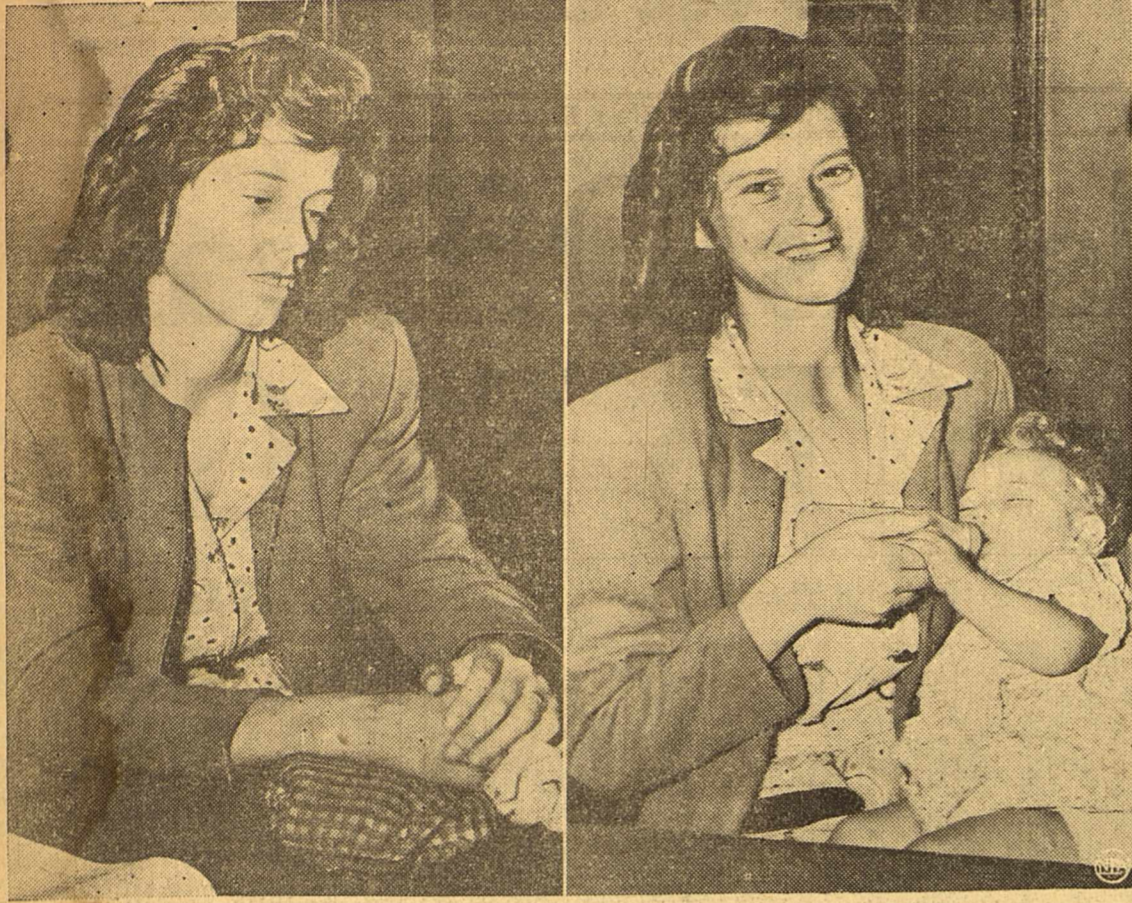


From Depths of Despair to Heights of Joy

Senate Approves Bill Freezing Security Rate

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Senate Friday accepted compromise social security legislation which freezes the old age insurance payroll tax for the eighth year at one per cent.

This action, one of the last by the Senate in the 79th Congress, was adoption of a Senate-House committee report on the bill. The House must yet act before the measure goes to President Truman for signing.

Military Government Described To JayCees

W. A. Thomas, Midland geologist, told of his experience in military government in Europe at a meeting of the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce Friday noon at the Scharbauer Hotel.

Thomas described activities of the enemy oil committee which charted the German oil potential and planned how to combat it. The speaker described the economic control of Germany as set up by Hitler. He also gave the human side of military government in its handling of displaced personnel.

Keith Morrow was program chairman. James Sims gave a report from the safety committee. Ernest Neill reported on a special project. President A. A. Jones announced committee appointments would be published soon.

