





#### Italy Chooses Between Monarchy, Republic In Sunday's Elections

ROME - (A) - Clashes between Monarchists and Republicans broke out in Milan Saturday on the eve of Italy's plebiscite on whether to keep the royal House of Savoy or to start back on the road from Fascism and defeat under a repub-

The Italian news agency Ansa said that King Umberto II, whose fate will be decided at the polls Sunday, was forced to leave the Milan Cathedral through an underground passage after demonstrators broke through a police cordor as he appeared at the cathedral

Clashes had been going on in the huge Duomo Square while the king visited the cathedral, and in the royal palace square while Alfred Cardinal Schuster, archbishop of Milan, paid Umberto "a visit of homage." Ansa reported.

The dispatch did not say whether the demonstrators at the cathedral who broke through the cordon were hostile. Umberto left shortly after for Venice to complete his "campaign tour." He will return to Rome "probably to cast a vote himself," Sunday, a Royal-

ist spokesman said. In addition to deciding the issue of monarchy versus republic, the voters, with the women outnumbering the men, will elect delegates to a constituent assembly which will write the political, 'social and economic principles of the new Italian state.

The ministry of the interior said the official verdict on monarchy or republic would not be known until after June 7.

#### Measles Cases Show Increase Last Two Weeks

The incidence of measles reached near-epidemic stage in Midland last week, showing a great increase over the reported cases of the past

Last week 75 cases were under treatment in the city, reports of physicians to the City-County Health Unit show. This is an increase of 33 over the number of cases reported the preceding week. The majority of persons afflicted

are of school age, with about onethird being of pre-school age. Reported cases during the first week of May totaled 65, but dropped to 51 the following week and to 32 for the third week of the month. One case of vacillary dysentery also was reported during the week and health officials warned that he disease can easily be spread by lies, roaches or rodents.

Three cases of chicken pox and one of mumps also were reported to the health unit.



#### Officials Report Good Results In Cleanup Campaign

Excellent results have been reported from the citywide cleanup drive sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce with the cooperation of the City of Midland and the City-County Health Unit.

Danger spots in the greater portion of the city last week were sprayed with DDT in an effort to cut down on the menace of infectious disease and to control the spread of flies, mosquitoes and ratcorne diseases. Only a few places were overlooked in the spraying, which was carried out by city-employed workers with DDT supplied by the JayCee organization.

A survey of conditions at the rear of food establishments reveals that the spraying was exceptionally ef fective, and few flies are to be found, M. Graham Smoot, acting director of the health unit, reported Saturday. The majority of the establishments are making special efforts to keep these areas clean and are continuing to spray garbage places with DDT, he said. Residents are encouraged to fo low the same program and to spray garbage and livestock areas reg-ularly with DDT so the work of the cooperative cleanup drive will not be lost. All residents are urged to keep their garbage cans covered, since uncovered garbage will attract flies to the premises.

The health unit has been receivng numerous complaints on improper waste water drainage, and is asking that these conditions be remedied. Nuisance complaints on conditions of livestock and poultry pens also are being received. Health officials are urging persons with livestock and poultry to keep a constant check to see that flybreeding spots are not created.

#### Midland Water Supply Receives Regular Checks

Midland residents need have no fear of the city's water supply being unhealthly.

Regular and special checks of the vater are made by the City-County Health Unit laboratory technicians through the cooperation of A. B. Cole, city water superintendent. The ity has never been on the State Health Department's "blacklist" of cities with poor water supplies, and its water is considered among the purest in the state.


Cole regularly takes samples of the water, from the two tank farms and from various spots serviced in the city, and submits them to the health unit. In addition, each time new pipes are laid samples of the water are checked to be sure there are no impurities in the lines.

The laboratory also checks samples of milk distributed here, and thrilling spectators at the Midland has found no objectionable factors in the supply.

