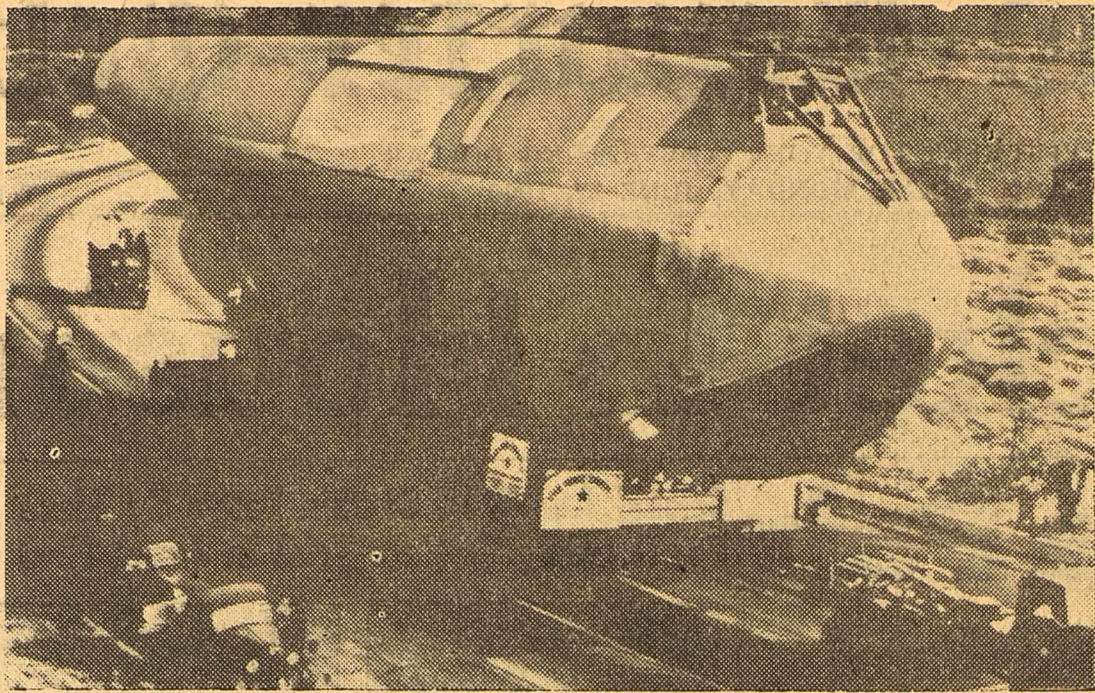

### With Earnings Of \$1,113,035 Film Director Leo McCarey Leads Nation's Money Makers

WASHINGTON—(AP)—With 12-month earnings of \$1,113,035, Film Producer-Director Leo McCarey led a treasury listing Monday of 593 of the nation's top money earners for calendar 1944 and business fiscal years ended during 1945.



Grand Mufti Back Haj Amin el Hussein, Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, in exile for the past seven years, recently landed in Damascus, Syria, in a British plane. Wartime pal of Hitler, broadcaster of Nazi propaganda to the Moslem world, sought by British and Yugoslavs as a war criminal, Haj Amin eluded capture by the British in 1939, disappeared into Turkey, finally turning up in Germany. French captured him there and took him to Paris, where he remained until his reappearance in Damascus.

Automobile Manufacturer Charles E. Wilson, president of General Motors—which put three of its executives in the top ten earners—got fifth place with \$322,954. Wilson was second on last winter's listings for the previous earning period.

The list was the first this year of the treasury's annual reports on persons drawing more than \$75,000 from corporations for personal services. The figures represent compensation before taxes, which cut net take of most recipients by at least 50 to more than 90 per cent.

The tabulation will be supplemented this fall or winter, when it probably will take in Louis B. Mayer, movie magnate who has been top man for seven consecutive years although his most recent first-place earnings were \$204,965 behind McCarey's new mark.

