Locations were reported Wednesday by Humble Oil & Refining Company for a 10,000-foot wildcat in Southeast Reagan County, and for major steps from recent discoveries in Southwest Kent and in Northwest Ector counties.

Another In Kent

Humble No. 1-C R. B. Cowden, et al. 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 36, block 5, H&GN survey, in Southwest Kent County, is contracted to go to around 8,500 feet or oil or water in the Ellenburger, at a lesser depth.

North Of Discovery

The drillsite is approximately one mile north of the initial Devonian producer in the North Goldsmith area, and it is about one and three-quarters of a mile north of Humble's No. 1 R. B. Cowden, now preparing to complete from the Devonian after showing for production from that formation on a recent drillstem test.

In last test reported, the well flowed 78.33 barrels of 38.9 gravity oil in 18 1/2 hours, through a 1/4-inch tubing choke, with gas-oil ratio of 856-1, and with a grindout of four-tenths of one per cent sediment.

UAW Initiates 7-Day Meat Buyers Strike

The CIO United Auto Workers has projected a meat buyers strike to which they invited the participation of all America's consumers.

Fighting the climb in living costs, the big labor union which helped to set up the nation's postwar wage structure sought to mobilize the public against "exorbitant" meat prices.

The UAW-CIO, calling for cooperation from its own 800,000 members and all other organized labor and consumer groups, ordered its strike to start Wednesday. It is to last seven days.

FRANKFURT, GERMANY—(AP)—Russian authorities have told the United States Army that two United States officers who supposedly disappeared into the Russian zone of Berlin recently cannot be located, it was announced officially here Wednesday.

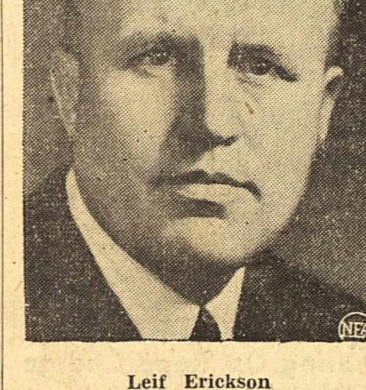

Senator Says U.S. Won't Be Coerced In World Issues

WASHINGTON—(P)—Senator Austin (R-Vt.) Wednesday joined Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) in declaring that the United States will not be "coerced" into international decisions.

"The sooner the world learns that, the better," added Austin, who has been named by President Truman to represent this country on the United Nations Security Council.

This Austin forecast the same sort of firm United States stand in the UN council that Vandenberg said Secretary of State Byrnes took at the Paris foreign ministers' conference.

The Michigan senator added in a formal report to his colleagues Tuesday that the Soviets must learn that the Americans "cannot be driven, coerced or pressured" into decisions and "will not bargain in human rights and fundamental liberties anywhere on earth."

Alford, 467 feet from southeast and northeast lines of section 50 1/2, block Y, P. B. Scott survey, in East Upton County, which has been temporarily abandoned on a total depth of 10,384 feet in line, since May 9, 1942, is being cleaned out to determine condition of the hole, with there being a possibility that it might be deepened. The cleanout had reached 7,746 feet, and found a bridge at that point. Nature of the obstruction had not been determined but efforts to remove it, and go on down, are continuing.

Texan Predicts 50-Cent Cotton

By NIEL KINCEY
NEW ORLEANS—Talk of 40 and 50-cent cotton is being heard throughout the South, since OPA controls apparently are off the market for good, and 35 cents a pound has just been passed for the first time in more than a score of years.

Discussing the crop, which today is worth a potential \$300,000,000 more than last June 1, J. E. McDonald, Texas commissioner of agriculture, predicts that the price may soar as high as 50 cents a pound within the next few months. Another commissioner, Tom Linder of Georgia, comments that "cotton is cheap up to 50 cents a pound."

