

May Invited To Testify In Inquiry

Congressman May Be Subpoenaed For Committee Hearing

WASHINGTON — (AP)—The Senate War Investigating Committee Friday formally invited Rep. May (D-Ky.) to testify in public on his activities in connection with a chain of Illinois munitions makers.

The committee said the explanation May gave in an executive session June 4 did not furnish the "full and accurate facts."

Chairman Mead (D-N. Y.) read the letter of invitation as the committee resumed its inquiry into the affairs of the combine promoted by Henry Garsson, one time internal revenue agent.

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) termed the letter to the chairman of the House Military Committee "only the first step" toward getting May's testimony on the record.

He added that the second step—presumably if May declined to appear—"should be a subpoena."

Garsson Ready

Garsson said he was "rarin' to go" to present his case.

"I am ready to say a lot of things," he told newsmen after hearing Chairman Mead (D-Ky.) describe testimony thus far as beyond the ken of "the most imaginative writer of fiction."

Garsson waived much of Thursday afternoon while the committee questioned Albert W. Jacobson, who rose from a \$1,020 a year War Department job as clerk-typist to consultant in the legal branch of the Chemical Warfare Service at \$9,975 a year.

Jacobson told the committee his duties included review of millions of dollars of advance payments to Garsson's munitions combine.

He also testified that Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the House Military Committee had recommended that he be reinstated to the District of Columbia bar, from which he had resigned under "pressure."

May has acknowledged interceding with the War Department for the Garsson interests, but has denied any personal profit.

1947 Midland Livestock Show To Be Lengthened, Enlarged

The 1947 Midland Livestock Show will be lengthened to three days and enlarged to include two new events, a registered sheep show and a horse show.

Directors of the Midland Livestock Association in a meeting Thursday voted to make the addition to next year's event. The show previously has been limited to divisions for calves, lambs and hogs.

E. H. Barron was re-elected president of the show and Vernon

Young, secretary. They were unanimously chosen.

Two types of horses will be shown in the new division. They are quarterhorse and thoroughbred. There may also be a performance test of some kind, including reining or cutting.

The directors decided that champion calves of the Midland show must sell here, and there will be no passage of bid calves from Midland to other cities if the calves are bid on here. Exhibitors here must keep their animals out of the sales ring if they plan to show at other events.

Discontinue Hog Show

It was voted to discontinue the hog show of the Four-County Stock Show held here. A hog show for Midland County animals will be held.

Directors discussed inviting Howard and Ector Counties and possibly other areas into the Midland event and expand it from a four-county to a larger event.

Sheep and hogs entered in the 1947 show will be sifted for quality before entry here to insure top show animals and to keep less desirable ones from the sales ring, the directors explained.

As in the past the 1947 Midland show will have no grand champion but milked and drylot division champions will be named.

Group classes of five animals may be added to the show in the beef cattle division.

Date Not Set

Date of the 1947 show has not been set, pending announcement of dates of the Fort Worth, Odessa and San Angelo stock shows. The Midland event annually precedes the Sand Hills Show at Odessa, which follows the Fort Worth Stock Show.

Directors tabled a suggestion for a commercially fed cattle division. Its inclusion will be dependent upon the feed crop in this area this year. If the show is held it will be a group feeding project, animals to be classified by a market judge. Pens of five animals would be shown and premiums awarded for the best pens.

Scales probably will be purchased by the Midland show directors for installation at the show grounds.

Stock show buildings are badly needed it was mentioned at the meeting. Several plans for obtaining them were suggested.

Scientists At Oak Ridge Think U. S. Peace And Security Are Endangered

WASHINGTON — (AP)—A report that Oak Ridge scientists think "the peace and security of the United States is definitely in danger" threw a roadblock against the administration's atomic control legislation Thursday.

House Republicans showed a disposition to sidetrack all A-bills until world conditions become more settled.

Representative Elston (R-Ohio) put it this way:

"Before we talk about entering into international agreements concerning atomic energy, we should reach other agreements concerning the future of world peace. We shouldn't put the cart before the horse."

He was commenting on a report read to the House Thursday by Rep. J. Parnell Thomas (R-N. J.), ranking minority member of the committee on un-American activities.

