Bidault Asks Delegates To Abolish War

Raps U.S. For Staying Outside Old League

PARIS—(A)—The 21-nation peace conference, convened formally in Luxembourg Palace more than a year after the end of the second World War in Europe, was summoned by President Georges Bidault of France Monday to abolish "the plague of war."

Addressing the 1,500 delegates of the victorious Ailies on behalf of the host nation, Bidault pleaded:
"The long suffering peoples of the world today look to you. If we annot get complete peace solutions, I hope that at least we will get reasonable ones.

Blames Russia and U. In an apparent reference to the United States and Russia, Bidault said that whatever blame could be attached to the failure to keep the peace after the World War I, a fundamental cause of that failure was that the two great powers who had taken a decided part in the conquest of arms remained on the sidelines during the solution of peace."

"The hopes of plain men are turned toward us today," he said, concluding his 10-minute, slowly spoken speech. Bidault was then named provisional chairman of the conference on the motion of U.S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes Byrnes Urges Free Press

As the 1,500 delegates assembled for the peace conference Byrnes urged that all negotiations be wide open to the press of the world.

Dr. Evatt And The Juggernaut

Dr. Herbert Evatt, Australia's Minister of External Affairs, is perhaps the most vocal champion of small nations' rights in world affairs. As such, he is in somewhat the position of a lone man disputing the right of way with a juggeraut. Yet it is hard not to admire his courage, applaud his intentions, and wish him well.

Dr. Evatt bases his case on a self-evident fact repeatedly ignored by the great powers. This fact he restated in a radio address to American listeners: "It is a fallacy to suppose that all knowledge and all wisdom must reside at the center of military power."

The Australian minister had the knowledge and wisdom to perceive the inherent danger of the veto in the formative days of the United Nations. In San Francisco, as he recalled in his radio speech, he warned that acceptance of the veto opened the way to its unrestricted use even in matters of relatively small importance. He sought vainly to get its use limited to the "extreme step" of economic or military sanctions against an aggressor.
