Cleveland to compete in Jr. Olympics again

Vicki Cleveland will make her second appearance in the 100-meter hurdles during the 1979 National AAU-USA Sears Junior Olympic Games on the University of Nebraska campus at Lincoln this weekend.

The 100-meter hurdle trials, semifinals and finals will be run Saturday and televised on Lubbock's NBC affiliate, KCBD-TV, at 4 p.m.

She will be among 2,000 athletes from across the United States competing for national championships in track and field events which include boxing, diving, gymnastics, judo, synchronized swimming and wrestling.

Cleveland, 17, won the AAU Junior Olympics Region IX Meet hurdles last month in Lubbock to qualify for the national event.

Her main goal will be to lower her best time of 14.0. "I hope to make it into the 13's. I'll have to run that fast to make it into the finals,"

she said. "My main problem in breaking 14 flat has been my start, so I've been working on my starts and running to the first hurdle. I haven't been taking a good strong first step. I've been kinda walking out," she added.

Cleveland, who will be a senior this fall in Dimmitt High School, finished seventh in last summer's 100-meter finals and is aiming for an even better finish this year.

"I'm really going to work for a medal," she said, adding, "the top six finishers in the finals get a medal."

Cleveland has been running and exercising every morning at the DHS track, using a structured workout program prescribed by Coach Ralph Tate of Oklahoma State University.

The Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring Cleveland again this year.

'Meet the Bobcats' night is scheduled

The Dimmitt Athletic Booster Club's pre-season party this year will be the biggest ever, and will be held outdoors.

Instead of the traditional ice cream party, the Booster Club and DHS coaches will stage a "Meet the Bobcats Night" at Bobcat Stadium, complete with a "mothers clinic" for people who don't know much about football, an ice cream supper, and introduction of coaches, cheerleaders, and all high school players from freshmen through seniors.

The event will begin at 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 17, just before the Bobcats' evening workout. That will be the first day the players can work out in full uniform.

New Head Coach Wayne Garner proposed the special event at Monday night's Booster Club meeting. Garner said his coaching staff and players will demonstrate the offensive and defensive formations the Bobcats will use this year, explain basic football tactics and training techniques, and explain the protective equipment which the boys wear.

Also, all high school players and coaches will be introduced to parents and fans. Most of the coaches are new this year. After the introductions and clinic, the boys will go into their evening workout and the Booster Club will start selling homemade ice cream.

All parents and fans who have ice cream freezers are asked to bring homemade ice cream for the outing.

Monday night's Booster Club meeting was the first of the year, and included election of officers. Leading the Booster this year will be Marvin Bryant, president; Joe Josselet, vice-president; Gwyn Bryant, treasurer; Louise Nelson, secretary; Sue Boozer, refreshments chairman; and John Brooks, reporter.

Bryant succeeds George Howell, who has served as the Booster Club president two years.

Club members voted to raise the dues this year to \$5 per person and \$10 per couple. The club postponed action on whether to order more "Snug Bug" stadium bags, vests, jackets, caps or pins.

Don Nelson reported on the projected cost and income of this year's football programs. Varsity Cheerleaders are currently selling ads for the 24-page programs, which will include pictures of all varsity players and coaches, plus the varsity, junior varsity, freshman and junior high schedules.

The club voted to increase the price of programs to 50 cents each this year. The varsity cheerleaders get the profit from advertising revenue, while the Booster Club and Boy Scouts share the proceeds of program sales.

No jerseys returned; site may be changed

As of Wednesday morning, none of the football jerseys stolen from the Dimmitt High School field house early this summer had been returned, Coach Wayne Garner said.

A drop-box was placed at Allsup's Convenience Store last week by the Dimmitt Independent School District as a depository for the missing game and practice jerseys totaling \$15,000.

An alternate site may be chosen for the drop-box, Garner said, adding that the jersey returns might be great-

er if the box were placed in another location.

