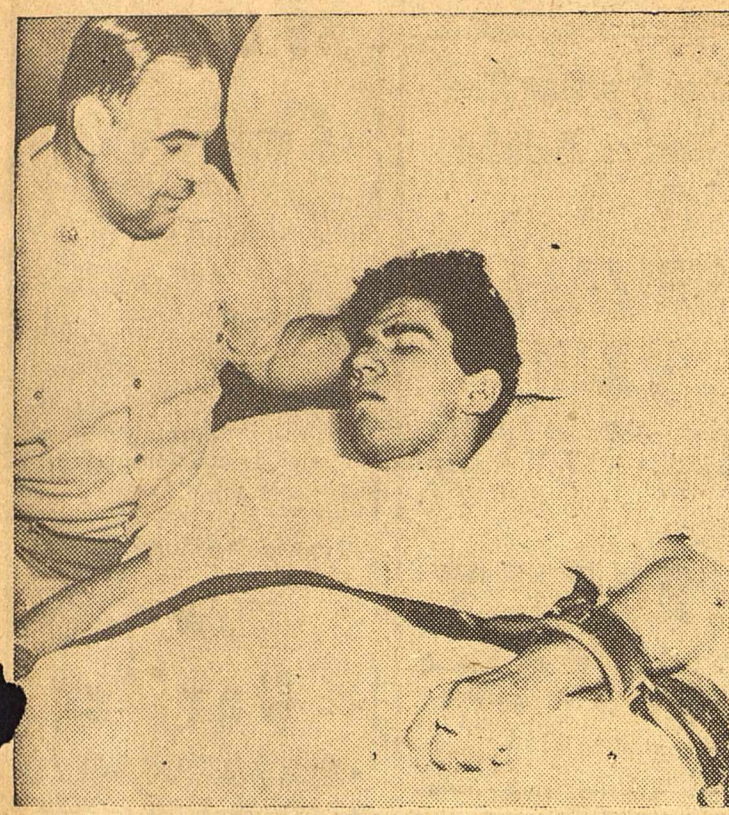


Congressmen Forecast OPA Renewal

Time Out For Repairs

The Senate, which has been trying rather desperately to cope with most of the nation's pressing ills all at once, took time out the other day for a little self-improvement. The result was a bill reorganizing and streamlining congressional procedure which is excellent as far as it goes. And it goes quite a long way.

The senators discarded one or two mossy, cherished traditions, and it must have wrung some of the older, more conservative hearts to do so. But they voted themselves and their colleagues in the House a \$5000-a-year salary increase by way of heart balm.

They also provided some generous social security which will permit them to retire with dignity and a pension after 62 years upon this earth, provided that six of those years were spent in Congress. To enlarge upon the wisdom of that move might lead to some unflattering examples. So perhaps it is enough to say that the pension appears to be a wise investment.

Among the reorganization bill's chief virtues are a reduction in the number of committees, expert assistance for appropriations committees, enough money to hire capable help for other administrative and research duties, and the registering of lobbyists.

A lot of senators have enjoyed the power, prestige and importance of many committee memberships. But they really pay for their enjoyment in hard work. Besides answering their mail, having their ears bent by constituents, understanding all current legislation, being on the floor for debate and voting, they are also at present supposed to be experts on all the various, complex specialized subjects which they have to wrestle with in a half dozen committees to which they may belong.

It is just too much to do efficiently. Besides, the same general legislative subject may slip over into two or three different committees, all of which adds to the confusion, delay and red tape.

As for appropriations, Congress has generally had to take an executive department's word for what it needed, and why. The members have been busy enough without endeavoring to fathom the inner workings of outside agencies. Consequently, they have approved or slashed budgets through ignorance, caprice, benevolence and sheer cussedness. Provision for expert assistants will give the committee some boys on their side whom they can trust, and who presumably will know what they're talking about.

