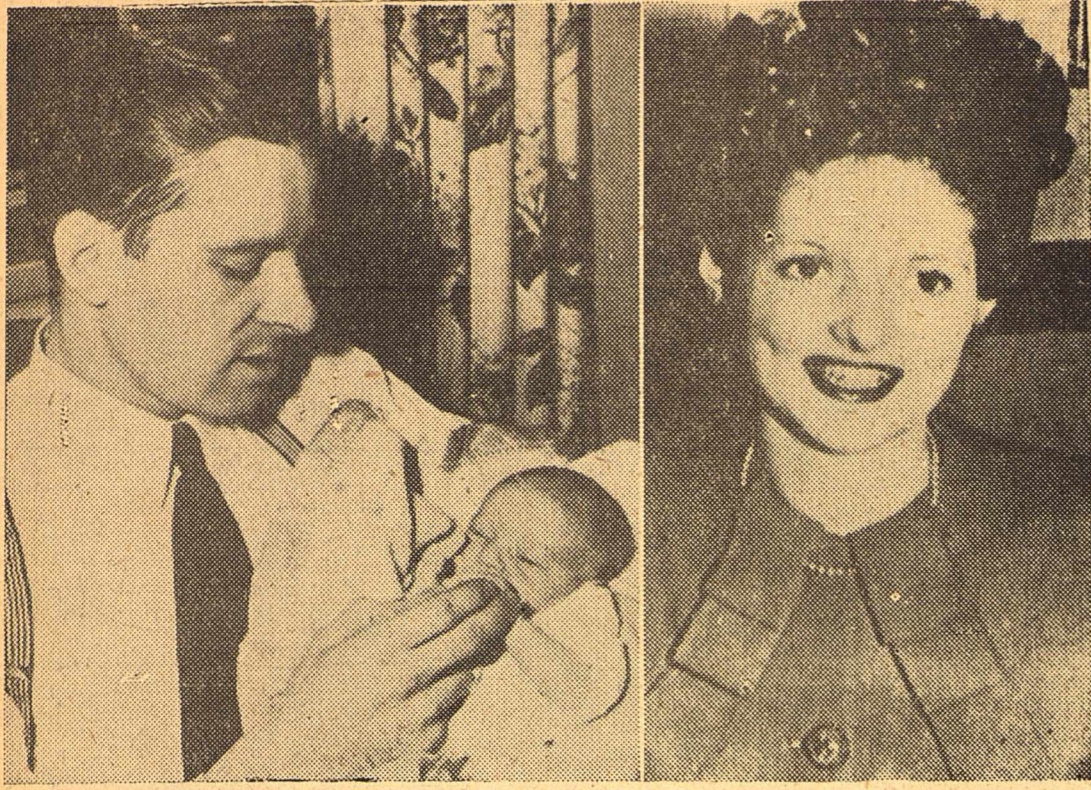

Veterans' Dreams Of Aviation Jobs Are Sure To Crash

WASHINGTON —(P)— Veterans are getting most of the new jobs in aviation, and are creating many for themselves, but thousands of wartime dream flights are certain to crash.

Government estimates indicate that even ten years from now the number of persons employed in the industry will not equal the number of men and women who, while in the services, were hopeful of making aviation a peacetime career.

A survey of Army and Navy Air Forces showed around 1,000,000 were interested in post-war occupations related to flying. Just at the moment, reliable figures on aviation employment are unobtainable except for manufacturing and scheduled transport. But manufacturing has not been hiring anyone. Instead, it has been engaged in readjustment from a giant wartime industry to a 15th or 16th place spot in peacetime.

The airlines have been hiring, however, and giving the jobs to veterans.

Non-scheduled air transport, such as contract carrier and charter flights, crop dusting and seeding, aerial photography, forest patrol, power and oil line inspection, hunting pests and giving flight instruction are among the ways veterans will fly for pay.

