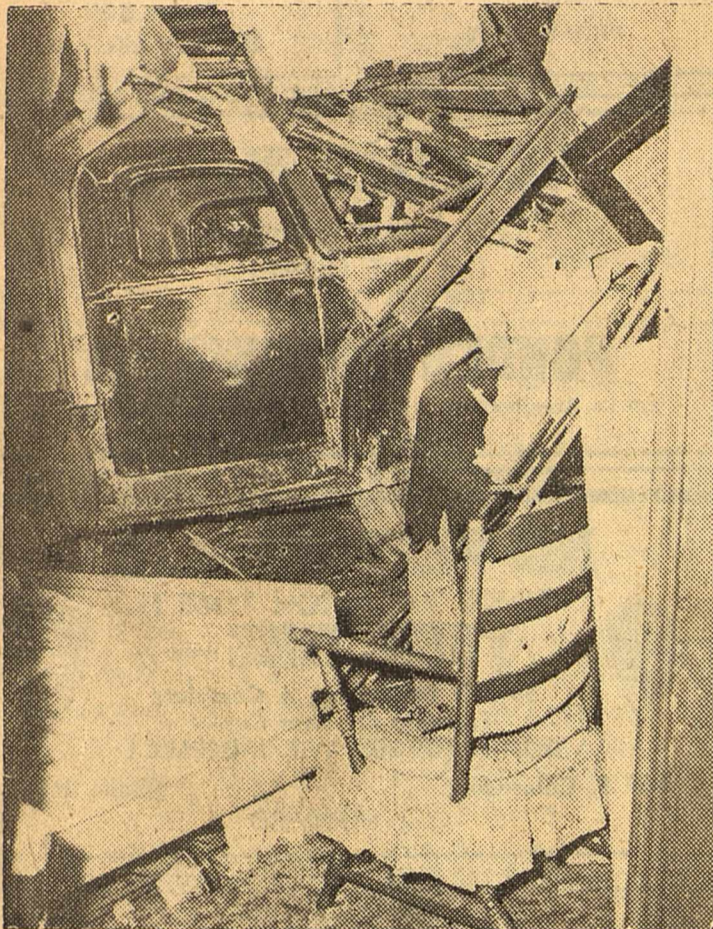

Skelly Wildcat In Fisher Shows Oil In Canyon Lime

MADAME SUN SAYS PRESENCE OF U. S. ARMED FORCES IN CHINA ENDANGERS PEACE—

Chiang Kai-Shek's Sister-In-Law Asserts Government Party Reactionaries Seek Civil War To Draw U.S., Russia Into Fight

By SPENCER MOOSA SHANGHAI—(AP)—Madame Sun Yat-sen, widow of the founder of the Chinese Republic and sister-in-law of its present leader, Chiang Kai-shek, said Monday in a rare interview that a desire to promote war between the United States and Russia motivates Kuomintang (Government Party) reactionaries seeking to stir up civil war.

Inactive in politics for years, she came out of semi-retirement to urge immediate establishment of a coalition government in the country now headed by her brother-in-law and to appeal to the United States to foster such a move by cutting off all military supplies to China.

As she issued her statement, Chinese Communists were claiming a big triumph on the coastal plain between here and Nanking, including the capture of 12,000 government troops and the commander of the government's 49th Army.

Communist spokesman Wang Ping-Non asserted 6,000 of the troops "threw down their arms in protest to the civil war" after they were ordered to attack Communist lines near Taihing, 60 miles east of Nanking.