Minister Persuades Fugitive To Give Up

AMARILLO—(AP)—An Amarillo minister Thursday night persuaded Frank W. James, 22, wanted in Fort Worth on charges of armed robbery, to surrender to officers.

Last Sunday James disguised two Fort Worth officers transporting him to Fort Worth and escaped in a commandeered car. He took with him the officers' two pistols and a sub-machine gun.

An extensive search by North Texas police failed to recapture him.

Thursday the Rev. E. F. Cook, pastor of the Glenwood Baptist Church here, heard a rumor as to the whereabouts of James. He drove more than 100 miles to the hiding place about 12 miles from Childress.

After 25 minutes of pleading to "give yourself up before someone gets hurt" James agreed to return to Amarillo with the Rev. Cook and surrender.

The minister and James made the agreement that the Potter County sheriff would personally deliver James to the Tarrant County sheriff.

Atom Test Pig Invited To Air Day Celebration

HARLINGEN—(AP)—Atomic Test Pig No. 311 has been invited to attend the first annual "Air Day in Texas" celebration here September 7.

Friday a telegram was dispatched by John Van Cronhite, director of the celebration, to the pig in care of Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz.

The porter was personally invited to attend and to demonstrate in the Harlingen airport swimming pool "how you swam from the warship Sakawa after July 1 Bikini atom bomb test."

AWOL GI And Another Man Held In Slaying

ONSET, MASS.—(AP)—An AWOL soldier and another man said by police to fit the description of a suspect known only as "Frank" were held for questioning Friday as police searched the East for the rapist-slayer of 25-year-old Ruth McGurk.

Meanwhile, the search spread westward for a man known as Frank, reported traveling in an automobile with another absent-without-leave soldier who has failed to report back to his New Jersey camp.

Major Bong's Estate Was \$2,000, Two Planes

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—The estate of Maj. Richard I. Bong, 24-year-old Army pilot who shot down 40 Jap planes, amounts to \$2,800 and two airplanes.

Mrs. Marjorie Bong, his 22-year-old widow, filed a petition for letters of administration Thursday. Bong left no will. He had a \$20,000 life insurance policy that was invalidated because when he was killed Aug. 6, 1945, he was flying an experimental Jet P-80 plane in violation of a clause in the policy.

Mrs. Bong now is tutoring fashion models.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator Wheeler (D-Mont) took President Truman off a potential political hot spot Friday by deciding not to seek reelection as an independent.

Truman gave Wheeler a helping hand in the primary by way of a letter to the senator's campaign manager. Had Wheeler decided to run as an independent, the President might have been faced with making a choice between his long time friend and Erickson.

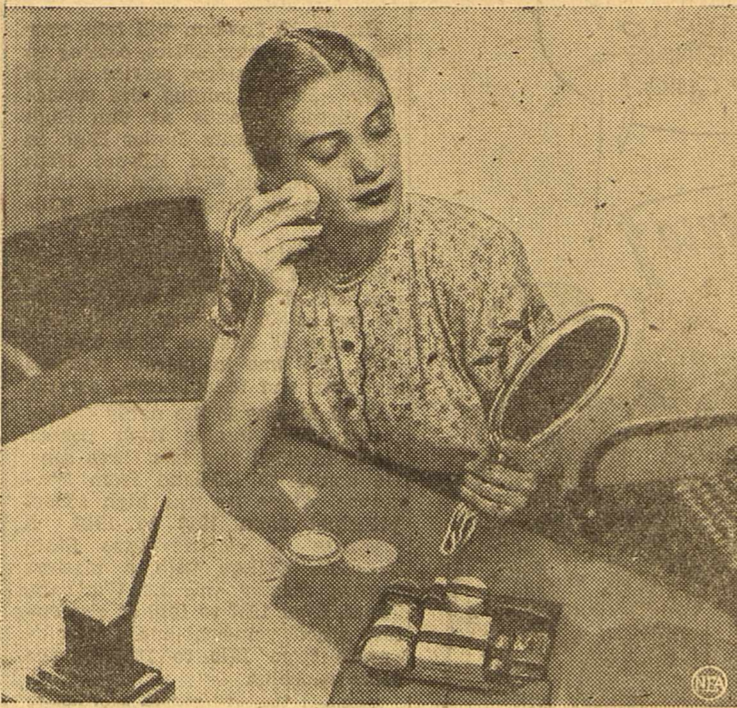

Gloves? She removes these, one finger at a time, folds smoothly and either lays them carefully down or carries them with nicety.

