

Four Midland Men Released From Navy

Four Midland men recently have received their honorable discharge papers from the U. S. Navy. Two were separated at the Norman (Okla.) center, and two at San Pedro, Calif.

La Grant (Copper) Daugherty, son of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Daugherty, 904 North Big Spring, was discharged at San Pedro after about 20 months of service, including 14 months of sea duty. He is listed in October, 1944, at Dallas, and served on the USS Presidio (APA 88) from May, 1945, to July 2, 1946, and is entitled to wear the American Theater ribbon, the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with one star, and the Victory Medal. He was a ship's service laundry third class.

Charles William Chancellor, Jr., ACOM3C, of 1710 West Missouri Street, was discharged at San Pedro after seven months of duty in Hawaii with Carrier Aircraft Service Unit 32. He entered the Navy in November, 1944, at Dallas. He plans to re-enter the University of Texas.

J. R. Mincey, coxswain, was discharged at Norman after 18 months of service overseas. He was stationed on the USS Wiseman (DE-667) in the Pacific area. He lives at 401 West Storey Street.

Jay Thomas Chambers, SIC, of Midland, was discharged at Norman after 12 months of service on the USS Bridge (AF-1) in the Pacific area.

in chert, likely still Devonian, and was drilling ahead.

Texas Gulf Producing Company No. 1-3 University-Forest, South-Central Andrews County wildcat to test the Holt-Permian, in section 17, block 9, University survey, had penetrated to 5,477 feet, in dry lime, and was drilling ahead.

The Texas Company No. 1-P State, possible discovery for production from the Tubb-Permian in North-Southwest Andrews County, and in northwest quarter of section 15, block 12, University survey, had perforated casing at 7,170-7,250 feet, and was swabbing out drilling water, to test.

Ray Albaugh No. 1 Sutton, South-Central Lynn County wildcat, in section 22, block H, EL survey, and about seven miles northwest of O'Donnell, was reported to be preparing to drill ahead from 5,520 feet, to a possible depth of 7,500 feet.

Its original contract depth was 5,500 feet, and it was dry at that point.

Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 Pincos, West Andrews County wildcat, in section 13, block A-40, psi survey, was drilling past 9,461 feet in lime.

A drillstem test had been taken for 25 minutes at 9,310-61 feet. There was a faint flow of air at the start, which died at the end of two minutes. Recovery when the drill pipe was broken down, had not been reported.

MIDLAND WILDCAT STARTS

Humble No. 1 Turner, new wildcat for East Midland County, about 12 miles southeast of Midland, had spudded to 50 feet, and was drilling ahead.

Humble No. 1-B Federal-Leonard, extreme Southeast Lea County New Mexico wildcat, which had salty sulphur water in the Ellenburger, at total depth of 12,585 feet, had been plugged and abandoned.

It had tested back up through the interval at 5,185-5,440 feet, and had failed to develop any signs of production of oil or gas. In the last interval investigated it showed salty sulphur water.

France Thanks U. S. In Bastille Day Ceremony

PARIS—(AP)—Winston Churchill, speaking in Metz Sunday at a Bastille Day celebration marking the 157th anniversary of the French Revolution, called on Europe to "rise from her ruins and spare the world a third and possibly fatal holocaust," a goal which he said necessitated a "strong France."

Meanwhile French President Georges Bidault, speaking at a similar celebration in Paris, voiced "the gratitude of the French people" to the United States for her role in the liberation of France from the Nazis and said differences between the two countries were like "old friends' quarrels."

From Washington President Truman, in a recorded speech short-waved to France, saluted the nation on her first peacetime Bastille Day in seven years.

"In spite of her losses and the destruction of her territory for the second time in 25 years, France remains in the front line of the free nations of the earth, proclaiming today the same principles of liberty and of respect for the individual as those in whose name her people spoke 157 years ago," President Truman said.

Churchill, who spoke at a dinner given in his honor by the Municipality of Metz, referred to Russia as "our heroic ally."