Investigate Activities

The report, by Eric Adamson, chief investigator for the committee, said he and Chairman Wood (D-Ga.) had been investigating "subversive activities" at the Oak Ridge, Tenn., atomic project and had found that:

1. Members of scientific societies there "are very active in support of international civilian control" of atomic materials and are "devoted to the creation of some form of world government."
2. Some officers of the societies "admit communication with persons outside of the United States."
3. "The security officers at Oak Ridge think that the peace and security of the United States is definitely in danger."

Orders For New Cars Total 5,500,000

DETROIT — (AP)—Orders on hand for new passenger automobiles now total something in excess of 5,500,000 units, according to authoritative estimates.

If the car industry follows the anticipated pattern, the production division should catch up with accumulating demand by the end of 1947 or early 1948. Trade experts plotting production trends forecast that assembly plants will turn out about 2,000,000 passenger cars between now and next December 31, and add about 4,000,000 more in 1947.

STOCKTON, CALIF. — (AP)—Thousands of gallons of brandy and alcohol went up in flames when fire started by an explosion burned the northeast section of the Schenley-Coronet brandy distillery south of here Thursday, causing damage unofficially estimated at \$1,500,000. Two men were injured.

Constellations Are Taken Off Airways

WASHINGTON — (AP)—On orders from the Civil Aeronautics Administration, United States airlines withdrew Lockheed Constellation airliners from service Friday pending an inquiry by the CAA and the Lockheed Aircraft Company into a fatal crash Thursday of one of the giant craft at Reading, Pa.

PASSENGERS ESCAPE AS FIRE DESTROYS SCHOONER

SAN PEDRO, CALIF. — (AP)—Fire early Friday swept through the schooner West Coast, destroying the 235-foot vessel anchored in the outer harbor, but 16 persons aboard the ship escaped by leaping into the water and swimming to a life raft.

Senate Drives For Vote On OPA Bill

Condition Of Howard Hughes Is Reported Critical; Flier Whispers Cause Of Plane Crash To His Doctor

LOS ANGELES — (AP)—His battle for life suddenly weakening, Texas-born Howard Hughes, 41, beckoned his doctor to his bedside Thursday night and whispered a halting story of the cause of his fiery crash Sunday in an experimental plane.

"I want you to give this message to the Army. The accident was caused by the rear half of the right propeller," the millionaire maker of planes and movies told Dr. Verne R. Mason.

"I don't want this to happen to anybody else."

Explaining carefully that the rear set of propeller blades on the right engine of his twin-engine

plane had suddenly reversed pitch during the first test hop, Hughes said:

"It felt as if some giant had the right wing of the airplane in his hand and was pushing it back and down."

"Tell the Army to look in the wreckage, find the rear half of the right propeller, and find out what went wrong."

Hughes gave his message to Dr. Mason after asking, "Am I going to live?" and hearing the physician solemnly reply:

"I don't know."

In a bulletin on Hughes' condition, issued when he disclosed the

airman's first words on the cause of the crash, the doctor said:

"Howard Hughes has suffered a turn for the worse in his fight for life. His left lung has failed to respond and is still functionless. He is surviving through the restricted use of his right lung, to the extent permitted by his crushed chest, which includes nine broken ribs."

"He is breathing pure oxygen 24 hours a day."

Hughes' XP-11 photo-reconnaissance craft, reportedly the world's fastest long-range plane, struck and set afire three houses and a garage in Beverly Hills before crashing and exploding in a vacant lot.

Pressure On For Decontrol Of Many Items

Republicans Get Behind Campaign For Final Passage

WASHINGTON — (AP)—A power drive to clinch price control exemptions for meat, milk and sundry other items gathered steam Friday as the Senate nudged an OPA revival bill toward passage.

Republicans got behind the new campaign after barely failing to tip from the measure provisions which Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said could prevent manufacturers from getting needed price increases.

The GOP objective was to compel the House to vote specifically on the various decontrols already ordered by the Senate Administration leaders were worried over the outcome. They conceded privately that the House might go along and that President Truman again might feel compelled to toss out a veto.

Strategy Outlined

This is the strategy, as outlined by Taft to a reporter:

"Once the Senate passes its measure to bring OPA back to life in slimmer form, the bill will have to go to a conference committee so differences with the House can be straightened out."