Want some exercises that are guaranteed to take a tuck in your waistline? Here are two, passed on by an Eastern Airline stewardess who testifies to the trimming these exercises gave her. With a class of other hopefuls, job-seeking Sarah Bunting, of Washington, D. C., trained for six weeks at a Fifth Avenue salon to cut a figure in order to meet the transport company's strict specifications.

For Sarah's first exercise, stand with feet apart, toes in, stomach pulled in and stretch while arms

reach for the ceiling. Now, turn to the right, bend at the waist, and reach with fingertips to the outside of your right foot. Straighten up, and go through the same motions to the left. Repeat 10 times, and daily increase the count.

For the second exercise, sit on the floor with legs outstretched and back erect. With arms held straight in front of you, bend forward—keeping back straight—and touch fingers to toes. Next, touch chin to arms where they cover the knees. Sit up, relax, and go into your exercise 10 times at first and gradually increase the count.

**Panic Won't Help**

If Congress abolishes, curtails or drastically amends existing price controls the result may be inflation—or, more properly, serious inflation. It may be, but nobody really knows. For whatever may be argued, pro or con, lifting controls while a scarcity of goods still exists is a gamble, and a dangerous one.

What would be preferable, of course, is rectification and betted enforcement of needed controls now in effect. But even if that is not in the cards, panicky thinking isn't going to help us prepare for the least desirable eventuality. And that kind of thinking is evident in some news-conference statements of the Emergency Price Control Committee, a consumer-civic-labor group working for extension of the price control bill.

For example, a representative of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen predicted that recent strikes would be "just a plaything" compared with future strikes if Congress should abolish price controls. Other labor spokesmen stated that a new series of wage disputes and strikes would be a likely consequence of that event.

Philip Murray, CIO president, called the proposed price-control act "a complete surrender to the forces of inflation." Congress, he said, "has been considering anti-labor legislation by which it would put an end to labor disputes by destroying the rights of workers to strike for higher wages and better working conditions. The Congress could devise no better way to throw labor-management into a state of utter chaos than to remove the last bulwark against soaring prices."

The deep concern implicit in these statements is understandable, and shared by many. But it does seem that a rather emotional approach to a potentially bad situation has already made it worse. In the first place, while organized workers might feel completely justified in striking for more pay, it would be the worst possible thing they could do, for their own sake as well as for the country's.

In spite of what Murray says, there are two bulwarks against soaring prices. One is price control. The other is abundant production. To paralyze production again by a wave of strikes in protest against the lifting of price controls would positively guarantee serious inflation, which the revoking of controls alone might not do.

And Murray is being foolish or insincere when he suggests that Congress is deliberately creating inflation in order to punish labor. However stupid or malicious Murray may think congressmen are, he surely can't believe that they don't know that inflation would punish not one group, but themselves, their constituents, and the whole country.

It would be much more sensible if Murray and other labor leaders would follow the example of the president of the A. F. of L. millinery workers' union, who has asked his members to continue their wartime no-strike pledge through reconversion, as a protection against inflation. Such a proposal might come in the form of a "deal" with Congress to continue price controls in return for a moratorium on strikes and assurance of full production.

