speaking campaign, loaded with factual data on outmoded Texas laws, juvenile delinquency, public health, and problems of veterans, teachers, old aged, farmers and workers. That campaign, hampered only by limited finances, may bode more of a threat to his opponents than any one of them has probably recognized.

Branding politics as "distasteful," Nichols says he had emerged from his quiet Texas Wesleyan Academy classroom where he was an instructor in social science because of a genuine desire to help solve through science the pressing problems which are being "fumbled by improperly trained politicians."

In the Army he rose through the ranks from private to lieutenant and served overseas.

world vision of human relationships and see new frontiers of economic and political life. People of the world must establish a universal association based on terms of freedom and equality. America must be strong and use the great inheritance that has been given her, for freely has she received from God and freely must she give in service to humanity.

World of Peace
"The end of the war gives us great opportunity to build a world of peace and prosperity, to build a more Christian order of life," he continued. "We have a sober responsibility to use our great power not for selfish ends, not to withdraw from the world of need, but to build for Christian brotherhood. America must point the way and become a great leader of the world, but America will be great only as her moral and spiritual developments are great, her concern for the welfare of all peoples is great only as she recognizes that the wealth of this nation is in the character of its people, only as we see that our purpose toward other nations expresses goodwill, economic goodwill, social goodwill, and political goodwill."

In concluding his remarks, the speaker said that America must emphasize social justice and social ethics. There must be equality of rights and opportunities for all people everywhere, unselfish service to the common life of all people everywhere. There must be emphasized use of economic resources of the world for the benefit of all people everywhere, the development of mutual understanding between peoples everywhere. America must serve the world, and individual citizens of America must be able not only to see themselves world citizens intensely loyal to America, but to visualize a world of peace, brotherhood, and understanding based on justice, mercy, and walking humbly before God.

Easter Seals Helped Midland Spastic Youth Walk 22 Steps, Say First Words

For the first time in almost 16 years, a Midland youth is walking and talking, because of the generous support of the people of the city and the interest shown in him by the Children's Service League.

His greatest accomplishment has been to take 22 steps unassisted and to speak a few simple words, but these acts seem little short of miraculous to his parents and friends.

He was born a spastic and lived in helplessness until several months ago. Then his case came to the attention of the Children's Service League, which is pledged to aid afflicted and stricken youngsters.

Members of the organization knew of the success of a school in Houston for aiding spastic children, and were determined to assist the youth. The league's Easter Seal Drive had provided the treasury with some money, but not enough to finance the cost. The women appealed, through The Reporter-Telegram, for donations.

Sent to Houston
The response was gratifying, and a total of \$1,200 was raised. The child and his mother were sent to Houston, where he received a three-month course of treatments. His mother cared for him both at their temporary home there and during the courses, meanwhile learning to administer the treatments.

They recently returned to Midland, the child wearing braces on many parts of his body. With the aid of the braces he now is able to walk a few steps and to say simple words. Doctors have advised the family and the Children's Service League that as his treatments are continued he will gain more control of his muscles and will lengthen the period of time he can stay on his feet. As he learns to walk, the relaxation of muscles will enable him to talk more.

Braces for the boy cost \$400 and the treatments are expensive. He must make a trip to Dallas each month to have his braces adjusted. Because of his age, more schooling should be given him to assist him in making more rapid progress against the affliction.

Seals Drive Now On
The Children's Service League now is conducting its annual Easter Seals Sales drive, and it is hoped that money obtained will enable the organization to further assist the youngster and to aid other victims. Mrs. Fred Cassidy, president, said. Sixty per cent of proceeds from the seal sales remains in the county for this purpose.

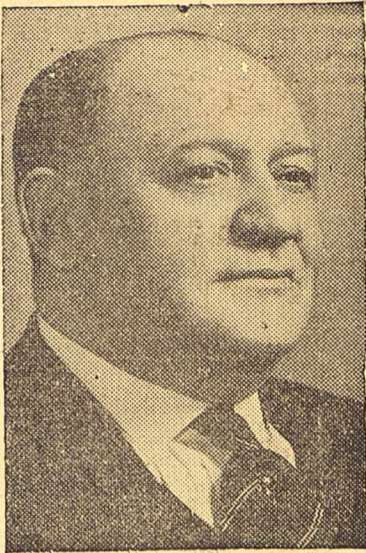

pose and the remainder goes into a national fund.

Infantile paralysis victims may receive state and national aid, but victims of spastic paralysis cerebral palsy must receive their assistance through private sources. The National Society for Crippled Children now is trying to focus public attention on the problem.

Treatment Is New

Spastic paralysis causes nearly 200,000 Americans to be condemned to a kind of living death. It is reported that about seven of every 100,000 children born are cerebral palsy cases. Most of the victims are regarded as feeble-minded and are shunned or locked-away because there has been no concentrated effort to understand and cure the affliction.

Doctors say if the spastic child can say one word it can talk; if it can take one step, it can walk. Because of the mother's devotion to the task of carrying on the treatments started at Houston, and because of the support given by the citizens of Midland in providing the treatments, the Children's Service League feels confident the Midland youth eventually will be able to walk and talk and take his rightful place in the community.