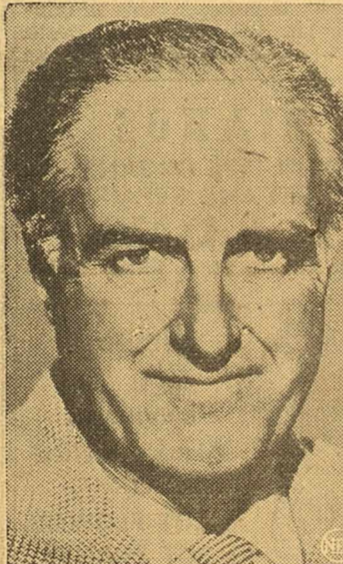

CHIC DUCHESS BUYS FROCKS FROM TOP PARIS COUTURIERS

NEW YORK—American observers back from Paris report that the Duchess of Windsor is "looking very chic"; that she "buys wonderfully well"; and that she is someone to watch from a fashion point of view.

The Baltimore-born Duchess, who has rated the world's best-dressed list before, is following a different tack, now that she is back in Paris, in stocking her wardrobe with couturier fashions. Instead of patronizing one French dressmaker—notable is Mainbocher, formerly of 12 Avenue George V, but now of New York—the Duchess has selected her spring finery from several of the leading couturiers.

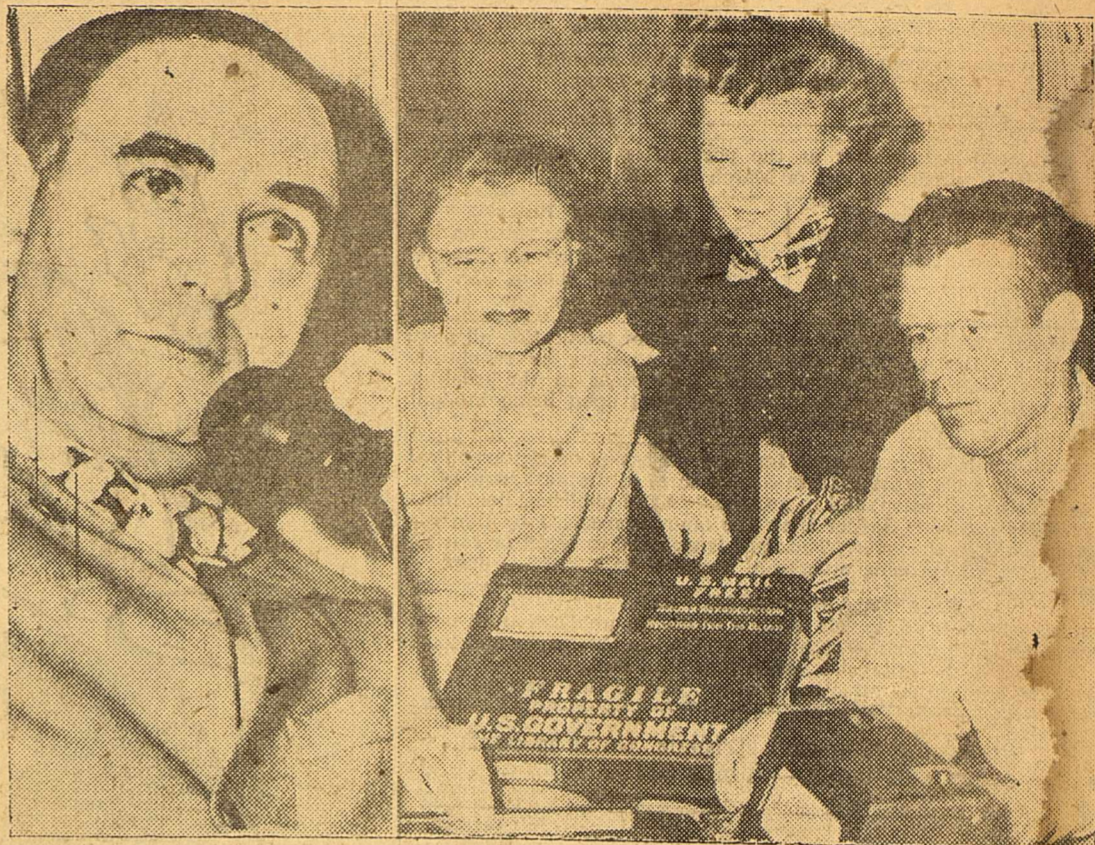
One is newcomer Pierre Balmain. This talked-about designer, who is dressing a number of elegant Parisiennes, signs his name to several of the Duchess's new outfits. Catering to her love of tailored clothes, he has created for her a simple, elegant dress and a more distinctive sweater top suit of navy twill. The sweater, as boldly striped as a blazer, is a pull-on of navy and white jersey, a knit appearing again as the lining of the jacket, which teams with a skirt as pertly pleated as a bobby-soxer's.

