Election Winner To Guide Islands. In Independence

MANILA-(AP)-A rumon sent Presidential Candidate Manuel Roxas scurrying in to hiding Tuesday as nearly 3,000,000 Filipinos quietly elected leaders to guide them in the first years of their independ-

The grounds of Roxas' residence were ominous with machineguns and a detachment of the Pilippine army, but the city was unusually

Roxas, who is president of the territorial senate, earlier had conceded that President Sergio Osmena would win four provinces, but claimed victory for himself by 300,000.

Manila returns were expected t be complete Tuesday afternoon, but some sources estimated it would require several days to report results ing archipelago. Air courier service and radio communications probably can finish the task before Saturmilitary police headquarters predicted. Communications were badly disrupted by the war.

The winner will be in the office when the islands achieve complete independence from the United States July 4.

Trainmen and Engineers will deide in a closed meeting beginning Wednesday whether the nation's rail transportation system will continue in operation after May 18 or be tied up by a strike.

Veterans' Housing

In spite of all the good intentions of Congress and the FHA, it is quite possible that the veterans' housing program will wind up as a disservice to the very people whom it is designed to help.

First of all, the sponsors of this program seem to view the veterans en masse as something of a race apart. Some veterans may prefer a colonial farmhouse or a Victorian homestead. But the housing program, with wellmeant generosity, is earmarking practically all purchases and rentals of new dwellings for veterans. In doing so, it is also restricting the veterans to this type of building.

The majority of veterans have signified a need for housing. And some 89 per cent of them, according to a War Department survey, want housing that rents for no more than \$50 a month. In fact, 34 per cent of those questioned said they did not feel able to pay more than

Accordingly, the new legislation concentrates on houses costing \$6000 or less. But building costs have risen about 50 per cent since 1940. So the \$6000 house of today, which rents for \$50 a month, is the house which cost \$4000 six years ago. Today's \$3600 house, built to rent for \$30 a month, is the \$2400 house in 1940.

Needless to say, these won't be much in the way of houses. They will have no place in the better residential sections of any city. They will not be very large or very attractive. It is unlikely that they will be very well made or durable, or that their resale value will amount to much in a few years.

Yet the new housing legislation, when put into practice, promises to limit most construction to cheap dwellings at inflated prices. And by, in effect, restricting most of the veterans whom it is trying to help to these dwellings, it is restricting them to what may be slum sec-

tions in a matter of a few years. The housing program also limits non-veterans pretty largely to their present places of residence. Many of these non-veterans would like to build better houses than are contemplated under the program, and are in a position to do so.

The normal urge to move or build has been drastically inhibited during the last four years. Meanwhile many families have grown and are straining the seams of their present quarters. Their needs, tastes, and budgets require something different from the one- or twobedroom dwellings of four years ago.

At the same time, the apartment or house where they now live would be quite adequate for a veteran with a wife and one child-or none. For about the same money that the veteran would pay for a newly built place he would probably get a much better value, under existing rent ceilings.

So why would it not be better and fairer for all concerned to permit a reasonable amount of house construction above the \$6000, or even the \$10,000, limit, and permit veterans and non-veterans to build or buy such houses? They also would be too expensive by 1940 standards.

Such a program would seem to offer a better balance between needs, available space, and sound economy than is offered under the present setup.


MEMPHIS — "The services are turning back much better musicians than those they drafted."