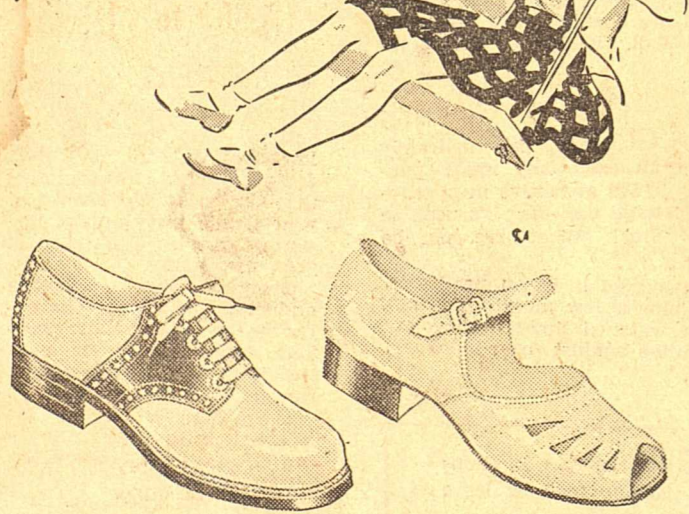

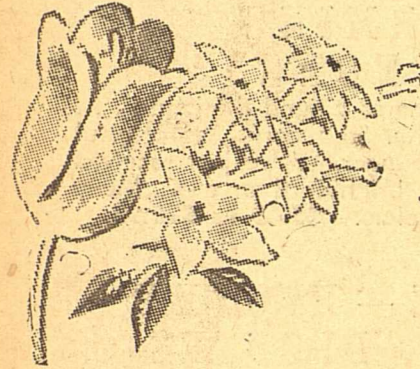

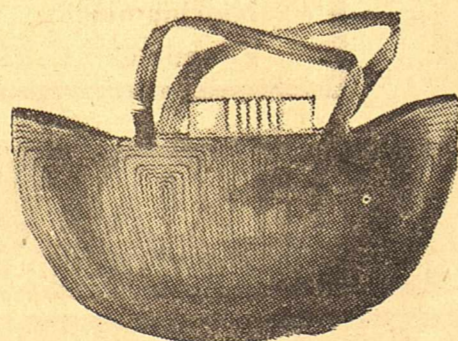

Members of the Midland American Legion Post will see the exhibit at their meeting Tuesday night.

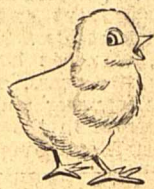

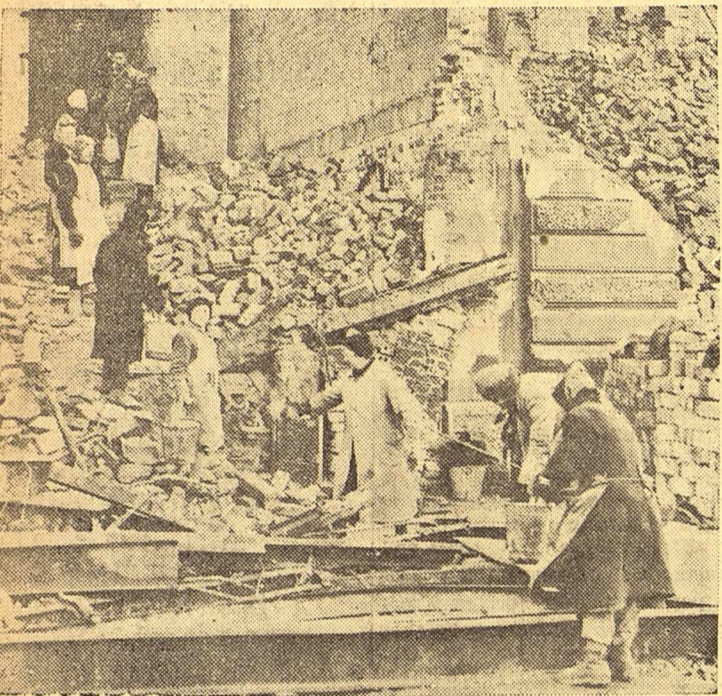

HOLLYWOOD—This will convey an idea of how many things can go wrong in shooting about 80 seconds of high-budget picture like "Forever Amber."

We're on a canvas-shrouded outdoor set, a 17th-century English village with tapestry-clad horses in the background. Director John M. Stahl put Cavaliers Cornel Wilde and Vincent Price through their paces: they stride out of a stone tavern and up to little-girlish Peggy Cummings, the blonde Britisher portraying Amber.

Other cavaliers also walk out of the tavern. Their sabres clank. "Keep those swords quiet!" bellows Stahl, a smallish man in dark glasses, gray hat and overcoat. He tells Peggy, Vincent and Cornel to stand farther apart.

All ready now—all ready to shoot. No, the rack-supported shrubbery bordering the scene needs trimming. Greenery men tilt it sidewise, meticulously whack and snip.

An airplane buzzes over. Airplanes are murder in movie-making; their hum louses up the sound track.

A horse, oblivious of all this expensive fol-de-rol, necessitates the

services of his attendant. And a sharp-eyed carpenter, spotting a 20th-Century nail glinting inconspicuously on the ground of this 300-year-old scene, leaps out to pick it up.

All seems ready now. No. The wind rustles the canvas roof far above us. An electrician turns the handle of his arc light. The handle squeaks. Stahl looks annoyed.

In the two hours I watched, they made many tries but didn't get the scene to Stahl's satisfaction. Entering my car I thoughtlessly slammed the door, probably ruining another take.

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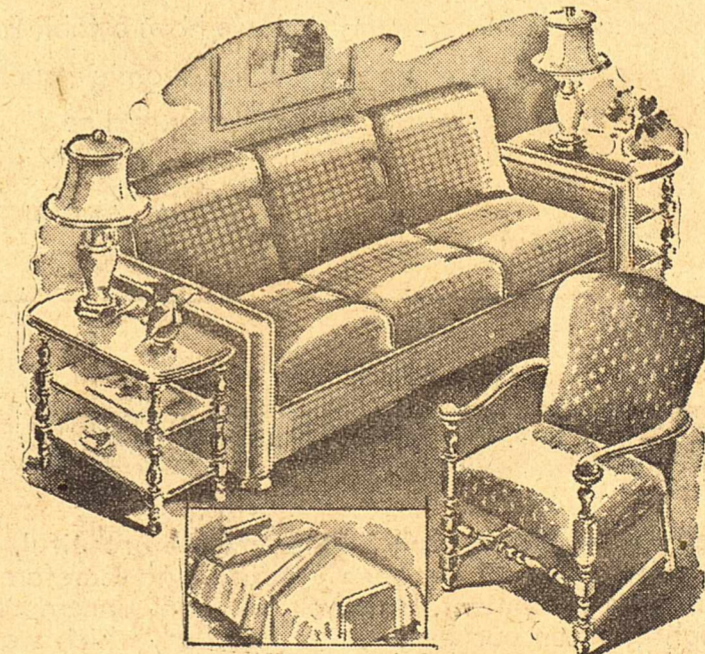
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City's Dump Grounds Looked Like This



Midland's dumping grounds for years looked like a 30-acre magnification of this pile of cans, bottles, cartons and paper. In refuse such as this, flies, mosquitoes and rats lived and multiplied, creating a serious menace to the health of the city. For about 20 years smoke rose continually from fires in the area, and odors poured from the 30-acre tract.