(So far the House has passed only a bill to continue OPA until July 20 in its pre-death form.)

However, instructions are being drafted—and the Senate will be asked to approve them—telling the Senate conferees to stand pat on amendments outlawing any future price controls on:

Meat, poultry, milk, petroleum, cottonseed, soy beans and their products.

Senate insistence almost certainly would compel the House conferees to lay these decontrols before the full chamber for test ballots. Taft said these votes probably would nail down the exemptions.

Byrnes Says Soviets Have Received Large Total In Reparations

PARIS — (AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes said in a statement on German reparations Friday that the Russians already have received directly or indirectly \$14,000,000,000 in territory and equipment.

The Russians through Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov demanded \$10,000,000,000 reparations of Germany earlier this week.

Byrnes acknowledged that an accurate valuation was difficult, but said the detachment of Eastern Germany, including Silesia, as decided at the Potsdam conference, placed \$14,000,000,000 worth of German property under Soviet control.

Under another agreement, this area was placed under Polish administration in compensation for portions of Eastern Poland which Soviet Russia absorbed, the secretary pointed out.

Russians Block Economic Unity Plans For Reich

PARIS — (AP)—Russia blocked steps for an immediate economic unification of Germany at the foreign ministers council Thursday by asking for time to study the future of the industrial Saar Basin, an American source said.

Secretary of State Byrnes proposed that the Berlin control council of the United States, Russia, France and the United Kingdom be instructed immediately to set up the machinery for such a merger.

The proposal was tabled.

The American informant said Byrnes made his new proposal after President-Foreign Minister Georges Bidault of France said in a conciliatory statement that the Saar should be excluded from such a unification and be incorporated fully in the French economy. The Saar with its rich coal deposits complements economically the iron deposits of adjoining French Alsace-Lorraine.

Byrnes Thursday had told his colleagues that the United States was ready to proceed with an economic merger of the occupation zones.

Little Hope Held For Budget Slash

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Government economists all but gave up Friday their hopes for a balanced federal budget this fiscal year.

Despite President Truman's announcement late Thursday that "government expenditures will be reduced," some officials close to fiscal matters said they fail to see how two to three billion dollars can be lopped off.

That is the probable difference, they predict privately, between federal income and outgo in the new fiscal year only 12 days old.

Truman named the Army and Navy, along with veterans' programs, as about to undergo a "review" to find ways of cutting expenses without "endangering national security or causing unjustified hardship."

Lubbock Man Killed In B-25 Plane Crash

BILOXI, MISS. — (AP)—Three officers and an enlisted man were killed in the crash Thursday of Keesler Field B-25 plane nine miles west of Lyman, Miss., after a wing exploded. The plane was on a routine flight.

The names of the crew men killed announced Friday by the personal affairs office of the AAF Technical Training Command, included:

Second Lt. Claude Hall Hubbard, 27, Lubbock, Texas.

Petty Problem Is Handled By MP's

FRANKFURT — (AP)—Ninety-six American soldiers were arrested by U. S. Third Army military police during the last six days for public peeping with German frauleins, it was announced Friday.

Aleman Leading In Mexico Vote

MEXICO CITY — (AP)—Miguel Aleman leads Ezequiel Padilla 123,798 to 84,441 in Mexico's presidential elections including complete and official returns from 11 of 148 congressional districts and incomplete figures from a twelfth. They are those of the federal district (Mexico City).

PRI, the administration party supporting Aleman, won 11 of the congressional seats in the federal district and both senate posts.

Padilla's Mexican Democratic Party (PDM) failed to win.

Juan Gutierrez Lascruain, of Accion Nacional Party (PAN), won the sole opposition congress post.

Elected senators were Fidel Velazquez, head of the Mexican labor confederation, and Col. Carlos Serrano.

Chinese Ask UNRRA Order Be Rescinded

SHANGHAI — (AP)—T. F. Slang, head of the Chinese National Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (CNRA), said Friday he was asking UNRRA Director-General Fiorella LaGuardia to rescind the order drastically cutting relief supplies being sent to China.

LaGuardia last Tuesday ordered all but emergency food supplies withheld from China because of alleged mishandling by the Chinese government.