Linder, McDonald and others in official positions think the price of cotton has been too low for some time, and that the steady rise in prices during recent weeks will benefit the farmer economically. Others point to poor crops in the wake of rain and weevils. They say the increase in price will amount to an economic break for the farmer, in lieu of his increasing labor costs and other production expenses.

The price of cotton on the New Orleans cotton exchange fluctuated under 35 cents a pound on July 16, after most months had closed well above the 35-cent mark the day before. Exchange statistics show that cotton has increased about \$30 a bale from June 1, 1946, or from about \$144 to \$175 per 500-pound bale.

Unemployed Veterans Exceed Civilians In County Out Of Work

Unemployed veterans outnumber unemployed civilian workers by approximately three to one in the Midland area, W. H. Donathan, district supervisor for the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, has reported in a comparison of veteran unemployment with individuals receiving civilian unemployment insurance. He said that the veterans were searching for jobs themselves and that the employment service was aiding but that churches, civic clubs, and merchants associations were needed to help solve this major reconversion problem—the re-employment of war veterans.

In the Midland area there are 25 unemployed civilian workers filing claims for unemployment benefits, and 82 unemployed veterans. The latter are receiving readjustment allowances under the GI Bill of Rights, which is administered by the TUCU in Texas through agreement with the Veterans Administration. Payments under the GI Bill come from monies supplied by the VA out of congressional appropriations for that purpose.

The nation's economy will be unbalanced until these veterans find jobs, Donathan declared, explaining that this was not only a local problem but nationwide.

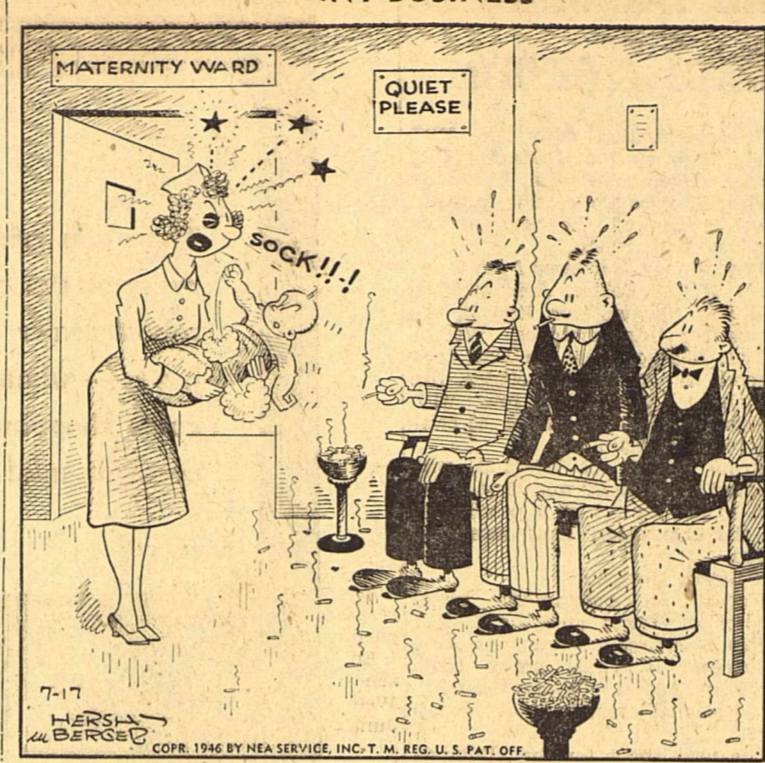

Ervin Dusk, virtually unknown rookie outfielder of the St. Louis Cardinals is the fair-haired boy to thousands in St. Louis Wednesday. The 26-year-old native of Chicago clouted a three-run pinch-hit ninth inning home run in Sportsman's Park to give the Cardinals a 5-4 victory over the league leading Brooklyn Dodgers and move the Redbirds to within a half game of the Braves.