The former British Prime Minister declared there could be "no revival of Europe or its culture without a strong France."

Emphasizing the necessity for British-French understanding, Churchill asserted: "You must never allow the slightest recrimination between Great Britain and France."



He accused them of putting parasitic followers on the payroll and running the union into the red, of trying to make their blessing a prerequisite to holding office, and of breaking their promise to allow the rank and file to control the union.

This is substantially the story of Communist tactics in every union where they have managed to seize a strong hold.

It is evident that the Communists in the labor movement think they're smart. They have absorbed the Russian revolutionary technique which emphasizes discipline, secrecy, tight organization and unremitting work.

This may have worked well enough in Russia and some other countries. But here the Communists have made several bad mistakes, which are now catching up with them.

They evidently thought that energy was a substitute for resourcefulness, and that discipline takes the place of adaptability. They overlooked the fact that the "dopes" and "suckers" might succeed in electing some of their own officers who wouldn't forever come to heel.

Most of all, perhaps, they forgot that they were up against a different sort of rank and file. Sure, the rank and file and some leaders, like Curran, have played along with the Communists. But the rank-and-file American can be pushed just so far and fooled just so many times.

During the war, when the Communists were lying low, the rank and file seemed to wise up. Today the same old line and tactics (and the Communists seem to lack the imagination to develop new ones) just aren't going over. The Revolt of the Suckers is under way.

A Strike Is A Strike Is A Strike

The purpose of this piece is to confuse you thoroughly. It's the only way to show how balled up things are. But don't say you weren't warned.

The other day the coal miners filed a complaint that they can't mine coal to keep the nation's economy going unless there is more bread and meat in the stores for them to eat.

What's the matter with these miners? Don't they realize their "No eats, no work" policy constitutes a strike against a strike?

The farmers are now on strike for higher grain and livestock prices, just as the miners recently were on strike for higher wages and welfare.

Don't these miners realize that for them to eat now would be worse than crossing a picket line? It would be plain strikebreaking. The miners should, therefore, continue their work without eating, because no miner would ever think of interfering with the national economy.

This is obvious nonsense. Or is it? If a rose is a rose, then a strike is a strike is a strike.

Of course, it would be all right for the packinghouse workers to go on strike next month and stop the production of meat that way. But it's wrong for the farmers to stop production of meat by refusing to sell their pigs and steers till the price goes up.