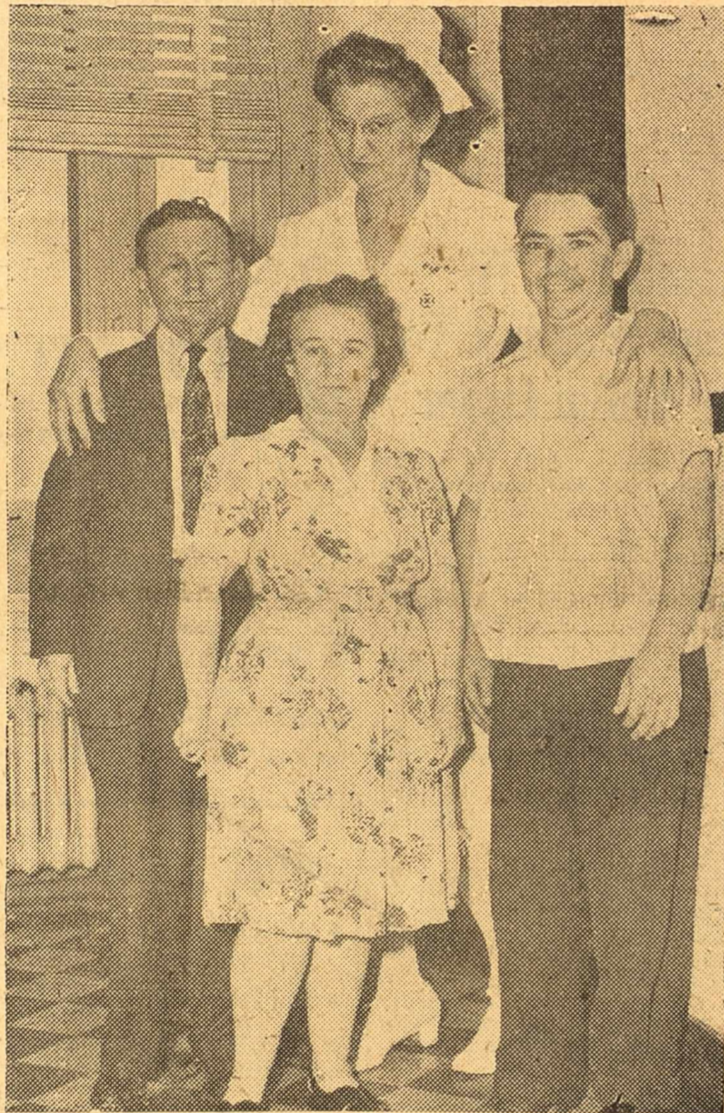

**War Crimes Trials In Germany May End Soon**

NUERNBERG, GERMANY—(AP)—Justice Robert H. Jackson said Monday his job as American war crimes prosecutor here probably would be over by July 15, and that he would return to the United States.

The jurist, spearhead of a controversy involving supreme court Justice Hugo L. Black, estimated the cases of the high Nazis would be completed by mid-July. The attention of the tribunal then will be devoted to prosecution of such organizations as the SS, the Gestapo and the Hitler youth organization.

He declined to comment further on the Supreme Court controversy which he touched off a week ago with a statement that Black participated in a decision in which his former law partner was a counsel.

**UNIONS MAKE THREATS**

HOLLYWOOD—(AP)—The conference of studio unions, which conducted last year's strike in the movie industry, has demanded an immediate meeting with studio officials and threatened "economic action" unless granted wage increases.

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**Allied Council Rejects Plan To Divide Jap Land**

TOKYO—(AP)—The Allied council rejected Monday a Russian plan for expropriation of Japanese land but approved a two-year rural land "reform" program offered by Great Britain for the fallen empire.

The Chinese and British members joined with George Atcheson, Jr., U. S. member, in opposing a proposal by L. Gen. Kuzma Derevyanko of Russia to expropriate the land of the wealthy.

Derevyanko then joined with China and Britain in approving a plan modeled after the suggestion of W. McMahon Batl, British commonwealth delegate, limiting land holdings.

Under this plan, which was approved for submission to General MacArthur, no one could hold more than seven and one-fourth acres of land on Honshu, Kyusau and Shikoku, the heaviest peopled islands of Japan.

On Hokkaido, northernmost and most thinly populated of the four home islands, individuals would be limited to 24.5 acres.

**Hughes' Giant Plane Rests In Graving Dock**

LONG BEACH, CALIF.—(AP)—The three sections of Howard Hughes' mammoth airplane, the HC-1, rested safely in a graving dock on Terminal Island Monday after a hazardous, spectacular 24-mile journey from the Hughes factory in Culver City.

More than 100,000 persons watched the world's largest plane being moved in three sections while power company employees clipped wires and moved poles to provide clearance.

Hughes said the \$20,000,000 plane, built almost entirely of wood, "cost less per pound than any other large experimental plane ever built in this country."

It will be about two months before the giant ship makes its first test flight.

