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Underwater **Atomic Test** Wednesday

75 Ships To Record Damage From Explosion

ABOARD THE USS APPALACH-IAN-(A)-The historic test of an underwater atomic bomb against a fleet stronger than most navies of the world was scheduled at 3:35 p. m. Wednesday, weather permit-

Early Wednesday a small craft believed to be the one from which the earth's first subsurface A-bomb will be suspended was towed into Bikini Lagoon past the 29 combat ships and 46 other vessels awaiting their possible doom.

From his flagship, the USS Mt. McKinley, Vice Adm. William H. P. Blandy flashed the word that the test was on, while he kept an eye on the squally weather, ready to

postpone everything if necessary. An erratic tropical weather front moved back over Bikini Atoll and the rest of the Marshalls, bringing clouds and rain, but meteorologists hoped a neighboring high pressure area would shove it off to the west.

The mysterious small craft entered the lagoon in tow of a tug early in the day and passed the line of target ships, many seared and blasted by the aerial A-bomb of It moved on to the central lo-

cation from which lines of target ships radiated outward as much as two miles like the spokes of a giant A canvas will conceal the bomb

from the eyes of the crew that will submerge it. Few See Actual Bomb

Only Dr. Marshall Holloway, Cornell physicist, and other scientists from Los Alamos, N. M., will see it. He was to start the mechanism that will detonate the bomb.



Death Penalty Set On Atom Security Violation

WASHINGTON - (P) - Senate and House conferees agreed Wednesday on the death penalty for major offenses against security under pending atomic energy legislation but failed to settle the issue of civilian versus military controls. Senator McMahon (D-Conn), head of the Senate members work-

ing with a House group on differences between the two chambers, told reporters after a morning session the conferees were in agreement that the death penalty should be provided in cases of security violations when there is clear intent to damage the United States.

McMahon said the conferees also agreed on a revision of the Houseproposed FBI loyalty check on all persons working in the field of atomic energy development under supervision of the proposed fivemember control commission.





More Strange Bedfellows

Incredible though it seems, Alfred M. Landon and Vyacheslav M. Molotov are in apparent agreement on one point of international policy. Both are opposed to a decentralized, agrarianized Germany.

Last February Landon made a speech in which he denounced "the iniquitous Morgenthau plan for defeated Germany," which called for decentralized government and an agrarian economy. Now Molotov, in presenting Russia's plan for Germany, has rejected such a setup, although he didn't use such blunt words or mention Morgenthau's named.

Russia's shift to Landon's way of thinking is rather recent. Earlier it appeared that Russia favored a decentralized Germany. What caused the change can only were made at Tuesday meetings.

Reparations may have something to do with the official Russian policy on Germany. Russia suffered deep economic wounds at the Nazi invaders' hands. They will Grandn be slow to heal. Certainly she deserves reparations, and as certainly she has received some in the large bites of German territory which she has taken for herself and her close associate, Poland.

Yet recently Russia mentioned the sum of \$10,000,-000,000 for further reparations. If any such sum should be fixed for payment by Germany, and if other sufferers from Nazi aggression should demand and be awarded comparable amounts, an industrialized Germany with a large foreign trade would be indispensable, even though such demands would probably be as ruinous to Germany as an agrarian economy.

As for unification, experience thus far seems to have Tawasi Girls To Be proved Landon and Molotov right. If occupation is to continue over a long period, as seems likely, a centralized administration of the whole country is the most logical arrangement.

In general (and on the surface), the Russian plan appears sane and reasonable and offers a promising basis of discussion and eventual agreement. It perceives a source of unrest and danger in an "annihilated" Germany, yet is conscious of the need for inter-Allied policing of German industry.

It favors a centralized Germany, yet promises no objection if, at some future date, a German state should decide by plebiscite to withdraw from that centralized government.

It sees in inter-Allied control of all German industry fulfillment of the Berlin conference decision to treat Germany as an economic whole—something which needs doing and has not been done to date.