The new bill should ease group pressures not only through registration and financial accountability of lobbyists, but by the establishment of majority and minority policy committees which would put major issues on a party basis. This last is something that Commerce Secretary Wallace suggested a while back, except that the Senate bill stipulates no reprisals if some rugged individualist refuses to hew to the party policy line.

In short, there is promise of better government in the Senate bill. If the House concurs, the result ought to win Congress a unanimous cheer. And that's a sweet sound that the legislators haven't heard in a long time.

If your arguments are with yourself, you're bound to win—and so is everybody else.

The best all-around meal is the square one.

Dirigible Lands, Deflated Here

Howard Hughes' dirigible advertising "The Outlaw" was forced to land at a Midland airfield late Saturday because of a shortage of fuel and strong headwinds which prevented it from proceeding to Big Spring, and Sunday night the 167-foot airship was deflated. Strong winds during the afternoon buffeted the bag round, making the deflation necessary.

George Studer of Los Angeles, in the airship and its crew of 12, said the bag would be transported possibly to Big Spring or some other point within a few days for reflation. Arrangements had been made to moor and refuel the airship at Big Spring Saturday night.

The dirigible was enroute from Los Angeles to New York on a tour to advertise the motion picture. It carries the largest airborne neon sign in history.

Damage to the ship was negligible, Studer said, and no personnel was injured.

Price Control Office Notified To Stay Open

A telegram Monday from the district office of price control at Fort Worth notified the Midland office to have personnel remain at their jobs pending clarification of the present situation, as urged by the President.

The telegram to R. W. Hamilton, price control chairman, and Elvora Charlton, chief clerk, stated: "According to general counsel, agency has authority to continue to operate within limits during an interim period and it is our duty to do so."

"Boards are to continue scheduling and holding compliance conferences on alleged violations for period before July 1.

"For your general information sugar rationing and slaughter control programs continue as in the past as they are under Second War Powers Act."

The telegram was signed by E. B. Holloway, district director, of Fort Worth.

The Midland office was open Monday.

Home-Rule Charter To Be Drafted For City Of Monahans

MONAHANS—A committee of 15 Monahans citizens appointed by the city council to draft a home-rule charter met Friday evening.

Mayor Ed Duffey as chairman, presided. "Monahans has outgrown her baby clothes and needs the advantages offered municipalities under the Texas constitution by home-rule," explained Rawlins. "Monahans must be planned for tomorrow as well as today," he said.

Benefits to be derived from home-rule were discussed and legislative and city limit committees appointed. Ira Hudler was named chairman of the legislative committee and Howard B. Price, chairman of the city limit committee.

At the expiration of 60 days the proposed charter will be presented to the city council for approval. When endorsed by the city council the charter goes to the secretary of state for approval after which it may be offered by vote of Monahans citizens for adoption.

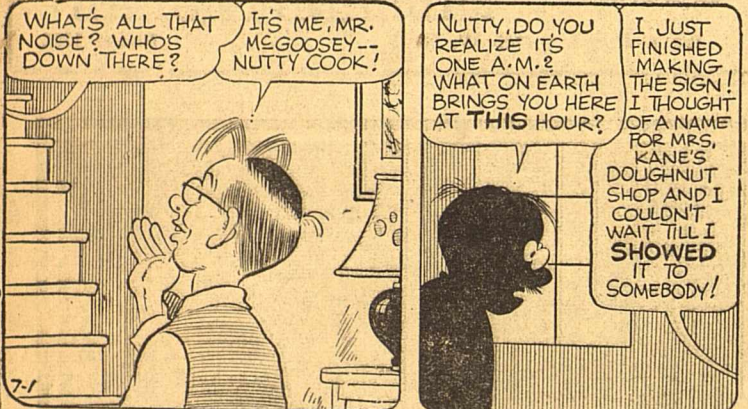

"I won't let her bother me," she said to herself.

