O'Daniel's Filibuster Fails

Senate Is Expected To OK OPA Bill

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Only three senators were on hand when the Senate met Friday morning, but Democratic Leader Barkley (Ky.) told reporters he believed the Senate will pass the compromise OPA bill by mid-afternoon after a few speeches Friday afternoon by senators still weary from W. Lee "Pappy" O'Daniel's eight-hour, 18-minute filibuster that failed.

O'Daniel, the Texas Democrat who left no lingering doubt of his dislike for either the New Deal or the OPA, quit abruptly at 10 minutes past midnight after he had talked since 3:52 p. m. Thursday in an attempt to prevent the extension bill's passage before the existing price control law expires at midnight Sunday.

Time after time, O'Daniel called upon his colleagues for help in an undertaking he conceded he could not carry out alone. Senators Bridges (R-N. H.) and Reed (R-Kan.) gave his aching vocal chords a few rests by asking questions. But none hit the sawdust trail in a campaign O'Daniel contended meant "salvation" of the country.

Senator Langer (R-N. D.), a demonstrated marathon talker, was reported trying to arrange air-plane transportation back to Washington from Fargo, N. D., but even his arrival could mean only an hour's delay in the final result. Stopped After Midnight

For O'Daniel, tired of feet and of voice, agreed with the rest of the Senate a few minutes after midnight that no one should talk more than once or more than an hour before the vote on the bill.

Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.), who waited patiently for eight hours Thursday to get in his licks on OPA, was the only other senator who indicated he wanted to talk again even for the allowed hour.

Congressional leaders told President Truman Friday that if he does not sign the compromise OPA bill price controls will be Sunday.

Barkley said after a White House conference that the majority leadership was unanimous in telling Truman that it is "all or nothing" so far as the bill now pending before the Senate is concerned.

Those who saw the President said he did not commit himself.

They told the President, Barkley said, that any such resolution would be "loaded down" with the same sort of amendments—or possibly more drastic ones, than are attached to the compromise measure which the House has approved.

The three senators on hand when the Senate met Friday were McKellar (D-Tenn.), presiding; Barkley; and White of Maine, the Republican leader.

There was no sign of Senator O'Daniel (D-Texas) who talked for eight hours Thursday against the bill.

Boy Kills Father, Mother, Then Self

KERRVILLE—(AP)—A verdict of murder and suicide has been returned in the deaths of O. R. Bode, 56, Mrs. Bode, 55, and their son, Leo Bode, in the Reservation community.

Justice of Peace Bob Bennett attributed the slayings to Leo Bode and his verdict said the son had later committed suicide.

Bennett said the body of Leo Bode was found on a country road about half a mile from the Bode home. When neighbors went to notify the parents, they found the father dead in the yard and the mother dead in the kitchen. Both had died of gunshot wounds.

W. H. Wesson Seeks Office Of Constable

W. H. Wesson, a resident of Midland for the past 40 years, is a candidate for constable of precinct one, subject to the action of the Democratic primary July 27. This is his first time to seek election to a public office.

Wesson has been employed at the Midland Army Air Field for the past four years, and was deputized as night policeman on several occasions during this time. He formerly was engaged in ranching here.

Property Damage High After Tornado Strikes In Detroit

DETROIT—(AP)—Property damage estimated in hundreds of thousands of dollars was left Friday in the destructive wake of a short-lived but vicious tornado that tore into Detroit Thursday afternoon.

The twister, second in the area in little over a week, swept across the Canadian border from Windsor, leaped the Detroit River and hit a northwest industrial section about a mile from downtown.

Naples Statesman Selected To Head Italian Republic

ROME—(AP)—Enrico de Nicola, veteran Naples statesman, was elected provisional president of the new Italian republic Friday by the constituent assembly. He received 396 of the 504 votes cast.

De Nicola, 68, was assured election earlier when the Christian Democrats, Socialists and Communists agreed that he was acceptable as a compromise.

When the president arrives in Rome Saturday, Premier Alcide de Gasperi's sixth party coalition will resign.

Because of the strong showing of De Gasperi's Christian Democrats in the June 2 assembly elections, De Nicola is expected to ask him to form another government.

Italians voted also on June 2 to depose King Umberto II and the Royal House of Savoy and establish a republic.

A former journalist, Nicola was elected to the pre-Fascist Chamber of Deputies four times and served as under secretary of colonies and treasurer in the Giolitti and Orlando cabinets.

In 1924—in the early days of Fascism—he retired his candidacy for the chamber, was nevertheless elected, but refused to be sworn.

King Vittorio Emanuele named him senator in 1932, but he never appeared at any sessions and virtually withdrew from political life.