This Tractor Did The Dirty Work

Dumping Grounds Completely Transformed

Sanitary Fill Method Stops Health Menace

Been down in the dumps lately? Midland citizens who have in recent weeks visited the dumping grounds east of the city have come away awed at the change which has come over the 30 acres the city has been using for some 30 years or more as a disposal place for all kinds of rubbish and refuse. The once unsightly area just east of the Latin-American section looks as if it is has been swept clean of all the old car bodies, tin cans, paper boxes and other refuse which long have dominated it. There's no rubbish in sight in this area which once comprised an ugly view on the approach to the city and which has for years been a great menace to the health of the city's inhabitants.

Refuse Simply Buried
It hasn't been swept clean. All the refuse has simply been buried, along with the thousands of rats and innumerable flies, maggots, and mosquitoes. The city has taken a modernistic viewpoint in regard to its dumping grounds, and has adopted the "sanitary fill" method of disposal.

Until recently, garbage, dead animals, tin cans, refuse of all kinds and the thousand and one items which find their way to a dumping ground have been scattered in the 30-acre tract owned by the city. In these piles of rubbish mosquitoes have bred by the millions, and rats have gorged themselves, grown fat and reproduced by uncountable numbers. Fires started in the area have smoldered for days, sending a pall of smoke over the eastern part of the city. Great swarms of green flies have buzzed over the garbage, flying off into the city to spread their germs. Maggots have wriggled over the carcasses of dogs, cats and horses thrown out on the ground, and have turned into flies to add to the health danger. Over the entire section have hovered the sickening odors of death, decay and fermentation.

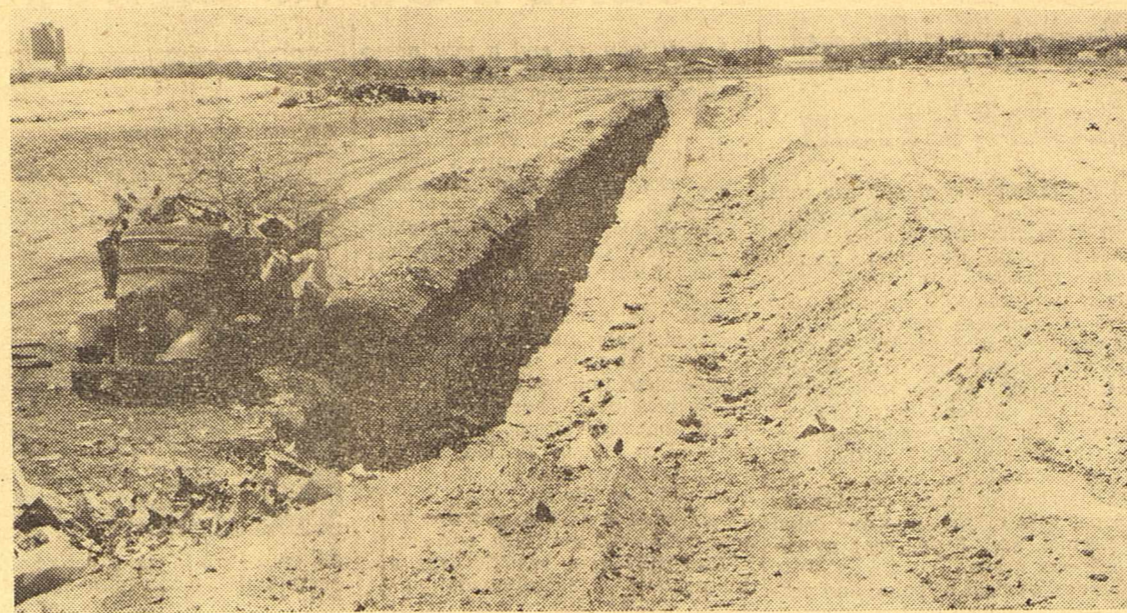
Last year the city decided to do something about the years-old mess. Investigation disclosed that an incinerator, most commonly used method of rubbish disposal, would be both too costly and too inefficient. The cost of operation was estimated at about \$30 a day, while the installation cost probably would exceed \$90,000. All refuse would have to be sorted, requiring additional labor. After the dumped material was burned there still would be the problem of disposing of ashes and metals.

Idea From Army Camps
The city, taking a cue from many Army camps, decided on the modern and efficient "sanitary fill" method. Its success had been attested to by health officers of Army camps and by sanitarians in a number of cities throughout the country.

To start its program, the city purchased a bull clam tractor and hired an operator. Then it took on the tremendous task of clearing off the piles of old automobile bodies, cans and other refuse which dotted the dumping ground and the streets and other areas of the nearby Spanish-American section. Long trenches were dug with the bull clam, and much of the rubbish was pushed into it, thoroughly rolled, then covered over with two feet or more of dirt. Low portions of the area were filled with dirt, and the entire 30-acre tract was cleared and leveled. Under the dirt went the innumerable rats, mosquitoes and flies—buried and smothered, their breeding places destroyed.

