Senate Expected To Reject Strike-Draft Bill Wednesday

day to vote by late Wednesday afternoon on the question of knocking the draftstrikers provision from Pres-Truman's emergency labor legislation.

The agreement, asked by Major-Leader Barkley (Ky.), came amid indications by an Associated Press poll that the Senate would not accept the draft provision.

Of 63 senators willing to state their position, 45 said they are opposed to that section of the Housepassed emergency bill which would empower the President to induct into the Army those who strike in government-seized industries. Eighceen senators announced their sup-

port of the proposal. Barkley also obtained an agreement for a limitation of debate on the measure as a whole to 30 minutes for each senator.

In view of that agreement, he told the Senate, he would not insist on a night session or on meeting Thursday, Memorial Day. **Case Bill Enters Scene**

The House Rules Committee recommended Wednesday, that the House be given an immediate opportunity to reject or accept without change the Senate version of the Case Labor Bill.

The procedure, if approved by the House itself, will give the members no choice on the various Senate amendments except to take all of them or reject them all. If they are accepted the measure will go

direct to the White House. If rejected, it would go to a Senate-House committee for pos-

sible compromise. The main amendments voted by the Senate prohibit employer contributions to union-administered welfare funds, incorporate provisions of the House anti-racketeering bill, and extend from 30 to 60 days he pre-strike cooling off period. Mr. Vishinsky's Definition

Andrei Vishinsky, famous Russian prosecutor and deputy minister of foreign affairs, threw a shaft of light through what might be called the iron curtain of Russian thought when, in a speech before a group of French jurists, he defined the Russian government as a "democratic dictatorship."

Dictatorship of the proletariat" is an old, familiar Marxist-Leninist figure of speech-a little obscure to the uninitiated, perhaps, but generally taken to mean "dicta-torship by the proletariat." However, Vishinsky's defi-nition was somewhat different.

A dictatorship, he explained, can be democratic "when it acts in the interests of the people." Well, that depends upon what definition of democracy one picks. American dictionaries offer a choice.


One definition is: "Governoment in which the supreme power is retained by the people and exercised either directly, or indirectly through a system of representation." Another is: "Belief in or practice of social equality; absence of snobbery."

By the first definition, no dictatorship could be democratic. By the second, a dictatorship might qualify, though this definition in English applies to social rather than governmental democracy.

But perhaps the Russians have evolved an entirely different interpretation of the Greek words "demos," meaning the people, and "kratein," meaning to rule. It may be that they have hurdled the Greek "demokratia" and gone back to the root words, reading them to mean "rule of the people" rather than "rule by the people."

At any rate, let us go along with Vishinsky's defi nition of democracy, admit that a dictatorship is democratic when it acts in the interests of the people. That' an easy admission to make. By the same definition and under the same circumstances, the government of the Russian czars could have been democratic.

It might be more precise, however, to say that a dictatorship can only be democratic when it acts in the interests of the people, and that when it doesn't it becomes fascism or nazism. That is so clearly implied in Vishinsky's statement that it seems impossible that he could object to the logical conclusion.

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

Therefore, by Russian admission, there is no virtue in the institution of dictatorship, but only in the men at the head of it. This may be true to some extent of all forms of government. But dictatorship gives the people no chance to criticize or change.

Obviously, the heads of the Russian dictatorship (as we may call it now without any fear of giving offense) consider themselves virtuous. Obviously, they believe that they can indoctrinate and choose so carefully that, even though dictators are mortal, their successors will be men of similar virtue.

But can the Russians guarantee the validity of wisdom and virtue in a dictatorship where only the leaders and not the people are permitted to pass judgment on these qualities? Can the Russians point to any government in history which has been headed by a succession of wise and virtuous men? Can they tell how a voiceless people, saddled with a stupid or wicked dictator, can remedy the situation except through blood and violence?

Anyway, we're grateful to Vishinsky for his definition of the Russian form of government, even though it doubtless leaves most of us more incapable than ever of admiring it.

U. S. Maps Plans For 1,500,000 New Maps

By DOUGLAS LARSEN WASHINGTON -(NEA) - With 53 per cent of the United States still unmapped, according to the Department of Interior, there is a desperate shortage of topographical charts being reported by engineering firms, oil companies, flood control experts and other users.

To remedy this shortage, Interior officials plan to speed up the mapping of these areas in the next few months. It is hoped that methods learned during the war will produce 1,500,000 new maps of America within the next year.

Topographic maps, Interior officials claim, are greatly needed to assist the makers of automobile highway maps, for building air fields, improving rivers and harbors, for the prosecution of power and irrigation enterprises, for forest administration and scores of other purposes.

Ten states, the District of Columbia and Hawaii may be considered completely mapped in the sense that official maps of these states and territories show the actual shape and elevation of the land surface, streams and drainage, the location and extent of cities and towns, Dectors call it bibliotherapy.