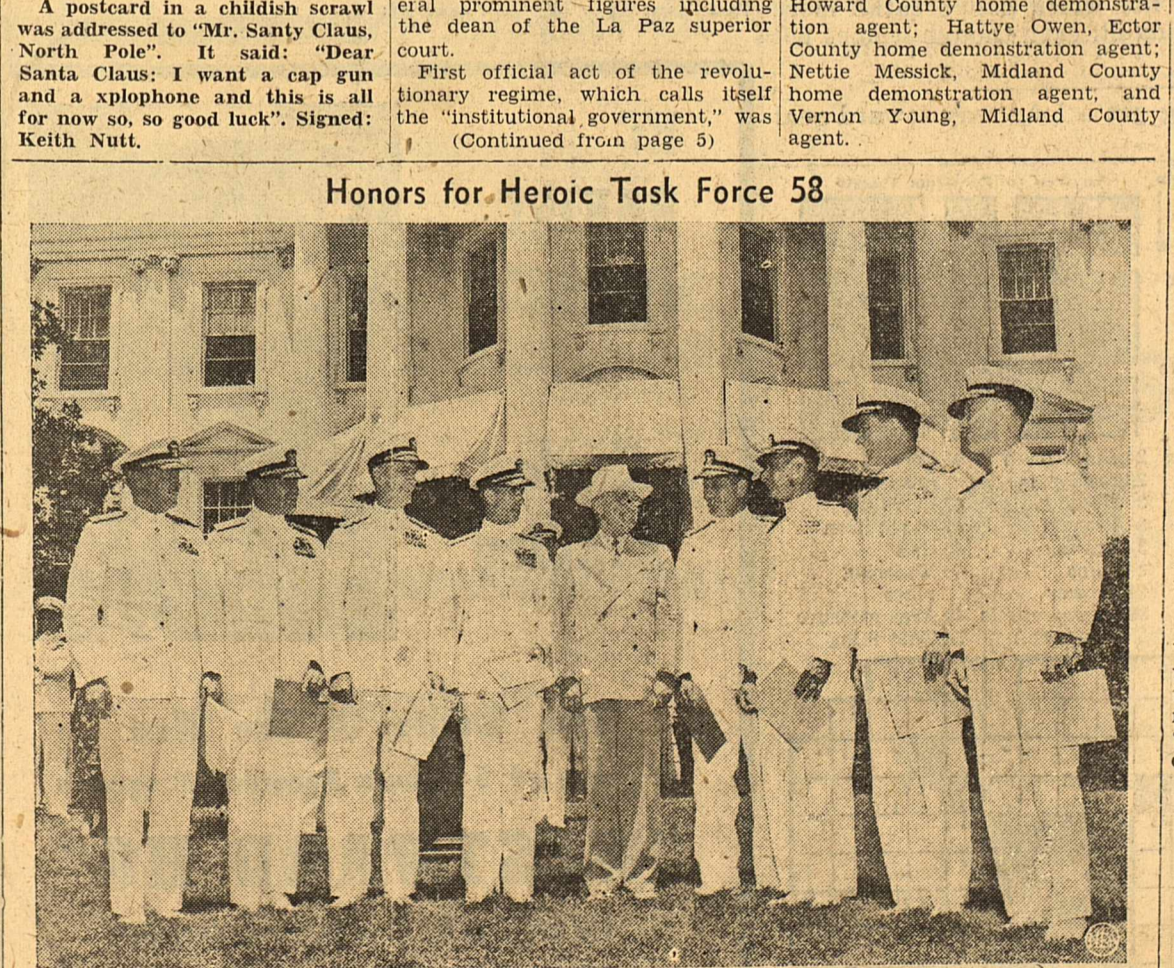

## Individualism To The Rescue

Despite all the speeches about democracy and dictatorship, and all the talk about national strength, geographical position and spheres of influence, international relations are determined in the end by the nature and character of the men who conduct them. This has been true throughout recorded history and remains true today. It is alternately a frightening and a comforting fact. And nowhere has it been better illustrated recently than at the Paris conference.

The foreign ministers' deadlock had held fast since last September, and showed no signs of breaking. Reasons of ideology and policy were cited to support the contention that an agreement was impossible unless a miracle happened. No one expected the miracle, or could predict its nature. But apparently it has come to pass in the shrewd, persuasive personality of Georges Bidault, premier and president of France.

Thanks to Bidault, the impasse over Trieste is dissolved and the prospects of peace treaties and a general peace conference at last definitely scheduled are, for the first time, bright. Thanks are also due the other three ministers for their amenable attitudes. But those attitudes seem to have been induced by Bidault's arguments.

Who is this political newcomer, and how did he do it? Common information on this side of the Atlantic is sketchy on both questions. But apparently Bidault is a small, quiet, reserved man who rose from obscurity through his leadership of the French underground during the occupation.

A relatively unknown professor, editorial writer and small-time politician, he seems to have attained eminence quite by accident as a result of his patriotic efforts. These efforts, carried out with a shrewdness and disarming innocence of manner, permitted him to direct and maintain the work of the underground without detection, while some of his closest associates were arrested, tortured and killed by the Nazis.

His patriotic service brought him to the attention of General de Gaulle. And through the intricate ramifications of French politics he found himself first in the French Foreign Office and then in his present eminent position.

That, briefly, tells who he is. But how he managed, as the weak junior member of this powerful foursome, to bring accord out of deadlock is a question whose complete answer is hidden within the walls of the Luxembourg Palace.

He inherited a canny, conciliatory policy from General de Gaulle and improved on it. Representing a country important enough to receive consideration but not strong enough to force an issue, he seems to have played both ends against the middle. Or to put it more politely, he apparently could see and appreciate the intransigent positions of Russia on the one side and America and Britain on the other, and by this longer perspective suggest solutions acceptable to all.

In budging the three greatest powers from their formerly immovable position Bidault has not only illustrated again the force of an individual in world affairs, but has also presented the future roles of the smaller nations in a new and hopeful light.

There will be future grave difficulties, certainly. But a way has been shown of solving the first and greatest, and as a consequence the world can breathe more easily. It can also thank Bidault, even though it does not know him very well as yet.

Families that get along get a long way toward real happiness.
