WASHINGTON - (AP) -President Truman asked Congress Saturday to merge the armed forces under a single cabinet officer and give the Air Forces more responsibility than the Navy want-

ed that branch to have. The President, deciding a disagreement between the secretaries of War and Navy over unification details, ruled generally in favor of the Army position on three points they told him they could not resolve. He went most of the way with the Navy on the fourth major point in dispute.

Army-Navy

Along with the letter to military and naval committee chairmen of the House and Senate setting forth the President's plan for the merger, the White House made public a letter to Secretaries Patterson and Forrestal advising them that the disagreements are "herewith decided."

Truman told the Congressional leaders that the two secretaries, together with Gen. Dwight D. Ei-senhower, Army chief of staff, and Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, Chief of Naval Operations, had "assured me that they will support such a plan" as the one he offered. Army Victory



In 1943 the foreign ministers of Britain, the United States and Russia issued a declaration on Italy saying that fascism must be destroyed and the Italians given an opportunity to have representative government.





WASHINGTON -(AP)- The War Department announced Saturday night that it had ordered the re turn from overseas of non-voluntee enlisted fathers and men with 21 months or more service.

The department also said it had authorized commanders in this country to discharge as surplus nonvolunteer enlisted men with over 21 months service.

The dual action was taken, the department declared in a statement prior to final decision of congress on the Selective Service Act, in order not to interrupt the flow of men for discharge and to fill returning troop ships which now run on regular schedules.

The greater part of the nonvolunteer fathers will be brought back to the United States by August 31, the department estimated. It said that the approximate number of non-volunteer enlisted fathers totals 133,000, situated a follows: 77,000 in Pacific areas, 28, 000 in the zone of the interior, 18, 000 in the European theater of operations and 10,000 in other overseas theaters.

A ban on inducting fathers is included in the compromise extension of selective service now pending before a House-Senate conference committee. The legislation also includes a provision that the service of any inductee shall be limited to 18 months.

# Water Lilies Lend Exotic Note To Your Backyard Pool

#### By HENRY L. PREE

Written for NEA Service The home gardener who is fortunate enough to have a lily pool in his back yard, whether it be large or small, will find it to be one of the most attractive parts of his garden and with less effort than any other section. It is not necessary to weed or cultivate and any of the few pests which attack water lilies are easily controlled.

Water lilies are very easy to grow. Under natural conditions the roots are in rich soil in shallow water of a marsh or pond and exposed to full sunshine. These conditions are easily reproduced in the home garden. Hardy and tropical water lilies may be planted in water a foot deep, allowing six inches of water over six inches of soil. Artificial pools need not be more than 24 inches deep, Twenty inches makes a satisfactory depth. It is best to provide a separate container for each water lily, or lotus.

Tropical water lilies do not grow well in temperatures below 65 degrees, and should indoor plants be shifted to colder water they are likely to stop growing for the rest of the summer. Lilies do best when the water is 70 degrees and warmer. The container should hold at least a bushel of soil, composed of three parts of good top soil and one part old manure. Muck from swamps, soil from woods, peat moss and sand should not be used in the soil. In the absence of manure thoroughly mix a half pound of a 4-12-4





### Anesthetic For Horses **Developed By Army**


CHICAGO-(AP)-A new anesthetic for horses which removed virtually all the danger of injury in veterinary surgery has been developed by Army veterinarians at Fort Riley Kan., the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association has reported.

In instances where the new formula has been used, the Journal said, it was noted that the "excitement" stage which had been present in animals heretofore was either negligible or absent, thus reducing danger of injury both to the animal

and attendants. Animals which normally were vicious and nervous lapsed quietly into comas without the usual accompanying periods of floundering and thresing about, the Journal added.

The new formula, the Journal said, consists merely of the addition of pento barbital sodium to the solution already commonly used as an anesthetic for horses—a solu-tion based on chloral hydrate and magnesium sulphate. The ingredients were placed in distilled water and injected into the jugular vein.



# We Ought To Be Ashamed

It has been suggested that we should welcome the bread shortage because empty bakery and grocery shelves mean that the absent loaves are feeding the hungry of Europe and Asia. That is a fine, comforting way of looking at it. But some of the more skeptical might be inclined to take a less optimistic view.

A few weeks ago Americans were asked to use less bread. Shortly afterward it was announced that there would be a 25 per cent cut in wheat for domestic flour. In a matter of days another shortage was upon us. Why?

There are several probable reasons, though admit-tedly the situation is clouded enough to put some of them in the realm of inference rather than documented fact For one thing, this is the lean period before the new wheat harvest, and thus the added drain of export shipments is felt more keenly. For another, the distribution of existing supplies is not even.


But still, the cut is only 25 per cent. Why, then, has the supply dropped 50 per cent or more in many cities? Part of the answer, perhaps, can be found in the bread queues and in the minds of many persons standing in those queues.

We strongly feel-though there is no way to prove it-that if every American beyond childhood had cut his bread consumption by one slice a day, there would have been no acute shortage. But the mention of short supply in anything is enough to make many rush forth, buy, and hoard.

We saw it throughout the war, when word that rationing of some item of food was to be begun or resumed and perhaps even Lenin. was enough to create a shortage in that food. We see it today in the continuing, flourishing black market.







Today's hand was played in one of the knockout rounds of the Vanderbilt Cup Tournament for the national knockout team-of-four championship.

When the queen of hearts held the first trick, East led the seven of hearts. Declarer won in dummy with the nine-spot and led the jack of clubs. Naturally West did not cover, North went up with the king and came back with the eight of clubs, and when East showed out, there was nothing for declarer to do but cash the ace.

Here is the correct play, which may not work but is worth trying. After winning the second heart with the nine-spot, lead the spade from dummy. When West puts in the tenspot, win with the queen and lead the eight of clubs, overtaking in dummy with the nine.

It is true that a keen West player should not win this trick with the queen, but if he does, declarer will get in with a spade or dia-mond, then lead the king of clubs and overtake with the ace, and the whole club suit will be good.





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