But more veterans are repairing airplanes and engines, operating

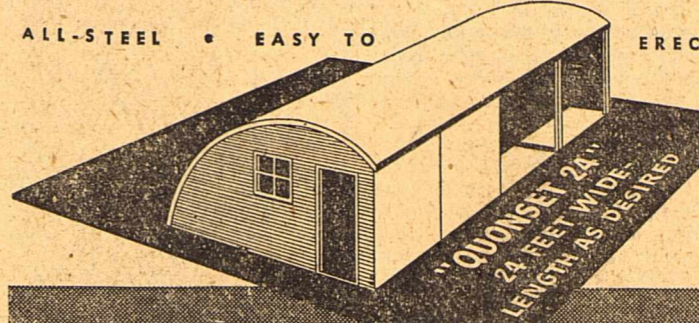

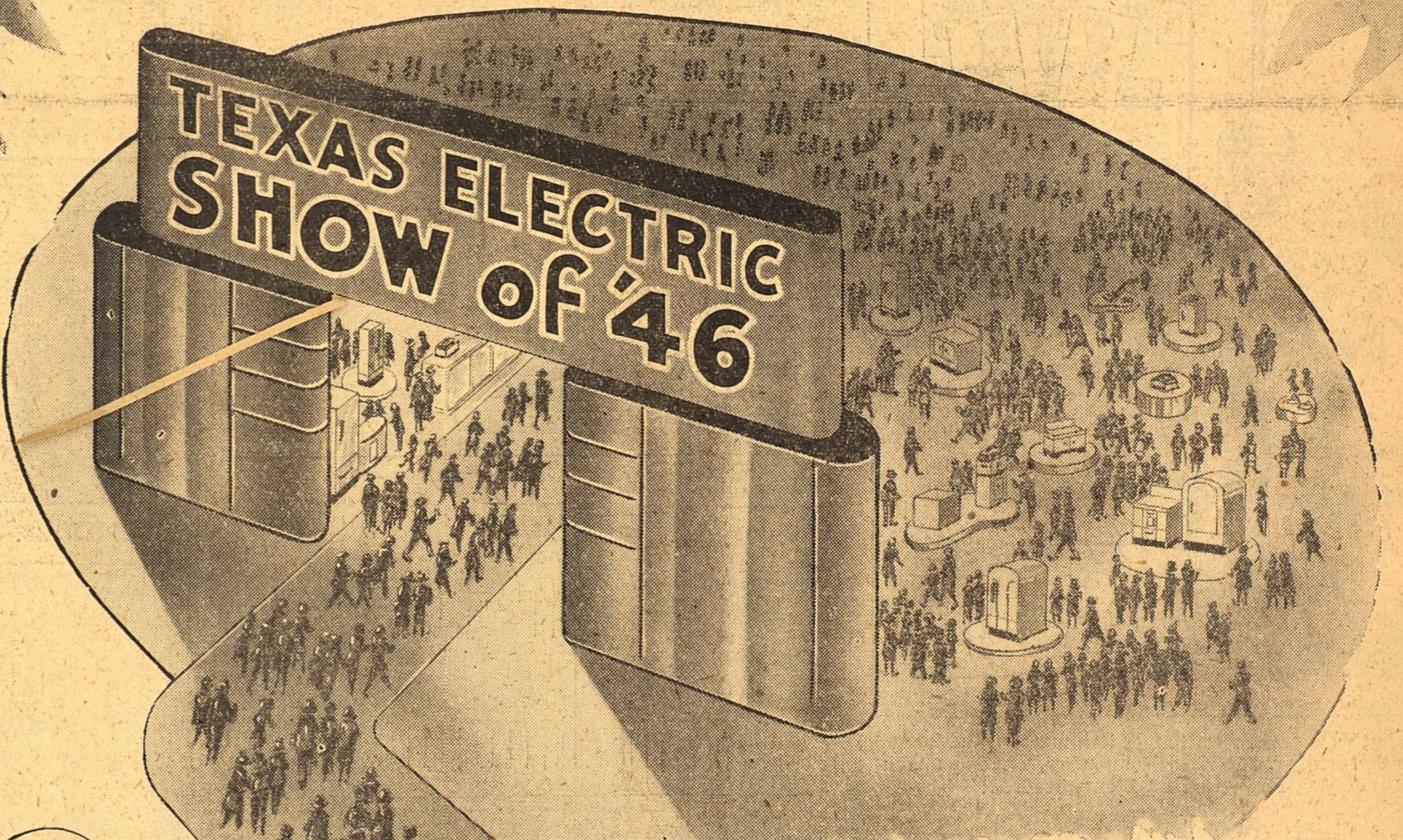

New Air Services To South America OKed

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman has authorized additional air services to Latin America by United States carriers, the Civil Aeronautics Board announced.

operate through Texas points. American Airlines was authorized to operate between Mexico City and Monterrey, Mexico, (even where a foreign government permits such service, the CAB must approve if U. S. carriers are involved).

Beyond Monterrey, American was authorized to operate to (1) the terminal point El Paso, and (2) the intermediate point San Antonio, and the terminal point Fort Worth-Dallas, subject to the condition that service to San Antonio may be provided only on flights originating or terminating at Mexico and at Fort Worth-Dallas or points north.

Braniff Air Ways was granted a certificate to operate between Houston via Havana, Cuba; Balboa, Canal Zone, Bogota, Columbia, Quito, Ecuador; Guayaquil, Ecuador; Lima, Peru; La Paz, Bolivia; Asuncion, Paraguay; and (1) beyond Asuncion, via Sao Paulo, Brazil to the terminal point Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; and (2) beyond Asuncion to the terminal point Buenos Aires, Argentina, subject to the condition that Havana be served only on flights originating or terminating at points in South America.

Braniff was authorized to operate between the co-terminal points San Antonio and Laredo, via Monterrey, to the terminal point of Mexico City.

Pan American also received by amendment to its certificate of authority to operate from Brownsville to the terminal point, Houston, via the intermediate point Corpus Christi, subject to the condition that local service may not be rendered between Brownsville, Corpus Christi and Houston.

FRANKFURT, GERMANY (AP)—The Army newspaper Stars and Stripes reported Monday the marriages of two former United States soldiers to German girls who, by a technicality, circumvented the Army's prohibition of American-German weddings.

Charles Quatt, 30, Paterson, N. J., and Philip Haeze, 24, Pittsburgh, married their German girls during the interval in which they were getting out of the Army and taking War Department jobs in Germany and when neither was in the employ of the United States, the newspaper said.

Quatt and Haeze now are living with their brides in apartments overlooking the Danube River in Regensburg. They were married recently by an official of the Regensburg Oberbürgermeister's office, the Army newspaper said.

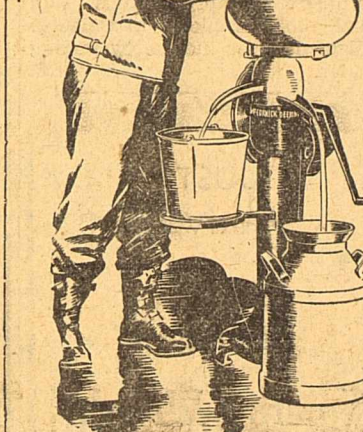