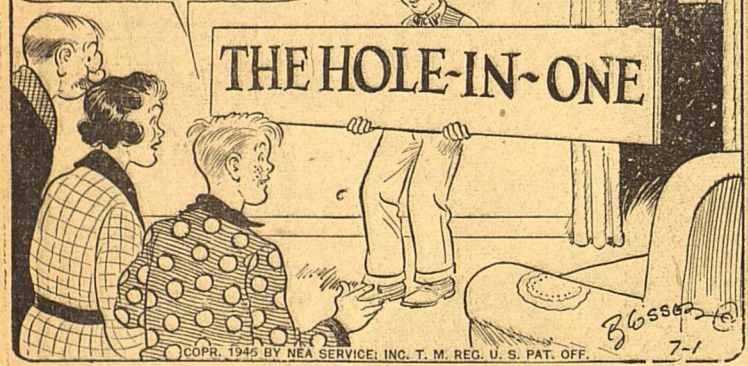

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

Where is the best bridge played in the United States? Probably in the Mermaid Room at the Park Central Hotel in New York. After a tournament the players gather there for sandwiches, and to discuss the hands, and some very smart plays are made in that cocktail lounge.

One of the country's great players gave me today's hand there, but when he told me about the play, he admitted that he had not made it at the tournament.

The opening spade lead was won by declarer with the nine-spot, a small heart was led and the jack

finessed. West refused to win, and declarer returned to his hand with the ace of clubs, then led another heart.

Now East showed out, so declarer went up with the ace of hearts and led the queen. West winning. West played the diamond deuce. East won with the ace and returned the diamond four. West winning with the king. The six of diamonds was returned and East won with the jack.

Now East should have led the king of spades, which would have prevented declarer from returning to his hand to draw the last trump. East was bound to get in again with the king or jack of clubs and would then return a spade, which West would trump for the setting trick.

The party bridge player is not inclined to take too much interest in a part score contract, but in tournament bridge it can be just as important to make or defeat a part score as to make or defeat a grand slam.

With July Fourth—major league baseball's midway station—only three days off, Manager Eddie Dyer of the St. Louis Cardinals Monday was faced with the task of making his pre-season prediction come true. It was on the eve of the 1946 season inaugural that the St. Louis Cardinal pilot said: "If we can stay within five games of the pace when the Fourth of July rolls around we will win the National League pennant."

Monday those dazzling Dodgers are roosting at the top of the standings, enjoying a five and a half game advantage over Dyer's runner-up Redbirds.

The Brooks gained a game and a half on St. Louis Sunday by whipping the Boston Braves for the fourth straight time 4-1, while the cellar-dwelling Pittsburgh Pirates were dealing the Cards a double defeat, 4-3 and 1-0.

Red Sox Split With Nats

The American League leading Boston Red Sox increased their margin over the second place New York Yankees to eight and a half games when they exchanged a pair of lopsided decisions with the Washington Senators. Led by Catcher Hal Wagner, who banged a pair

of homers, the Sox won the opener 15-8. The Nats came back to rip the Sox 9-2 in the afterpiece. Dave (Boo) Ferriss copped his 12th victory in the opener.

Ernie Bonham, New York Yankee football expert, tried out his right arm and discovered to his sorrow that it could not meet the test as the Philadelphia Athletics shelled him to an early shower with a six-run fourth inning to beat the Bronx Bombers 6-3.

Detroit's third-place Tigers improved their position slightly by taking two close games from the St. Louis Browns 1-0 and 3-2. Lefty Hal Newhouse hurled his 14th triumph in the opener with a four-hitter and fanned seven.

The Philadelphia Phils, fighting for a first division berth, were still one game away after dividing two games with the New York Giants. After dropping the opener 8-1, the Phils had to break a regulation nine-inning deadlock and win the game, 6-5, in the 10th when Pitcher Schoolboy Rowe, who earlier had hit a home run, doubled and his pinch runner eventually scored on an outfield fly.

Cincinnati and Chicago divided a twin bill, the Cubs winning the opener 6-5 and the Reds came back to win the second 4-3.

The Chicago White Sox defeated the Cleveland Indians 7-3 and then played a nine-inning 5-5 tie when the second game was called because of darkness.