But Balmain, whose forte is ultra-feminine duds—his is the strapless dress, the flounced petticoat, the under-slip that puts on a show—has coaxed the Duchess into one of his elaborately draped afternoon dresses. Made of navy wool and highlighted by black silk twill, this dress swatches her hip line with a spiral drape which cascades at the side to the hem.

Schiaparelli has also had a whirl at dressing the Duchess. She has made for her a vividly patterned print silk afternoon dress and snappy suit with yellow-and-brown checked jacket.

Lucien Lelong, noted for an extraordinary collection, has added to the Duchess's wardrobe one of his famed cutaway suits and a long-torso double-breasted tulleur of light gray checks run through with a faint blue line. Evening and dinner dresses which the Duchess will wear to the ballet, concerts, charity fetes and big diplomatic dinner parties also come from the House of Lelong. Although some of these gowns show that the Duchess has succumbed to the new siren silhouette, one—a dinner suit with a black satin skirt and cutaway jacket of yellow satin—proves that she is not entirely faithless to the tailored mode.

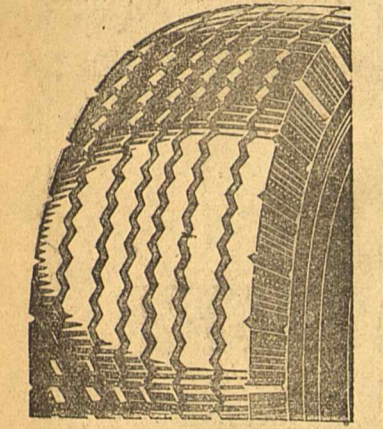

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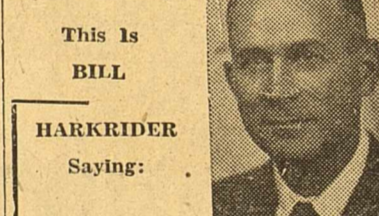

Two Trials

A few hours after Gen. Draja Mikhailovitch died before a firing squad in Belgrade, Lt. Nicolai Redin of the Soviet Navy found himself freed of a charge of espionage by a jury in Seattle. Perhaps it is stretching a point to connect the two events. Yet the contrast between the trials of the two men offers an interesting comparison.

The Mikhailovitch trial was as notable for its omissions as for its disclosures. The disclosures were confusing. There were admissions of Chetnik-Partisan clashes, but doubt as to who fired the first shot. There were admissions of meetings with Nazis, but doubt as to whether these were for the purpose of arranging collaboration or a truce.

Omitted, however, was any mention of the first two years of General Mikhailovitch's international fame. During that time, between the Nazi invasion and Communist Marshal Tito's belated emergence, the Chetnik leader and his guerrillas harassed the Nazis, upset their timetable for the Russian invasion, and kept Nazi divisions engaged which Hitler might have used in his losing race for Moscow against the approach of Russia's freezing winter.

Nothing was heard from Allied fliers and others who had been rescued by the Chetniks and had seen them in action against the Nazis. These men, anxious to testify, were refused the opportunity. Allied personnel and policy received some disparaging comment at the trial. But Americans and Britons were not permitted to speak in defense of the general or their own actions.