Dusk battled for Pitcher Howie Pollet after Southpaw Joe Hatten had nicked Marty Marion with a pitched ball and Clyde Klutz singled. After fouling off a pitch and taking a called second strike, Du-

sak crashed Hatten's next offering into the left field stands before 26,591 fans.

The righthanded swinging Dusk broke into organized ball with Mottet of the Arkansas-Missouri league in 1938 and belted 18 homers. He advanced rapidly through the Card system, gaining a reputation as a home-run hitter and in 1941 and 1942 he played in a few games with Cards.

Chicago's third place Cubs missed an opportunity to gain on the Dodgers as Bill Voiselle of the New York Giants blanked the Cubs, 1-0, on six hits. Bill Rigney singled in the winning run in the ninth frame. Feller Beats Red Sox

Boston's front-running American League Red Sox dropped their second home game of the season to a western club as Bobby Feller of the Cleveland Indians scattered nine Red Sox's hits to post his 16th win of the year.

Feller in winning, 6 to 3, fanned seven batters to run his strikeout total to 202 for the season.

The Boston Braves took over undisputed possession of fourth place in the senior circuit by trouncing the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-0, behind big Mort Cooper while the Cincinnati Reds were shutout, 2-0, by Schoolboy Rowe of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Rowe yielded the Red Legs only five hits in outpitching Rookie Ewell Blackwell to gain his ninth victory of the season.

The St. Louis Browns retained their fifth place deadlock with Cleveland by trimming the Washington Senators, 7-1, behind Jack Kramer.

In the only other contest of the day, Portside Edgar Smith of the Chicago White Sox limited the Philadelphia Athletics to five safeties in elbowing the Pale Hose to a 6-2 victory.

The New York Yankees and the Detroit Tigers were not scheduled.

- Jewelry sales—up 26 per cent in June above last year.