Although the Dimmitt Police Department is investigating the case, it has made no arrests.

No questions will be asked of anyone dropping a jersey into the box, Supt. Robert Ryan said, adding that the school district is only interested in retrieving the missing jerseys.

The drop-box is presently located under the canopy on the front of the Allsup's Store and is identified by a sign.

Enrollment days announced

Vacation time is running out fast for students in Castro County schools, with Aug. 22 set as enrollment date for Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth schools. Classes will begin the following day.

Even earlier, Dimmitt High School seniors and students who will be new to the school and did not previously register during the summer, are to register in the high school counselor's office next week, Monday through Friday.

In-service sessions for teachers will be a preliminary to pupil enrollment, beginning Aug. 20 in all three schools.

Dimmitt

The schedule for enrollment in Dimmitt High School calls for juniors to register between 9 and 10 a.m. Aug. 22, sophomores from 10 to 11 and freshmen from 11 to 11:45, Principal D.W. Harkins has announced. Students will pick up their schedules and materials that day.

Students new to the high school, who have not already registered, are asked to bring their health cards and report cards when they register next week, according to D.H. Koeninger, DHS counselor. Any who are not able to report at this time may enroll during regular registration Aug. 22.

At Dimmitt Middle School registration will be in the library, from 9 to 10:30 for eighth grade students, 10:30 to 12 noon for seventh grade. Those who miss registration in the morning may report between 1 and 4 p.m., Principal Emmett Broderson said.

New students who have not already registered for fourth to sixth grades may enroll at any time during the day in the foyer, he added.

Enrollment in elementary grades will be conducted Aug. 22, at Helen Richardson School, where all teachers are to be in the building.

Two days of in-service programs for Dimmitt teachers, featured by a seminar conducted by Dr. Berlie Fallon, professor of education at Texas Tech, will begin at 8 a.m. Aug. 20. The Monday sessions will include orientation for new faculty members and a general assembly.

Dr. Fallon will direct the PEPPER seminar beginning at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Aug. 21. It will be concerned with

professional excellence, personal creativity and self-understanding. Teachers will spend the remainder of the day in their rooms, preparing for classes.

A get-acquainted social for teachers new to the system will be hosted by the board members and the administrative staff at 7:30 p.m. that evening in the city hall assembly room.

Hart

New faces will be plentiful on the Hart schools' faculty, Supt. Ted Averitt said, and that district is still looking for a speech therapist and an art teacher. The school opening schedule there is virtually identical to Dimmitt's.

After two days of in-service programs and registration Aug. 22, classes will begin Aug. 23 in all schools. Principal Ed Ammons reminds students that they must be in class the first period of the first day to qualify for a perfect attendance record.

Three new courses, trigonometry, art and choir, will be offered this year in HHS, Ammons said, and students who wish to enroll for these are asked to contact him as soon as possible. Those who plan to enroll for chemistry are also asked to contact the principal.

History-book cover art was completed at 4 a.m.

Pete Gonzalez, 23, didn't know an Eclipse from any other kind of windmill. But he did his research, submitted a sketch, and his drawing of the wood-bladed windmill will go down in history.

That is, it will be reproduced in gold leaf as the cover design of Castro County's permanent history book.

Members of the Castro County Historical Commission



had specified the design for the history-book cover. They wanted an 8 1/2 x 11 drawing that included an Eclipse windmill and a barbed-wire fence, two of the main inventions that helped tame the prairie.

Gonzalez found his Eclipse windmill on the cover page of the News's 1975 Roundup issue. It was a duotone reproduction of a photograph taken by M. L. Simpson at the Texas Tech Ranch Heritage Museum.

Gonzalez and nine or 10 other area artists submitted sketches. "The reason they said they picked my drawing," he said, "was that it included the foundation posts at the bottom of the windmill tower."

There were several men on the committee who know from experience just how it was supposed to be. They had me redraw it and change a few little things about it. They wanted it to be exact.