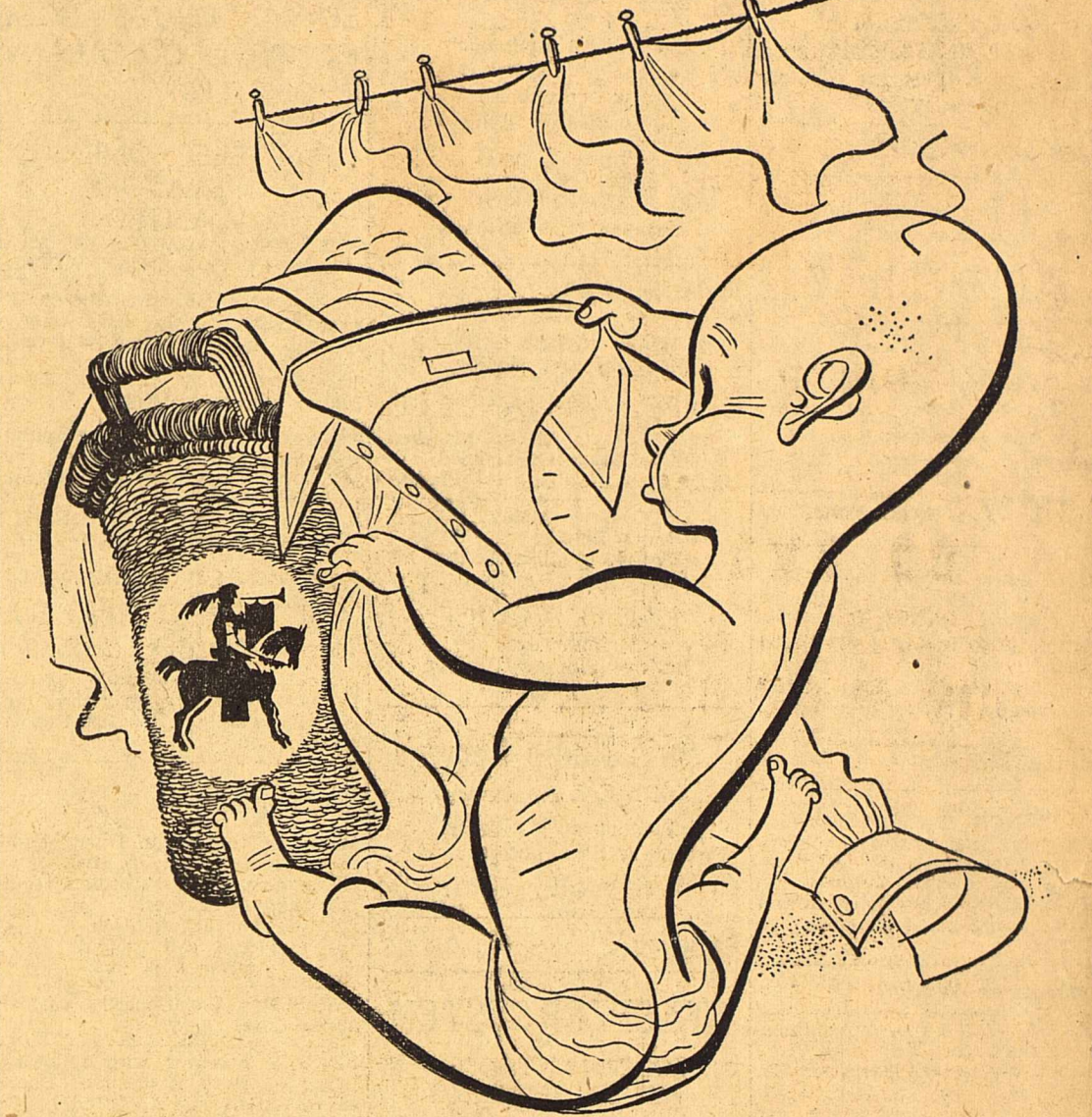