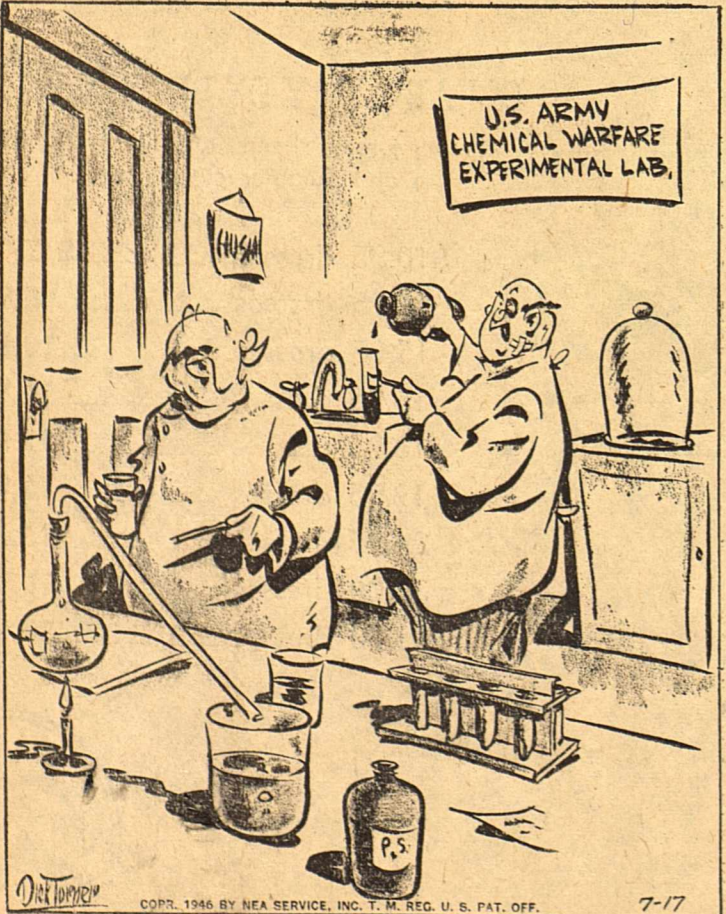