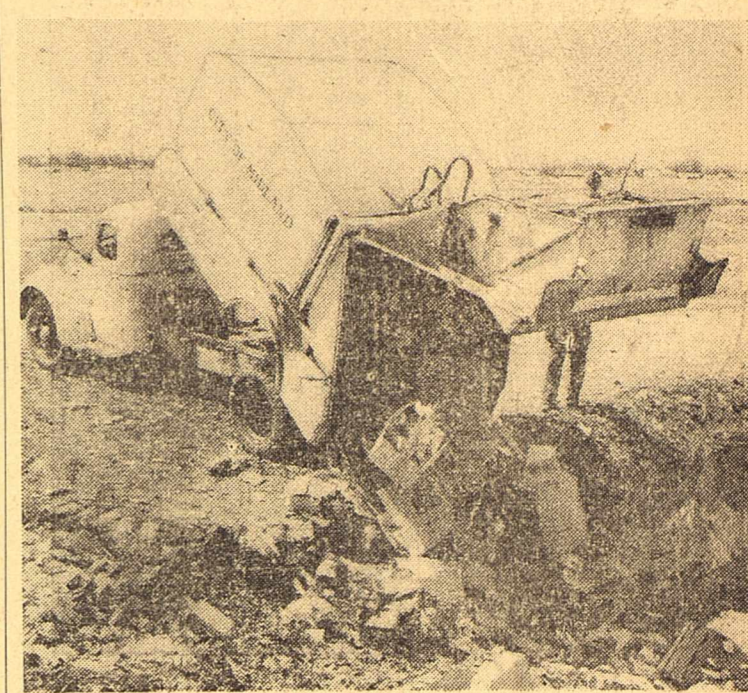
Gone were an estimated 1,000 old car bodies, including hundreds moved from areas near the highway approaches to the city; vanished

also were the 12 city blocks of trash and cans, paper and garbage. Gone, too, were tons of refuse moved from nearby streets, giving the residents their first opportunity to improve their localities.

Deep Ditch Used
With the accumulation of years of dumping buried under tons of dirt, the bull clam was moved to one side of the tract and a long trench started. It is from six to nine feet deep, about 15 feet wide.

Now the city dump trucks and other trucks hauling trash to the area back up to the far edge of the ditch and unload into it. The tractor moves onto the refuse, pounding and packing it down, smashing cans, breaking bottles and crushing crates, then covers the litter with at least two feet of dirt. Thus, flies and mosquitoes are unable to

breed in the cans and bottles, and rats cannot get at the garbage.

About ten feet of the trench is used each day, and at this rate enough space is available to last for many years. Cost of disposal is very low, and a definite menace to the health and well-being of the city has been banished. No longer do unsightly piles of rubbish mar the area, and the pall of smoke and stench of rotting things rise no more from the dumping grounds.

People Urged To Cooperate
A number of people, however, persist in throwing their garbage and refuse indiscriminately around the section and small piles of rubbish continue to appear daily.

Mayor Fred Hogan urges citizens who carry rubbish to the dumping grounds to dispose of it at the end of the trench now being filled, and to refrain from leaving it elsewhere

in the area. If the latter practice continues, the purpose of the sanitary fill will be defeated and the old condition will arise again.

By adopting the "sanitary fill" method of disposal, Midland falls in line with many other progressive cities of the nation, and is drawing the praise of health authorities. At the same time it rid itself of a major problem, yet handles its disposal economically.

As far as the city is concerned, being down in the dumps isn't so bad now.

THERE'S BEEN SOME CHANGES MADE —

Ex-Sailor Declares Wife Who Pulled Her Rate Isn't Boss Of Family Now

There's been some changes made in the bossing-around situation in the Cutshall family of Midland.

Or so says Joe M. Cutshall, baker at Blackwell's Bakery. Mrs. Cutshall let her husband know who was boss when they got married . . . and she had the United States Navy and its regulations to back her up.

On their nuptial date, July 15, 1944, Cutshall was a seaman first class (equivalent to the Army's corporal) in the Navy. Mrs. Cutshall, the former Miss Naoma Lutz of The Dalles, Oregon, was a yeoman second class (staff sergeant) in the WAVES. Since she outrated him, the wife was entitled to give orders to her husband.

Back to 'Frisco The marriage was performed in the chapel of the Armed Guard Center at Treasure Island, San Francisco. Cutshall was a gunner on a merchant ship, and went back to sea soon after the ceremony.

Ten months later he was sent back to the 'States for shore duty—and was transferred to Treasure Island. There he was assigned to duty in the personnel office where his wife worked. He was rated yeoman third class, his wife advanced to yeoman first class. She saw that he had work to do, since hers was the job of running the office.

"She pulled her rate on me, all right," Cutshall says.

The pair was stationed on Treasure Island together for eight months, and in September of 1945 Mrs. Cutshall was discharged under the point system. She was employed in a San Francisco office until her husband was discharged on February 2 this year. They then came to Midland, where his half brothers, Frank and Horace Blackwell, operate the bakery.

Pay Situation Solved When they were married, Cutshall, a native of Cement, Okla., was drawing \$66 per month while his wife received \$96. When he was rated at Treasure Island, he drew \$78 and she drew \$114. She does not work now, so he has the pay situation straightened out.

But, Cutshall says, she still tries to "pull her rate"—but, he declares, he keeps reminding her that she has no authority behind her for it. At least, not as much as the Navy gave her.

"She knows who's boss in the family now," Cutshall declared. "The only trouble is, her idea isn't the same as mine."

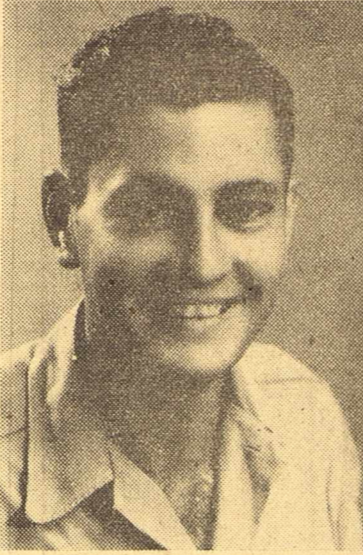
Former Carolina Judge May Be Japs' Counsel

Australia And U. S. Reach Airline Accord

CANBERRA, AUSTRALIA — (AP) — The Australian Air Minister Arthur S. Drakeford told the House of Representatives that Australia is negotiating a bilateral agreement with the U. S. which would confer reciprocal commercial rights upon airline operators of the two countries.

Drakeford said he hoped that a satisfactory agreement would soon be concluded permitting the establishment of regular civil air transport service across the Pacific.