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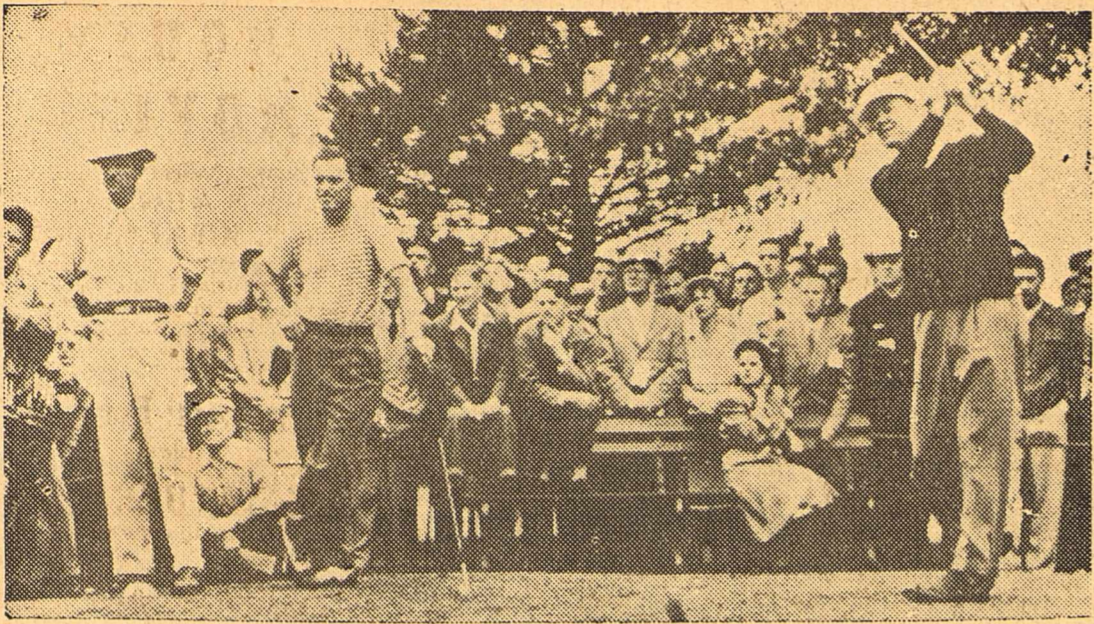

Texas-Born Ex-GI Beats Nelson And Ghezzi In Double Playoff To Win US Open Championship

CLEVELAND (AP)—They won't be calling him "Ray Mangrum's kid brother" around the golfing circuit any more—for now he's the National Open champion.

In one of the most star-spangled finishes the links classic has ever witnessed, Lloyd Mangrum of Los Angeles, a Texas-born farm boy, snatched goldom's biggest prize Sunday over Canterbury Golf Club's storm-menaced layout in a double

playoff with Byron Nelson of Toledo, and Vic Ghezzi of Knoxville, Tenn.

They had tied Saturday at 284, four under par, for the regulation 2 holes, and in the first playoff round Sunday morning they came in like a three-horse team with par 72s, forcing another round.

Three strokes behind Ghezzi and two back of Nelson at the end of 12 holes of the final round, Mangrum uncocked a blazing four-hole spurge in which he took a two-stroke lead through the 16th, saw it whittled to a single stroke on the 17th green, and then hung doggedly on to win between lightning flashes, and in the glare of automobile headlights, on the final green.

Mangrum, 31, wears the Purple Heart for shrapnel wounds received in Europe. He is a mighty mite, weighing only 145 pounds although six feet tall. A natty moustache adorns his lip.

Before 1938, when he first took up tournament golf, he was known

as Ray Mangrum's kid brother, Ray being one of the better-known journeymen picking up prize checks.

In his Texas draw—he was born and reared on a farm near Brenton, Texas—Mangrum declared that he started as a caddy. Never played amateur golf, but that "I have always been a pro. I am not a professional at any club, and I'm not going to take a job like that."