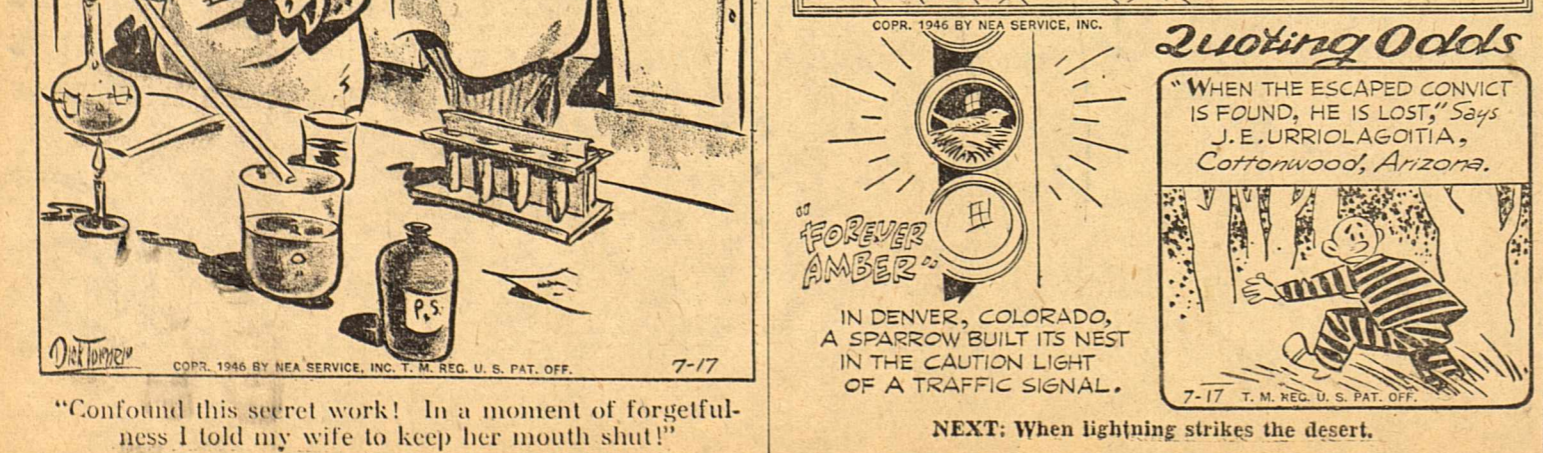
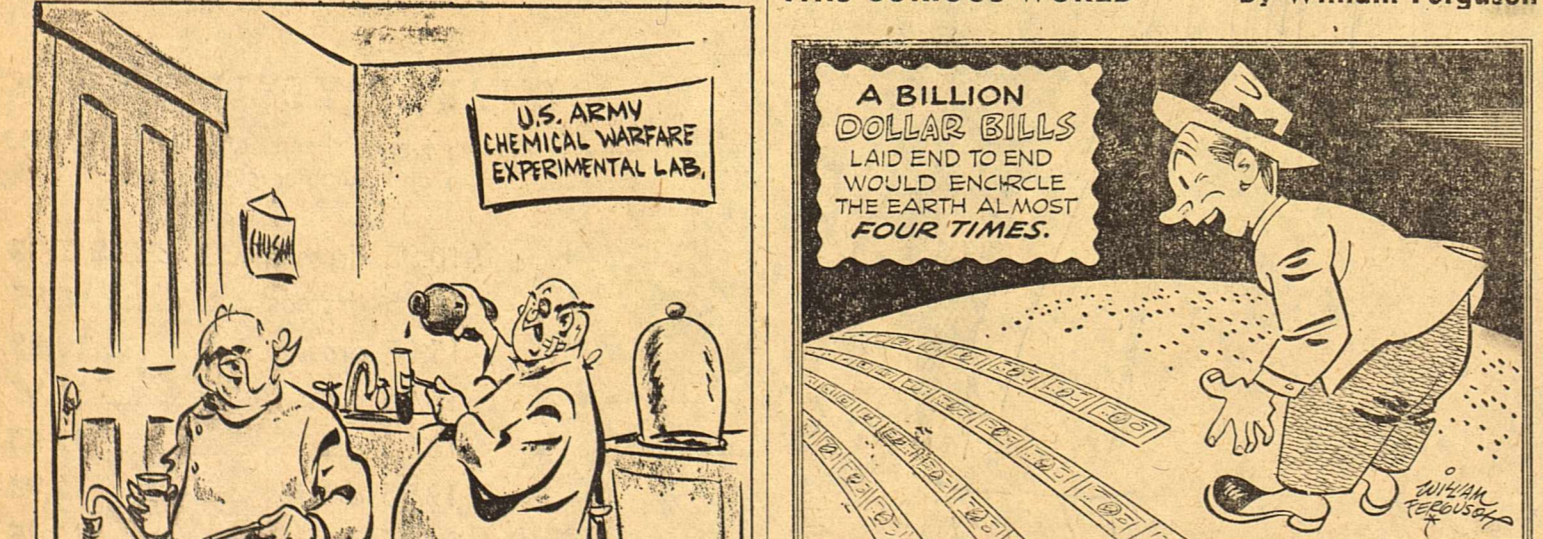