In addition to this communitywide service, the laboratory also runs tests for typhoid, diphtheria, undulant fever, venereal infection and other diseases for physicians of







It may not be alarming, but the alarm-clock situation in Midland hasn't improved much in the postwar days, a survey of stores re-







"But when you get around to figuring the possibility of 51 stars," Sewell says, "you've got a job on your hands. You just can't go around dropping stars promiscu-



#### 'Hell Hath No Fury ...

A labor and salary dispute is brewing in England which, if it really gets going, may make our epidemic of strikes seem like a gay series of clambakes. We refer to this organized pay-for-housewives movement. And if the Labor government can't persuade the girls to go home and forget the whole thing, Honest Clem Attlee & Co. may wish that they'd given the country back to

"We loathe housework," shouts one militant missus. A feminine physician and MP wants "the country to recognize my contribution as the mother of a tough son and daughter." A daughter of the late novelist Elinor Glyn (whose heroines, we recall, seldom suffered from dishpan hands) wants the state to cough up a married man's income tax rebate in the form of a "positive payment" in cash to his wife.

Now, the ladies seem to want their pay from the government-which ought to be all right with a government that's skeptical of private enterprise, anyway. But the plan is going to pose some serious legislative problems for the champions of state socialism.

What's going to be the basis of payment? Obviously, there will have to be a period of apprenticeship, a minimum wage, and a sliding pay scale. The new bride can't expect to rate the seniority of a mother of seven. The rich man's wife (assuming that Britain's social system and tax rate will leave any rich men) can't expect the same wage as a charwoman with a houseful of kids and an unemployed husband.

And what about the husbands? If their tax rebate vanishes in favor of an outright payment to the little woman, they're going to want the best possible bargain. Suppose it turns out that the winsome bride can't cook, and won't wash dishes. The bridegroom may want to turn her in on a more efficient model, or at least get his rebate back. And who can blame him?

And there's bound to be great dissatisfaction among the women. It's easy to imagine delegations of all sorts 35 Levantine picketing No. 10 Downing Street. This group will want an 18 1/2 d. an hour wage rise for each additional child. That group will demand portal-to-portal pay, instead of wages figured only from the time the breakfast tea kettle is put on until the last dinner dish is dried. And so on.

There's only on solution for the Labor government. It will have to fix things up for the women. It will win votes. And the mere male, browbeaten enough already, may take it meekly for a time.

But even that solution isn't perfect. For there's always the danger that the browbeaten worm may turn.

#### Sorry Speciacle

A really serious indictment of Army "caste system" would seem to be present in the whole unsavory mess surrounding the trial of personnel at the Lichfield, England, prison camp for Army deserters. Distance and secrecy obscure the details, but it seems obvious that so far two sergeants have taken the rap for what certainly was not entirely their doing.

In a disciplined arm, no sergeant would ever inflict physical punishment upon fellow soldiers with impunity unless such actions were at least condoned by his superiors. The United States Army was clearly a disciplined organization. Therefore, it may be assumed that the beatings at Lichfield, for which these two sergeants have been found guilty, were either known to the officers there, or else that the officers were so incompetent and ill-informed as to be ignorant of what went on under their

In either case, it is up to the Army to put responsi-bility where it is due. Instead, we read confusing and discouraging stories of frightened witnesses, confessed perjuries, and expressions of disappointment from al-

most all legal personnel actively concerned with the trials.

It is indeed a "sorry spectacle," as the trial judge advocate put it. The situation calls for a prompt airing and a thorough housecleaning, with accent on justice rather than on ranks, as seems to be the case at present.

#### Care In A Crisis

Commercial America is suffering from a housing shortage, too. Veterans are starting their own businesses. New fields are opening up. Established firms are expanding to try to meet the pent-up demand for goods and services. And there is little relief in sight.

