Write-in campaigns spark election

Big voter turnout foreseen here

A record 76 percent of the registered voters in Castro County attorney's race here since Jimmy Davis, now serving in the nomination to this office. cast ballots in the General Election two years ago. And despite office by appointment, and Keith Lemons entered the reports of voter apathy elsewhere in the state, many political Democratic primary early in the year. observers predict a turnout at the polls here Tuesday that will challenge that record.

Hotly contested local races involving five write-in campaigns, plus the fact that Castro County native Kent Hance is seeking a seat in the US Congress, have fired up interest among residents here.

Practically all those who voted in 1976 are still registered voters, according to the county tax collector's office.

The official ballot shows only seven contested races, with nominees from the Republican, Raza Unida and Socialist Workers parties as well as the usual full slate of Democratic candidates.

Locally, interest centers in the race for the unexpired term of the Castro County attorney and that for county judge, with write-in candidates for both offices.

Also, local residents are concerned with Hance's campaign for retiring George Mahon's seat in Congress.

Hance, a state senator from Lubbock, is facing a strong challenge from Republican nominee George Bush Jr. of Midland.

A series of legal skirmishes has marked the county

Lemons sued successfully to have Davis disqualified on the grounds that he had not been a county resident for the required time before filing. But before the primary, Davis counter-sued and Lemons was disqualified as the party nominee because he was not yet a licensed attorney.

Both suits went to the Texas Supreme Court.

With no duly elected nominee for the General Election at the certification deadline, the County Democratic Executive Committee opted to appoint one, and chose Davis, who by then had fulfilled the residency requirement. Afterward, Lemons filed as a write-in candidate, and has waged a spirited campaign.

County Judge Weldon Bradley, who was unopposed in the Democratic Primary, is challenged by two write-in candidates -M. L. Simpson Jr., Democrat, and Sam Killough, Republican.

For county commissioner of Precinct 4 Alfons Maurer, the Democratic nominee, is opposed by write-in candidate Gilbert Commission seats. Mack Wallace, a Democrat who is seeking a Schulte.

surveyor by write-ins. No candidates filed for primary

In top state races, all four parties have candidates on the ballot for US Senator and Texas governor. Republican John Tower, the incumbent senator, has active opposition from Democrat Bob Krueger, while the Raza Unida Party has entered Luis A. Diaz DeLeon in the race, and the Socialist Workers have put forth Miguel Pendas.

Attorney General John Hill, Democrat, and oilman Bill Clements, Republican, are in a hot race for the governor's seat, with Mario C. Compean of the Raza Unida and Sara Jean Johnston of the Socialist Workers as other candidates for the chief executive's office.

For lieutenant governor, Democrat Bill Hobby, the incumbent, is opposed by Republican Gaylord Marshall and Socialist Workers nominee Andrea Doorack.

Democrat Mark White, Republican Jim Baker and Socialist Worker Agnes Chapa are in the contest for attorney general of Texas. State Treasurer Warren G. Harding is opposed for re-election by Derrick Adams of the Socialist Workers Party. Contested races also are being waged for two Railroad full term, is contested by Jana Pellusch of the Socialist Also, John Alldredge is seeking re-election as county Workers, and John H. Poerner is the Demo contender for an unexpired term against Republican James W. Lacy.

Bob Bullock is unopposed for another term as comptroller of public accounts, Reagan V. Brown as commissioner of agriculture and Bob Armstrong as commissioner of the General Land Office, in other state races. So is Speaker of the House Bill Clayton as state representative from the 74th District.

Unopposed for posts in the county are Zonell Maples, county-district clerk; Oleta Raper, county treasurer; Gary Lilley, justice of the peace, Precinct 1; Marshall Young, justice of the peace, Precinct 2; and Ed Wilson, commissioner, Precinct 2.

There is no opposition to the Democratic candidates for judicial offices at the district and state levels. John T. Boyd seeks re-election as the 64th District judge and Van C. Stovall as 242nd District judge. Both are incumbents.

On the ballot for Texas Supreme Court chief justice is Joe R. Greenhill; and for associate justices, Franklin Spears, Place 1; Sam D. Johnson, Place 2; Charles W. Barrow, Place 3 (four-year unexpired term); and Robert M. Campbell, Place 4 (two-year unexpired term).

For judge of the Criminal Appeals Court, candidates are Wendell A. Odom, Place 1; Sam Houston Clinton, Place 2; and W. C. Davis, Place 3. Mary Lou Robinson is the nominee for chief justice of the 7th District Court of Civil Appeals, and Carlton B. Dodson for an unexpired term as associate justice on the same court.



County, with maize practically all out of the fields. Sugar beet harvesting is about at the peak and carrots are also moving rapidly to the packing Cotton trailers are begining to come into the gin ards, but growers are mostly waiting for the staple to finish naturing and the foliage to be illed by a hard freeze. In opposite sides of the Othel Fry at Flagg Gin said "cotton is still too green" and only 63 bales have been ginned there so far, while Hart of the Plains Gin reported "just getting started" on the 1978 crop. Fry said he does not expect as good a crop of cotton as last year, when a surprisingly large crop was harvested in this area. The spokesman at the Hart gin said they have not yet gotten reports back on the grade of the new crop. Maize yields were disappointing, Bill Clark of Dimmitt Agri Industries said, but quality of the grain has been good. Acreage was down from 1977. With harvesting just about to come to a standstill, he said elevators in the county still have storage room to put all the grain under cover. Calvin Jones, agricultural manager for the Holly Sugar plant at Hereford, says the area sugarbeet harvest is more than one-fourth complete and the Holly firm was scheduled to put its receiving facilities on an accelerated [See HARVEST, Page 8]



The Occupational Safety & Administration Health (OSHA) has restricted exposure of workers to toxic chemicals and metals such as benzene, lead and cadmium because of the danger of disease. But pity the poor artist. No one seems to be on the lookout for him or her.

Artists often work in cramped, poorly ventilated quarters and work with many of the same toxic substances. OSHA says it has no authority over artists. The Consumer Product Safety Commission deals only with household products. So the \$2.7 billion arts and crafts supply industry goes on largely deregulated.

OSHA has finally decided to hold a conference in Washington to gather available data on health hazards facing artists. Activities of artists closely parallel industrial processes-from printmaking, which uses dangerous solvents, to welding, use of laser beams and toxic styrene. Many paints contain lead carbonate or cadmium sulfide.

One of the few companies adequately disclosing the contents of developing chemicals is Eastman Kodak. It also has a 24 hour hot line to answer questions about its photographic chemicals. In addition, the Crayon, Water Color & Craft Institute makes sure that children's products are nontoxic.