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

This is the third of a series of hands sent to me by Dick Kaplan, of Asheville, N. C., where the Southern Appalachian Tournament will be revived August 23, 24, and 25. The point brought out in this hand is the importance of small cards.

Ordinarily, Dick said, he would stop at six trump with this hand, but he thought that if he and his partner won a top on the board, the last of the session, they might win the duplicate as they had a pretty good game.

He elected to play it at spades rather than no trump because a shortage of clubs in his partner's hand was indicated by the bidding and it might be necessary to do some ruffing.

The opening heart lead was won in dummy with the ace, and the ace of spades cashed. Kaplan carefully playing the eight-spot from his own

hand. A small spade was won with the queen and Kaplan found the trumps banked against him. Remembering West's overall, he cashed the ace and queen of diamonds, then led the nine of spades. East covered and dummy won, and picked up the last trump with the seven of spades. The balance of the diamonds were cashed and at trick ten West found that he could not keep the king of hearts and protect the queen-jack of clubs.

If Kaplan had played the three on the first spade trick instead of the eight, East could have defeated the contract by covering the nine of spades at trick six. This would have forced declarer to win the last spade trick in his own hand, but he had to be sure to take the last spade in dummy in order to cash the diamonds and squeeze West.

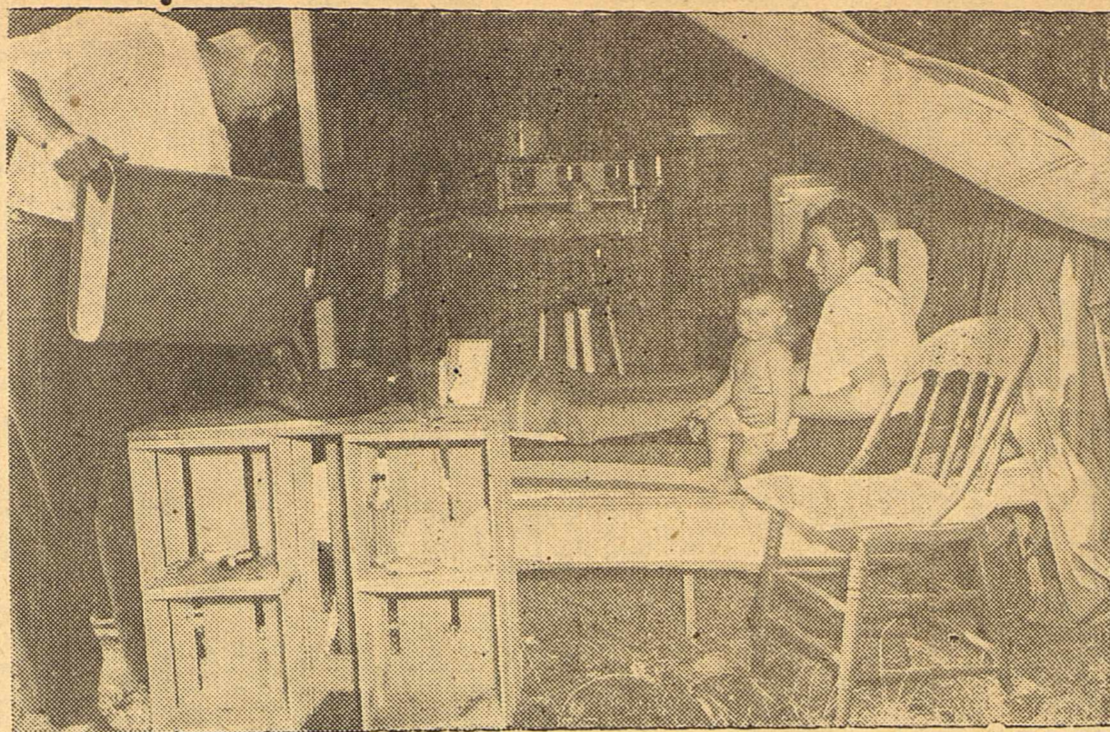

Commander Says Allies In Berlin Display Friendly Relations

BERLIN—(P)—The Irish combat soldier who bosses the American garrison in this showwindow of Allied occupation considers relations between the four powers in Berlin "very satisfactory."

Maj. Gen. Frank A. Keating also reports that the Army's "spit and polish" campaign has sharpened up occupation troops, but that results would be even better if the soldiers were more mature.

The red-faced, curly-haired commander, who began his Army career as an enlisted man, came to his present administrative post after winning a name for himself as an expert on amphibious warfare and leader of Doughboys in the field.

"Contrary to the general belief," he said, "the relations between the four powers in the Kommandatura in Berlin are very satisfactory. A friendly spirit prevails at all meetings, notwithstanding that we very frequently do not see eye to eye on all issues."

Keating said there was no question but that the Army's tighter discipline is producing results.

Felony Rate Drops
"The venereal rate in Berlin is gradually dropping, and at the present time is below the theater average level. Our misdemeanor and felony rate has dropped to a very low ebb."

"Isolated cases, however, are still reported. It is hard for me to understand why any soldier will, without provocation, assault a civilian, male or female, but they do."

"I am of the opinion that misconduct along this line has caused certain retaliatory measures to be taken by the Germans."

"The assaults on troops are usually due to an argument between two nations, or the cause arises in jealousy of German males over fraternization."

Keating added that many of the men in the European theater are young and just out of school, and haven't attained proper standards.

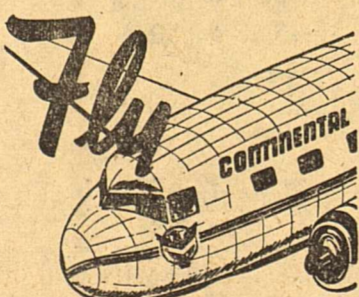
"I believe that if the average soldier was in an older age bracket we would be able to do more than we are now doing."

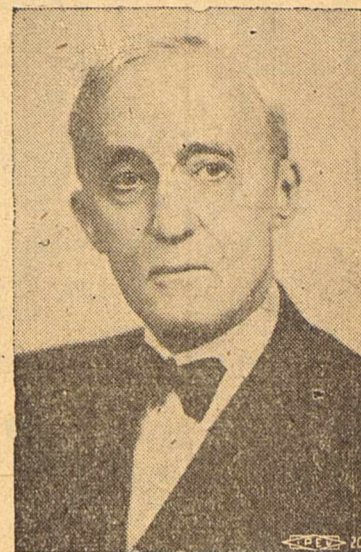