He added, "I stayed up until 4 o'clock in the morning drawing it the way they wanted it. I think I hate windmills now . . ."

Gonzalez, who is assistant manager of the Castro County Housing Authority, has been drawing and painting ever since he was first grader at Nazareth.

"The nun who taught us in [See COVER ART, Page 7]

Funeral services for John William Collins, 14, were held Saturday at 2 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church of Dimmitt with Rev. Howard Quiett, pastor of the church, officiating.

Burial was held in the Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

Collins, son of Wayne and Darlene Collins of 704 Cleveland, was pronounced dead on arrival around 3 p.m. Thursday at Plains Memorial Hospital from head injuries he received after falling from a horse.

Collins, who was riding with two friends on his family's farm, apparently struck his head after he fell from the horse.

Born Oct. 9, 1964, he moved to Dimmitt with his family five years ago from Goodland, Kansas. Collins would have been a freshman in Dimmitt High School this fall.

Collins was president of the Jr. High band and was member of the Jr. High football, basketball and track teams. A Boy Scout, he was a member of the First United Methodist Church.

As a hobby, Collins built model airplanes and played tennis.

He is survived by his parents; a brother, Joe and a sister Suzan; two grandmothers, Katy Collins of Dimmitt and Gwen Gilmore of Anton; one grandfather, Richard Fox of Rosedale; three uncles, James Collins and Ted Collins of Dimmitt and Jimmy Fox of Houston; and two aunts, Doris Miller of Goodland, Kansas and Dianna Roberts of Lubbock.

C-C exec resigns

Resignation of Shirley Hall as manager of the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, to be effective Oct. 1, was accepted by the Chamber's board of directors at its August meeting this week and board members immediately began a search for her successor.

Mrs. Hall, who has seen the Chamber membership and budget increase substantially during the more than a year she has served as manager, in submitting her resignation said she is leaving the job for personal reasons.

She will leave the Chamber with 180 members, working this year with a budget of more than \$20,000. Responsible for organizing many of the activities surrounding the annual Castro County Fair, she will promote the 1979 fair, Sept. 7 and 8 as a community project before her resignation takes effect.

Mrs. Hall has also worked with numerous other projects sponsored by the Chamber during her tenure as manager, and has worked especially to expand membership.

Jerry Marvin, Chamber of Commerce president, said the board hopes to find a replacement for Mrs. Hall as soon as possible. Anyone may apply for the position by contacting the Chamber office, he said.

"We welcome ideas and suggestions from all our members as we seek to fill this important position," Marvin added.

Submitting her resignation, Mrs. Hall said, "I have enjoyed my work with the Chamber of Commerce and I appreciate the fine cooperation I have received from the Chamber board and all of our members."

