# Red Troops Break Into Manchurian Capital

CHUNGKING—(P)—A Chinese government dispatch said Tuesday that Communist troops had broken into the Manchurian capital of Changchun after a night of un-

A government military spokesman reported dispatches from Changchun up to midnight Monday indicated that the slim government garrison still clung to at least a portion of the city. The spokesman said the Changchun garrison numbered no more

(A pooled dispatch from U. S. correspondents in Changchun estimated the Chinese Communists had 40,000 men surrounding the city.)
The nearest substantial reinforcements were nearly 70 miles to the southwest, where the U. S .- equipped Chinese First Army was fighting around the railway junction city of Szepingkai.

This force has been held up for days by stubborn Communist resistance and it was a question whether the First Army could reach Changchun before the garrison fell.

# Council Action Delayed

United Nations secretarygeneral expressed doubts Tuesday that the Security Council could retain the heated Russian-Iranian case

on its agenda. In a memorandum submitted before the council convened Tuesday Secretary-General Trygve Lie said that Iran's withdrawal of the complaint "would seem to remove the question automatically from the

genda." "There may well be no way," he said, "in which the council may keep the Iranian case before it. His memorandum was referred to he council's committee of experts for a decision within two days.

Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., resuming the debate against Russia's proposal to drop the Iranian case from the agenda immediately, charged that Andrei A. Gromyko, Russian delegate, had "questioned the motives of the United States. Stettinius said he regretted the Soviet action. Then he stated again his judgment that it would be unwise for the council to drop the

ranian matter." He said the council could not igore the fact that "the sudden reversal of the Iranian position octurred while Soviet troops still were hysically in Iran."

Stettinius said his opposition to he Russian attempt to erase the case from the agenda did not in any way mean that the United States questioned Russia's integ-

Gromyko, taking up the case after Stettinius spoke, said that Russia and Iran have reached an agreement on all points and that both the Soviet and Iranian governments wanted the case dropped. Calling Stettinius' position "illog-



Well, here I am in this place where you are supposed to do as the Romans do.

I don't know whether to build a statue or try to sell something on the black market. That's what the Romans seem to be doing mostly. What a wonderful place this would be to start a scrap metal drive! I never saw so many statues and monuments in my life. They certainly must have a strong sculptors union to get so many contracts.

The clothing shortage is reflected in the statues. All over town you see lovely nude bronze and cast iron ladies riotously squirting water through their teeth, wrestling with fishes and holding up stone porches. After walking around among these undressed nymphs you get the slightly insane feeling you ought to

step up and help shoulder a porch. There is no end or beginning to the black market here. It affects all classes and there is little moral feeling about it. We ran into it as soon as we arrived by air from Athens. Before we left the airfield several shady characters sidled up to ask "anything you want to sell, Joe?" or "want some money changed, Joe?"


