## Two Persons Are Killed, Score Hurt In Naples Demonstration

ROME — (AP) — A monarchist leader charged Saturday there had been fraud in the plebiscite in which Italy chose to be a republic, and demanded Allied review of balloting that doomed the reign of King Umberto II.

Monarchist demonstrations, meanwhile, subsided Saturday after causing two deaths and a score of injuries in Naples, and rioting in Rome and Palemro. Minister of \*the Interior Giuseppe Momi-

### Senators Blast Price Revisions Sent To Chamber

WASHINGTON -(P)- Four dissenting senators estimated Saturday that revisions in the price control law récommended by a majority of the Senate Banking Committee would cost consumers nearly

Indirect costs, they contended, would dwarf that figure. They declared that a year's spiral of inflation could easily result in a 50 per cent general price rise which would cut in half the value of \$145,000,000,000 in wartime sav-

ings of individuals and businesses. In a tart minority report on the price control extension bill, Banking Committee Chairman Wagner (D-NY) and Senators Downey (D-Calif), Taylor (D-Idaho) and Mitchell (D-Wash) declared that 19-member group write a "death

sentence for effective price, wage and rent stabilization." "It is our considered judgment they said, "that adoption of the bill as reported would be as dangerous to the economic safety of the country as the immediate expiration of

the existing laws.' The bill, which provides for exending price control a year past its June 30 expiration date, is to be called up in the Senate Monday. Majority Leader Barkley, who has announced his "strong disagreement" with several of the amendments curtailing OPA powers, told reporters he hopes to bring it to vote by Thursday.

## Government Decrees Death To Traitors As Disorders Continue

ATHENS — (AP) — New disorders were reported in Greece Saturday in the wake of the Royalist government's drastic decree providing death sentences for action against the state, and the Communists charged in a formal statement that the step could lead "only to civil war."

The ministry of public order, asserting that 198 persons, including 17 gendarmes and three soldiers, had

been slain in armed attacks since April 1, said roaming bands of Communists had created a "desperate" situation in the Edessa district of Western Macedonia in new outbreaks.

### Sellers Promises Farm Ownerships For 100,000 World War II Veterans

ver Sellers, in a speech prepared for delivery at the courthouse square of his home town Saturday night, opened his campaign for governor with a nine-point platform and a pledge that he is opposed to any special group which may try to dictate governmental

"That includes the Political Action Committee, the so-called Fight for Free Enterprise, the Ku Klux Klan or the National Association of Manufacturers," he said.

He gave special emphasis to a broad program to include making farm owners of 100,000 war veterans, improving 40,000 miles of farm-to-market roads and raising what he called the "inadequate" ceiling of \$20 a week on workmen's compensation.

His platform also included plans for a research laboratory to combat polio and other communicable diseases, and an extensive plan for preventative medicine.

He said the Texas Constitution does not now authorize any aid to veterans of World War II. He said a constitutional amendment would be necessary to provide any help other than that provided in the proposed veterans' land fund amendment

Farm Homes For Vets

Sellers said he wants to see this amendment adopted in November, and "then should I become governor next January, I will provide homes on the farm-at low rates of interest—to be paid for over long periods of time—for 100,000 veterans of World War II, and those men will be home owners and not tenant farmers."

AUSTIN—(AP)—Oil operators bid: 319,500 for oil and gas leases on 16,527 acres of University of Texas

The university's 19th public land auction was considered record breaking in proportion to former sales on the basis of per acre prices paid. 



How Europe Knocks on Uncle Sam's Door

The good old U. S. A. is still the Promised Land to most of Europe, and this year, 5,000,000 Europeans would try to take the next ship for America if they were not restrained by immigration quotas, according to a State Department visa official. Immigration laws permit a total of 150,000 persons from all parts of the world to enter the U.S. annually. Map above shows immigration quotas of European countries. All save three are expected to be heavily "oversubscribed," with long waiting lists. Typical is France, which has never before filled its quota of 308 per month. In May, there were over 1000 French applications. The three stay-at-home nations are Great Britain, whose citizens don't emigrate much; Russia, where "emigration" is not a good word to whisper within hearing of the Kremlin; and Eire, which has not filled its quota since depression days.



By doing this Mrs. Messick said that the color and elasticity of the fruit was preserved and this also helped to keep insects out. After dehydration, the fruit should be stored in air tight containers, according to the agent. Another solution rec-

#### American Troops Take Part As Great Britain Celebrates War Victory

LONDON-(A)-Britons, overflowing by the millions into London, celebrated the empire's formal Victory Day Saturday with the biggest jubilee since the accession to the throne of King George VI.

A nine-mile long procession of

military might and civilian defense typifying Allied unity in the war drew ovations from the great throngs for the royal family, members of the labor government, Winston Churchill, combat commanders,

and plain fighting men and women. The unity of the occasion was marred, however, by the absence of official Soviet, Yugoslav and Polish participation. Those governments had said earlier that they would not send contingents.