Navy Demobilization To End September 1

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Navy expects to complete its demobilization program by September 1. Effective June 15, the discharge scores for enlisted men and officers will reach their final low point, 23 for enlisted men and 30 for officers.

As of July 1, the point score system for NAVAL Reservists will be abandoned and a plan will be substituted whereby all but a few special categories of the remaining reservists will be returned to civilian life within two months.

Personnel will be started for separation centers in four quotas, beginning July 1, with all to be at the centers by August 20 for processing and separation.

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MackENZIE'S COLUMN

The French Constituent Assembly has made the sensational move of approving a bill for the suppression of prostitution in Metropolitan France, thus striking a heavy blow at one of the forces most destructive to the moral fibre of chaotic Europe, for the old world is experiencing a plague of sexual immorality and its attendant disease which far exceeds anything it ever has known before.

Immorality is a by-product of every war, but the Hitlerian conflict differed from others in that the evil Nazi teachings encouraged it both at home and abroad. The Nazi Fuehrer taught German girls that it was a patriotic duty to the Fatherland to have illegitimate children to provide more soldiers. And in some conquered countries the Nazis conducted a regular campaign of interbreeding, so as to introduce German blood.

Thus we find that large sections of the populations in many parts of Europe have abandoned restraint and that even young girls who haven't yet reached their teens have joined the ranks of the professionals.

France Fights Evil France is one of the first countries to take constructive action to deal with this evil. The move is all the more striking in that legalized houses of prostitution have been permitted since 1877 and there are now some 3,000 in operation, doing a business which runs into millions.

The new law not only contemplates the closing of all houses of ill repute within six months, but campaigns against white slavery and venereal disease are to be inaugurated. Measures also are to be taken for the re-education and rehabilitation of prostitutes. In order to make a clean sweep the law provides heavy penalties for cafe and hotel proprietors who allow their premises to be used by prostitutes.

The crusade which has culminated in the new French law was begun last autumn by Madame Marthe Richards, a Paris municipal councillor who won fame as a spy in World War I.

Mme. Richards said last December that people who were interested in the operation of these houses had offered her 1,000,000 francs (about \$8,500 at the present depressed rate of the franc) if she would "drop this whole business." But she refused to quit, and now has her reward in the new bill.

Report On Feeder Plane Routes To Be Announced

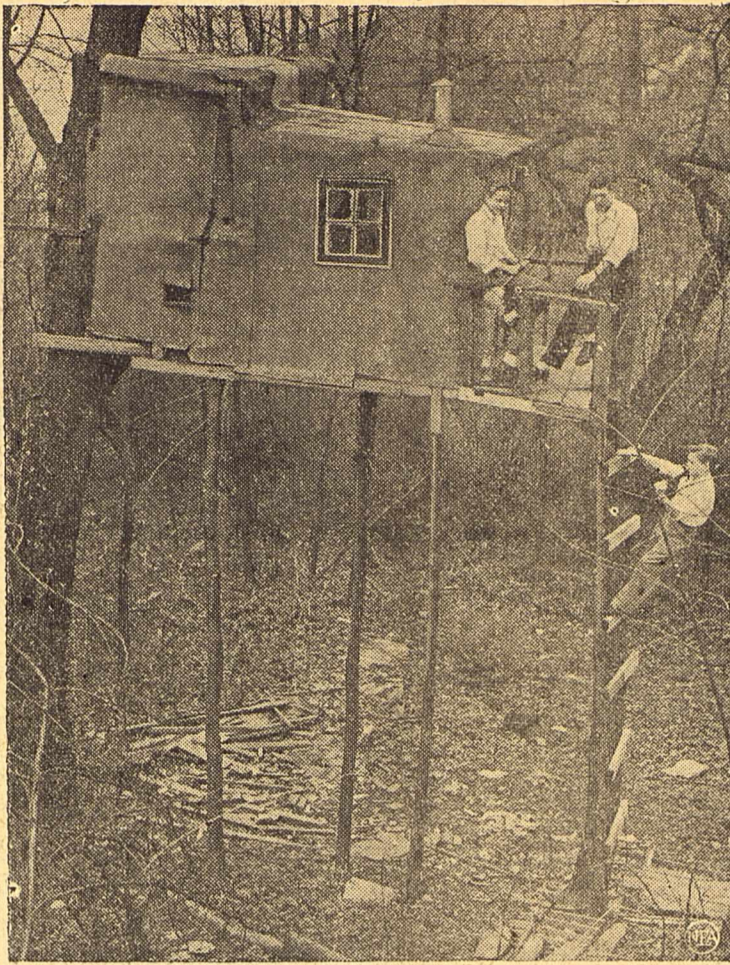
WASHINGTON—(AP)—Civil Aeronautic Board officials said Thursday that a report on proposed feeder airline routes throughout Texas and Oklahoma should be released within a few days.

The report, based on hearings conducted over the Southwest several months ago by Assistant Chief Examiner Thomas L. Wrenn, is expected to include recommendations as to where new air services should be authorized. The board will act later on the recommendations.

The hearings were of an exploratory nature to determine what sort of policy should be adopted regarding service between small towns and communities with larger points on transcontinental air routes. While dozens of applications to establish new feeder routes had been filed when the hearings were conducted, some requests since have been filed with the board, including that of Texas Air Lines, Inc. The company's proposed service would include a route from Brownsville to Amarillo, via Plainview. Other stops on the route are Weslaco, Laredo, Eagle Pass, Del Rio, San Angelo, Big Spring and Lubbock.

Although direct service from Plainview to Houston was not detailed on any of the 12 routes proposed in an application filed March 15 by Texas Air Lines, it is possible that connecting service might be inaugurated to link the two cities.

Cabin in the Sky—Almost

Blockade In Korea Works Hardship As Inflation Increases

By MORRIE LANDSBERG SEUL—(AP)—Korea's economic plight probably is unique among war dislocated countries of the Far East.

Not a battleground itself, this little nation nevertheless has suffered. Few Koreans are sorry that Japan's surrender overturned their economy. But the U. S.-Russian occupation that came with it has proved a definite hardship.

