





Let's Start The Show

One of the greatest shows on earth, the return of American industry to peacetime production, has been beset by a sea of troubles. A series of unfortunate delays has kept the show in rehearsal while the audience out front has waited impatiently for the curtain to go up. And too many of these delays can be traced to some of the leading players.

Among them is that veteran thespian, John L. Lewis. Lewis was never more effective in his annual negotiations with the mine operators. He threw away the script and refused to talk about wages and hours until certain other matters had been settled. And he wrote and delivered an exit speech. Then he retired to the wings.

He has remained there, sulkily and aloof, knowing that the show can't go on without him. Maybe he is waiting for more applause. But he shouldn't be surprised if he starts hearing hisses and cat-calls instead. For the audience is getting a little tired of his backstage tempera-

From what can be pieced together of this behind-thescenes pout, it seems that Lewis wants a "health and welfare fund," presumably to be financed by the operators on a royalty-per-ton basis and administered by the union. But having made his general demand, he seems unwilling to discuss its implementation with the mine owners.

The operators apparently don't warm up to the royalty idea. But they have offered to make joint contributions with the union to such a fund, which would be administered by an outside agency such as the Red Cross. They also have offered to turn over funds collected from miners' pay for medical and hospital service to any local unions that are dissatisfied with the way these funds are now being used.

Furthermore, the operators have agreed to accept workmen's compensation laws in states where the observance of such laws is optional. And they have proposed that joint committees of miners and operators get together to study state mining laws in the interest of

No one can blame Lewis for wanting protection for his miners in their hazardous calling. They deserve the fullest coverage of compensation payments, inexpensive hospital and medical treatment, death and survivor bene-They must demand and secure working conditions of the greatest possible safety.


In short, there is nothing wrong with Lewis's goals. But there is something obviously wrong in his insistence that they be approached only along his one-way road, and in his curious strategy of proposing without discus-

Meanwhile, the show again is stopped. The coal strike reaches out to paralyze again the preparations for MGS Tuesday Luncheon large-scale production and employment which have been repeatedly and dangerously delayed. Surely Lewis and the operators are not so far apart that candid and honest bargaining could not soon bring them into agreement.



Vandergrift Hits Army Opposing Big Marine Corps

WASHINGTON-(A)-Gen. Alexander A. Vandergrift came out fighting Monday to save his Marine Corps from the extinction he said is threatened for it in the pending Army-Navy merger bill.

In language he acknowledged was "unquestionably vigorous," the fourstar Marine general contended that the Army "is determined to reduce the Marine Corps to a position of studied military ineffectiveness.
"And the merger bill in its pres-

ent form makes this objective readibly attainable," Vandergrift declared in testimony prepared for a closed session of the Senate Naval Committee. The text of his statement was made available by the

A member of President Truman's informal council of military elder statesmen, the Marine Corps commandant coupled sharp criticism of age and theories with an underlined reminder that "the Marines are ready.

Are Ready Now "If it came to a fight today," he added, "I do not know who could replace them."

"At a time when the responsible heads of other services are complaining of disintegration of fighting power accompanied by problems of low morale and deterioration of discipline," Vandegrift declared, "I can assure you that these conditions are not existent in the Marine Corps.'

In sharper tones than either Secretary of the Navy Forrestal or Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz used in earlier appearances before the committee, Vandegrift contended that the War Department general staff has considered "the very existence of the Marine Corps x x x as a continuing affront.'



Texas Reserve Officers' Urge Military Training

AUSTIN-(A)-The Texas Reserve Officers Association Monday was on record as favoring a single depart-ment of national defense and compulsory universal military training. The group finished its first postwar convention Sunday, electing Lt. Col. William E. Dahl of Fort Worth president, and choosing San Antonio as the site of its 1947 conven-

Other resolutions adopted favored a Congressional provision for some form of non-disability retirement coverage for "all members of the reserve components," and advocated use of Army planes and fields for reserve air forces officers who wish to maintain their flying practice.

The convention, making a bid for increased membership, voted conditionally to amend its constitution so that reserve officers of the Navy, the Marine Corps and the National Guard could be members. This revision is contingent upon, amendment of the national constitution