In short, the accused received a political trial of which the outcome was never in doubt. Marshal Tito had said, in effect, that Mikhailovitch would be given a fair trial, and then shot. That was the price for backing the wrong political horse.

As for Lieutenant Redin, he has been found innocent, and there is no reason to doubt or quarrel with the verdict. But what a contrast between the trials in Belgrade and in Seattle!

The closing days of the Redin case coincided with official charges of Soviet espionage in Canada, and the subsequent sudden departure of most of the Russians named in the charges. Yet no reference to these events was allowed at the trial.

The judge who heard the Redin case ruled out the death penalty as too severe in time of peace. He stated that no shred of evidence had been presented to connect the defendant with the Kremlin. Any speculation that Lieutenant Redin might have collected secret Navy information for his government instead of his scrapbook was very properly ruled out.

Thus we have seen, in a matter of days, a triumph of politics and a triumph of justice. We may regret and resent General Mikhailovitch's fate. But we can be happy and hopeful in the story of American justice which young Lieutenant Redin will take back home to Russia.

Reese Tasker has moved to Midland from Dallas to become superintendent of the plant. He was with the Oriental Laundry in Dallas, and has had 21 years experience in the laundry business.

The new building is 60x84 feet and all equipment is new. The latest types of washers are installed in the plant, which has its own water softeners. Also ready for inspection are the shiny new extractors, tumblers, apparel presses, shirt presses, and other finishing machines.

A blue and gray color scheme is carried out in the interior of the building, which is large and airy. Sky lights provide adequate ventilation and light for the workers.

Three Services
Three cleaning services will be provided by Suprex. 1. family finish; 2. fluff dry; 3. bachelor service. In the latter, buttons will be sewed on clothing and mending will be done.

Prompt service is promised from the opening, and as soon as possible definite schedules will be worked out.

Pioneer Of Rural Free Mail Delivery Dies

DALLAS —(AP)—George Washington Curtis, who operated one of the first seven rural free delivery mail routes in the United States, died at his home here Thursday.

He was known as the father of rural free delivery in Texas. Curtis was postmaster at Weston, Collin County, at the time rural service was meeting strong opposition. Weston was a testing ground for service in Texas.

In 1899, when Congress appropriated \$3,000 to establish the routes, Curtis made application for a route—26 miles long in dry weather and 50 when it rained. The application was approved.

Three appointments to the faculty of the Midland School System were announced Friday. They include a band director, a Junior High principal, and a Junior High athletic director.

G. E. Massey is the newly elected principal of Junior High School. He is married and has three sons. He comes to Midland from Seagraves, where he was high school principal from 1943 to 1946. A graduate of North Texas State Teachers College with a masters degree, Massey was at Wortham, Texas, from 1937 to 1940 as elementary school principal and at Stephenville from 1940 to 1943 in the same capacity.

Richard Vestal, athlete and graduate of Rice Institute, has been employed as Junior High coach and physical education instructor. Vestal is married and has a son. He will come to Midland after attending the Texas Coaching School at Corpus Christi next week.

Some vacancies still exist in the Midland schools faculty. Harlan Howell, Midland High School principal, said.

Justice Jackson Returns From Nuernberg Trials

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Justice Robert H. Jackson returned from Nuernberg Friday, saying he plans to resume "my normal work" but refusing to answer a direct question as to whether he will stay on the Supreme Court.
 The question was prompted by his public criticism of a fellow justice, Hugo L. Black.
 Jackson told reporters who met him at the National Airport that he would comment only on the war crimes trial where he is the United States prosecutor. Asked specifically about returning to the bench, Jackson said:
 "I won't have anything to say except about Nuernberg."
 Before his departure from Nuernberg Wednesday Jackson said he would be gone only temporarily, planning to return by mid-September.

Man Killed, Three Hurt In Two Family Fued

HOUSTON — (AP) — Manuel Gutierrez, 56, was killed, his two sons wounded, and Trinidad Martinez, 48, critically injured by a series of gun shots in the Martinez yard here Thursday night. Police said they believed the shooting resulted from a feud between the two families.
 Martinez's son, Rudy Martinez, 17, had been charged with assault on murder in connection with the July 7 stabbing of Clem Gutierrez, 23, another son of the man killed Thursday night. Clem Gutierrez is still in critical condition in a hospital.