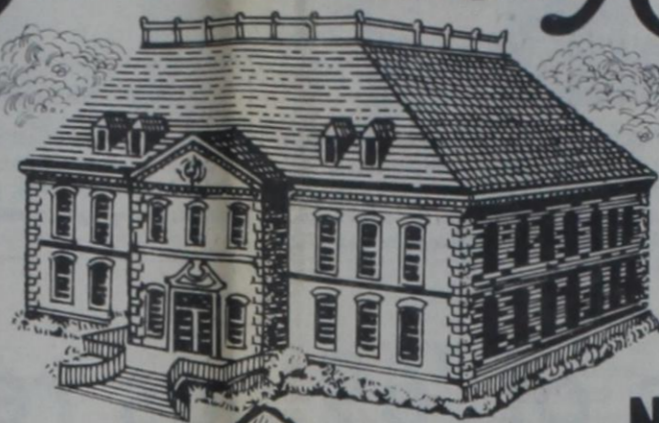

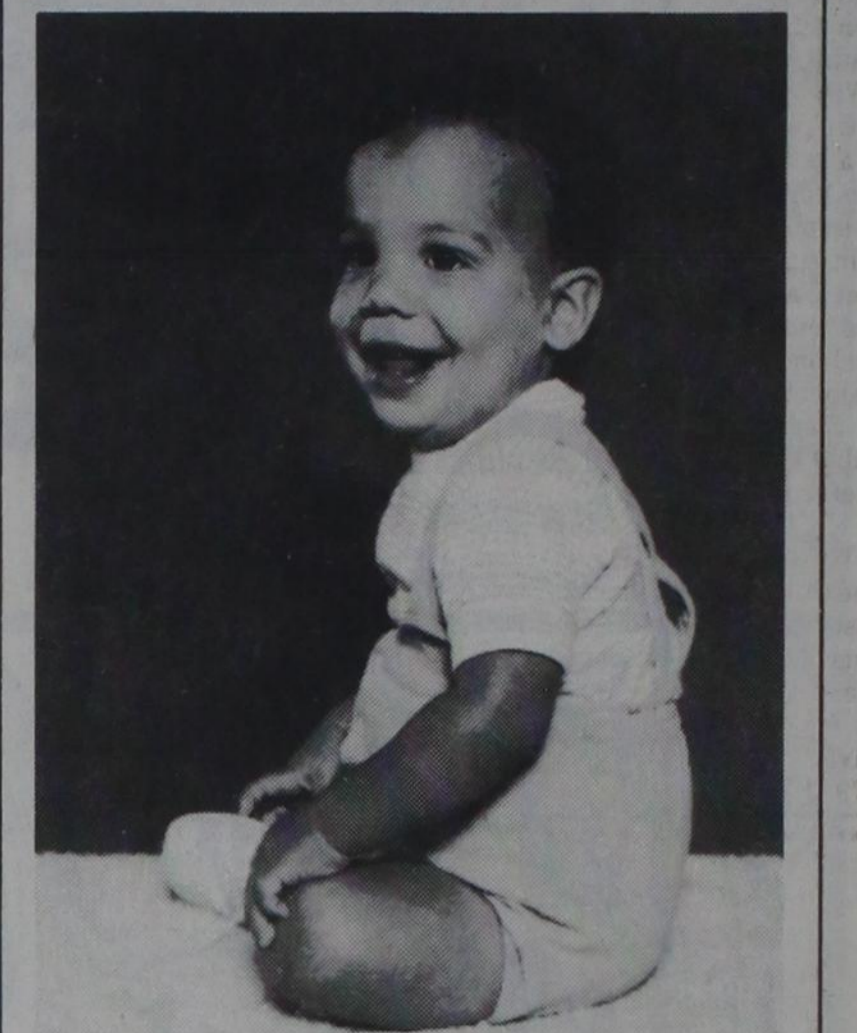

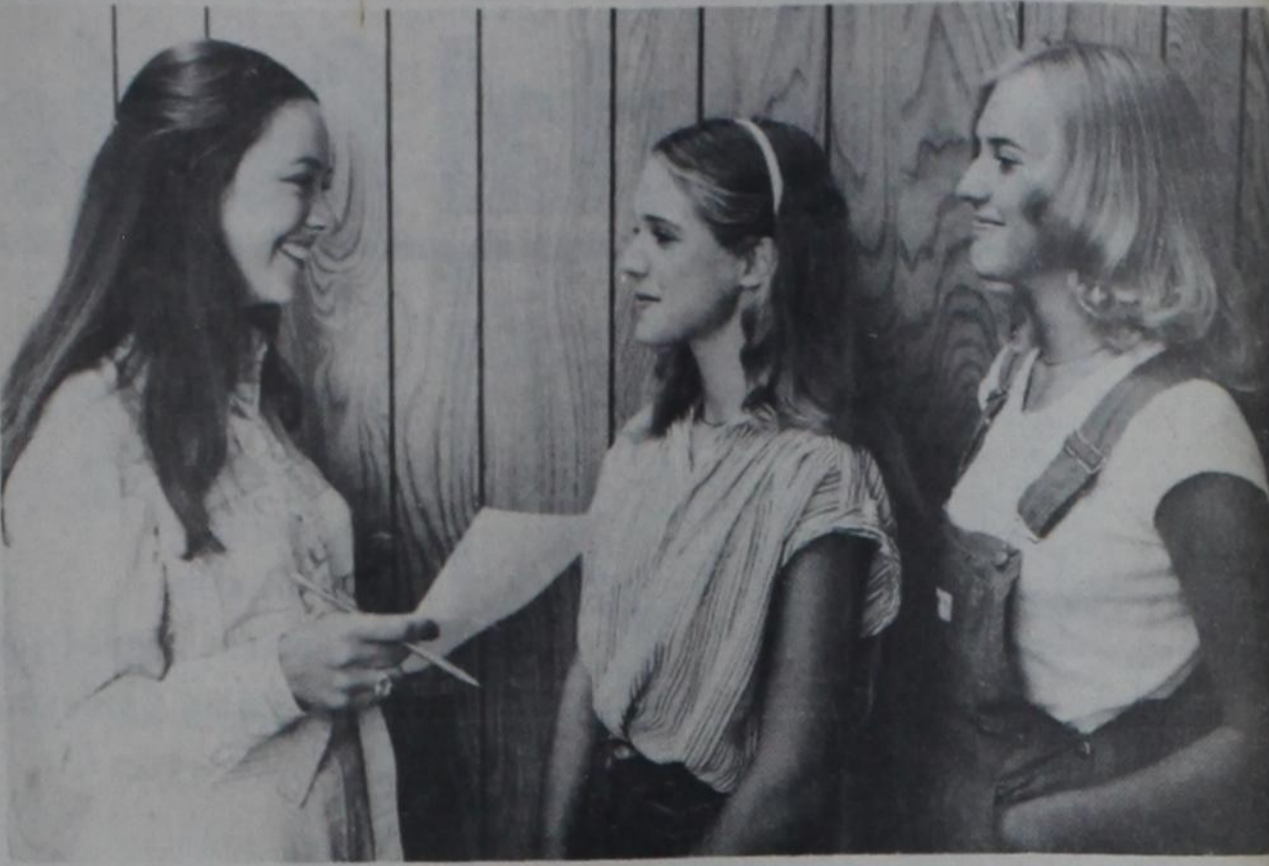
Two masters degrees given from WTSU

Hance asks district's opinion about issues

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance has announced he is mailing a questionnaire to all residents of the 19th Congressional District seeking their opinions concerning present and future legislative proposals.

The questionnaires have been mailed and local resi-

dents should begin receiving them in the mail this week.

"We want to try to get the opinions of all the people in the 19th District," said the congressman. "In the questionnaire we have covered a wide range of topics in an attempt to get the overall feelings of the people. We strongly encourage people to take just a few minutes to fill out the questionnaires and mail them back to my Washington office."

Issues listed on the questionnaire include a balanced federal budget, gas rationing, returning the post office to congressional control, military draft or registration, 55-mile speed limit, six-year presidential term, nuclear power plants, nuclear waste storage in Texas and New Mexico, national health insurance, oil price decontrol, solar energy and coal, saccharin ban, tax credit for parents of college students.

It also asks for opinion on the single most important issue today—agriculture, defense, energy, health, inflation, taxes or international relations?

"We will carefully evaluate every returned questionnaire to see what issues most concern the people of West Texas," Hance said. "This is one way I know of making sure every person has a voice in the federal government."

"One of the biggest problems of government today is that the people do not feel they have any say in what happens. I intend to make sure the people I represent have as much say as possible and this questionnaire should provide them as avenue for input to their elected representative," he added.

Residents of the district will have until September 1 to fill out the questionnaire and send it back to Hance's office. The questionnaire is a four-page brochure which allows participants to fill out the questions, detach and mail it using the self-address already printed on it. The remainder can be retained for reference of congressional office telephone numbers and addresses.

