

was a young man and he had been County Attorney W. O. Shafer Thursday filed a charge of murder against John L. Nall of Houston, former husband of Mrs. Thornton. Sheriff Hugh Ratliff telegraphed the Harris County sheriff's office to arrest Nall on sight.

He was employed at the Midwest Supply Store and had living quarters at the store.

There was no robbery motive, officers said, because Thornton's billfold was unmolested and there was money in the room.

The Pursuit Of Happiness

Today's holiday will be marked again by an intensive pursuit of happiness, now that war's sobering presence and restrictions are gone. The quest will bring its usual violent harvest of death and injury, and its inevitable host of minor mishaps. But the great majority of Americans, escaping with nothing more serious than sunburn, will have fun. And they properly should.

The rather feverish activities which exemplify a typical Fourth of July may not be quite what Thomas Jefferson had in mind when, in writing the Declaration of Independence, he included the pursuit of happiness

among man's inalienable rights. Jefferson, in his wisdom, knew not only the inesti-

mable importance of happiness, but also the quality and condition of happiness at its fullest. Some statesmen today would insist that the gift of happiness, ready-made, prescribed and presented, was an obligation of a paternalistic government. But Jefferson knew the inspiration and value of the quest itself, and the brevity of its reward. So he insisted that the pursuit of happiness was the right of individual men, and that government's role was to protect that right.

It would be understandable if Jefferson had failed to recognize the fundamental importance of the pursuit of happiness. He was young (33) and a radical. Fortunately, however, he was not like so many young radicals of a later day who have had the grimly earnest conviction that the betterment of man is best achieved in an atmosphere of hatred, bitterness and bloodshed.

It is equally remarkable that the Continental Congress, which established this nation by approving Jefferson's Declaration 170 years ago today, did not include one dour dissenter to insist that the phrase about happiness be deleted. Puritan views on worldly happiness were not dead. Also, July of 1776 was not a happy time for Americans. The colonies were poor and split by dissension. And their war for independence wasn't going particularly well.

The minds of the Continental congressmen were filled with righteous anger at the prolonged and grievous injuries of a tyrannical king, as their Declaration of Independence shows. Their thoughts must have been on a grim present. Yet they could remember and approve the ageless, endless pursuit of happiness which moves the

world. In the past 170 years our pursuit of happiness has often been selfish and thoughtless. Yet it has been a great motive force in the banishment of economic servitude. It has added untold comforts to our existence, and prolonged and enriched our lives. It has created an ever pleasanter atmosphere in which the inevitable sorrows of individual man are easier to bear.

We have fought wars to protect our right to pursue happiness as well as to protect life and liberty. But the promise of happiness has sustained men in battle. And it is fulfilled today for thousands who last year faced death in the Pacific or, a year before, on the coast of France and the hills of Italy.

July of 1946 is not in many ways a happy time, either. Universal doubt and discontent invade the individual peace of mind. But today's struggle for the pursuit of happiness is only an intensification of the continuing struggle. The inalienable right remains. This is a good day to recall that right, reaffirm our intentions of protecting it, and exercise it in the present by enjoying

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Mexico To Elect New President, Congress Sunday

nism, religion and possible influence of the United States in Mexican president and a congress Sunday.

The successor to President Manuel Avila Camacho will take office December 1 for a single six-year term. The two leading candidates, Miguel Aleman and Ezequiel Padila, both are former members of Avila Camacho's cabinet. Gen. J. Augustin Castro, former secretary of national defense, and Gen. Enrique Calderon, a career soldier, also are in the race.

Campaign arguments have been heated, but somewhat one-sided. It is Padilla, former secretary of foreign affairs, who usually attacks, and Aleman, former secretary of the interior, who ignores the repeated blasts. Padilla is the opposition and Aleman represents the party in power. He is backed by the official party, PRI (Partido Revolucionario Institucional), and the great mass of people on the public payroll are committed to his support.

"Imposition" is a widespread cry which however was not invented by Padilla. It is the charge that the government and PRI put their men in office by their influence and by elections which have been denounced as fraudulent by angry

Crowd Protests In one case, at Leon, January 2, a crowd protesting against the "imposition" of a PRI mayor was fired