Korea wants to buy from abroad, but has no way of paying. Japanese decrees impoverished the silk industry, which otherwise might have shipped raw silk to the United

States to establish a basis for foreign exchange.

American-occupied Southern Korea grows rice chiefly and nobody is talking about exporting that commodity when there isn't enough to feed the people at home.

Factories in both the American and Russian-occupied zones are cut off by the rigid boundary of the 38th parallel. The South may have raw materials that the industrial North could use but free communication is not permitted.

There is no immediate relief in sight, although the American-Russian commission, now in session

here, might lift the blockade any time.

American military government attempts to increase production are hampered by the boundary line and a shortage of supplies. So far, only a minor quantity of goods has come in from the United States.

Army authorities recently announced plans to import commodities from the United States, but the quantity and method of payment have not been announced.

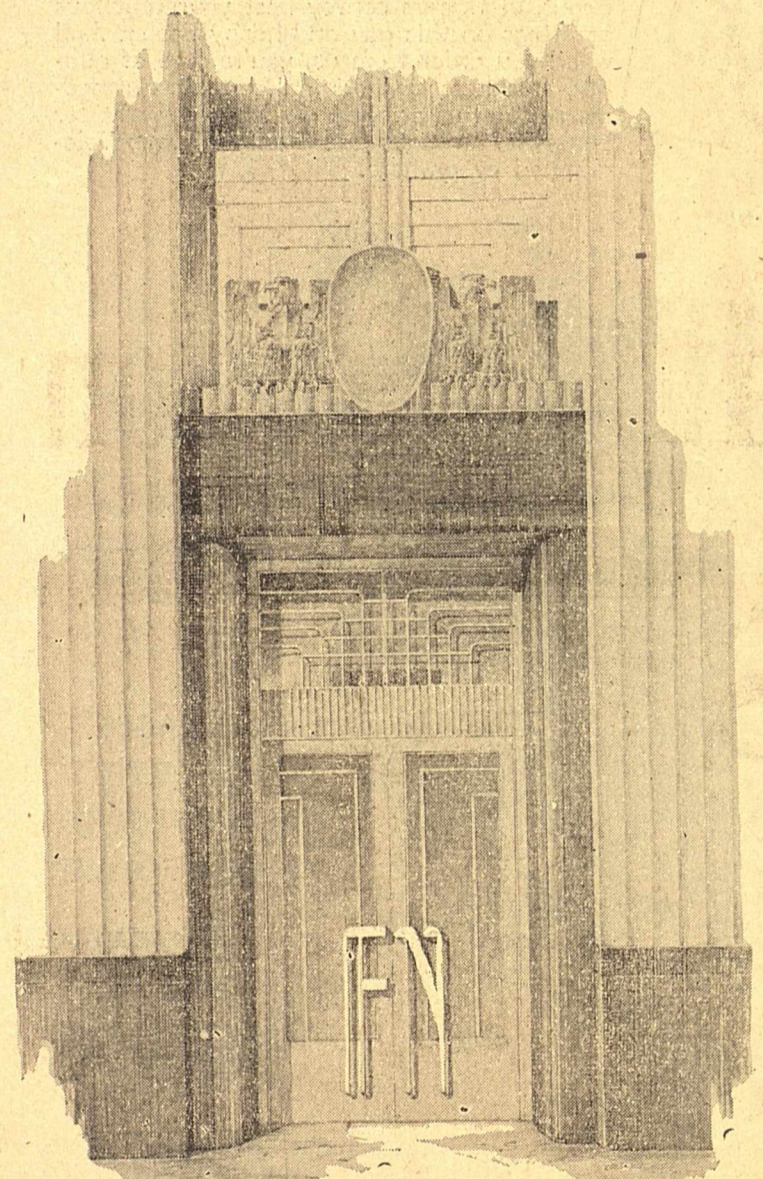

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Amarillo's Kids Incorporated Pays Off With 70% Cut In Delinquency

By HAROLD V. RATLIFF AMARILLO—(AP)—Kids Incorporated does a thriving business in this city of 50,000 perched high on the Texas Panhandle.

There's nothing commercial about it; all the money is going out, none coming in. But the investment is paying dividends in other ways. Amarillo civic leaders say it's worth a billion dollars.

Kids Incorporated is just what the name implies—an investment in boys. Three thousand of them profit from it.

There's nothing new about it. Organized play has been going on for years in the war against juvenile delinquency. But its leaders say no other town in America has a program to compare with Amarillo's in scope.

Sheriff Bill Adams and Chief of Police Sid Harper are its greatest boosters.

"Cases of boys brought before me during the time Kids Incorporated has been operating are 70 per cent less than before it started," comments the sheriff.

Neighborhood Trouble Gone "Our kid walk for neighborhood mix-ups are almost nil," says Harper. "We think so much of Kids Incorporated that we're furnishing coaches from the police department to direct two teams in softball this summer."

The program has taken organized athletic competition into every neighborhood in Amarillo and such outlying precincts as Tech Village, Canyon and Boys Ranch. The latter is a home for underprivileged boys, founded a decade ago.

Kids Incorporated is the outgrowth of Amarillo's famed Maverick Club, an organization devoted to play for kids. Boys athletics outgrew the Maverick Club, which primarily served one specific area of the city and was of benefit only to a few hundred youngsters. Thus came Kids Incorporated.

The idea for the whole thing is quite simple: there's a game on the corner lot or school grounds. A boy sees his pal playing and wants to try himself. He is given the chance and another athletic enthusiast is born. Kids interested in sports and play don't have time or desire for the things that make them debts instead of credits to the community. Leadership of the business men who coach them gives the ideals that make for good citizenship.

It takes \$10,000 a year for the organized sports program—that and a lot of work by a great many people who pay the freight on this gigantic promotion of boys' athletics. Kids Incorporated furnishes coaches, equipment, officials, awards, public recognition and places to play football, softball, baseball and basketball. It provided scheduled contests. Everything is worked out to the last detail.

Hundreds of boys who formerly

had no desire for sports are playing now simply because they have been exposed to athletics for the first time.