Army Asks Age Limit In Draft Be Raised To 34

WASHINGTON — (AP)—The Army has recommended to President Truman that the top draft age be boosted from 29 to 34 years when induction calls are resumed in September.

The War Department recommendation was disclosed Friday by an official completely familiar with it after the American Council on Education heard an assertion Thursday night that Selective Service expects to "scrape the bottom of the manpower barrel as it's never been scraped before" by next March.

The declaration came from Col. George A. Irwin, chief of the demobilization division of Selective Service, who mentioned only incidentally in the course of his informal address that the Army does not want any men over 35.

Army Changes Plans

Heretofore the Army has been reluctant to take men over 25, although while the stop-gap draft extension law was in effect from May 15 to June 30 men through 29 were being processed for induction.

Informed of Irwin's new age reference, the official who asked not to be quoted by name said the change of Army mind came about because the current draft act bans inductions of 18 year olds, about 25,000 of whom made up the bulk of draft calls in recent months.

With this prime source of manpower dried up by law, the official asserted, the Army decided it would have to go above the 30-year bracket to fill its needs. Fathers are specifically exempt under the new act.

No Signs Of Violence Found In Dallas Death

DALLAS — (AP)—Preliminary results of an autopsy in the death of Will E. Allen, wealthy retired attorney whose body was found at his home Wednesday, failed to show evidence of violence, Justice of the Peace W. L. Sterret said.

An official inquest verdict will be delivered upon completion of the autopsy, Sterret said. Allen's body was discovered in his bedroom five weeks after he died.

Sun 2 Keystone Flows Oil From Devonian Zone

Sun Oil Company No. 2 Keystone, North Winkler County exploration, on the northwest side of the Keystone field, which failed to get production in the Ellenburger, flowed 214 barrels of oil in 24 hours, through a 1 1/4-inch tubing choke, from the Devonian at 8,035-8,142 feet, through casing perforations, after a 4,000-gallon injection of acid.

This well is four miles north and three miles west of the closest producer from the Devonian—Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Mack Taylor, on the southeast side of the Keystone field. It is 660 feet from south and 1,987 feet from east lines of section 4, block 77, ps1 survey.

The Sun's new discovery, after failing to develop production in the Ellenburger and in the Simpson, plugged back and completed as a small well from the Silurian. That production had practically disappeared, and recently operator went in and started investigating the Devonian, with the results reported above. The well will be put on production shortly.

No Shows In Moore

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Moore, Southwest Kent County wildcat, one half mile west of the discovery for production from the Ellenburger in the Polar field,

was making hole below 7,933 feet, after a drillstem test for 18 minutes at 7,847-7,903 feet recovered 20 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas.

Humble has reported location for a new wildcat to around 10,500 feet in West Andrews County, to test the Ellenburger. It will be 660 feet out of northeast corner of section 25, block A-39, ps1 survey, and is to be carried as Humble No. 2 H. C. Sims. Drilling will start immediately.

Cities Service Oil Company No. 1 Parker, Central Ector County wildcat which showed oil and water in a drillstem test in the top of the Ellenburger, was circulating on bottom at 12,529 feet, while waiting for orders.

May Run Casing

Top of the Ellenburger has been officially reported at 12,475 feet. Some sources reveal that operator is considering running casing to make a production test of the shows in the top of the Ellenburger.

Placid Oil Company and Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 Thornberry, West-Central Andrews County wildcat, which also found oil and water in the Ellenburger, through casing perforations at 10,941-9,951 feet, swabbed 19 barrels of 40-gravity, sour crude, and 453 barrels of salty, sulphur water, in 20 hours. Fluid was standing 400 feet below surface.

A casing pump may be installed and the well may be put on production.

Humble No. 1-B G. H. Cowden, East Crane prospector, was drilling ahead below 10,015 feet, in lime, understood to be the Ellenburger. A drillstem test for 52 minutes was taken at 9,943-96 feet. Recovery was 20 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas.

New Wildcat For Andrews

Humble No. 1 E. B. Cowden, outpost to the discovery for Devonian production in the Goldsmith area of Northwest Ector County, was making more hole past 7,997 feet in lime and chert, after a drillstem test at 7,849-7,982 feet, recovered 125 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil and gas during the two hours the tool was open.

Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 Pinson, West Andrews County Ellenburger wildcat, had reached 9,361 feet, in lime, possibly Montoya, upper Ordovician, and was drilling ahead. It had drilled through the Silurian section.

Oilson Drilling Company No. 1 E. M. Roots estate, six miles east of Fort Stockton, in Central Pecos County, and 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 17, block 118, T&STL survey, is to be a 5,000-foot wildcat. Drilling will start as soon as rig can be put in operation.

How Sacred Is A Contract?

The Hobbs anti-racketeering law, it will be recalled, was drafted primarily to meet a local situation in New York City. The Justice Department in 1938 investigated complaints that roving bands of union teamsters were halting out-of-state trucks in New York, giving the driver a choice of joining the local, paying a union member a day's wage, or taking a beating.

The Supreme Court eventually ruled that these practices were within the scope of legitimate union activity. Congressman Sam Hobbs of Alabama, sniffing at this morsel of justice handed down by the high tribunal, introduced a bill defining the New York local's join-up-or-else routine as robbery and extortion. Now, after a long period of hibernating and being kicked around, the bill has become law.

Whereupon the New York local's counsel predicts that the new law won't make any difference. Out-of-state truckers will still have to employ local drivers before they can make pickups or deliveries or have their goods handled by warehousemen, who are members of affiliated unions.

Why? Well, says the attorney, that arrangement is part of most truck operators' contracts with the union. Also, he says, most employers in interstate truck operation welcome the arrangement because it allows their drivers to rest while the local drivers do the work (at extra pay).

All of which is likely to be a little confusing to the lay minds of most of us. For instance, how sacred is a contract—sacred enough to make its provisions binding even when they contravene a duly enacted law?

How about the truck farmers of New Jersey, who grow so much of the food that New Yorkers eat? Are they going to insist upon the letter of their contract (if they have one) instead of being permitted to bring in their own truckloads of lettuce or tomatoes, get their money, do a little shopping and go home—all without the paid assistance of Local 807, International Brotherhood of Teamsters?

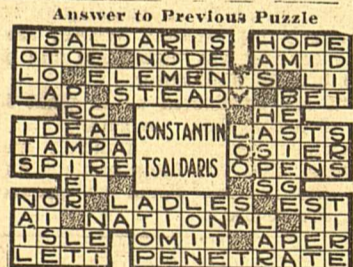
Are these Jersey farmers going to insist upon being compelled to "rest" in their role of truck drivers, while paying a member of Local 807 a day's wages to do their work?

We doubt it. And we further suspect the union counsel of legal mumbo-jumbo when he says that "acts of coercion and violence have always been subject to the exercise of local police power." Maybe the cops could have made an arrest. But what good would it have done when this business of "jumping on trucks," as the lawyer delicately puts it, was sanctioned until very recently by the highest court of the land, provided the jumpers were union members?

It remains to be seen now whether the Hobbs law will be applicable to practices which it defines as robbery and extortion and which it was written to curb, if those practices are already in force. Logically, one would say it should. But we're betting no money on it, as of now.

B. Jay Becker, who manages the Cavendish Club in New York, has long been rated as one of the country's outstanding players. Becker believes that when a player pulls the wrong card or makes any other careless mistake, it is a definite weakness in his game.

Certainly Becker will never be accused of making a careless error. If he makes a psychic bid, it becomes the topic of conversation for the week around the New York bridge clubs.

An amusing incident came up on today's hand. Becker (South) won the opening lead, cashed four rounds of hearts, three rounds of clubs and three rounds of spades. This gave him a perfect count on

the West hand. West had shown out of clubs and hearts and East had shown out of spades. That meant that both East and West had three diamonds left, and the question was how to take the finesse.

Becker pulled a coin out of his pocket and was about to toss it to decide whether East or West should be finessed for the queen of diamonds, when Mrs. Helen Sobel, his partner, said, "Hold it! I would rather trust your judgment than the toss of a coin." The coin was replaced—and he correctly guessed the location of the queen.

I do not know whether or not Becker employed the theory of the queen over the jack. When it is impossible to decide the location of the queen by the bidding or play, many players today prefer to play the queen over the jack on the principle that most of the others will play it the same way, so they will come closer to getting average.