Smelter Strike At El Paso Plant Settled Friday

NEW YORK—(AP)—Louis Gates, president of Phelps Dodge Corporation, announced Friday the long strike of the CIO mine unions was ended at its Arizona copper mines and the company's smelters and refineries at Laurel Hill, N. Y., and El Paso, Texas.

Arizona miners will return to work Monday. Smelter and refinery workers may return the same day or shortly thereafter, he said.

The terms followed the "national pattern," set in the Anaconda strike settlement of an increase of 18 1/2 cents an hour in wages, Gates said.

The Phelps Dodge mines and smelters have been tied up for five months by the strike.

The settlement ended the last of the big strikes in the copper industry, which at their height brought production down to about 10 per cent of potential and threatened to halt electrical appliance and automobile manufacturing.

FUNERAL SERVICES for Mrs. Louise B. Haight, 70, who died early Thursday of injuries received when she was struck by an automobile Wednesday night, were scheduled at 4 p. m. Friday in Ellis Funeral Chapel.

Officiating were to be the Rev. Clyde Lindsey and the Rev. W. R. Mann. Interment was scheduled in Fairview Cemetery. Masonic rites were to be used at the funeral and burial.

Mrs. Haight was survived by a son, Everett Russell of Hummelstown, Pa., and three grandchildren.

Mrs. Haight was fatally injured when she was hit by an automobile at Illinois and Colorado Streets Wednesday night when she was walking home from a visit with a friend.

Girl 'Blacks Out' After Baring Breasts To Jury To Show Scars

BOSTON—(AP)—Helen Stavrou, 18, former Army airfield typist, testified Friday that her mind had "blacked out" since she fainted on the witness stand Thursday after baring her breasts to a 12-man jury to show scars she said were inflicted into her with cigarettes by a young Army flyer.

Under cross-examination by defense counsel for Lt. Thomas Farrell, 24, of Somerville, charged with assault and other offenses, Miss Stavrou was asked to tell the superior court jury whether Farrell had visited her after the alleged branding.

Murder Suspect Arrested In California

REPORTERS INSPECTED RUSSIAN CITIES — UNRRA Official Says U.S. Wrong

BERLIN—(AP)—Marshall MacDuffie, head of the UNRRA mission in the Ukraine, says that a statement that United States correspondents have not been able to report UNRRA activities in Russia is incorrect.

MacDuffie in a news conference Thursday night attributed this statement to President Truman in his recent report to Congress on the subject.

MacDuffie said that a month ago eight correspondents, including three Americans and two Britons, visited Kiev and Minsk, capitals of the Ukraine and White Russia, respectively, and with UNRRA personnel inspected ration stores, free markets, collective farms and received ration figures and other data.

Two of the American correspondents were Robert James of The Associated Press and Drew Middleton of The New York Times.

(James wrote of UNRRA operations in the Ukraine and White Russia. There were no indications that his dispatches dealing with UNRRA had been censored.)

MacDuffie said that members of his 11-man UNRRA team "visited every important city in the Ukraine, covered the whole area with complete freedom of movement and received full Russian authorities' every cooperation and all the information we desired."

(The Russian note appended to President Truman's letter to Congress asserted: "Inasmuch as special commissions of the UNRRA will be sent to the Ukrainian SSR and the Byelo-Russian (White Russia) USSR, American official circles and the public will have the possibility of receiving information of interest to them concerning the utilization and distribution of the supplies and services of the UNRRA through these commissions." This note was dated March 12.)

Mrs. Swails Dies Thursday Night

Mrs. J. B. Swails, 65, a Midland citizen for 23 years, died Thursday evening at her residence, 511 East New York Street.

Funeral services will be held at Abington, Texas, Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. Swails would have been 66 years of age on July 13. She was a member of the Church of Christ. Survivors include 10 children, 17 grandchildren, her mother, two brothers, two sisters. Her husband died in April, 1936.

Odessa Man Held In Theft Of Drill Pipe

CRANE—(AP)—Sheriff Jack Young of Crane County arrested Tommy Hill, Odessa, here Thursday in connection with the theft of four truck loads of drillstem pipe valued at \$5,000 from Tolbert and McKee of Fort Worth at a drilling rig here.

The property was recovered after two truck loads had been sold in Odessa and two in El Paso. The suspect is being held for grand jury action July 10. He was unable to make \$2,500 bond.

46 Men Die In Crash Of Spanish Submarine

MADRID—(AP)—The Spanish submarine C4 sank Thursday near the Balearic Islands with the loss of 46 men after being struck by the destroyer Lepanto, the Navy announced Friday.

## Sincere Flattery

The Allied Military Government in Germany has been stupid, it seems to us, in ordering the destruction of all "anti-democratic, military or Nazi" books and other writings.