Here's an idea of the scope: 77 teams of boys from eight to 14 years of age have just finished playing 480 basketball games in 60 days. That's an estimated 40,425 boy hours consumed by kids in practicing and playing games during the season.

Civic clubs, the Women's Junior Welfare League and individuals vie with each other in contributing to the upkeep of Kids Incorporated. The city and county get in on the program, too. They not only give money but do the work of building playing fields and backstops.

The kids who don't play are missing something—but just try to find one who doesn't.

Fire Losses Increase 38 Per Cent In 1946

BOSTON—(AP)—A 48 per cent increase in "large loss" fires in the United States and Canada during the past three months was reported by the National Fire Protection Association.

Percy Bugbee, general manager of the association, termed this destruction—fires exceeding \$50,000 in loss—the "silent partner of inflation," adding that housing, food and clothing shortages are "critically aggravated by the rising fire loss with the resultant bulges in our price structure."

Bugbee said heaviest losses were suffered by clothing and dry goods stores, hardware and appliance shops, food markets and restaurants.

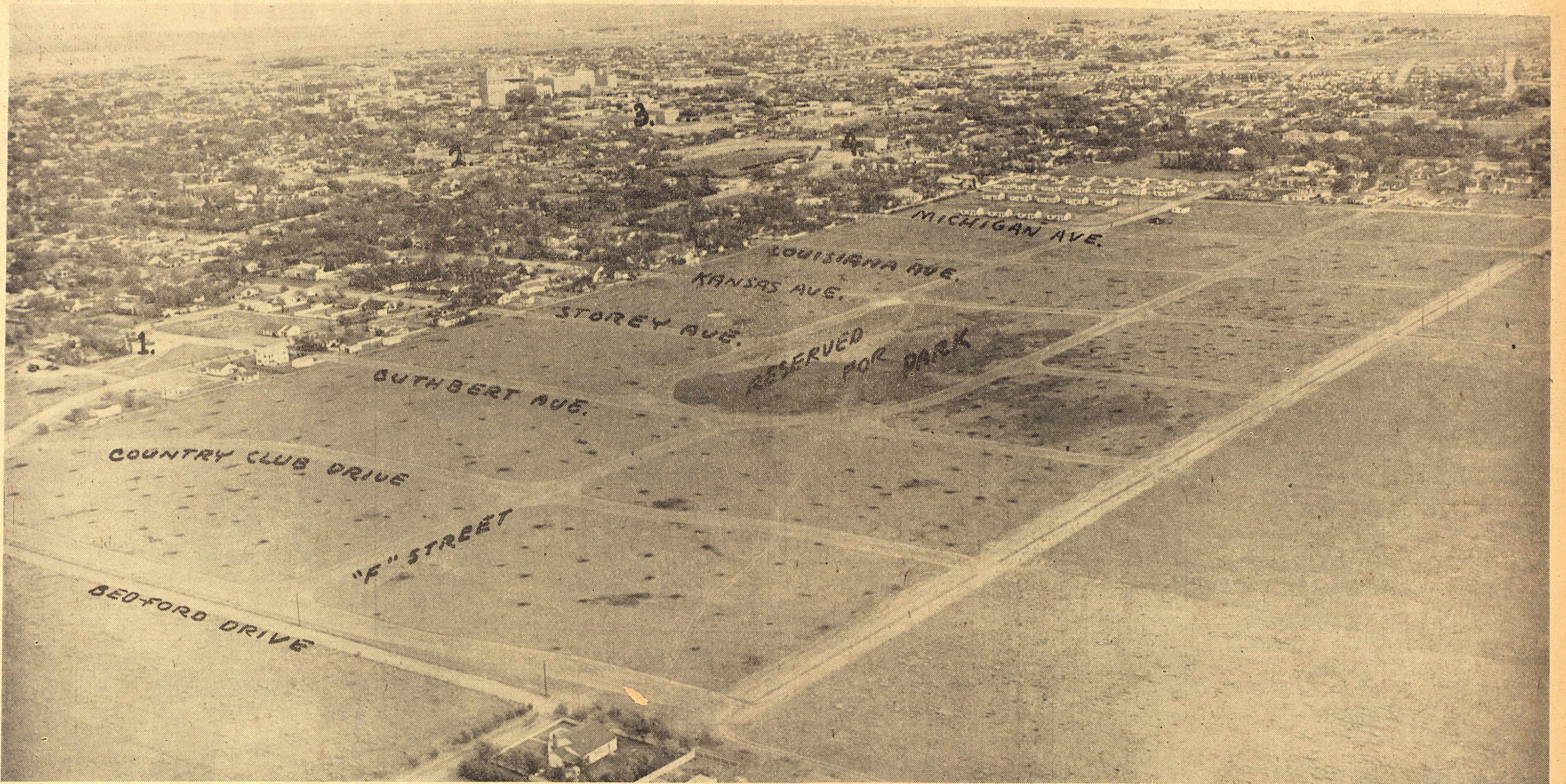
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The Heart To Find

Development Of Acid Ointment For Burns Announced By Society

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. —(AP)—Development of a new "acid ointment" for burns, which removes dead skin painlessly—without need of a surgeon's knife or brushing—was announced here to the American Chemical Society.

The ointment—for treatment of second degree burns—was described by Drs. Albert M. Matlocks and Wilbur A. Lazier of Southern Research Institute, Birmingham, Ala.

They told the chemists, who complete their 109th meeting, that the ointment was basically a dry, stable, easily wettable powder "capable of producing on addition of water an acid ointment effective for the cleansing of burns."

When applied, it is a clear, jelly-like substance, the doctors said, adding its action was to remove the dead skin from the burn surface "without pain or the destruction of islands of living tissue."

They said that before they and another group of investigators at Yale University had undertaken this line of research, the only method of removing dead tissue was "by surgery or brushing."

Brain Concussion Detection

At the same time, Dr. M. Spiegel-Adolf and a group of colleagues from Temple University announced a new technique for detecting brain concussions.

It consists of employing invisible, ultra-violet light rays, directed against a sample of cerebrospinal fluid tapped from a patient thought to have a concussion.