All this emphasizes the possibility of agreement, not the many points of potential conflict. But, at least, the difficulties do not look to be totally insoluble at the moment. And that, after recent experiences, is good news.

This is probably monkeying with a buzz-saw, but here goes. The point is, you have to take these great big foreign-policy problems and fit them into something you're familiar with, close to home. Only then do involved issues begin to make sense.



It so happens that Maryland is the American state closest in size and population to Palestine. Vermont and New Hampshire may come closer in shape, but they don't have nearly as many inhabitants. Palestine covers 10,000 square miles and has 1,600,000 population. Maryland's area is 10,000 square miles, and its population is 1,800,-

Now supposing some high monkey-monk commission from the United Nations came along and said to the people of the great Free State of Maryland: "Lookit! You people cown there have got to take in another 100,000 immigrants, quick. The Russians have just confiscated the property of a lot of Germans in Austria and told them to get out. They want to come to the American zone in Germany, but there isn't room. So they want to come to Maryland. Get ready to take them in.

You can just imagine how much of a blow-up there would be in Baltimore if anybody tried to put over anything like that on the State of Maryland. Yet that is just about the formula the U.S. and British governments now propose to work on Palestine.

Palestine is in the news again. No. That's wrong. Palestine hasn't been out of the news since the end of World War I-since the days of Crusades-since the beginning of the Christian era—since the days of Moses. It is the world's oldest story, the world's oldest problem.

Truman Signs Bill For OPA Operation

WASHINGTON -(P)- President Truman signed into law Tuesday a bill providing \$75,000,000 for OPA operations during the fiscal year which started July 1.

The measure contains a ban on use of "propaganda" by the agency

in support of price controls.

The legislation also includes approximately \$2,000,000,000 for the Veterans Administration and a new \$465,000,000 contribution to United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.

The UNRRA allocation contains a section permitting the secretary of state to deny use of the funds in any countries which he finds do not permit "a reasonable number" of accredited press representative to report on the agency's operations without censorship restrictions.

The legislation is known as the third deficiency appropriation bill

It carries a total of \$2,652,860,866.96 in funds for various agencies.



Turner will face Olney F. Flynn, former Tulsa mayor, who won the Republican nomination in the first primary July 2.

Turner was chosen over Dixie Gilmer, Tulsa County prosecutor. Unofficial returns from 3,567 of the state's 3701 precincts gave Turner 190,042, Gilmer 166,241.

Defeated were Congressmen Jed Johnson, in the House 20 years; Lyle Boren, in Congress 10 years; and Victor Wickersham, a House member five years.

Johnson was beaten by District Judge Toby Morris of Lawton, who was making his fourth race against the veteran congressman. Youthful attorneys and World War II Veterans Glen D. Johnson and Preston E. Peden were chosen Democratic nominees to supplant Boren and Wickersham, respectively. Carl Albert, McAlester attorney, led Bill Steger, Durant attorney, by 184 votes in the race to succeed retiring Rep. Paul Stewart, third

National Polio Epidemic Averted But Texas Suffers

By FRANK CAREY

Associated Press Science Reporter Infantile paralysis already has struck more people this year than in the comparable period in 1944second worst "polio" year in U. S. records. But health authorities offer hope a major epidemic will be averted.

In Washington, a U. S. public health service official who asked anonymity said this hope is based on the fact that the cases thus far this year are scattered among larger number of states than in

He said the outbreaks in those states may well "level off" before they reach anything like the "explosive" outbreaks that occurred in a few states in 1944. Those states ccounted largely for the total of 19,029 cases recorded that year There were 27,363 cases reported in 1916, the all-time known high. Up to July 13 this year, there were 2,596 cases throughout the country reported to the health service, compared with 1,752 for the similar period of 1944.

This year's total up to mid-July is also the highest for the period since 1934 when 2,694 were recorded for the comparable period.