Here's what 4-H is

Some have asked, "What is 4-H?"

4-H is a youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which focuses on the needs, interests and concerns of young people. Its aim is to help youth gain a positive self concept, rational social behavior, knowledge and problem-solving capabilities. Boys and girls between the ages of 9 & 19 from all ethnic, racial, cultural and economic groups, regardless of geographic localities, may participate.

Through planned individual projects, meetings, groups activities and participation in local, county, regional, state, and national events, members develop new skills, learn cooperation, develop leadership abilities, improve their citizenship and have fun.

Although early work in 4-H concentrated on agricultural and home economics subjects, today's 4-H and youth projects have been broadened to involve youth in urban as well as rural families. Emphasis is on helping youth develop skills to better cope with demands, events and opportunities in their everyday lives.

Youth can participate in 4-H activities through the 4-H club which is a continuous organization with one or more volunteer leaders and elected officers and project groups where members work on one project or subject matter area.

4-H is sponsored jointly by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System; Extension Service, USDA; and County Commissioners' Courts. Private donors provide additional program support.

Volunteer leaders are the cornerstone of the 4-H program. They conduct educational activities with youth and serve in other specialized roles.

Orientation and assistance with the local 4-H program is provided by County Extension Agents in each county. State and area 4-H and youth specialists support County Extension Agents with materials and assistance in programing.

Youth can be involved in numerous projects including bicycle, woodworking, aerospace, automotive, dog care, career exploration, consumer information, public speaking, photography, teen exploring parent education, landscape horticulture, recreation, and safety.

4-H also provides opportunities for scholarships and travel. meeting new and interesting friends from across the country.

The 4-H emblem is a four-leaf clover with the letter "H" on each leaf. The four "H's" stand for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. Leaves of the clover are green and the "H" are white. The white is for purity. Green is nature's most common color and is symbolic of youth, life and growth. The 4-H Motto is "To Make the Best Better." 4-Hers pledge is:

My head to clearer thinking,

Teresa's topics

My heart to greater loyalty,
My hand to larger service,
and
My health to better living,
for my club, my community,
my country and my world.

4-H Prayer: Help my, O Lord, to live so that the world may be a little better, because Thou didst make me.

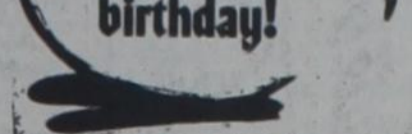
Shower plans for newlyweds are announced

Grain sorghum board to elect new officers

Grain sorghum producers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on Sept. 15 as terms of four current board members expire at that time.

Members leaving the board are John Gilbreath of Hart, E.C. Witten of Edmonson, A.W. Anthony Jr. of Friona and Don Nelson of Tulia.

Incumbents are eligible for re-election to the 6-year, non-salaried position as long as

they are bonafide grain sorghum producers.

Any qualified person's name may be placed in nomination for the board by application to the organization, signed by himself and 10 others who are also eligible to vote.

All nominations must be filed by Aug. 15, at the TGSPB office, 1708 15th, Lubbock, 79401. Forms are available at that office.

Any person in the TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms, their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by Sept. 15. Ballots may also be obtained at the local county agent's office.

One of the most interesting developments lately has been the popularity of self-help or "personal resource" books. They are the kind that neatly talk you into accepting yourself no matter how messed up your psyche happens to be.

Mixed drink tax revenue totals given

Castro County's total tax revenue on the legal sale of mixed drinks totaled \$5,733.34 during the months of April through June according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The county received a 15 percent rebate totaling \$860.00. Dimmitt's total tax revenue was \$813.44 for the second quarter with the 15 percent remittance totaling \$122.02. Nazareth had sales totaling \$739.95 and received \$110.99 in remittance.