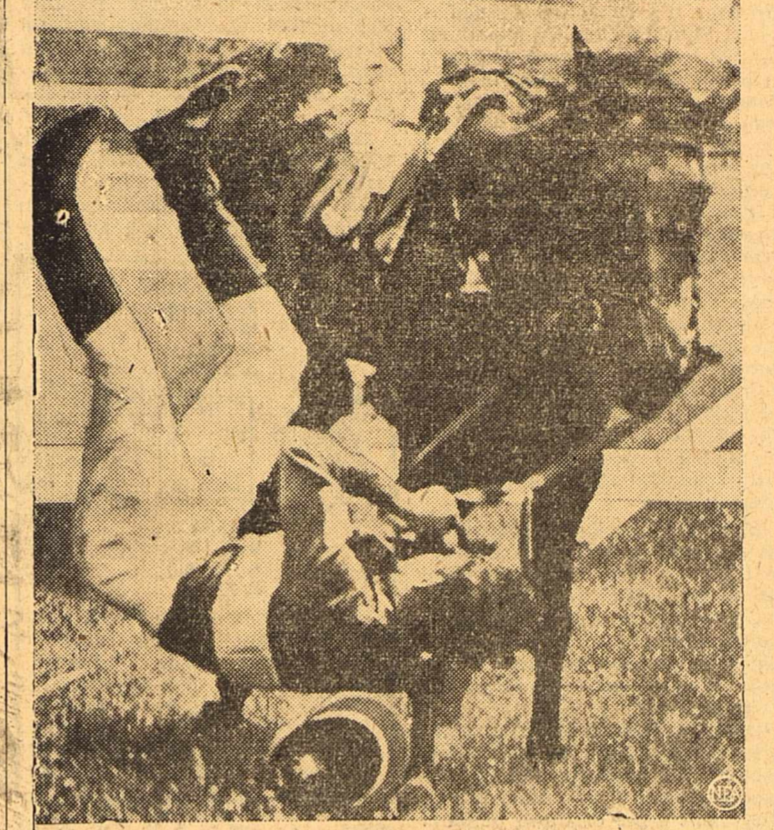

The Cards were forced to accept a split with the New York Giants when the Polo Grounds came back to humble them 9-1 after the Cards had won the opener 4-1.

The Boston Red Sox dropped their first series of the season when they could do no better than divide two games with the Chicago White Sox. The split plus the twin triumph of the New York Yankees narrowed their first place lead in the American League to eight games. Boston won the opener 6-1. The Windy City boys won the afterpiece 7-4.

After pounding out a 9-2 win over the St. Louis Browns, the Yankees cashed in on a three-base error by Pitcher Tex Shirley to win the first game of Boston's double header with Cincinnati which sent the Hub on its way to an even dozen games off the pace when the Washington Senators triumphed 6-3.

The largest crowd in Philadelphia's National League history 35,910 paid, saw the Phils extend their winning streak to four straight when they beat Pittsburgh, 4-3, but the Pirates came back to defeat them 10-1.

Cleveland moved into fifth place by copping both ends of its double-header with the Philadelphia Athletics 2-1 in 11 innings and 3-2.

queen of spades were led, which picked up both outstanding trumps. Looking at all four hands, you can see that declarer had no problem but to lead toward the jack of diamonds. But with the location of the diamond queen uncertain, the safe play was to trump the jack of hearts, lead the club to dummy with a trump and trump the nine of clubs. This stripped declarer's hand and dummy of clubs and hearts.

Now Ehrlenbach led the jack of diamonds and let it ride. West won with the queen, and if he led anything but a diamond, declarer would discard a diamond from one hand trump in the other. If he led a diamond, declarer had the balance of the tricks.

1-17 Fraser, and the TXL field, tested at 8,244-8,315 feet, for one hour. It showed gas of 1,770,000 cubic feet per day, and flowed an estimated one barrel of distillate during the period. Recovery was 250 feet of distillate. The project was making hole under 8,325 feet, in the Devonian.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Crespi, East Midland County Devonian prospector, nine miles southeast of Midland, flowed 66 barrels of fluid in the 24-hour period ending at 7 a. m. Sunday. About 33 barrels was oil.