If a concussion is present, cells in the sample of spinal fluid will be disturbed in such a way as to absorb rays of the ultra-violet light—and this absorption can be measured, the doctors said.

If there is no concussion, the cells in the fluid will absorb none of the invisible rays.

The reason visible light cannot be employed for such tests is that cerebrospinal fluid is colorless and does not show optical absorption in visible light.

Beginning with the raw materials and continuing every step of the way in its production, a single engine for military aircraft received an accumulated total of 50,000 individual inspections.

Traffic Accidents So Alarming That Truman Calls National Meeting

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Take it easy with your automobile and—if you don't have a car—look out for cars.

Cars are killing people at a startling rate. It's so startling that President Truman has called a national conference to halt it.

The worst year in history for auto deaths was 1941 when 40,000 Americans were killed.

At the present rate, the National Safety Council estimates 38,000 will be killed this year.

In January and February, a total of 5,450 were killed, or more than 45 per cent above the number killed in the same months in 1945.

The council estimates, another 5,450 or so will have been killed in March and April.

And the injured in those four months? The council's estimate is 370,000.

Why the sudden spurt of death on the streets and highways? People have gasoline, new cars are coming and they don't mind tearing around in their old ones.

The wartime controls, which called for slower driving and careful use of automobiles, are gone.

As early as last December, seeing the rising death rate, President Truman took steps to save lives by the time warm weather driving started.

Conference in May

He said then he wanted a conference—it's called the President's Highway Safety Conference—here in Washington May 8, 9 and 10.

He named Philip B. Fleming, who is federal works administrator and thus boss of the Public Roads Administration, to be conference chairman.

Governors of all the states have been invited to attend the conference as heads of their state delegations.

These delegations will include chiefs of state police, highway and motor vehicle commissioners, other state officials and representatives of groups interested in safety.

What they do will be done voluntarily back in their own states.

Fleming has organized, meanwhile, a committee of leaders in the traffic field.

This committee has set up a number of subcommittees to study special traffic problems.

The subcommittees will make their reports to the conference when it opens.

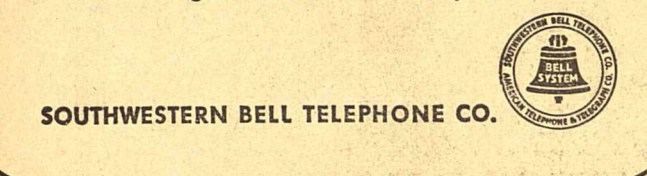

Amendment Simplifies Manner In Which Vets May Obtain GI Loan

WASHINGTON — No longer will veterans wanting GI loans wear out their pen hand signing documents. New Veterans Administration (VA) loan regulations, the result of the amended GI Bill, call for the veteran's signature in one place just once.

Take the form being distributed to supervised lending institutions to be used when a veteran wants a government-guaranteed home loan under the GI Bill. (Similar forms have been issued to cover farm and business loans.)

Three-quarters of the way down on the back of the application form is a box headed "Must be signed by veteran." It reads (a) "I declare I do not have an application pending for a loan for the purposes stated herein; (b) I previously have used my guarantee benefit for other

loan or loans as follows: \$..... for real estate; \$..... for non-real estate."

Greatly Simplified
Then follows the request to the administrator for endorsement of honorable discharge or certificate of eligibility for whatever the amount

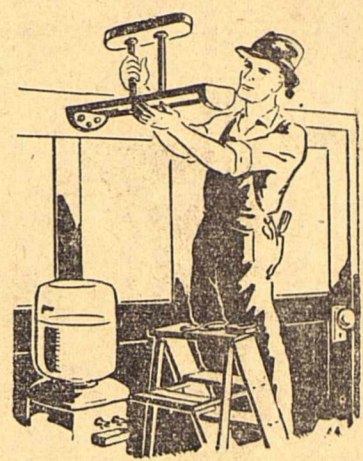
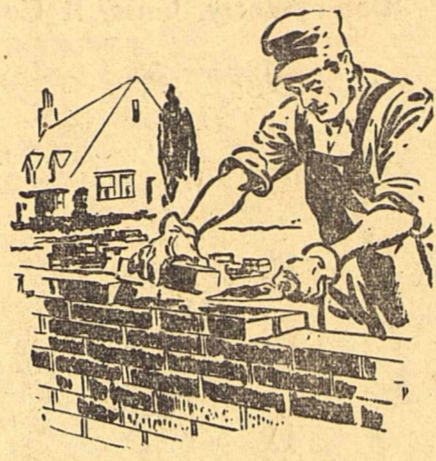
It used to be "reasonable and normal." Since few values today are "normal," many otherwise sound loans could not be made.

Discharge Is Certificate
The veteran's honorable discharge now automatically becomes his certificate of eligibility. He doesn't have to apply to the VA for one.

Veterans who have no honorable discharge still have to make application to VA for the certificate of eligibility. The VA takes a keen look at the conditions surrounding his discharge, and if they are not dishonorable a certificate is issued.

The new loan regulations also do these things:

1. Increase the amount of the guarantee to \$4,000 on all real estate loans. The maximum used to be \$2,000.
 2. Extend the time during which veterans may take advantage of their GI loan privileges from two to 10 years after the official end of the war.
 3. Extend the period in which loans must be repaid to 25 years for home loans and 40 years for farm loans.
 4. Provide for the VA to insure loans, instead of guaranteeing them. VA can insure 15 per cent of the aggregate of loans made by any one lender to any number of veterans. VA says this plan should broaden the scope of credit assistance to veterans.
 5. Allow the cost of a lot on which a veteran wants to build a home to be included in the loan.
 6. Allow GI loans to veterans for delinquent indebtedness.
 7. Broaden and liberalize farm loans so that the loan may be used for practically every ordinary farming purpose.
 8. Allow inventory and working capital to be included in business loans.
 9. Extend loan privileges to men on terminal leave and servicemen who are hospitalized pending final discharge.
- If you're a veteran and want a GI loan, don't write the Veterans Administration about it. The VA lends no money. The place to go is your local bank or trust company.