In the first place, it is an immense task almost impossible of accomplishment. Secondly, it is bound to set up a familiar human reaction memorably illustrated in this country by the prohibition law. Nothing could be more calculated to focus attention on such literature, to encourage hiding, re-reading, and smuggled circulation than this ban.

Lastly, of course, it pays Adolf Hitler the sincere flattery of imitation. The whole German population can be counted on to gloat over this and make the most of it. And well they might. For book-burning, whether done by Hitler or the AMG, carries the inescapable implication that the burner has so little faith in what he is selling that he must destroy his competition before he can hope to have his product accepted.

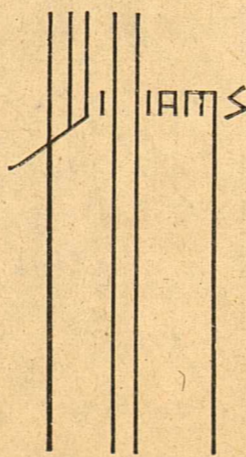

**Discouraged Vet Wants To Sell Eye**

**SEATTLE**—(AP)—A jobless, 24-year-old former soldier, feeling the breaks have gone against him, wants to sell one of his light blue eyes to finance himself in a business of his own.

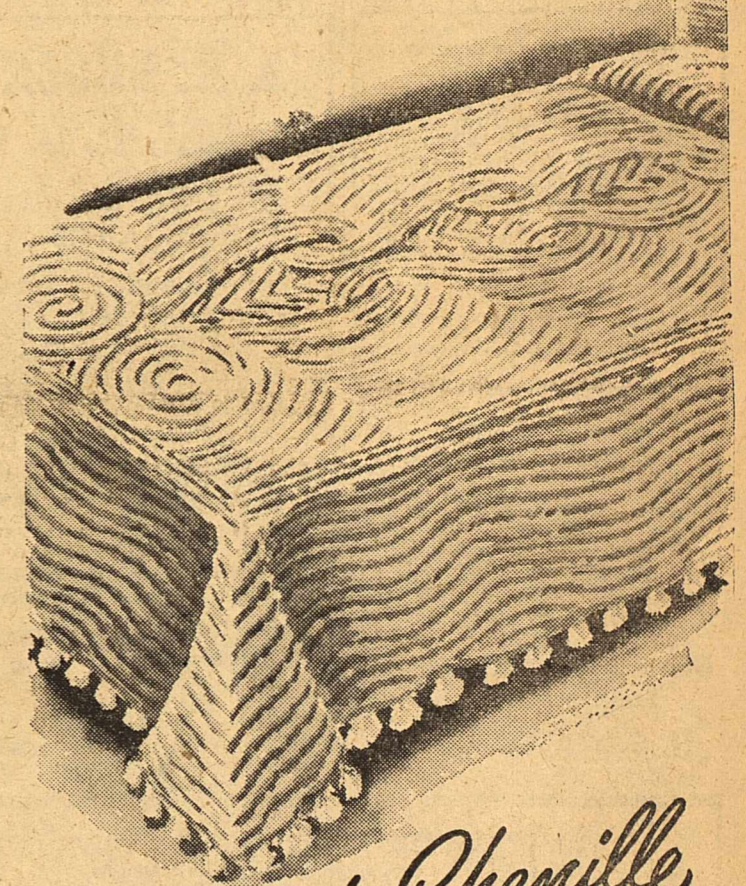

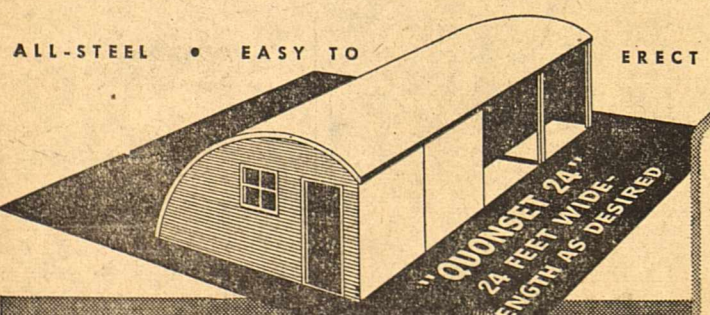

bid of three hearts with the West hand. That would be all right without the king of clubs, but with that card, there is a sound opening bid in the hand.

When North doubled one heart, South was forced to bid, and North's supporting bid of three diamonds set South to thinking. The double indicated strength in spades, and North also showed a fit in diamonds. South therefore decided to bid three spades on his three-card suit.

In the play West cashed two high hearts and continued with the ace, East having played the six and four, showing out. If South had made the mistake of ruffing the third heart with the lack of spades, he would have lost the contract. His correct play was to discard dummy's losing club.