But a small group of Polish airmen marched on its own with the RAF and the flags of Russia, Yugobeing boosted to working speed by rockets. Flight speeds, characteris-

#### \$11,000,000 Used Car Black Market Uncovered

DALLAS-(A)- The Better Business Bureau of Dallas reported Saturday it had uncovered an \$11,000,-000 black market in used cars. The report, prepared for distribution Monday, was based on studies of the sales records and volunteer statements from 55 dealers in used cars, and from surveys of car trans-

The bureau placed the blame for the black market on individuals who sell cars for higher than Office of Price Administration ceilings. It said more than half the sales of used cars were going from individual to individual rather than through licensed dealers.

#### Husseini Leaves France As Arabs Open Session

PARIS-(A)-An information officer of the French Foreign Office said Saturday night that Haj Amin Al Husseini, exiled grand mufti of Jerusalem, had left France, but the time of his departure and his destination were not disclosed.

Husseini's departure coincided however, with the opening Saturday in Bludan, Syria, of an extraordinary session of the Arab League. It was expected the meeting would declare the opposition of 40,000,000 Arabs to the British-American report on Palestine which recommends the immediate admission of 100,000 European Jews to the Holy Land.

THE flags pictured here may be strange to you, but they are all American banners-predecessors and, in the case of the three below, direct ancestors of today's Stars and Stripes, as described in "Flags of All Nations," by Cleveland H. Smith and Gertrude A. Taylor. During the Revolution the colonies had their own flags. One of the most popular symbols was the pine tree, used in many variations, two of which are pictured above. At left is the Massachusetts Navy flag, almost identical with that used on Washington's six warships. Next to it is the Bunker Hill flag, with the red cross of St. George in the canton and a pine tree in the corner of the cross. At upper right is the Bedford of St. George in the canton and a pine tree in the corner of the cross. At upper right is the Bedford flag, carried by the Minute Men of that city at the battle of Concord. First real ancestor of our present national flag is the Grand Union flag, at lower left, flown over Washington's headquarters near Cambridge on January 1, 1776. Use of the British Union Jack indicates that the colonists, then had no thought of separating from the mother country. But after the Declaration of Independence, the Union Jack was ousted and the first United States flag, center, below, made by Betsy Ross, appeared. It was made official by the first Flag Act, June, 1777. Admission of two new states called forth the second Flag Act, creating a flag with 15 challes. This was the "Star Spangled Banner" that forth the second Flag Act, creating a flag with 16 stripes. This was the "Star-Spangled Banner" that flew over Fort McHenry in September, 1814, and inspired Francis Scott Key. As the country grew, the practice of adding a stripe for every new state was obviously impractical, so the third Flag Act was passed, April 4, 1818, calling for the addition of a star for every new state.



## Thought And The Atom

"The unleashed power of the atom has changed everything save our modes of thinking," said Dr. Albert Einstein in an appeal for a fund of \$200,000 to be used in a campaign to arouse the world to the fact that we are drifting "toward unparalleled catastrophe."

At first thought, it might seem that it would not be necessary to spend a six-figure sum to arouse in mankind the basic emotion of fear. The literate world knows enough about the atomic bomb to be frightened of it. The possibilities of "unparalleled catastrophe" have been expounded endlessly.

And yet the history of the past 10 months makes it seem likely that Dr. Einstein and his distinguished colleagues who make up the Emergency Committee of Atomic Scientists would have difficulty in changing our modes of thinking even with 10 times \$200,000.

Men fear the atomic bomb, to be sure. But they do not fear it as a present peril. Face to face with danger, men act instictively to protect themselves. Dr. Einstein and his colleagues plan a nationwide campaign "to let people know that a new type of thinking is essential if mankind is to survive." That, indeed, is a democratic approach. But it also may involve a

longer process than the situation permits.

Might it not be better for the scientists to concentrate their efforts upon this and other governments, and upon their efforts upon this and other governments, and upon the still unformed United Nations group which is to con-trol atomic energy? It is at these high levels that the steps must be taken to save the world from the power which science has loosed and for which it feels an acute and accusing responsibility. To change the mode of thinking among men at these high levels will be a hard



Mrs. Floyd Countiss, Sr., of Midland was the first teacher in the first public school opened at Cotton Flat. She taught the fall term opening in 1909, with an enollment of about 18 students. The school building was a one-room frame structure. Prior to that time a private summer school had been taught in the community. Members of the Countiss family


had been connected with the school since its establishment and many members attended the school. Three Buildings Left Grades through the tenth were taught in the Cotton Flat School







Warns About Blasts

#### Poor Addressing Causes Return Of Much Mail Here

Incomplete addresses are causing large volume of mail to be returned to senders, N. G. Oates, acting postmaster of the Midland Post Office, said Saturday. Most of the mail is "local" mail.

In urging individuals and firms sending letters, statements, and other matter to Midland residents to include box or street numbers, Oates pointed out that incomplete addresses cause delays in delivering the mail and in some cases cause it to be returned because the person to whom it is addressed is unknown by the clerks and delivery men.

"Several years ago the clerks knew everyone in the city and could deliver letters addressed with just the name only," Oates said. "Because of the great increase in population and the constant changing of addresses, we no longer are able to know every person and every address."

Every possible attempt is made to locate persons to whom mail is addressed, but many of them can not be found, he said. Improperly addressed letters are causing a great amount of extra work. On letters and other matter mailed in Midland the office is unable to use the directory service, although letters mailed from out of town are checked against the guide.
