SEATTLE-(AP)-Russian Naval Lt. Nicolai G. Redin was acquitted by a federal court jury Wednesday on espionage and conspiracy charges. A jury of seven men and five women brought in the verdict after more than 20 hours of deliberation. The government had charged that he purchased secrets about the USS Yellowstone, a new type destroyer tender, from Herbert G. Kennedy, shipyard engineer.