An Interesting Race

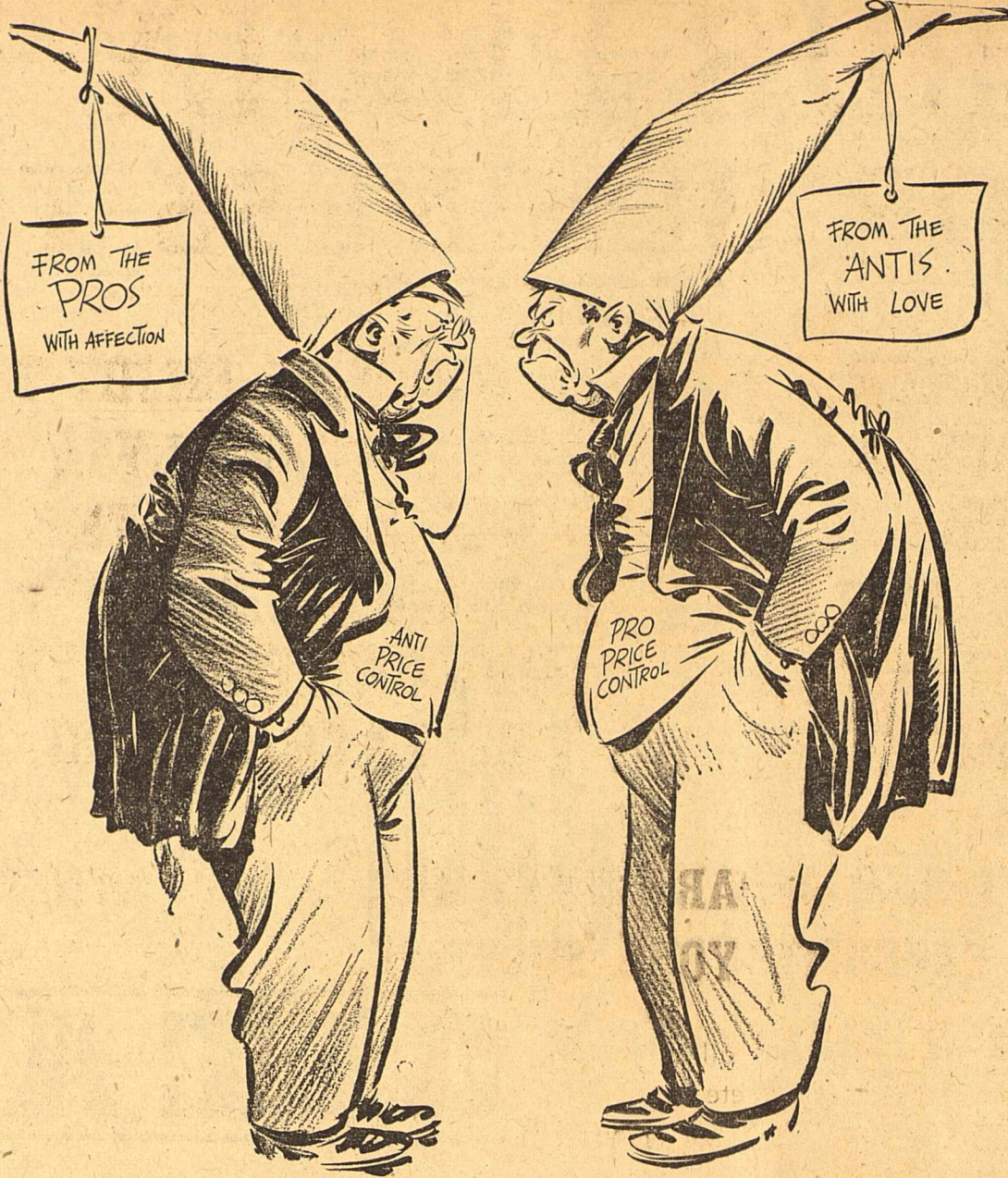
Best guesses are that it will be two years before receipts of natural rubber from abroad attain anything like their prewar volume. And when that time comes it will be interesting to watch the race between the natural and synthetic varieties.

Synthetic rubber, though expensive and inferior in some respects, was good enough to win the wartime "rubber battle." Now it must compete in price and quality with natural rubber in peacetime competition.

An indication that the competition will be keen is found in the fact that 334 patents were taken out last year—almost one a day—in the synthetic rubber field. These, of course, are not basic inventions or inventions based on the first large-scale usage.

Probably the chief reason why this race will be interesting is that such competition holds the eventual promise of giving the public more varied and abundant rubber products at lower prices.

Lined up on one side are Wheeler and Truman, who protested against the "smear campaign" he said was being made against his old Senate colleague.