In the 24 hours ending at 7 a. m. Monday the well flowed 49 barrels of fluid. There was 19 barrels of 46-gravity oil, and 30 barrels of salt water in the recovery. Operator was continuing to flow to test.

Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Roberts, Southeast Reeves County possible discovery for a small production in the lower Permian, about 25 miles southeast of Pecos, had reached 11,420 feet, in silt, and was drilling ahead.

It had reached original contract depth of 4,000 feet. There is a possibility that it might be drilled deeper.

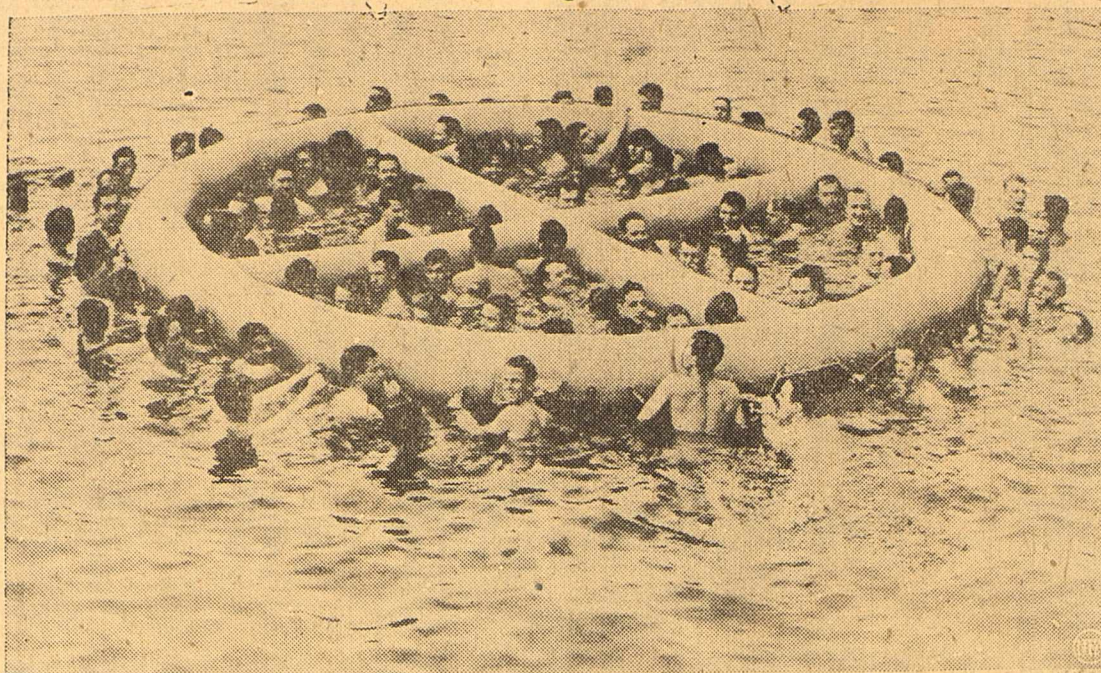
It is understood that it had a slight show of oil and gas at the total depth. It balled about one-half gallon of oil each 30 minutes during a short test, operator representatives reveal.

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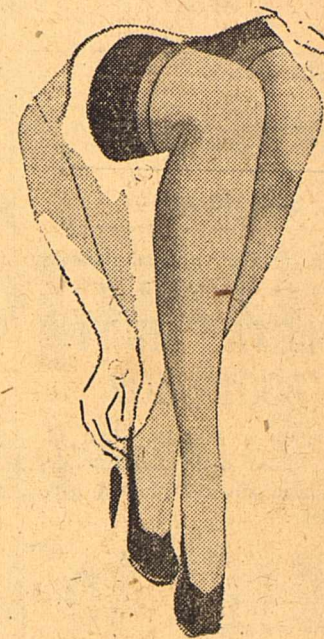
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