The discard of the losing club protected declarer against a four-two break in trumps, and they actually were. East of course refused to trump the heart also.  
When the fourth heart was led, declarer was able to trump it in his own hand, pick up the adverse trumps, and dummy's five diamonds and his ace of clubs gave time 10 tricks.

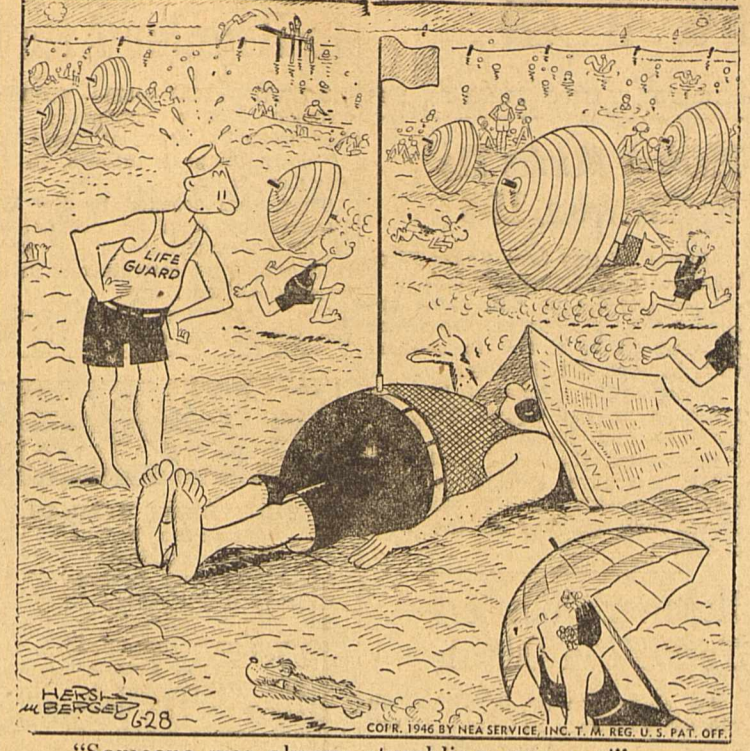

While the National League is in danger of failing to produce a single 20-game winner for the first time since 1931 and only the second time in its 70-year history, the American League may boast four pitchers in the select 25-game winner class this year.

The National League quartet of Grover Alexander, Philadelphia; Dick Rudolph and Bill James, Boston; and Jeff Tesreau, New York, was the latest to accomplish the feat in 1914.

Each of the present quartet, Hal Newhouse of the Detroit Tigers; Bob Feller, Cleveland Indians; Dave Ferriss, Boston Red Sox; and Spud Chandler, New York Yankees has passed the 10-victory mark with less than half the scheduled completed.

In the only two games played Thursday, the pace-setting Brooklyn Dodgers increased their National League lead to three-and-one-half games over the idle St. Louis Cardinals by downing the Boston Braves, 3-1, and the Chicago Cubs nosed out the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-5.

The Dodgers scored two runs in the seventh inning on singles by Dick Whitman and Bruce Edwards, a sacrifice, a wild pitch and a squeeze play by Ed Stanky to break a 1-1 deadlock and sew up the contest.

The Cubs came from behind to beat the Pirates, with Pinch-Hitter Bill Nicholson driving in the tying and winning runs with a bases-loaded single in the ninth inning.

**800 Texas Vets Nominated Officers In Regular Army For Ability In War**

WASHINGTON —(P)— President Truman Friday nominated 9,800 "top cream" veterans of World War II as permanent officers in the Regular Army.

They were selected by the War Department from an original list of 108,000 applicants, all of whom held temporary commissions in the wartime citizen Army.

The nominations, which went to the Senate for confirmation, will bring the officer corps of the Regular Army to its authorized strength of 25,000.

A Senate military subcommittee Thursday approved doubling this figure to 50,000 after hearing Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower testify that the additional officers may be needed for the next 25 to 30 years.

The War Department said it employed a new screening process in the selections designed to find "the best leaders in the world today."

Voluntary withdrawals and failure to pass rigid physical examinations trimmed the original applicant list from 108,000 to 81,000, the department said.

Final selections were made by a board which the Army chief of staff told the senators Thursday was not subject to influence.

Of the successful appointees, about 4,100 will be commissioned in the air forces, 3,100 in the ground forces and 2,600 in the service forces.

About a third of those on the list have already been returned to civilian life. They will be called back to active duty in 15 days. Those still in service will continue at their temporary rank until reduced under normal procedure.

Every state and territory was represented in Friday's list. California led with about 900 nominees. Texas was second with some 800 and New York third with approximately 600.