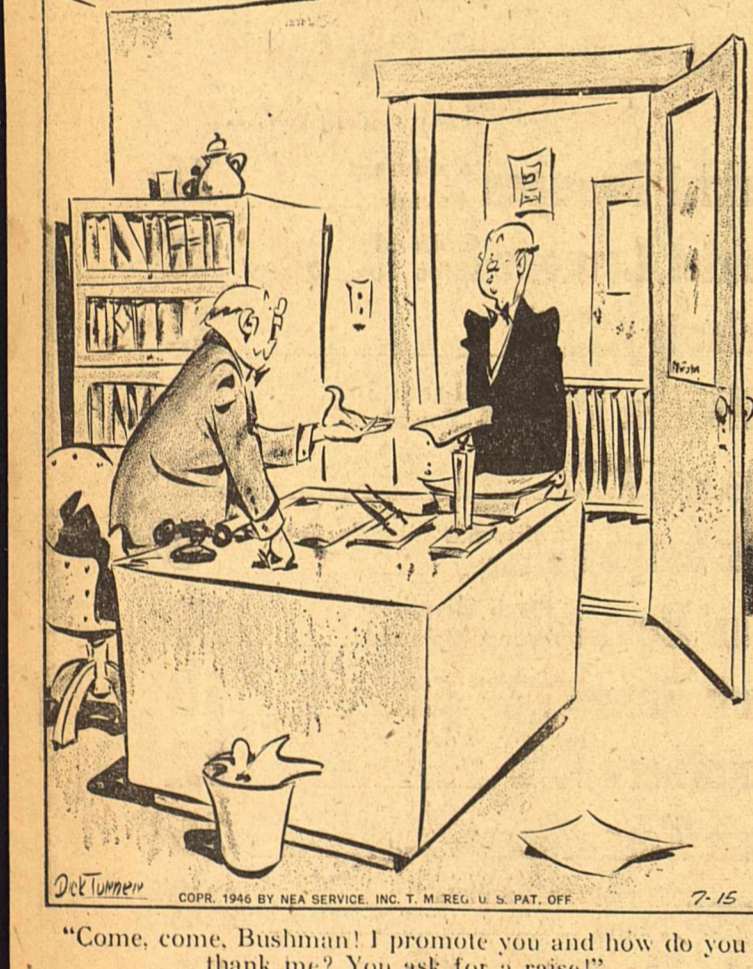

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Amateur Downs Pros To Capture Kansas City Open KANSAS CITY (AP)—Amateur Frank Stranahan, son of a Toledo, Ohio, millionaire, whose winning score of 274 in the Kansas City invitational golf tournament Sunday resembled a pauper's bank account, Monday had the world's greatest professional tee-men on his hip for the moment at least.

The 23-year-old Ohioan had the shot for every pin during four days of blasting on Hillcrest Country Club's 6,592-yard course that ended without several of the big name money-players running out their string. While Stranahan settled for the title trophy after making the final round in 31-38-69 for a 72-hole total of 14-under par 274, big John Bulla, Chicago, was only one stroke away and collected the professional's prize of \$2,500.

Veterans, Byron Nelson, Toledo, pre-tournament favorite, Jimmy Hines, Chicago, and Harold (Jug) McSpaden, Sanford, Me., each came in with 276's and \$1,433.23 of the \$20,000 Victory Bond pie. Delay Seen In Granting Loan To Soviet Union

WASHINGTON (AP)—Russia probably will have to wait until next year at least for a loan even a fraction of the size of the \$3,750,000,000 credit Congress okayed Saturday for Britain.

The Kremlin reportedly is interested in borrowing about \$1,000,000,000 from this country. Little has been heard of a Russian loan since the United States some months ago notified Moscow of a willingness to discuss it—provided Russia would agree to talk at the same time about her trade relations with the Balkans and other areas within the Soviet sphere of influence.

Any such loan would have to come through the Export-Import Bank unlike the one to Britain which late Saturday won a 219 to 155 House vote of approval, following Senate clearance previously.

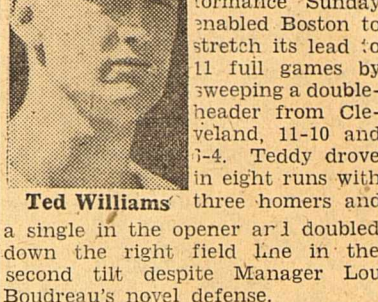
Only President Truman's signature is needed before London can start drawing on the money, in return for which the British have promised to work for freer world trade. The loan is to be repaid by the year 2001. Some officials believe the first money will be advanced this week.

Russia figured prominently in the British loan debate. Proponents argued that the credit would establish Britain as a bulwark against the spread of Communism.
