CPA officials interviewed said the knife wounds. manpower pinch might be felt as Dies Of Sun Stroke early as October or November, growing out of three factors: (1) demands for perhaps 1,000,000 men in construction and building materials, (2) sizeable expansion in the retail trades and services, and (3) continued but smaller new hiring by factories.

Some analysts in the Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion say there is "better than a 50-50 chance" for a manpower shortage this fall; others believe it will be severe in some industries and localities but not general. The U.S. Employment Service

holds mainly to the latter view. Throughout the government, of ficials voice surprise over the rate at which private industry has absorbed discharged veterans - almost 10,000,000 in the last ten months, USES says. Five out of every six servicemen released up to June were at work or in school.

Real labor tightness is likely to be felt this fall, CPA analysts be-lieve, when the flow of men returning from the armed services slacks off at just about the time that thousands of young men and women quit their vacation jobs to go back to school. However, to some extent this will be offset by the usual fall drop in farm employment.

# Name Signed To Hometown Agent Checks

Price Five Cents

WASHINGTON -(P)-Joseph Freeman, a munitions manufacturer's Washington agent whose salary skyrocketed from \$5,841 to to \$70,000 in four years, testified Monday that he asked Rep. May (D-Ky) for business help "six or eight times.

But Freeman told the Senate War Investigating Committee, searching into the wartime operations of an Illinois munitions combine, that he 'didn't know" whether May had ever visited his office.

That response came after Chairman Mead (D-NY) cautioned him to "think hard and long, and renember that you are under oath."

The committee has received testimony that May, chairman of the House Military Committee, interceded with the War Department to give contracts to the munitions combine. May has declared his activities were solely in the interest of the war effort and that he aid not profit.

The combine received wartime contracts amounting to more than \$78,000,000.

"Was the congressman cooperative?" inquired Mead.

"Not always," said Freeman. Under questioning, Freeman testified that sometimes he had to wait as much as a week in order to get May's help on problems involving the Erie Basin and Batavia Metal Products companies, two cf the concerns in the combine.

Before Freeman was called to the stand, Mead announced that the committee is examining the law "as to bringing Congressman May before the committee by legal process." Freeman related that one of the transactions concerning which he contacted May was the formation of the Cumberland Lumber Company, Prestonsburg, Ky., home town



France Thanks U.S. In Bastille Day Ceremony

PARIS—(P)— Winston Churchill, speaking in Metz Sunday at a Bas-tille Day celebration marking the 157th anniversary of the French Revolution, called on Europe to "rise from her ruins and spare the world a third and possibly fatal holocaust," a goal which he said necessitated a "strong France."

Meanwhile French President Geogres Bidault, speaking at a similar celebration in Paris, voiced "the gratitude of the French people" to the United States for her role in the liberation of France from the Nazis and said differences between the two countries were like "old friends' quarrels."

From Washington President Truman, in a recorded speech shortwaved to France, saluted the nation on her first peacetime Bastille Day in seven years.

"In spite of her losses and the destruction of her territory for the second time in 25 years, France remains in the front line of the free nations of the earth, proclaiming today the same principles of liberty and of respect for the individual as those in whose name her people spoke 157 years ago," President Truman said.

Churchill, who spoke at a dinner given in his honor by the Municipality of Metz, referred to Russia as "our heroic ally."

The former British Prime Minister declared there could be "no revival of Europe or its culture without a strong France."

Emphasizing the necessity for British - French understanding, Churchill asserted: "You must never allow the slightest recrimination between Great Britain and France.







## Revolt Of The Suckers

Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union, is the latest union leader to join the leadership of what might be called the Revolt of the Suckers. Recently CIO President Philip Murray rebuked the Communists for their infiltration tactics. Then Morris Munster re-signed as head of the CIO furniture workers as a protest against Communist control of his union. Now Curran has lashed out against the same state of affairs in the NMU's higher echelons.

Curran spoke in no uncertain terms. Among other things, he called the recent NMU elections "one of the worst machine jobs I have seen." He charged the Communists with withholding from the membership information on the state of their own union.

He accused them of putting parasitic followers on the payroll and running the union into the red, of trying to make their blessing a prerequisite to holding office, and of breaking their promise to allow the rank and file to control the union.

This is substantially the story of Communist tactics in every union where they have managed to seize a strong

It is evident that the Communists in the labor move-ment think they're smart. They have absorbed the Russian revolutionary technique which emphasizes discipline, secrecy, tight organization and unremitting work. They obviously believe that the rank and file can be led or pushed, rallied by song and slogan, and made to swallow any preposterous story that suits the leaders' purpose, so long as it is told loudly and often enough.

This may have worked well enough in Russia and some other countries. But here the Communists have made several bad mistakes, which are now catching up

They evidently thought that energy was a substitute for resourcefulness, and that discipline takes the place of adaptability. They overlooked the fact that the "dopes' "suckers" might succeed in electing some of their own officers who wouldn't forever come to heel.

Most of all, perhaps, they forgot that they were up against a different sort of rank and file. Sure, the rank and file and some leaders, like Curran, have played along with the Communists. But the rank-and-file American can be pushed just so far and fooled just so many times. He can also be suspicious and alert. He is literate. And he has ample sources of information in a country where inquiry and speech are free.

During the war, when the Communists were lying low, the rank and file seemed to wise up. Today the same old line and tactics (and the Communists seem to lack the imagination to develop new ones) just aren't going over. The Revolt of the Suckers is under way.

### A Strike Is A Strike Is A Strike

The purpose of this piece is to confuse you thoroughly. It's the only way to show how balled up things

are. But don't say you weren't warned.

The other day the coal miners filed a complaint that they can't mine coal to keep the nation's economy going unless there is more bread and meat in the stores for them to eat. Of all the crazy commentaries on the cockeyed condition of the country, this takes first prize.

What's the matter with these miners? Don't they realize their "No eats, no work" policy constitutes a strike

The farmers are now on strike for higher grain and livestock prices, just as the miners recently were on strike for higher wages and welfare.

Don't these miners realize that for them to eat now would be worse than crossing a picket line? It would be plain strikebreaking. The miners should, therefore, continue their work without eating, because no miner would ever think of interfering with the national economy. This is obvious nonsense. Or is it? If a rose is a

rose is a rose, then a strike is a strike is a strike. Of course, it would be all right for the packinghouse workers to go on strike next month and stop the production of meat that way. But it's wrong for the farmers to stop production of meat by refusing to sell their pigs and steers till the price goes up.

### An Interesting Race

Best guesses are that it will be two years before receipts of natural rubber from abroad attain anything like their prewar volume. And when that time comes it will be interesting to watch the race between the natural and

Synthetic rubber, though expensive and inferior in some respects, was good enough to win the wartime "rubber battle." Now it must compete in price and quality with natural rubber in peacetime competition.

An indication that the competition will be keen is found in the fact that 334 patents were taken out last year-almost one a day-in the synthetic rubber field. These, of course, are not basic inventions or inventions based on the first large-scale usage. They are improvements resulting from ample data derived from observing characteristics and performance in widespread use over a considerable period of time.

Probably the chief reason why this race will be interesting is that such competition holds the eventual promise of giving the public more varied and abundant rubber products at lower prices.