Governmental curbs on non-essential construction indicate that there will be no extensive building, except in the housing field, for the next two years. This is as it should be. Yet it behooves the owners of business establishments to take care that the present situation does not

It could become worse through neglect, as A. D. Pickett, chairman of the cleaning and maintenance committee of the Tile Council of America, has recently pointed out. His advice may seem of an obvious sort, but it is worth emphasizing. For, with few opportunities for re-modeling in prospect, proper care is necessary if existing

buildings are to be kept usable. And they must be. It can readily be seen that if any commercial or industrial space is neglected to the point of becoming dangerous or uninhabitable, that much more economic woe has been piled on an already critical situaFar Too Many Doctors



#### Scientist Says Man May Someday Make Artificial Moon

CHICAGO-(A)- Days on earth are getting longer, but you can still trust your watch-because only a second is added every 100 years, says Dr. Harlow Shapley, internationally-known Harvard astronomer, and he declares the moon's to

Shapley told the American Psychiatric Association here that it's all a matter of tidal effects caused by the moon.

"Water in the oceans is pulled about by the tides, and this creates frictional effect on the ocean beds,' he said, "and thus we have a slowing down of the earth.

"The friction is greatest in the Irish Sea and in the Bering Straits-but don't worry, this slowing down only lengthens the days on earth by one second every 100 Referring to the age-old supersti-

tion linking lunacy with changes of the moon, Shapley told the psy-

"Certain types of mental derangenent have been attributed to lunar effects—and there may be some-thing to it." He didn't elaborate, and none of the psychiatrists argued

He virtually pooh-poohed another theory that our lunar neighbor has an effect on plants, saying "there's no evidence that plant growth is appreciably affected by the moon.' Shapley indicated that as far as having satellite moons is concerned, our planet is just a minor-leaguer compared to some of the other

But some day, he said, it may be possible for earthlings to shoot an "artificial moon" into the sky-propelled by rocket power-and cause it to rotate with the earth once a day.

Hohenasperg, which houses them snugly inside 50-foot walls girdled by a deep, dry moat, got its name of Demokratenbuckel (Hump of Democracy) just about a century ago when leaders of the German liberal revolution of 1848 first filled its white-washed cells. Today, run by Americans and guarded by Poles, it is known by the less picturesque name of Internment Camp No. 76. Hosenasperg had a long and checkered history both before and since it got its local name. Another dictator, Napoleon Bonaparte, once scaled the hill to gaze with admiration on the cannon which aligned its mighty walls. German students, sentenced for illegal duelling, strolled across its tree-lined yard, which the Americans call "Central Park"

Chained with great links to the clammy wall of a dungeon in one MOSCOW -(P)-Savings deposits of the towers, the German poet was no time for free speech, after Francesca von Hohenheim. 

Russian Record Is Good

Commerce Department officials said, however, that they had heard no complaints against Russian purchasing methods from American manufacturers and that the Russians had built up a record for paying promptly whenever their accounts, were due.

One other direct effect of a return to peacetime trading will be that big American manufacturers can build up anew their European exporting offices, which already are being slowly re-established.

These offices, many of them in Paris, London, Brussels and Berlin, were responsible for a majority of foreign sales that big American corporations made to European countries in prewar days.

Countries that have been notified by the United States to end purchasing activities as soon as possible are Australia, Belgium, China, France, Greece, India, Italy, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Union of South Africa, Russia and the United Kingdom.

None of the Latin American countries ever set up actual purchasing missions in the United States. Throughout the war their normal purchases were handled by export agencies, with the exception of military equipment, which went through accredited military missions recognized in the United

COPENHAGEN-(AP)- During the final weeks of the German occupation of Denmark one film company here began filming the story of Danish resistance to the Nazis. Friends of Lau Lauritzen threw an armed guard around his studio

as his lone camera ground away. Whenever a German car drew near an alarm bell sounded and actors, prop hands, cameramen and electricians ducked out along a nidden ditch until the peril of discovery was over.

Resistance leaders provided them vith 20 German uniforms by waylaying Nazi soldiers at night. When Lauritzen said he needed a German major's uniform for one scene, the Danish underground leader replied: That's a little more difficult. I guess we will have to kill one. But don't worry, we won't get any holes in his uniform." 6

At this period patriotic Danes were also busy rubbing out their own collaborators. They cornered one on the fourth floor of a build-
