15 Die In Dubuque Hotel Fire

Workers Hunt Wreckage For Other Bodies

DUBUQUE, IA. — (AP) -Workmen were bracing the blackened walls of the Canfield Hotel Monday preparatory to further search for bodies in the gutted structure where 15 persons died when fire swept the building Sun-

In addition to the 15 dead, three of whom still were unidentified, American Red Cross officials said 23 persons remained unaccounted Twenty-one persons were infor. jured, 16 of whom still were in

Dubuque hospitals. Fire Chief Perry Kirch said he believed most of the persons unaccounted for were permanent guests who were registered at the hotel, but had left for the weekend.

Meanwhile, a three-way investigation was scheduled to open here Monday in an attempt to determine the cause of the blaze which apparently started in the basement, raced up a partition separating the main-floor lobby and cocktail lounge and fanned out ond upward quickly.

Coroner F. S. Leonard said representatives of his office, State Fire Marshal John Strohm's office at Des Moines and from County At-torney E. J. Keane's office would participate.

Kirch said there had been no attempt yet to estimate the property damage as the result of the fire, as all firemen had been engaged entirely in attempting sift the wreckage for more bodies. The blaze was fought 2 1/2 hours 75 firemen and there were scenes or horror and heroism Kirch praised the work of civilians who aided firemen and 35 policemen to bring out victims.

White House intimates of the chief executive voiced this opinion privately, following two days of intensive study of the measure by the President and his advisors. Similar views were expressed by administration spokesmen on Capitol Hill None of these officials, however, would say positively that Truman has decided against approving the legislation, which sets up new fed-eral mediation machinery and carries several sweeping regulations of union activity.



Message To Congress On Labor Bill Makes Plans For Action

WASHINGTON - (AP) - Chairman Augustine B. Kelley of a House labor subcommittee said Monday he is going ahead with plans to work out a Congressional solution of the maritime dispute now that other federal mediation attempts appear deadlocked.

Kelley of the subcommittee on labor-management, told a reporter that his group had held off hearings hoping the Labor Department could work out a settlement.

"We had hoped for a settlement by Tuesday but now that it looks like there will be nothing coming out of the Labor Department negotiations we feel that we should get busy right away," Kelley said. Seven unions affiliated with the CIO-dominated Committee for Maritime Unity (CMU) have set a strike date for midnight Friday in behalf of their demands, principally for a reduction in the present 56-hour work-week for seamen.

Keliey said his committee will open hearings Tuesday with testimony from either Joseph Curran president of the CIO National Maritime Union, or Harry Bridges, head of the CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union. They are co-chairmen of CMU. Another witness will be Joseph Selly, president of the CIO American Communications Association.



In August, 1944, the indictment said, McDowell "took part" in a meeting at the village of Focsi between Mihailovic and the chief of the administrative staff of the German military commander in Serbia, Neubacher. McDowell also participated in a later meeting in September between Mihailovic and South Of Production Neubacher's deputy, Sterker, near the village of Panjina, it was charged.





This clothing, sent by the Council, has already been sorted, baled, and made ready for shipment abroad to needy people.

Not only are clothing, bed-ding, canned foods, and money received, but also soap, candles, shoes, kitchen utensils, dolls, carpenter tools, cotton feed bags, and a number of other items needed abroad in war-stricken lands. Goods sent here are usually packed and shipped within 48 hours after their receipt. Over 700 pairs of shoes are reconditioned each week in the shoe-repair shop before shipment abroad.

People are urged to send any usable articles mentioned above to this center. They can be assured of prompt and safe distribution across the seas. Recently over a thousand letters have come from grateful persons overseas, thanking Americans for their donations of clothing and bedding.

The donation from Midland is the second one in the past few weeks. The quantity of both shipments are gratefully received.

A Lesson From Germany

Throughout Europe today the popularity of statecontrolled industry is growing. The prevalent opinion eems to be that the system is not only just and efficient, out that it offers the quickest route to recovery and general prosperity.

All of which lends added interest to a booklet recently released by the Army Air Forces. It contains the testimony given by Albert Speer, former Nazi minister of armaments, to American Intelligence officers in Germany. And a reading leaves one with the conviction that the war in Europe would have been over considerably sooner if Speer had not replaced Germany's tightly nationalized industry with something closely resembling our democratic capitalism.