Bullock said gross receipts taxes on mixed drinks earned the state \$14 million in revenue during the second quarter of the year.

The mixed drink is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and the city-county share is rebated on a quarterly basis by the Comptroller's office.

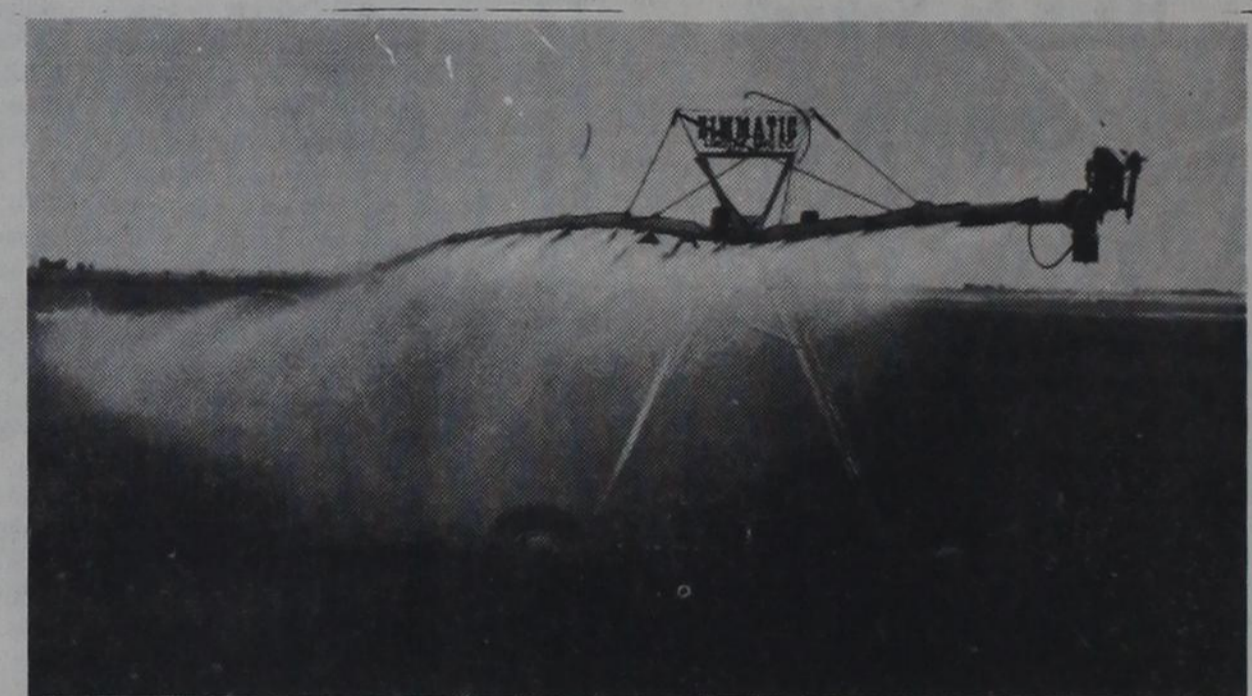

FOREIGN OWNERS OF AGRICULTURAL LAND—The Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act requires all foreign persons who acquire an interest in Agricultural Land to report such holdings to the Secretary of Agriculture within 90 days of the date of purchase. Reports are to be made to the Castro

County ASCS Office. **SET-ASIDE ACRES**—Set-aside acres cannot be grazed from May 1 thru October 31, 1979. Weeds, wind and soil erosion must be controlled. You can plant sorghum-grass crosses on this acreage, but it cannot be baled or cut for hay at any time.

FAILED CROPS—If your corn, milo or cotton suffers a disaster, you need to have it appraised before haying, cutting or silage, grazing or plowing to be covered for Disaster Payments.

1978 PROGRAM PAYMENTS—As of May 31, 1979, Castro County producers had been paid \$7,945,279, in Program Payments under the 1978 Feed Grain, Wheat and Cotton Programs.