Speer's efforts are not entirely unknown. The United States Strategic Bombing Survey says of him: "In Feb-ruary, 1942, Speer was appointed minister of armament production with wide powers . . . (He) set about replacing the existing machinery of control with a new organization manned by people selected from among he production managers and technicians of industry. They were charged with the task of increasing production and of rationalizing German war industry . . .

"In the course of two and a half years, the military output of Germany in aircraft, weapons and ammuniion was raised more than threefold; in tanks, over sevenfold.

Those two and a half years, of course, saw a steadily growing weight of Allied bombs fall on Germany. That ferman arms output increased almost to the end speaks learly enough of the superiority of Speer's system.

The Nazis had carefully worked out all their production problems on paper, long before the invasion of Poland. But the highly nationalized, highly bureaucratized plan didn't work. Finally, in desperation, Hitler called in Speer and gave him a free hand.

The result was a program which Speer called "The cific Railway Company burned to to fill an old well near the site Autonomy of Industry." It was a sort of free-enterprize system working in a super-nationalized economy. Speer freed production and production planning from politicomilitary control, abolished penalties against industrialists for quota failures, and turned to the principle of incentives. By operating German war industry much as American war industry functioned, he achieved growing efficiency in the midst of growing disaster.

Wheat Dealers Contend Southwestern Farmers May Hold Crop From Market

By WILLIAM FERRIS

CHICAGO — (P) — A famine-smashing wheat crop maturing in the Southwest prompted specula-tion Monday on the amount of grain which will be held back on farms.

Although yields of the golden grain were greater than expected causing upward revisions of production estimates, grain dealers were disturbed by reports producers were reluctant to send the wheat to market.

Success of the government's famine relief program, as well as easing of the flour shortage at home, depended not only on the output of wheat but also upon how much was marketed. Splendid weather in recent weeks

caused higher crop forecasts. C. M. Galvin, statistician for James E. Bennett and Company, placed the winter wheat crop at 751,089,000 bushels and Walter Scott of the Kansas City Board of Trade estimated 760,000,000 bushels

Both predictions reflected improved weather conditions since the Agriculture Department's May estimate of 742,887,000 bushels. May Outwait OPA

Increasing reports were heard that farmers, angered over the government's handling of its wheat program, might store much of this gain in old barns and bins on their farms. Farmers who marketed their 1945

crop early did not do as well as those who held the grain until later, the Kansas State College Extension Service noted. There were two increases in

ceilings after most of the 1945 crop was harvested, plus a 30-cents bushel bonus. Farmers who held their wheat obtained 48 cents a

bushel more than those who sola during the first eight months of the season, the college service said. Resentment was reported grow-ing among producers at the government order compelling sale of one-half of wheat delivered to elevators for storage. Some farmers

regarded this as close to confiscation of private property. Speer told our officers that he believed the "ex tended theoretical preparation of our armaments is mainly responsible for our low level of production until 1942." He also said that he had told Hitler that Russia and the United States were to be envied because they had been forced to "improvise" their war industries program.

The Speer report is an interesting commentary on the theory, put forth here as well as abroad, that government long-range planning will solve all economic problems. But, more than that, the report may be of some immediate and practical value.

It is being cited by aircraft industry representatives in hearings on Senator Mitchell's bill to establish a nation Air Policy Board. Germany's lesson under fire may give the senators something to think about when they consider the future relationship of government and private industry in terms of our national defense.

Fashion's Latest Decree

Fashions are seldom the concern of the editorial page. But the decree from Paris that skirts shall be longer seems to us a matter of general interest, and maybe even of concern.

The whole world is badly clothed. Even in prosperous America, some articles of apparel are much more scarce than ever before in the memory of living mortals. Yet at this time some omnipotent being in war-scarred Paris removes the pins from his or her mouth and proclaims that skirts shall be lengthened.

In former days, such a command from on high was irrefutable. To question was heresy. But today it's different.

To buy clothes simply for style rather than for need is all right in the piping days of prosperity, so long as the budget isn't fractured. But to buy them needlessly when men's suits, shirts, and shorts are scarce as pearls in oysters is another matter.

So we're all in favor of the Civilian Production Ad-ministration's bureaucratic interference with the oracles of fashion. The CPA is in for a tough fight, and we wish it luck. May it outmaneuver the Parisian general staff, and manfully withstand the expected frontal assault by the country's mobilized and militant nylon lines.


At Least They're There
